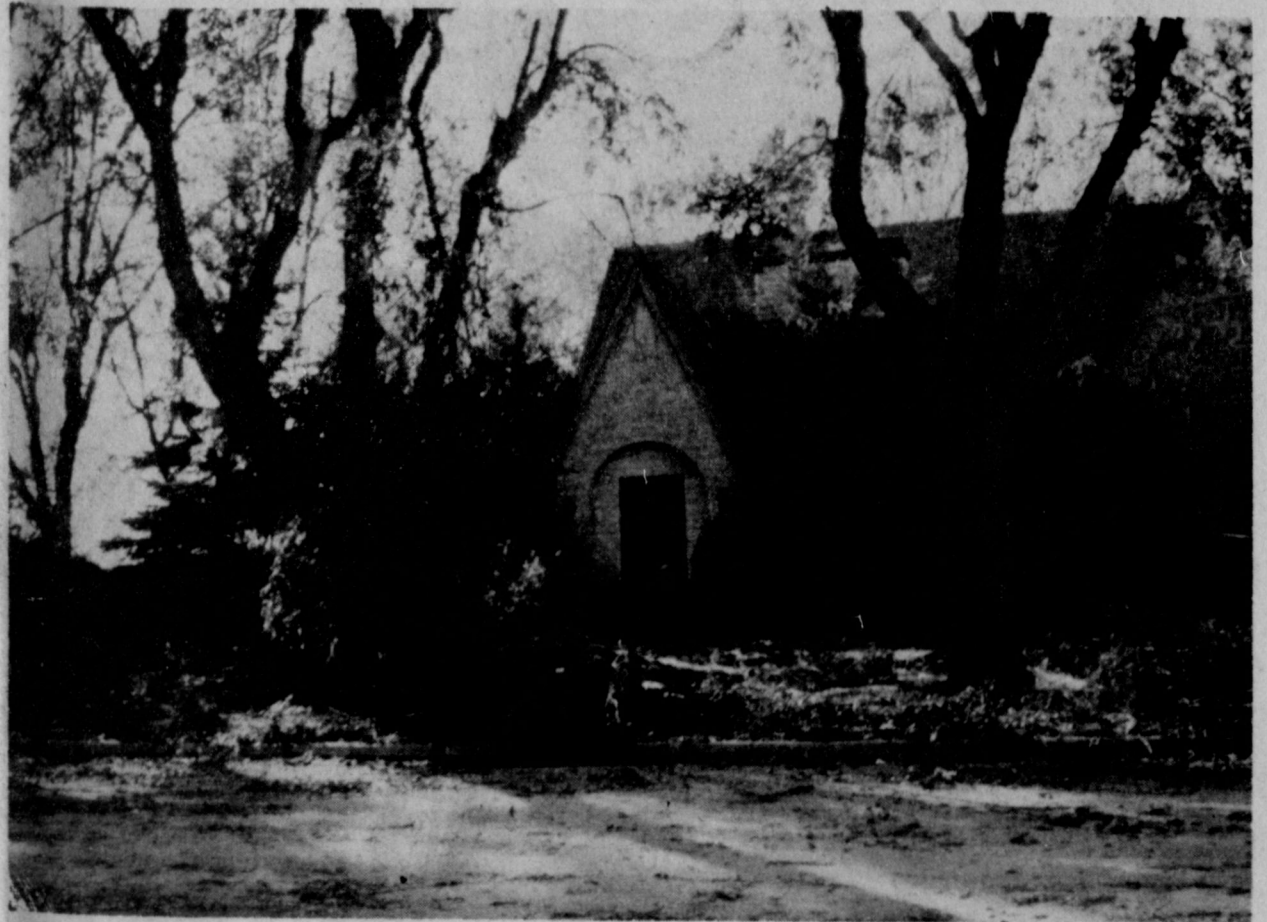

Storm Clean Up Continues

Clean up continues this weekend after the devastating blizzard that hit the area Tuesday night.

Damage was heavy in the county in cattle losses, crop damage, power lines down and in Spearman the storm wreaked havoc to trees, TV antennas, and to almost anything that wasn't tied down.

City crews were busy Thursday clearing streets of tree limbs. Some streets in the city were impassable due to the limbs falling from the trees.

During the height of the blizzard Tuesday night winds gusted from 45mph to 70mph as the snow fell.

Spearman Firefighters ran units 53, 55 and personal autos on rescue to persons stranded in autos on roads into Spearman.

The Firefighters answered a fire call to 821 S. Archer due to down and damaged power lines. There were no damages at this address but a unit was left to make certain any fire was contained.

A little later the White's Auto building at 316 Main, collapsed and units 51, 55 and 52 were dispatched there. After evaluation of damages, unit 51 was left to post guard for the premises from theft until 8 a.m. the following morning. Two firefighters were stationed with units.

These units ran service the following afternoon checking and removing downed power lines, tree limbs, antennas, and various debris.

The Spearman Firefighters would like to acknowledge the men who came out to assist in these operations. They included Ron Antalek, Dan Hendricks, Robert Cochran, Stan Hudson, Butch Tigrett, Ed Williamson, John Trimmel, Robbie Schaeffer, Ken Schaeffer, Rich Bennett and Keith Martin.

Firefighters would also like to acknowledge and thank sincerely the following Spearmanites whose help was invaluable to the services they were trying to accomplish. They include Community Public Service, Spearman Police Department, including dispatchers, Sheriff's office, Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and deputy Jim Ivey, Mr. Vance Snider, Mr. Lawrence Anthony, Jeff Hawkins and many which may have been unknown.

There were no serious injuries reported, no major fires, and all rescue and salvage operations were as successful as could be expected.

Electrical power was restored about noon Wednesday bringing relief to Spearman residents, who had been without power since about 4:30 Tuesday. Many residences in the city were without heat due to the power outage.

Ron Antalek, of the Spearman Cable TV, stated Friday that he hoped to have cable TV restored to all homes in the city by Monday. Some 30% of the

cable lines in the city were downed by the storm, and crews have been working day and night to get the service back to residents.

Mrs. Nichols Dies In Louisiana

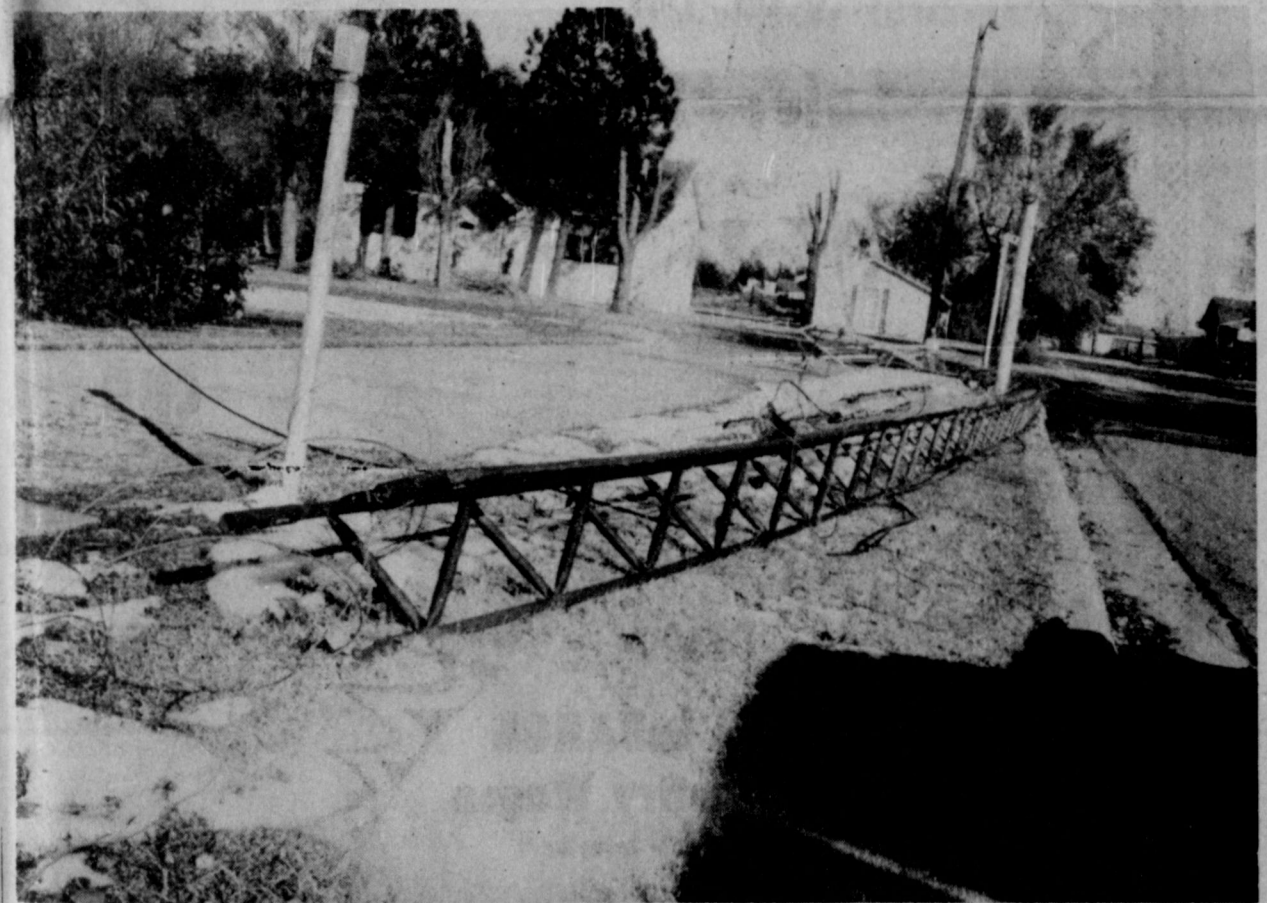

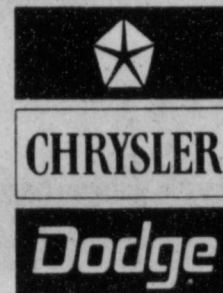

Election Nov. 6

If absentee voting is any sign of interest in the upcoming Constitutional Amendment Election Tuesday, Nov. 6, turnout will be light. A check with County Clerk Marie Gould Friday noon revealed 3 had voted absentee.

There are three propositions on the ballot.

Proposition No. 1 would require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state, which would change the present practice of appointing Notary Public term from its present two year limit to a term of four years.

Proposition No. 2 would allow for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by the more than 200 agencies in the executive department, all of whom now act independently of such review and would eliminate much of the unnecessary red tape and many of the ridiculous guidelines coming from many of the executive department agencies.

Probably the most important is Proposition No. 3, at least to the agricultural community of the state. This proposition would authorize the legislature to provide for the guarantee of farm and ranch loans by the sale of general obligation bonds of the state of Texas. The amendment would allow the legislature to issue and sell bonds called Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds of the state of Texas not to exceed \$10 million.

All money from bond sales would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture.

These funds would be used to guarantee loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, and for advancing to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The

commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans.

To qualify for these guaranteed loans, one must be a Texas resident and have a net worth of less than \$100,000. The intent of this amendment, according to Representative Bob Close, is to promote the small family farm. Unless you are born into a farm, it is practically impossible to get into farming these days and we hope this amendment would alleviate some of the problems the small farmer faces in today's unsteady economy.

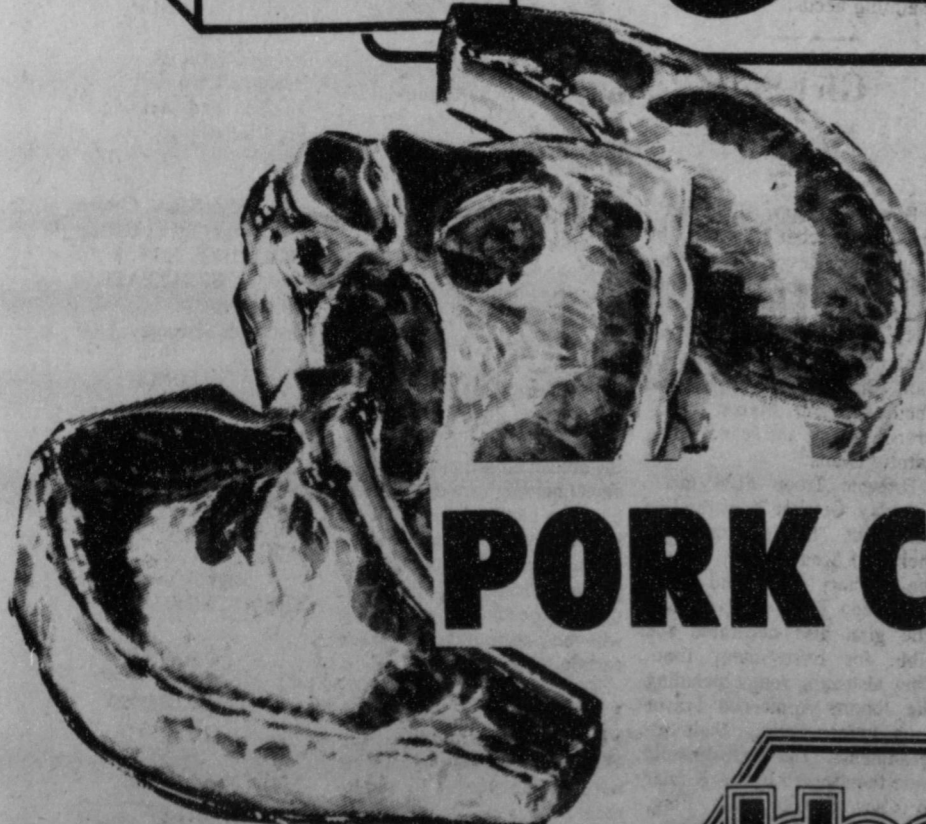

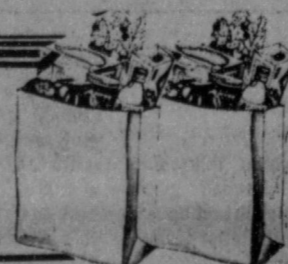

ABFP diplomates also must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. No other medical specialty requires diplomates to prove competence on a continuing basis.

Energy Independence On The Farm

Waco, Tx, Oct. 22, 1979 -- With another diesel shortage looming in future forecasts and the ever increasing cost of gasoline, Texas farmers will have another opportunity to learn about the potential to create their own dependable, renewable fuel during "Gasohol Know-How Conference III" November 15 at Waco's Convention Center.

Co-sponsored by Baylor University's Glasscock Energy Research Center, the conference is the third such gathering of the nation's most reputable experts assembled by the Texas Farmers Union to school producers on the technologies, legalities, equipment, and financial assistance available for the production of alcohol fuels from farm products.

Over five hundred farmers turned over recently for a similar conference put together by TFU and Texas Tech University, thus proving, according to a spokesman for the farm organization, that "farmers are fed up with OPEC price gouging, monopolistic energy companies and the ongoing battle of New England heating oil versus Midwestern diesel and are ready for the Gasohol Revolution."

"The technology needed to produce fuel grade ethanol is fairly simple," stated Jon Thomas who is the coordinator of the Texas Farmers Union's forefront efforts to bring Texas producers the necessary know-how to convert crops and crop

residues to alcohol fuels. "Now that production of alcohol fuels is legal in the state, the Farmers Union is mounting a campaign to spread the message of energy independence."

"The detractors continue to raise questions of economics," Thomas continued. "Well, compared to the economics of oil and gas, ethanol is already competitive today; tomorrow it could be considered the cheapest, most economical, and certainly the most dependable supply. American farms have proven to be the world's greatest producers of food and fiber. They now hold promise of producing a large percentage of the nation's domestic energy supply."

The November conference will draw together the most recent information available on various plant sizes and equipment, state and federal permits, financial assistance, and on-farm uses. Recent development in the use of solar methane sources for heat in the distillation process and breakthroughs in cellulose conversion of crop residues like grain stubble and gin trash will also be reported to conference participants.

Widespread interest and a number of plants already scheduled for the Central Texas area bring conference planners to expect another packed crowd in Waco in November 15. Advance registration for the full day workshop is strongly encouraged by calling Texas Farmers Union at (817) 722-7220.
