Basketball

Stinnett Cagers Lose At Spearman

SPEARMAN—Spearman walked away with four basketball victories here Tuesday night as the Lynx claimed a 71-64 win against the Stinnett Rattlers, and the Lynxettes triumphed, 65-41. The Lynx JV's won a 44-41 decision over the Rattlers, and the girls coasted to a 47-28 victory.

The Lynx returning four starters off a team that finished 8-2 in District 1-AA play last year, and a pre-season pick to win-it-all this year, engineered the fast break with precision and utilized the full-court press to its fullest to take an 18-11 first quarter lead. Spearman hit the rims for two quick buckets before Stinnett scored on a three-point play by Reece Evans. Evans scored all but two of the Rattlers' points in the initial period.

Veterans Zane Newton and Jim Jones paced Spearman with eight and six-points respectively in the second period to propel the Lynx to a 20-point halftime spread, 40-20.

Playing inspired ball in the third-quarter, the Rattlers drilled in eight unanswered points before the Lynx found the range and scored on a bucket by Twane Freimel.

Stinnett outscored the Lynx, 18-12, in the third stanza, but Spearman still held a 53-28 margin going into the final frame.

In the final period the Rattlers pulled within 10-points of the Lynx, but Jones ripped the cords for six-points for the host boys to surge ahead, 60-42, with 3:33 left in the contest.

With 1:01 remaining, Danny Brawley dropped in two beautiful shots that swished the nets from the baseline. Mike Sargent canned two-points, and Rodney Greene hit a pair of charity tosses, but time ran out for the Rattlers, and the Lynx

escaped with the win. Jones paced the winners with 18-points. Other Lynx to score in double figures were Newton, 14; Freimel, 13; and Randy Reid, 11.

Evans led all scorers with 20 markers, and Sargent hit 11. Bob Williams added seven; Brawley, six; and Mike Leffew, four.

Stinnett got excellent floor play from Leffew, and Tommy Watson.

Spearman dominated the rebounding category, 53-30. Jones hauled down 15 boards; Freimel, 13; and Alan Shields, 12.

Watson grabbed seven cars for Stinnett; Evans, six; and Sargent, five.

Spearman-Stinnett 65-41 (Girls)

The Rattlerettes turned in their best performance of the season in the girls' match.

With five returning starters of a team that won the Class AA state championship in 1977, the Lynxettes found the going a little rough in the first six minutes of the match, as a much improved Rattlerettes team battled the more experienced girls in the first period.

Stinnett matched points with the Lynxettes in the opening stanza and trailed, 10-9, with 2:20 left in the period.

Tracie Keetch and Debbie Greene broke loose for four points in less than a minute to give the Lynxettes a 14-9 first-quarter lead.

In second-quarter action, the Lynxettes stretched their lead to 18-9 before Rattlerettes Janice Pool and Monica Gage combined efforts to slice the Lynxettes lead to 18-16 with 4:34 on the clock.

The Spearman girls blitzed the nets for 10-points in less than two minutes for a 30-20 halftime command.

When play resumed, the

Spearman varsity quickly established their ball control game, and ended third-quarter play sporting a 53-31 lead.

The Lynxettes rang up 13 counters to Stinnett's 10 in the final period to retain their lead, and win the game, 65-41.

Many games are won or lost at the free-throw line, and Spearman cashed in on 21 of 30 attempts from the charity stripe, while the Rattlerettes were accurate on seven of 18.

Stinnett held the advantage from the field, hitting 40 per cent in the first half, and 68 per cent in the second half. Spearman shot a frigid 25 per cent in first half play, and 37 per cent in the second half.

Christy Collier took game scoring honors with 27-points. Keetch and Greene chipped in 16 and 12 respectively.

Pool led the Rattlerettes with 20-points; Jennifer Smith and Suzi Phillips four apiece; and Sandee Reger, three.

Stinnett guards turned in a fine defensive effort. The defense played the boards for 25 rebounds. Paula Hawthorne matched 10 caroms; Kimi Collier, nine; and Tammy Gaddis, five.

Spearman's defense was led by all-state guards JoVell Comegys and Cindy Gressett, and Lori McAdams.

Junior Varsity

In the JV boys' game, Spearman was paced by Mark Franklin and Steve Shields with 14 and 10-points respectively in a win over the Rattlers.

Willie Dodd paced the JV Rattlers with 11 tallies, and David Lantime scored 10. Coenae Shields pumped in 25-points to lead Spearman's JV girls in their 47-28 win over the Rattlerettes.

Janet Pool tossed in 20-points for the Rattlerettes.

Insurance Corner UNDER INSURANCE



Despite this phenomenal growth in the value of residential properties, many homeowners have failed to protect their investment by purchasing adequate amounts of insurance. Unless insurance limits have been increased on a fairly regular basis, a home bought only a few years ago is likely to be substantially underinsured. In the event of a total loss - such as can occur in a fire or tornado - the owner might find his insurance money woefully inadequate to rebuild the family's home.

Even if the home is only partially damaged, it is important that insurance limits be equal to at least 80 percent of the replacement value of the structure. Say a partial loss occurs, perhaps a fire damages two rooms of the house. If the insurance on the dwelling is 80 percent or more of the full replacement cost, the policy will pay the total costs of repairs to the structure. On the other hand, if a family fails to carry insurance limits equal to at least 80 percent of replacement cost, the policy will pay only a portion of the full replacement cost of repairs.

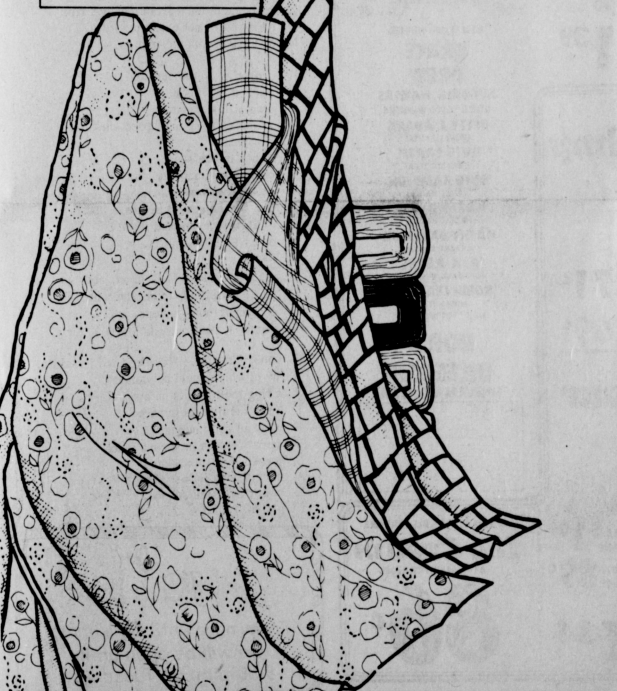

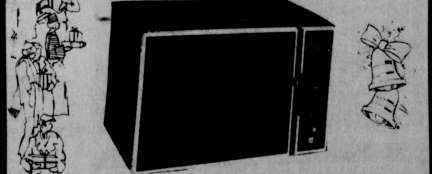

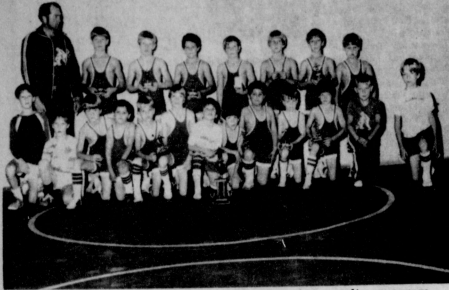
