> LOOK FOR BARGAINS IN FEED Livestockmen should be alert for bargains when buying feed, says Shannon E. Carpenter, area dairy specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension

Service. The important point to watch in buying feed, according to the specialist, is the price you pay for the actual nutrients of the feed. Feeds that seem expensive may be cheaper than low cost ones when the price is figured according to the actual amount of nutrients in the feed.

The majority of livestockmen continue to buy the same kind of feed year after year without comparing prices, assuming that the market will even out the price they pay for feed. Carpenter says that the producer should not rely on the market to keep prices in line because they will vary between locations.

As an example of how the producer can save money, Carpenter says that the purchase of cheap protein supplement may offer an opportunity to lower the cost of production. These sup-


