Third Man Killed On Highway 15

Long, straight and uncluttered Highway 15 has claimed its third life in less than three weeks. A Borger youth was killed Tuesday morning at the intersection of 15 and FM 281 14 miles southwest of Spearman.

Killed in the car-truck accident was Sammy Bedford Gillean, 19, of 133 Turner in Borger. The driver of the truck Armal Jason Taylor, 26, of Borger was not injured.

Highway patrolmen investigating the accident say Taylor was preparing to turn left the highway onto the farm road, when Gillean's car hit the rear of the bobtail truck.

The youth, who was a construction worker in Spearman, was pinned in the wreckage. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of Peace J. D. Miller.

Officers said the car turned truck.

Two weeks ago Francis Jones of Spearman and Jerry Brown of Electra were killed in a wreck just a short way from the site of Tuesday morning's accident.

Gillean was survived by his parents, a sister and grandfather.

He was a member of the Bi= ble Baptist Church and services were conducted in Borger.



All band members are urged to attend this Aug. 26 meeting and bring their instruments. This announcement was made by band director Larry Sparks.





DISEASE THREATENS

A new kind of horse influenza that is causing great concern in the eastern states may soon spread into Texas, says Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian at Texas A&M College.

Dr. Patterson warns that horse owners in Texas should pay special attention to their animals during the next few weeks for signs of respiratory infection. An affected animal will cough, run a fever up to 105 degrees, have a slight nasal discharge, and show a loss of appetite.

An animal with the disease should be isolated as soon as it is detected because local outbreaks may affect 80 to 90 percent of a horse population, This precaution reduces the danger of passing the infecttion on by direct contact of contamination of feed and water, says Dr. Patterson,

He stresses that animals showing these symptoms should not be exercised. A veterinarian should be called immediately and with proper treatment the animal usually recovers in five to ten days, Dr. Patterson explains. PRUSSIC ACID POISONING

Prussic acid results from the hydrolysis of a glucoside which is normally present in actively growing plants of the sorghum family. The splitting of the glucoside into prussic acid only occurs in dangerous amounts when the plant's growth is interrupted by inadequate moisture or frosting. There are several factors that influence the production of prussic acid in the plants. The following factors should be considered in controlling losses from this pofson:

1. The type of plant to be grazed-All members of the Sorghum family, including Johnson grass, sudan, milo, forage sorghums, and all the hubrids of this group of plants are potentially hazardous under certain circumstances. Young plants, or second growth suckers, are more likely to cause trouble than older plants nearing maturity.

2. The fertility and tilth of the soil-The more luxuriant the plants are growing, the higher the level of the precursor glucoside they will contain, and the more likely they are to be dangerous if

their growth is interrupted. 3. Weather conditions-Interruption of growth by moisture stress may be due to depleted soil moisture, or due to the plant losing moisture through evaporation faster than it can transport from roots to leaves. This situation frequently occurs when the temperature and wind velocity are high and relative humidity of the air is low.

When there is a shortage of available soil moisture, plants may remain toxic for extended periods. However, when moisture stress is caused by excessive moisture loss, plants may be toxic only during the period that they are wilted.







BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 62 of Art-icle XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by add-ing thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

"(e) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fundshall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by addivision to the election of the State of Texas, be amended by addivision to the election of the State of Texas, be amended by addivision and publication.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by addivision and publication to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 16 proposing an amendment to
Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize
an increase in the total amount of
bonds or obligations that may be
issued by the Veterans' Land Board
to Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000,00); providing for
the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating
thereto and the use of the Veterans'
Land. Fund; and providing for an
election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so the same will hereafter read as follows:
"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board, Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances, One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advise and consent of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen membershall, with the advise and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members sewing on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the Gen-

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000,00) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000,00) of which have here-tofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall hear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or pur-

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT chasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands neretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such lands; sums received by and March 31. 1955, and who upon the failure of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest or the bonds comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys and not expended for the said Board may be used by said Board as is now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys and not expended for the said Board may be used by said Board as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set assidgmant remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the

regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All moneys attributable to the contents of the contents and and additional bonds."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment. no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitu-tional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November. 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150.000.000.00; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.
