## The Hansford Plainsman

Residents of the city of Spearman will have two propositions to vote on in the Tuesday, June 15 bond election.

The purpose of the bond election is to provide local matching funds for the EDA grant that is available to the city to rework the gas and water systems.

The bond issue will be for \$275,000 in two propositions. These will be revenue bonds to be secured by and payable from a lien on and pledge of the net revenues of the city's waterworks, sewer and gas systems.

The passage of these bonds will in no way raise taxes or gas and water bills as they will be paid for from the revenue of these systems, according to city officials.

Proposition No. 1 calls for issuance of bonds in the principal amount of \$139,000 for the purpose of improving and extending the gas system, and Proposition No. 2 calls for issuance of bonds in the principal amount of \$136,000 for the water system.

All bonds are to mature serially not to exceed 40 years from their date and are to be sold at

such prices and bear interest at such rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the city council.

The city estimates that it has lost as much as \$90,000 in gas leaks in the present system during a year. These costs have been lessened somewhat with what repairs have been done in the past year and a half. This saving of gas that the city must pay for would go a long way towards paying off these bonds.

The gas system must be repaired and additional water wells must be drilled.

The issue is as simple as this, do you want the city to raise matching funds for the EDA grant, or lose the grant and have to do all these improvements on our own.

According to city officials, both propositions must pass for them to get the EDA grant.

The election will be held in the East central hallway of the high school building.

Be sure and vote Tuesday for the bonds. We need these improvements if we are to remain a progressive city.

### Hospital Board Discusses Finances and Personnel

At the regular meeting of the Hansford Hospital Board of Directors held June 10, 1976, bills payable and payroll were discussed.

Mack Hoel, certified public accountant of Gruver, who was hired to audit the books reported on the financial condition of the hospital district. He reported accounts receivable were approximately \$123,000.00, of which he had listed \$52,000.00 either slow or bad accounts and suggested they be written off. The board members checked the list of accounts receivable and noted some had the ability to pay. Action was tabled until a later date.

The payroll account in the Gruver State Bank was discussed. It was noted that it would take at least a \$10,000.00 deposit plus the receipts of this month to cover the payroll to keep the account out of the red.

The account in the First State Bank was discussed. This account is used for expenses and with the payment of most of bills for May was almost depleted. Some checks were not sent out and if they had been, the account would have been overdrawn.

An executive session was called to discuss personnel. After a lengthy discussion which lasted over two hours the meeting was opened again to the public.

The board then voted to pay the bills and payroll, and voted to hire Chuck Rigdon on a part-time basis to do maintenance work. Joan McClellan was appointed Supervisor of Nurses and in charge of inservice training. Mrs. Kay McFarlin was relieved of the inservice training of nurses.

Loree Booth was appointed as lab & x-ray technician and Mrs. Reta Pettitt's employment in this capacity was terminated. No action was taken on a hospital supervisor.

Board members, Bill Ething and Dick Kliger were appointed to meet with the county commissioners to discuss how much added revenue would be received when the re-evaluation of property is completed and report back on same at the next meeting.

Vice President Richie Fletcher and secretary Jimmy Vernon were appointed to try to secure a loan to keep the hos-

pital running. Boiler insurance was discussed and Bill Ething was appointed to check with the insurance company that had handled this insurance and see if it was still in effect and to what amount, and to secure some insurance either in Spearman or Gruver.

A special meeting was called for Thursday, June 17 when several items and various reports will be discussed.

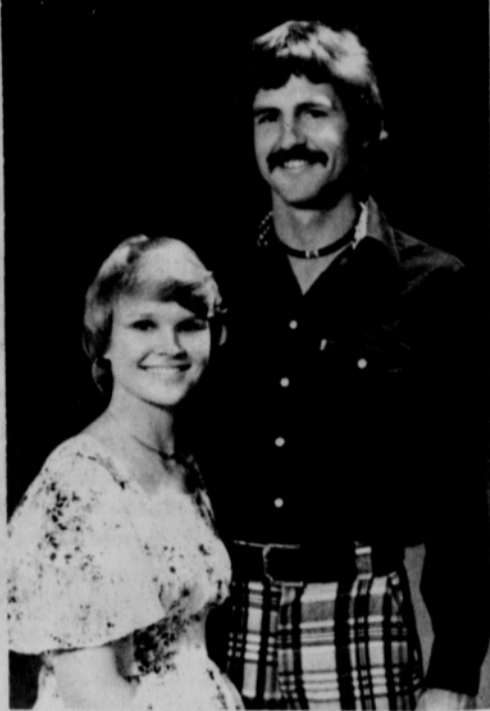
City Summer Recreation Program activities include an adult tennis tournament on Tuesday, June 15 and 17 for men and women's doubles.

### Health For All

Covering coughs and sneezes is still a sound idea. But spreading colds may be more complicated than previously suspected.

According to one new study, cold-catching may require hours of togetherness between giver and getter. At the University of Wisconsin, Dr. Elliott C. Dick and a team of researchers asked volunteers to risk a cold in the interests of science. The study wanted to find out if the volunteers would spread their colds to their spouses.

One infection in each couple was infected by administering nose drops which contained a cold virus. The researchers were surprised to find that less than half of the cold-infected subjects--38 percent--transmitted their colds to their spouses. In those cases where the colds were transmitted, the symptoms from the original infection were at least moderate or severe. And these couples spent many hours together during the week. Usually 122 hours a week, or more than 17 hours a day.

1 Idea of the common cold spreading like wildfire in a community may be a myth, say the researchers. Person-to-person spread of cold viruses, says Dr. Dick, is not really predictable and is more difficult than had been suspected.

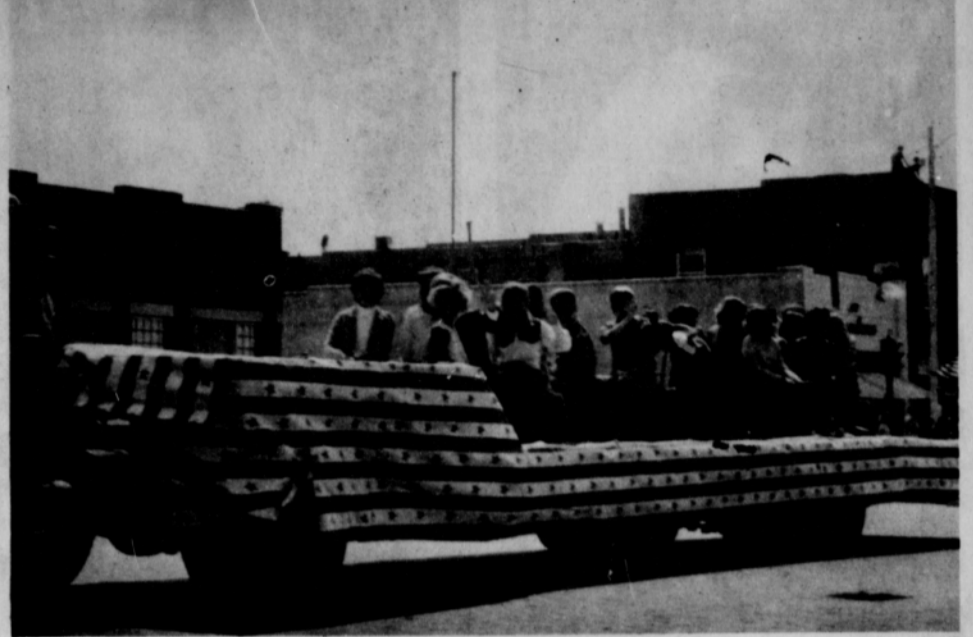

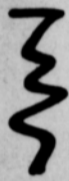

### Cunningham Chosen For National Seminar

DAYTON, OHIO--The Institute for Development of Educational Activities, Inc. (I.D.E.A.), the educational affiliate of the Charles F. Kettering Foundation, announced today that James A. Cunningham, superintendent of schools in Spearman, has been chosen as one of 600 outstanding American

educators to participate in a week-long national seminar this summer. The I.D.E.A. Fellow Institutes are designed to give participants a thorough grounding in some of the new and emerging problems and practices affecting elementary and secondary education.

The theme for the 1976 Fellows Program is Education for Responsible Citizenship. The selection of this highly significant topic is based upon recent studies of school reform which concluded that schools could not be reformed substantially unless individual rights, which students have gained over the past few years, are balanced with individual responsibilities to the school and society. An analysis will be made of the need for a new and more vigorous emphasis on citizenship and moral/values education, the responsibilities youth have to school and society, and the need for students to assume greater responsibility for their own learning.

In addition to reviewing a report of the National

Task Force on Citizenship Education, 16 nationally prominent educational leaders will address the participants. They will include Dr. Ewald B. Nyquist, New York State Commissioner of Education; Dr. Leon Lessinger, University of South Carolina; Dr. Ralph W. Tyler, Science Research Associates, Inc.; and Dr. Wendell Pierce, Education Commission of the States.

The I.D.E.A. Fellows Institutes are the oldest, continuing in-service program for school administrators in the nation. Over 4,000 elementary and secondary educators from North America and overseas have participated in this program.

### Summer Fun & Asthma

Segregating children with asthma is a mistake, says the American Lung Association. Asthmatic children, except for a few severe cases, should be included in regular group activities at camps, school physical education programs, and all kinds of recreational programs. Camps that have a nurse--or physician on call--are the best choices. Sudden attacks of asthma

can be scary business for anyone, especially children. But asthma may also involve mild, more or less continuous breathing difficulty, too. Mild or severe, asthma attacks--when they occur in the first three and a half decades of life--are usually triggered by a variety of factors. Substances in the air or environment, acute respiratory infections and emotional disturbances. Heredity seems to play a part, too.

When doctors can pinpoint the offending substances, asthmatic patients may receive allergy shots to make them less sensitive to the substances. Now there is also a new drug called cromolyn sodium which can help prevent attacks of seasonal asthma, especially attacks caused by pollen in the air.

Six million people in this country have asthma, and nearly half are children under the age of sixteen. Treatment at young ages is important, says the American Lung Association, because asthma in childhood can--and often does--contribute to later lung disease.

The Federal Power Commission hearings on the proposed plans of several of the large gas companies to curtail gas for irrigation usage have hit agri-business people in a vulnerable spot.

In the Texas Panhandle alone there are 70,191 irrigation wells of which 46,154 use natural gas--just to bring the situation down to hard facts.

The meetings this week were an effort to find solutions for the problems confronting those who are involved in irrigation farming and agri-business.

### Perseverance Pays

AUSTIN -- Perseverance pays.

After more than three decades highway personnel of New Mexico and Texas have rebuilt the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad crossing of US 84 in Farwell.

The highway forms a perpendicular crossing of the line separating the two states. However, the railroad crosses the state line and the highway on a diagonal. Negotiations have continued for years because of problems arising from the need to install crossing signals in a complicated pattern in the two states.

Neither state can, by law, perform work in the other.

It took a signed agreement between the governor of New Mexico and the governor of Texas, along with railroad acquiescence, before the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation could complete its part of the work.

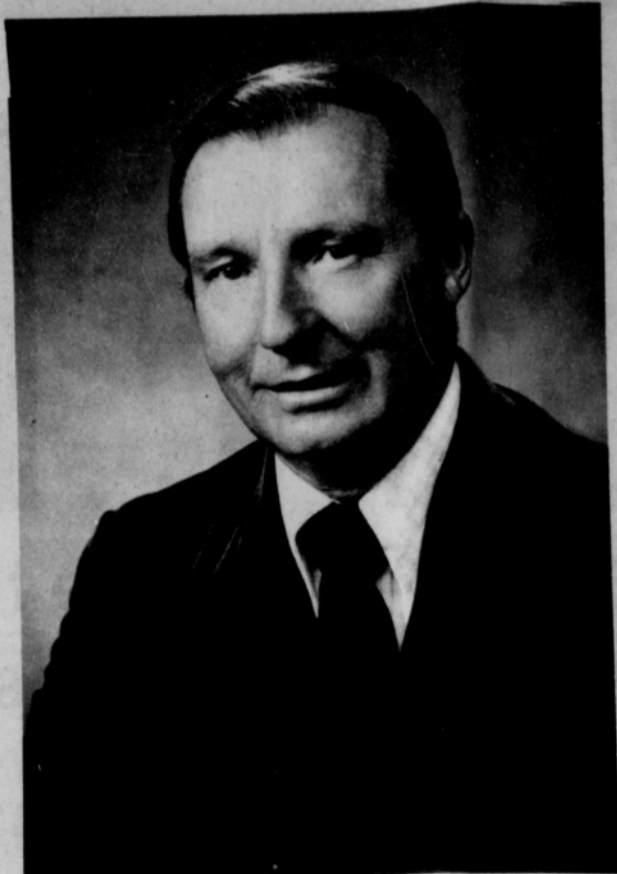

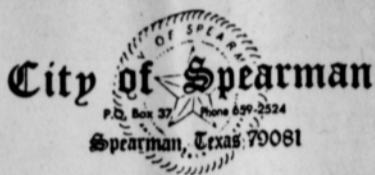

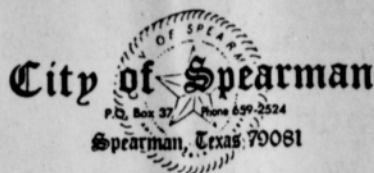
