## Third Man Killed On Highway 15

Long, straight and uncluttered Highway 15 has claimed its third life in less than three weeks. A Borger youth was killed Tuesday morning at the intersection of 15 and FM 281 14 miles southwest of Spearman.

Killed in the car-truck accident was Sammy Bedford Gillean, 19, of 133 Turner in Borger. The driver of the truck Armal Jason Taylor, 26, of Borger was not injured.

Highway patrolmen investigating the accident say Taylor was preparing to turn left from the highway onto the farm road, when Gillean's car hit the rear of the bobtail truck.

The youth, who was a construction worker in Spearman, was pinned in the wreckage. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of Peace J. D. Miller.

Officers said the car turned on its side when it hit the truck.

Two weeks ago Francis Jones of Spearman and Jerry Brown of Electra were killed in a wreck just a short way from the site of Tuesday morning's accident. Gillean was survived by his parents, a sister and grandfather.

He was a member of the Bible Baptist Church and services were conducted in Borger.

## Spearman, Morse Set Lion Cabinet To Meet Here School Opening Plans

School opening schedules and requirements were announced, or re-stated this week by the heads of the Spearman and Morse Schools.

At Spearman all seniors are asked to attend registration Aug. 28, from 9-12 a. m. Juniors, Sophomores and Freshmen do not have to attend registration unless they wish to make changes in their schedule planned last Spring.

Junior registration is scheduled 1-4 p. m. Aug. 28, sophomore time is 9-12 a. m. Aug. 29 and freshmen 1-4 p. m. that day.

First grade students in Spearman will register 9-12 a. m. Aug. 29. All students must have been vaccinated for

smallpox and diphtheria. Morse Supt. John Brumley says classes will start there Sept. 3 with a full day of school. Pre-registration for grades 7-12 will be held at 9 a. m. Aug. 30. He said it was most important for all students in these grades to pre-register and work out their schedules before Sept. 3.

First grade students at Morse will not pre-register, but must bring a birth certificate and have a smallpox vaccination.

The Morse faculty has 11 teachers this year. Frank Lewis will be the principal and teach agriculture and science. Miss Nellie McWhirter will teach math. Mrs. Vera Anderson, (cont. on page 2)

## Many Boys Report For Grid Teams

"Drive, Drive! Keep your head up! Boy, don't be bashful! Hit'em! No! No! You cannot block a man on your knees!" And, with these age-old commands by the coaches, football season started again in Hansford County.

In Spearman and Gruver the pads are popping as the teams have started contact work. At Morse, under a new interscholastic league rule, this first week is all conditioning work.

Contact starts Monday. Coach Don Seymour has the largest turnout of prospects for Spearman in several years. He reported that 58 boys have drawn uniforms and Tuesday only one player was missing from workouts. The coaches said they did not know if the boy would return.

Both the varsity and freshman teams are working out in pads at night, but the freshmen do their contact work to themselves.

The lack of size and speed is going to be the big problems for the Lynx this season. Tuesday night, with Ike Richeson not at workouts, there was not a varsity lineman that topped the 170 pound mark.

In the purple jerseys there were ends Don Archer, 162, and Leroy Callaway 132; tackles Bill Carden, 153 and Clayton Cochran, 160, guard Wesley Brinkley, 135, center Bill Blackburn, 155.

In the backfield Johnny Crawford, 165, is the field general, with Mike Morris 153, and Larry Butts, 140, at halfbacks and bouncing David Batson, 164 at fullback.

Although these are wearing the purple jersey, there are a host of aggressive sophomores and juniors scrapping to take a royal purple shirt away from its owner. Senior Mac Crawford, who missed some early workouts, is contesting aggressively for one of the shirts. The coaches are expecting the purple to change hands several times before the opening kick-off in Panhandle Sept. 6.

Lion District Governor O. A. Stephens of Amarillo and his cabinet will hold their first session of the year in Spearman Saturday and Sunday.

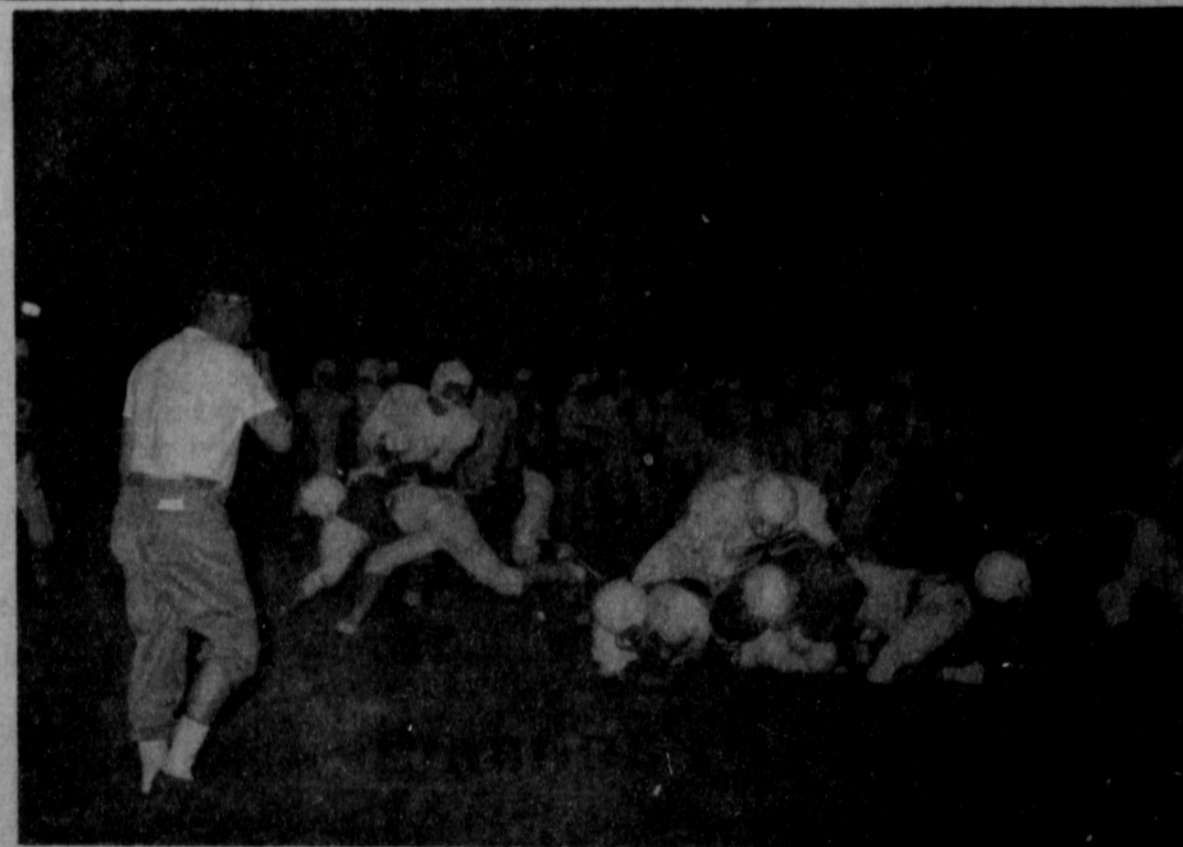
The District 2T-1 cabinet consists of 28 members and they will be accompanied by their wives.

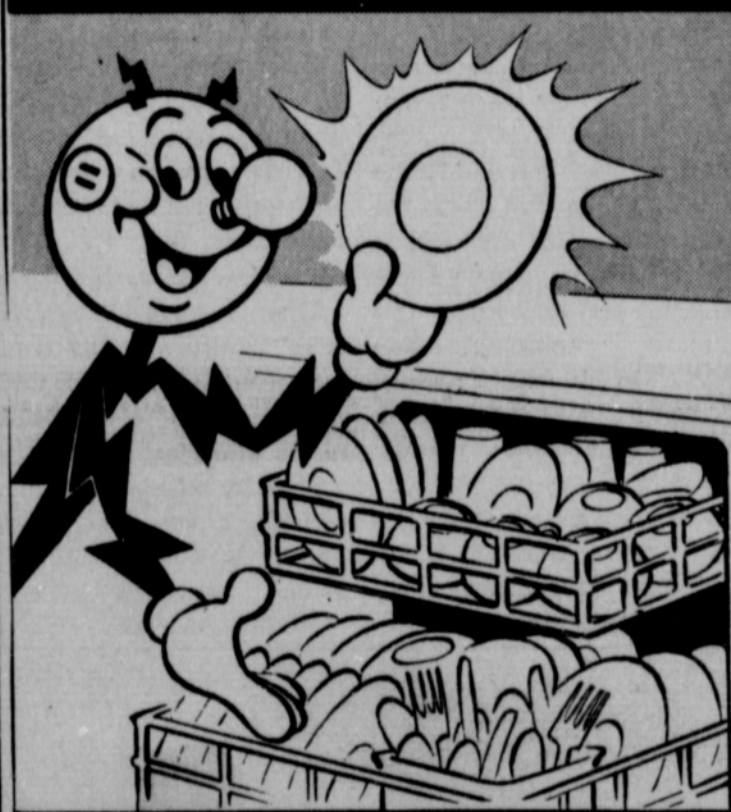

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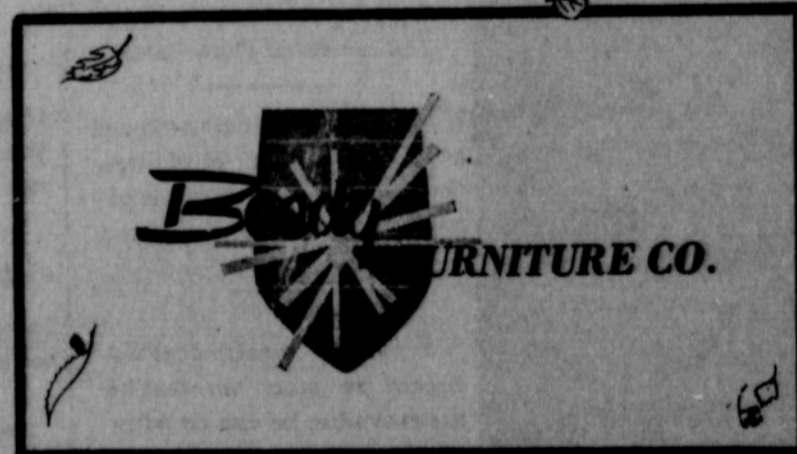

## Autograph Party Sunday

Miss Loula Grace Erdman will autograph her new book "Life Was Simpler Then" at an autograph party Sunday August 25 from 3 to 5 p. m. in the Community Room of the First State Bank. Copies of Miss Erdman's other books will also be available. Included will be "Edge of Time," and the \$10,000 Dodd-Mead award book, "Years of The Locust."

Miss Erdman, a native of Missouri, taught English in Amarillo and at West Texas State where she is a novelist in residence and associate professor of English. She at present directs a writers' workshop and an advanced course in creative writing.

Miss Erdman's books, both the adult and teenage ones, have been reprinted in England, Germany, Australia and New Zealand. "The Edge of Time" was a German Book Club selection. Most of them have been transcribed into Braille and some have been put into talking book records.

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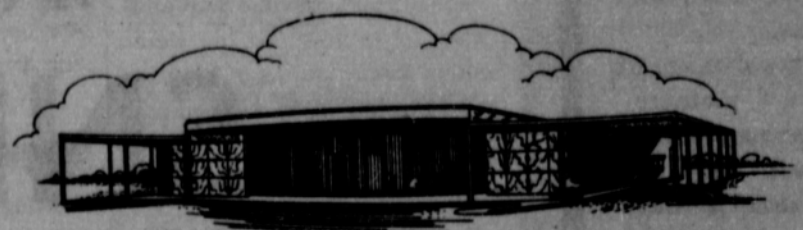
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# County Agent's Report

## DISEASE THREATENS

A new kind of horse influenza that is causing great concern in the eastern states may soon spread into Texas, says Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian at Texas A&M College.

Dr. Patterson warns that horse owners in Texas should pay special attention to their animals during the next few weeks for signs of respiratory infection. An affected animal will cough, run a fever up to 105 degrees, have a slight nasal discharge, and show a loss of appetite.

An animal with the disease should be isolated as soon as it is detected because local outbreaks may affect 80 to 90 percent of a horse population. This precaution reduces the danger of passing the infection on by direct contact or contamination of feed and water, says Dr. Patterson.

He stresses that animals showing these symptoms should not be exercised. A veterinarian should be called immediately and with proper treatment the animal usually recovers in five to ten days, Dr. Patterson explains.

## PRUSSIC ACID POISONING

Prussic acid results from the hydrolysis of a glucoside which is normally present in actively growing plants of the sorghum family. The splitting of the glucoside into prussic acid only occurs in dangerous amounts when the plant's growth is interrupted by inadequate moisture or frosting. There are several factors that influence the production of prussic acid in the plants. The following factors should be considered in controlling losses from this poison:

1. The type of plant to be grazed—All members of the Sorghum family, including Johnson grass, sudan, milo, forage sorghums, and all the hybrids of this group of plants are potentially hazardous under certain circumstances. Young plants, or second growth suckers, are more likely to cause trouble than older plants nearing maturity.

2. The fertility and tilth of the soil—The more luxuriant the plants are growing, the higher the level of the precursor glucoside they will contain, and the more likely they are to be dangerous if their growth is interrupted.

3. Weather conditions—Interruption of growth by moisture stress may be due to depleted soil moisture, or due to the plant losing moisture through evaporation faster than it can transport from roots to leaves. This situation frequently occurs when the temperature and wind velocity are high and relative humidity of the air is low.

When there is a shortage of available soil moisture, plants may remain toxic for extended periods. However, when moisture stress is caused by excessive moisture loss, plants may be toxic only during the period that they are wilted.

4. Grazing management—Hungry animals turned into a sorghum field in the hot part of the day might fill up rapidly on wilted forage and be poisoned, but if turned in early in the morning while the plants were normal would likely fill up and lay down before wilting reached a dangerous point. Regardless of the time of day, animals should be watched closely for an hour or two when turned in on pasture of this type. Should any animal become restless and breathe fast, all animals should be removed immediately. Death or recovery from prussic acid poisoning can occur within a few minutes.

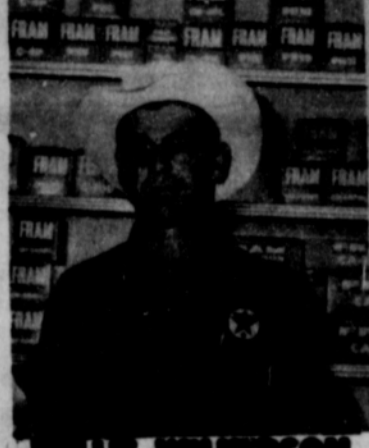
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# THE MORSE CODE

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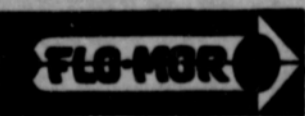

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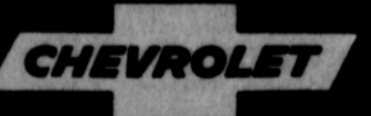
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
