





Bullock Blasts Revenue Cutoff current total of tax revenues. "Highfalutin debate on the pros and cons of revenue sharing doom't mean a thing to the taxpayer," the Comptroller said. "The cold truth is that in most cities and counties, he'll have to pay at least 20 percent more in local taxes if the program ends." The death of the program would also be a hardship on the state, Bullock added, noting that the Legislature would have to write a budget without the \$100 million a year it could otherwise expect. "But the real impact would be on the cities and counties that have received nearly \$1 billion during the five-year life of the revenue sharing program," he said. "It's time for state officials to worry about more than the state budget. We've

AUS TIN-City halls and courthouses across Texas will have to close their doors or drastically increase local taxes to keep providing the same level of service if Congress doesn't extend the revenue thating program. Comp

troller Bob Bullock said this week.

Bullock released a list showing the percentage tax increase each county and city would have to enact to replace revenue sharing funds they now receive.

On the assumption that revenue sharing is not renewed, Spearman would need an 12.4 percent increase in tax revenues in order to replace revenue.

Hansford County is one of 84 Texas counties that would need to generate less than 20 percent more income from tax dollars to replace lost revenue sharing funds. The actual figure given out by Bullock for Hansford County is 15.8. Gruver would need an 15.3 percent increase in tax revenues.

New License

Stickers Are

Sticky

AUS TIN---Application for new motor vehicle registration plates is more simple in Texas this year than at any time since World War II.

Instead of new metal plates the Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT) is issuing validation stickers to be applied to the upper left-hand corner of the rear plate issued last year. An adhesive on the back of the sticker folls removal of the sticker by would-be thieves -- or motorists who foul up the instructions for application.

And of course them.

And, of course, there have been some almost unbelievable lash-ups by otherwise intelligent motorists. For instance:

A motorist in Corpus Christi was very careful to put the validation sticker in the proper position on the rear plate -- except that it was his neighbor's car. Both vehicles, parked side by side, were red.

In Amarillo a motorist paid for his sticker and immediately went to the patiding lot of the county courthouse. He applied the sticker to the rear license plate -- of the vehicle owned by the assistant county tax assessor-collector. Same make, same model, same color -- wrong car. One woman received her sticker in the mail. She wanted to see how well the "stickum" on the back worked, She put it on the kitchen table. It worked fine.

Another motorist went back to his tax assessorcollector. He was plenty mad as he displayed a sticker almost obliterated with holes. "I'm having a (deleted) time stapling this (deleted) thing to my metal plate," he fumed. The information "staple here" is for information of the tax collector's office to Indicate where

to attach the sticker to the registration receipt. He got a new one.
One registrant bought stickes for two can but left one on the counter. The next man in line thought he needed two sticken, so he picked up the one he needed for his vehicle and the "extra. At last report they were trying to find him. The first motorist got a replacement sticker.
A motorist with four vehicles paid for four registrations. He applied

vehicles paid for four registrations. He applied the four stickers to the front and rear plates of two cars. Then he read the instructions. He paid for two additional stickers. But Texas motorists are not alone in fouling up. Louisiana also has initiated the validation-sticker system this war. There

Louisiana also has initiated the validation-sticker system this year. There a tax collector was explaining how the sticker was to be applied. He pointed to a sample plate on the wall, which had a sticker in the proper position on the plate.

"Now you put the sticker exactly where that sticker is," he explained, Sure enough, the motorist quickly peeled the backing sheet off the sticker and had it on his thumb ready to put it on the sample plate. The clerk stopped him in the nick of time. So a reminder or two from the Motore Vehicle Division of DHT:

(1) Read the instructions for applying your sticker. The instructions are applying the sticker is a surface.

able both in English and

able both in English and is Spanish.

(2) If you louse it up, carefully scrape off all the sticker and put the pieces in an envelope.

(3) Take the sticker pieces, with your registration receipt, to the county tax assessor-collector's office or substation, (4) Take along \$1.30 for the replacement fee for each new validation sticker.

"Money will be available this year for farmers and machers," the credit bank president said, "but we anticipate an upward trend of money costs toward the latter half of the year."

Calkins challenged Amarillo PCA stockholders to reevaluate their values. He pointed out that a break-

down in cooperate ethics and the use of bribery and future profit ends have brought vividly to the surface the need for this reevaluation.
"We can't blame the ethic breakdown on a 'faceless thing', Calkins emphasized. "An individual had to propose the bribe; an individual had to accept it."

A highlight of the meeting was presentation of a 25-year service award to James Van'elt, Amarillo PCA president. PCA Board Chairman Gaston Wells of Dumas made the award, recognizing Van-Pelt for his outstanding contributions to agricultural finance.

VanPelt started his PCA career in 1950 at Memphis PCA. Amarillo PCA last year loaned more than \$79 million to farmers and ranchers in 12 Amarillo-area counties.

Reelected directors at the meeting were Wells and Wesley Garnett of Spearman. Representing the board of directors on the program was Russell Blanton of Claude, who gave the board's official report to the stockholders.

Amarillo PCA members were entertained Friday night at a social. On the program were two members of the Department of Public Safety, Reeves Jungkind and Floyd Hacker. Jungkind is DPS firearms training officer; Hacker is DPS director of training. Both are stationed in Austin. Speaker Friday night was Charles R. Townsend, West Texas State University professor of history. Townsend, a Nocona native, spoke on the birth of swing music.

Child Care Meeting Set

A public meeting is scheduled in Amarillo March 5 to afford persons in the Parhandle area an opportunity to present opinions and suggestions regarding new child care licensing standards, it has been announced by Nathan Martin, regional administrator for the State Department of Public Welfare. Meetings will be held from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. and from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. at the Psychiatric Pavillion, 7201 Evans Boulevard. All persons interested in regulations affecting child care facilities are invited to participate, Martin said. Suggestions received will be sent to the department's licensing division for consideration in formulating state-wide standards.

The Legislature last year passed a new law broadening the welfare department's licensing responsibilities. Minimum standards for facilities have been adopted on a provisional basis, and hearings

oeen adopted on a provis-onal basis, and hearings

and meetings are now being held over the state to gain further suggestions before the standards are made permanent.

The provisional standards are subject to change within the framework of the law and reasonable interpretation of its provisions according to Jerome Chapman, deputy commissioner and acting director of the welfare department licensing division.

"Suggestions of merit and significance will receive full evaluation," Chapman said.

Minimum standards cover 24-hour care facilities, day care only, and non-accredited schools, kindergartens and nurseries. The standards cover matters affecting the health and well being of children, including the number of children to receive care in a facility, numbers and qualifications of staff, activities of the children, discipline, naps and rest periods, sanitation and health, fire safety, nurtition, and adequacy of buildings grounds and equipment. Standards vary according to the kind of program offered by the facility and the number of children to be served, growing more comprehensive for the larger facilities.

Martin will chair the Amarillo meeting, assisted by members of the regional licensing staff, Similar meetings are scheduled March 9 at Abllene and March 11 at Wichita Falls.


