The Dallas Morning News has acquired the exclusive first newspaper publication rights for the state of Texas to James A. Michener's forthcoming historical novel Texas.

The agreement with Michener entitles The Morning News to excerpt three chapters of the book

into six installments for newspaper publication. The series will appear in the newspaper in the summer of 1985 just before release of the book by Random House.

The Morning News stated "they had a strong faith in the quality of Michener's writing, and the fact that he happened to be doing it in Texas seems fitting for our newspaper as it nears its 100th anniversary in 1985 and as Texas approaches its sesquicentennial in 1986."

This will be the 32nd book by the Pulitzer-Prize-winning author. "Texas" will be the result of 3 1/2 years of research by the author who has spent the past two years living in Austin and traveling throughout the state.

The 77 year-old Michener said "Texas is a wonderful subject, and at this time in my life, I wouldn't waste my time on secondary subjects. This book will start with Cabeza de Vaca (the 16th century explorer who discovered Texas), and it will end with whatever infamous things you (Texans) are up to in 1984."

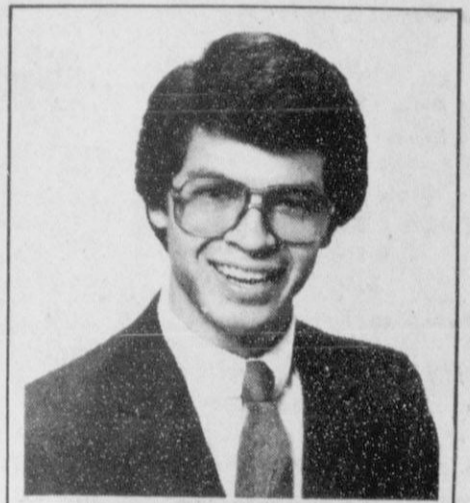

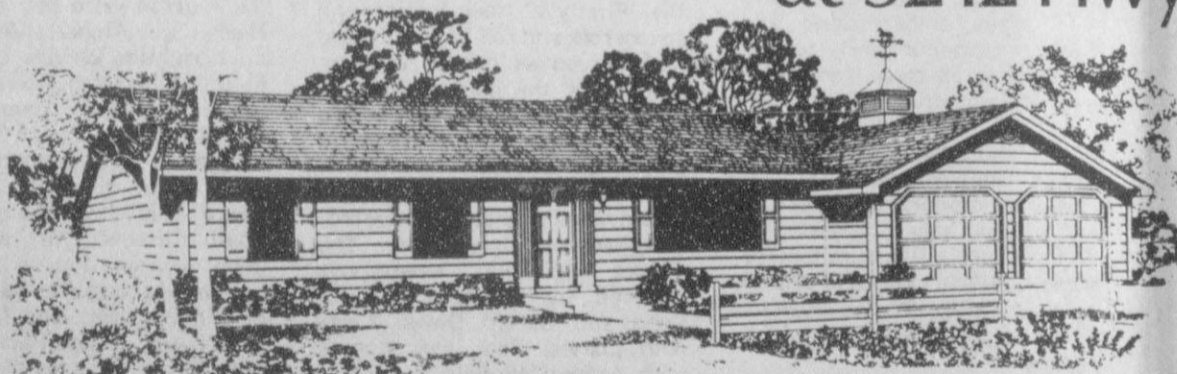

Notice is hereby given that the Pringle-Morse CISD is placing for sale a tract of land in Hutchinson County. The land will be sold by sealed bid. Bidders may bid on the land under two options.

OPTION NO. 1
Five acres of land out of the Northwest Quarter (NW/4) of Survey No. One, Southern Pacific Railway Co. beginning at an iron pipe in the Southeast corner of Lot No. 1 (1), Block Twelve (12), of the Townsite of Pringle; Thence south 622 2/7 feet to a point; Thence west 350 feet to a point; Thence north 622 2/7 feet to an iron pipe in the Southwest corner of Lot Nineteen (19), in said Block Twelve (12); Thence east 350 feet along the South line of said Block Twelve (12) to the place of beginning.



"Hill Street Blues" at Spearman Police Dept.!

On July 25, 1984 at approximately 9:02 p.m. an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to a dog bite. Upon arrival, the officer was met by a white male complainant who advised the officer that his son had been playing with a black and white mix breed cowdog when the dog bit him on both hands. The bites just barely broke the skin on both hands. The dog was picked up and transported to the dog pound to be held for ten (10) days for observation.

On July 27, 1984 at approximately 6:45 a.m. the Police Department was contacted by a female subject who reported that there had been a vandalism at her residence. An officer was dispatched to the residence. Upon arrival, the officer was met by a white male subject who showed the officer a broken window on his vehicle. The male subject advised the officer that the window was not broken the night before but he noticed it was broken when he went to get his newspaper at 6:30 a.m. this morning. He also stated that his neighbor had heard dogs barking between 12:00 a.m. and 2:00 a.m. of the day in question. The officer observed the drivers side window of the vehicle had been broken but there was no indication of any foreign object being thrown at the window. There was a broken glass on the ground outside the vehicle as well as glass lying inside the vehicle. Photographs were taken of the damage.

On July 28, 1984 while an officer was on patrol, he was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to an assault. Upon arrival, the officer was met by a female subject. She advised that she had recently gotten married and her and her husband had come to Spearman to visit her husband's brother. They all had started drinking and they finally went to bed. She advised that they started arguing and her husband hit her. She advised she didn't want to file charges but only wanted to go back home. The officer transported her to the Spearman Police Department where she made a phone call and Hansford County Sheriff's Office let her use a cell for tonight so this incident would not reoccur.

On July 29, 1984 at approximately 4:50 p.m., a complainant contacted the Spearman Police Department by telephone and related that at approximately 4:45 a.m. on July 29, 1984, he was on foot and was in the process of crossing 7th street from Lee Drive, when he was in the middle of 7th Street, he observed a pickup approaching him in the East bound lane. The pickup suddenly accelerated and started to veer out of the East bound lane toward him. The complainant

advised that he had to jump behind a dumpster to avoid being struck by the pickup. The complainant advised that the pickup continued to accelerate and then pulled back into the East bound lane and continued Eastward. As the pickup passed the complainant, he was able to obtain a license plate number. The complainant further related the description of the driver of the pickup. The Spearman Police Department ran a check on the license plate number given by the complainant. The dispatcher contacted the officer and informed him to be on the look out for the subject and his vehicle and if located, to bring the subject to the Spearman Police Department. At approximately 4:55 a.m., the officer made contact with the subject in the 1000 block of South Dressen and escorted him and his passenger to the Spearman Police Department. Both subjects were interviewed about the incident. Both subjects denied having any knowledge of the offense. At approximately 5:15 p.m. the complainant entered the Police Department and made a statement of the offense and related that he wished to make a complaint against the subject. The complainant also identified the operator of the vehicle when he saw the subject at the Police Department. The subject was advised of the complaint being filed against him and informed him that charges would be filed against him in County Court. The subject was released pending charges filed against him. At approximately 2:45 p.m., on July 30, 1984, an officer went to the swimming pool to inform the complainant that he was to go to the County Attorney's Office to sign a complaint against the subject for the complaint that he reported to the Spearman Police Department. During the course of conversation with the complainant, he informed the officer that he had found a witness who had observed what had happened. The officer and the complainant then went to the subjects residence and conducted an interview with the subject and his parents. The subject related that he and his brother were playing outside in their front yard at the time of the offense. He advised the officer that he observed a subject driving a pickup in a Easterly direction on 7th Street. He also related that he was the complainant on foot and he was in the process of crossing 7th Street from Lee Drive when the pickup accelerated and veered from the East lane to the West lane. He advised that the complainant ran across the street and jumped behind a dumpster to avoid being struck by the pickup. He further stated that the driver of the

pickup came very close to hitting the complainant. A statement was obtained from the witness and turned over to the County Attorney.

On July 29, 1984 at approximately 10:42 p.m., the Spearman Police Department was contacted by a complainant who advised that a unknown vehicle had been driven into the 2x6 fence on the South side of his business parking lot and caused considerable damage to the fence and had left the accident scene. Photographs of the damage was taken by the officer. Two (2) other officers arrived at the scene of the offense and the investigation revealed that the fence had been struck by a blue and white colored vehicle. A piece of the fence with the paint color on it was transported to the Police Department for evidence and comparison of the paint scraping when the unknown vehicle is located. At approximately 11:19 p.m., the complainant again contacted the Police Department and related that he had received an anonymous phone call. He advised that the person informed him that he knew who had hit his fence. At approximately 10:40 a.m. on July 30, 1984, contact was made with the vehicle in question. The officers checked the vehicle for damage, finding fresh scrapings on the left rear quarter above the tail light. This area consisted of stripes being dark blue, light blue and white which was the main color of the vehicle. These colors matched respectively with paint on the board that was taken as evidence from the scene. The owner of the vehicle was then contacted and questioned about the incident and he advised that he had no knowledge of any of the damage reported. A photograph was taken showing the area on the vehicle. At approximately 10:50 a.m., the complainant entered the Police Department with an estimate on the damage to the fence. At approximately 11:20 a.m., the owner of the vehicle entered the Police Department and advised that he would pay the damage on the fence. The subject was advised to appear in court for the offense of Leaving the Scene of an Accident.

On July 29, 1984 at approximately 10:22 p.m., the Spearman Police Department was contacted by telephone by a female subject who related that there was a fight in progress at a Spearman residence. Officers were dispatched and were advised by a male subject that it was a family dispute and that everything was under control. Everyone involved in the fight stated that they did not wish to sign any complaints against each other.

On July 29, 1984 while an officer was on patrol, he observed the railroad cross bar sign on the

Vet Clinic road and been knocked down and coming to rest in one lane of traffic and the cross bar sign was off of the pole and was laying in the middle of the roadway. The pipe that held the sign was uprooted and marks on the pipe showed that it took a hard jolt to pull it out of the ground. The officer took several pictures of the scene and the Hansford County Deputy poured a plaster cast of the tire track. Cost of the sign and pole is unknown at this time.

On July 29, 1984 while on patrol an officer was stopped by a white male subject who advised the officer that there was a fight in progress at a Spearman business. Upon arrival the officer observed a female and a male. The female was swinging at the male subject and several other people were trying to hold her back. The officer stepped up to the female subject and tried to control her. The female subject ignored the officer as he informed her she would go to jail. At this time the female subject swung at the officer, the officer grabbed her and placed her into the patrol unit. The female subject was transported to the Police Department. The officer telephoned her parents to come and get her. Case closed.

On July 30, 1984 at approximately 5:10 p.m., an officer was advised to go to a Spearman residence and contact a female subject. Upon arrival, the officer spoke with a white female subject who stated that she wanted to file charges against a white male subject. She advised that he would not keep his dog up and that it continued to chase her, her mother and grandson everytime that they went walking. She also advised that they had asked him to keep the dog up, but that he failed to do so. The complainant signed a complaint and was advised to be Municipal Court at 10:00 a.m. on July 31, 1984. Contact was made with the male subject and he was advised to also be in court at 10:00 a.m. on July 31, 1984.

On July 30, 1984 at approximately 3:30 p.m., an officer was dispatched to the 1000 block of Dressen in reference to a subject selling books. Waco TSTI to host Texas Sesquicentennial Air Shows

The Sesquicentennial will take to the skies in June of 1986 when Texas State Technical Institute in Waco hosts the Texas Sesquicentennial Air Show, a two-day extravaganza of aviation in Texas. The Air Show has received the official stamp of approval from the Waco Sesquicentennial Commission, taking its place among the major, statewide events for the Sesquicentennial.

Improving communications is program theme

At their regular Monday, July 30 meeting, the Spearman Rotary Club heard Mr. Michael Tindall of Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, speak on "Three Steps to Improve Communication." Mr. Tindall grew up in Ohio and received educational degrees from the College of Wooster and Rutgers University. His professional work has been in counseling, family therapy, and hospital management. He presently serves as Director of the Psychiatric Program at Methodist Hospital.

Mr. Tindall reminded his audience that employees want to be involved in what is happening in their factories, offices, shops, etc. This involvement requires good communication between supervisors and supervisees. As a first step in good

communication in business, Mr. Tindall suggested that supervisors determine the "learning mode" of their co-workers. Which sense do they use in learning: hearing, seeing, touching, or a combination? Is the supervisee a "doer" or a "thinker"? Because most people have a short-term memory of only five items, it enhances communication to make written lists and instructions.

Second, Mr. Tindall recommended that supervisors listen with a "third ear." That is, they should listen for feelings more than for content. This especially helps in dealing with persons who need to "make mountains out of molehills."

Third, Mr. Tindall advised managers to give immediate feedback—positive or negative—to workers, which tends to keep morale high and anger low.

What are Lutherans like?

Lutherans. What are Lutherans all about? Some people think that we are like Catholics or Episcopalians. Not really.

Lutherans have been around since the sixteenth century. In fact last year, we had celebrated the five hundred birthday of Martin Luther. That is a story in itself.

Martin Luther was born in 1483, to poor parents. Martin's father wanted him to become a lawyer, or something like that, so he could be somebody. Luther was not too interested in school, but he went. He started college but did not take it too seriously. Then one day in a thunder storm which frightened him very much. He prayed to St. Ann, and promised that he would become a monk if she would save him.

Luther survived the storm and kept his promise. He had a farewell party with some of his friends and then entered the monastery. There he punished himself for all his evil sins. But nothing would make him feel safe with God. The Abbot (Head of the monastery) tried to convince Luther that he did not have to take his religion so seriously. The Abbot also recognized that Luther had intelligence and persuaded him to study to become a priest. Luther did this, but he was still not happy. Finally Luther became a teacher of the Bible at the University of Wittenberg in Germany. This is where Luther really got to read and study the Bible to any extent.

While teaching the Bible at the university, Luther discovered a verse in Romans 1:17 that changed his whole understanding of Christianity, "The righteous shall live by his faith." For the first time, Luther realized that we can not save ourselves by our own good deeds, because we are sinners and cannot be perfect; but for Jesus' sake we are saved by faith. Luther began to teach the Bible with a new point of view. A number of people, including the Elector (ruler) of his province, came to be followers of Luther's teachings. Having important friends later helped protect him when opposition came.

The real turning point in Luther's life that led to the Reformation was when a man named Tetzel came to Wittenberg to raise money to build St. Peter's

Church in Rome. He did this by scaring the people by telling them about Hell and damnation, then selling them certificates from the Pope called 'indulgences' that were supposed to guarantee that they would get out of Hell. On October 31, 1517 (Reformation Day), Luther nailed 95 Theses (statements) to the door of the church in Wittenberg. One of Luther's Theses was, "Pardon for sin is from Christ and is free." Tetzel did not like this at all; people started to stop buying indulgences. This is what we call the beginning of the people started to stop buying indulgences. At first the Pope thought that it was an argument between two monks in Germany and he didn't pay much attention. But when people started to learn what Luther was teaching, they began to follow him. The leaders of the church began to get worried, and after much debate, the Pope himself condemned Luther for his teachings and commanded him to stop. But the Pope could not make him stop because the Elector of Luther's province protected him.

Luther did not want to start a new church; he wanted to correct the old one. But the church leaders did not want to listen to him so the followers of Luther organized the Lutheran Church. The writings of Luther and of his main helper, Philip Melancthon, made up most of the Book of Concord, which is the second most important book in the Lutheran Church; the Bible is first.

A number of important results came out of the Lutheran Reformation. The most important was the translation of the Bible into the language of the people. Luther himself translated the Bible for the German people. The printing press made it possible for many people to afford Bibles who could not afford the hand written Bibles.

Another important contribution of Luther was the Catechism which consisted of: The Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the Creeds (specifically the Apostles' Creed), the Sacraments

(Baptism and Holy Communion, and some lesser articles. Luther wrote two catechisms. He wanted each family to have the main teachings of the Bible in a simple form that could be taught to children by parents. The first Catechism ended up being too long for this, so Luther wrote a smaller one that most Lutherans know of. The longer Catechism is used by those who want to study Christian teachings in more detail. Hymn singing was not known but Luther did much to encourage singing in the church worship service. He himself wrote many

hymns. Probably the best known are, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our

God" and "From Heaven Above To Earth I Come".

Governor announces funds for job training program

Governor Mark White announced today that \$1,115,070 will be used for job training programs for economically disadvantaged, unemployed, and underemployed Texans in the Panhandle area. The Governor has approved the expenditure of these funds for job training programs in Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, and Wheeler Counties. The Texas Department of Community Affairs has executed a contract effective July 1 for the provision of a job training program under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA).

"The Job Training Partnership Act is a catalyst for integrating the private and public sector in developing skills needed by Texans for productive employment and economic self-sufficiency," Governor White said.

Under the Job Training Partnership Act, local elected officials in partnership with private industry councils, composed of business and community representatives, plan and provide programs best suited for residents of their area. Program services include basic education skills training and job placement.

Aping man: New flight standards that will require its aviators to have longer arms and shorter legs have been adopted by the Navy. A spokesman said the standards will exclude 73 percent of all college-age women and 13 percent of college-age men from flying in the Navy. According to Capt. Frank Dully, commanding officer of the Naval Aerospace Medical Research Laboratory, the new standards were devised because some aviation candidates could not reach rudder pedals or see over their instruments panels. 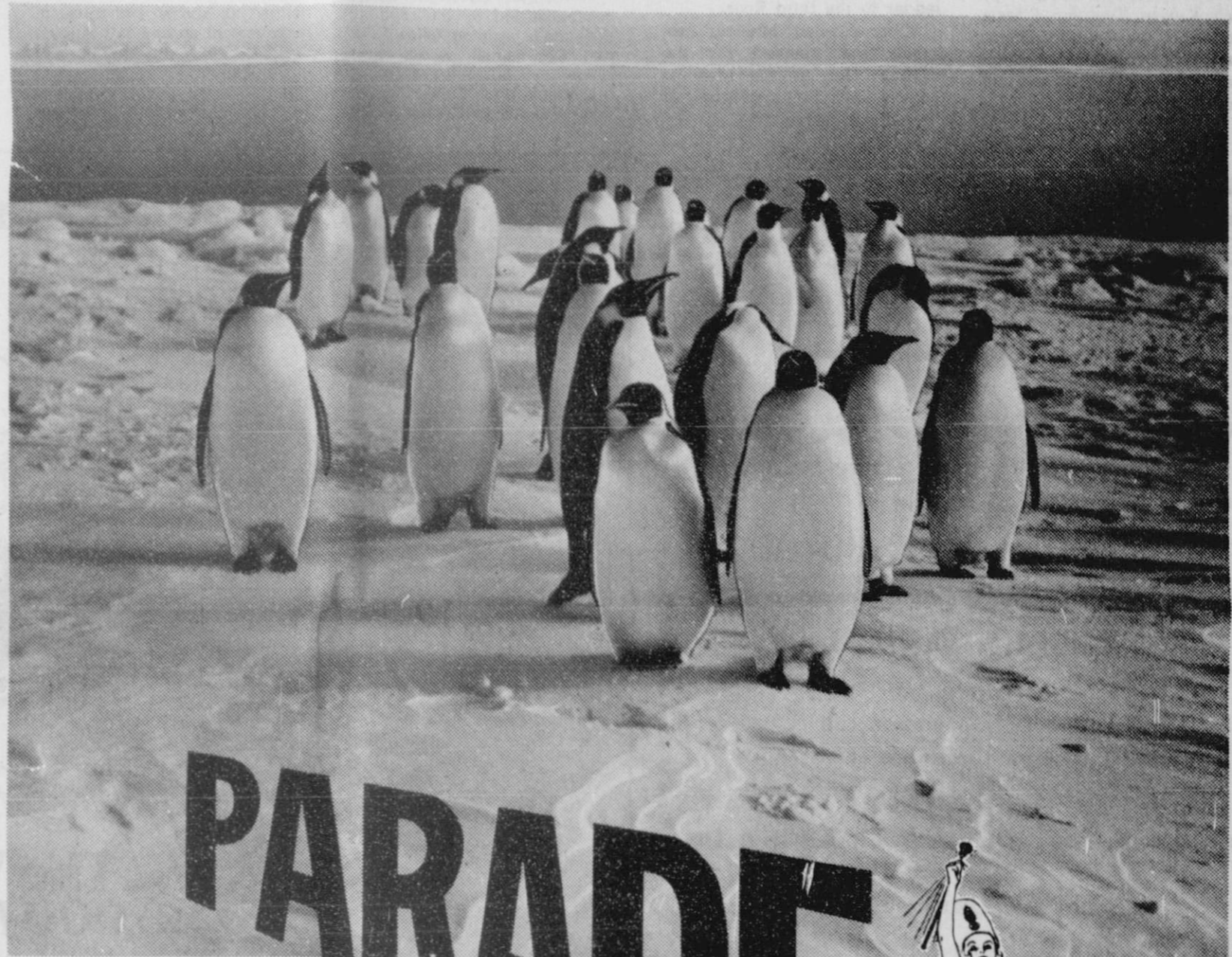
