

Storm Clean Up Continues

Clean up continues this weekend after the devastating blizzard that hit the area Tuesday night.

Damage was heavy in the county in cattle losses, crop damage, power lines down and in Spearman the storm wreaked havoc to trees, TV antennas, and to almost anything that wasn't tied down.

City crews were busy Thursday clearing streets of tree limbs. Some streets in the city were impassable due to the limbs falling from the trees.

During the height of the blizzard Tuesday night winds gusted from 45mph to 70mph as the snow fell.

Spearman Firefighters ran units 53,55 and personal autos autos on roads into Spearman.

The Firefighters answered a fire call to 821 S. Archer due to down and damaged power lines. There were on damages at this address but a unit was left to make certain any fire was

A little later the White's Auto building at 316 Main, collapsed and units 51, 55 and 52 were dispatched there. After evaluation of damages, unit 51 was left to post guard for the premises from theft until 8 a.m. the following morning. Two firefighters were stationed with

These units ran service the following afternoon checking and removing downed power lines, tree limbs, antennas, and

various debris.



There are three propositions on the ballot.

Proposition No. 1 would require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state, which would change the present practice of appointing Notary Public term from its present two year limit to a term of four

Proposition No. 2 would allow for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by the more than 200 agencies in the executive department, all of whom now act independently of such review and would eliminate much of the unnecessary red tape and many of the ridiculous guidelines coming from many of the avecutive from many of the executive

department agencies.

Probably the most important is Proposition No. 3, at least to the agricultural community of the agricultural community of the state. This proposition would authorize the legislature to provide for the guarantee of farm and ranch loans by the sale of general obligation bonds of the state of Texas. The amend-ment would allow the legisla-ture to issue and sell bonds called Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds of the state of Texas not to exceed \$10 million.

All money from bond sales would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the

uarantee loans used for the ourchase of farm and ranch real tate, and for advancing to the

If absentee voting is any sign of interest in the upcoming Constitutional Amendment Ele-

To qualify for these guaranteed loans, one must be a Texas resident and have a net worth of less than \$100,000. The intent of this amendment, according to Representative Bob Close, is to note the small family farm. Unless you are born into a farm, it is practically impossible to get into farming these days and we hope this amendment would alleviate some of the problems the small farmer faces in

the small farmer faces in today's unsteady economy.
