## Outstanding Conservation Farmer Will Be Named Thursday at Banquet

One of three outstanding conervation farmers in Hansford County will be named the Hansford Soil Conservation District's Conservation farmer of the year tonight at the anpual Bankers' Award Banquet. The banquet, with O.R. Stark, Jr. , of Quitaque as the principal speaker, will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Spearman Elementary School Cafeteria.

The banquet is sponsored each year by the First State Bank of Spearman and the Gruver State Bank of Gruver.
Also to receive an award tonight will be the outstanding District Supervisor.
Johnny Venneman, Eugene Wood and Theodore Bayless are the three nomizees for the award. All three farmers are irrigation farmers and livestock ralsers.

Venneman operates a large farm and ranch in the north part of the county and has been irrigating since 1953. The native of Hansford County has put over 500 acres of dryland farmland back to grass.

Venneman says he began irrigation purely by accident. In 1953, during that drought cycle, Ed Wilbanks approached Venneman about drilling a well. Venneman said he was not interested in irrigating and knew nothing about it.
Wilbanks insisted on drilling the well and told Venneman he could pay for it if it made Venneman any money.
The farmer agreed to the arangement and Wilbanks drilled him a good well. Venneman nade a bumper cane crop on ome cane that was nearly burnd up before the well was put own. He has been irrigating Ince that time.

He is a strong believer in soil and water conservation and practiced it for many years before the conservation district was formed.
Wood's conservation work has been improving the efficiency of his irrigation farming and his livestock operation.
