



The Oil Dailey of March 16, 1979 makes the suggestion that controls be imposed on milk prices. To implement these controls, the government would, of course, have to set up a "Council on Wholemilk Stability and Mandatory Intrastate Lowfat Controls (CONS MILC)." The Council would then in all probability establish the following Price Control rules:

1. Old Milk - any milk produced from a cow born on or before December 31, 1972. The milk can be sold at the May 1973 price adjusted for inflation.

2. New Milk - any milk produced from a cow born on or after January 1, 1973. This milk can sell for the September 1975 price adjusted for inflation.

3. Stripper milk - any milk produced from a cow that makes less. than 10 pints a day or alternately any milk produced by a group of cows that graze at a density of less than 10 per acre. This milk can sell at the 1970 uncontrolled price.

4. "New" new milk - any milk produced by a cow born after May 31, 1979 that grazes 2- 1/2 miles from another cow or in a ravine a thousand feet deeper than the meanest cow. This milk can sell at the June 1, 1979 uncontrolled price adjusted for inflation.

DENTON, (16) -- A cell hemical that may improve the chances of persons prone to cancer has been found at North Texas State University, a scien-tist there disclosed today.

Dr. David A. Busbee, Director of the Genetics Center and Associate Professor of Biology at the Unviersity, told an inter-viewer he believes a protein cell The program was a real aponent discovered "by ac-ent" in his laboratory can lower the abnormal level of an enzyme, AHH (aryl hydrocaron hydroxylase) in patients with lung cancer and perhaps other types of cancer caused by hydrocarbons similar to those found in cigaratte smoke. Dr. Busbee and his collea-

developed cancer. The discovery of a relation-ship of AHH to lung cancer may pave the way to devising a diagnostic test for finding lung cancer earlier while there is some chance for cure. 
