

More Highway Work Planned

Highway construction in Hansford, Hutchinson, Ochiltree and Sherman counties is included in the Texas Highway Commission's plans for 1967-68. The commission has allocated approximately \$13.6

million for highways in the 17-county Panhandle District. In the plans for 1967-68 is the re-construction of Texas 282 between Spearman and Gruver. This will include 13.4 miles of construction.

The contract will call for the reconstruction of grading, structures and resurfacing and the resurfacing of some right-of-way. In Hansford and Sherman counties FM 289 from 6.6 miles east of Stratford east to

2.3 miles southeast of the Hansford County line, a distance of 21.6 miles will be widened and resurfaced. There will be several contracts let on Highway 15 in Hutchinson County around Stinnett. Also, the overpass

over the railroad on 15 6.4 miles north of Stinnett will be widened. In Ochiltree County Highway 15 will be resurfaced from the Hansford County line to Perryton. Throughout the district

Highway 15 and the highways east and west that will be re-designated 15 are being improved in the plans. Also, the north south highways that will become a single number when 15 is changed are being improved.

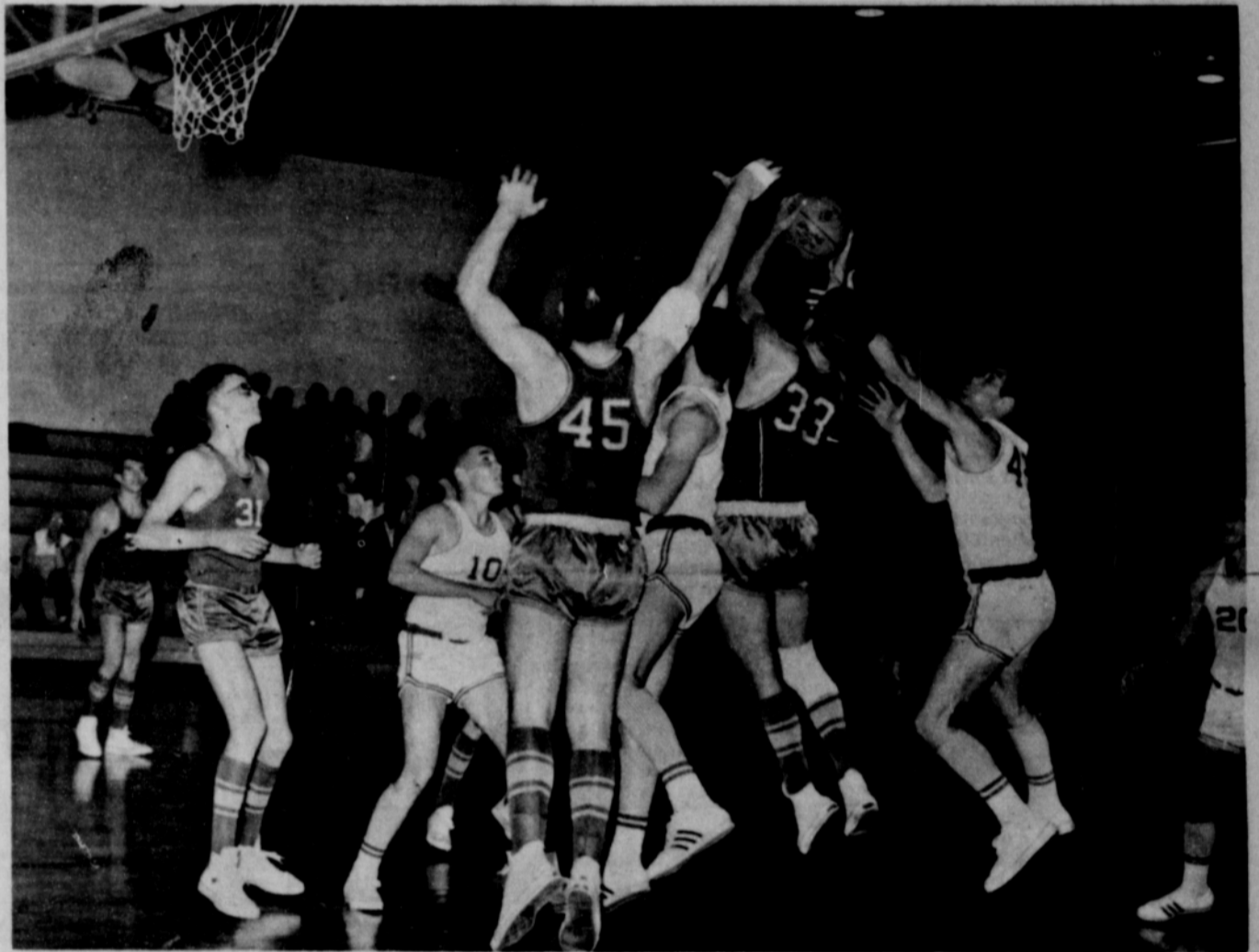

Coach Dean Weese used 11 players in many different combinations. He found some strength in some of the new men. Larry Butts was not allowed to play because of a back injury suffered in football. He has been working out though.

Where Life Is Cheap

The Texas highway patrol is an efficient organization, and the members of it work long and hard hours trying to control traffic and keep people from killing each other on the highways.

And this program has been successful, despite the fact that the number of fatalities in traffic accidents has risen in recent years.

The accidents per million miles traveled has decreased, which is probably all we can hope for in the way of traffic safety education.

It ought to be obvious that we have some deficiencies in our traffic enforcement laws.

Specifically, Texas grants drivers licenses to a lot of people who shouldn't have them.

We let 14-year-olds drive on restricted licenses, which is questionable. Then we let 16-year-olds have the complete freedom of the road with a good drivers license.

But we make no effort to determine whether elderly drivers have failing eyesight or reflexes, unless by the sheerest chance they inadvertently permit their licenses to lapse.

When the Texas drivers license law went into effect back in 1935, all that was required was that drivers register and pay their fee, for which they got their drivers license.

There were some people who got their drivers license then who didn't know much about driving, and a lot of these same people have kept their drivers license valid ever since by merely sending in their renewal fee every two years.

In the intervening years, their driving ability may have slipped to the point where they are dangerous. There are a lot of dangerous drivers on the road today with a perfectly good drivers license in their billfold.

Then, too, we have a financial responsibility law, but we don't worry about it until after the wreck, and then it's too late.

Our vehicle inspection law leaves a lot to be desired, although it has retired a lot of jalopies from the highways.

We have a long way to go in demanding good traffic safety and enforcement of laws. Until we get more alarmed about it than we are right now, we will continue to have death on the highways.

Committee Invited To Regional

Tom Jones, chairman of the Hansford County Historical Survey Committee and his sub-committee chairmen have been invited to attend a regional meeting on Monday, Nov. 22, of county historical survey committees comprising Region 1, according to Charles R. Woodburn of Amarillo, a member of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Woodburn is in charge of this region which encompasses 14 counties: Carson, Dallam, Gray, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Roberts, Sherman and Wheeler.

Dedication of nine Official Texas Historical Markers in Carson County is the highlight of this regional meeting planned to give county historical survey committees the opportunity to tell of their work to preserve Texas History in their particular locale, Woodburn stated.

Ben Barnes of DeLeon, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, will be the principal speaker at a luncheon at which the Carson County Historical Survey Committee will be host. He later will dedicate the historical marker delineating the history of Carson County. He will be introduced by State Representative J.M. "Red" Simpson of Amarillo.

State Senator Grady Hazelwood of Amarillo will dedicate the official marker erected for the historic First National Bank Building of Panhandle.

Other state officials who will be present and will participate in the county-wide dedicatory ceremony include State Representatives Ralph Wayne of Plainview who will dedicate the Purvine's Ranch House marker and Fritz Thompson of Borger who is on the program to dedicate the 6666 Ranch historical marker.

Representative Grainger McIlhenny of Wheeler will speak at the ceremony dedicating the J.C. Jackson General Store (White Deer) Medallion with interpretive plate.

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake is scheduled to dedicate the historical marker memorializing the old N Bar-N Ranch so named for the two German Niedringhaus brothers of St. Louis who came to Carson County in 1882 and built a cattle empire.

Representative W. S. (Bill) Healy of Paducah will unveil and dedicate the Official Texas Marker recording the historical significance of the City of Panhandle in the development of the county and area.

Dr. James P. Corrette, president of West Texas State University of Canyon, will speak at the dedicatory ceremony commemorating the founding of the Panhandle Herald in 1887, oldest newspaper in the Texas Panhandle and second oldest business in the area. He also will dedicate the plaque memorializing David M. Warren, longtime publisher.

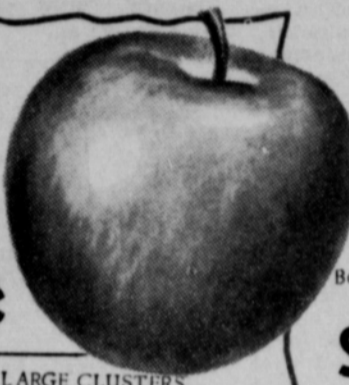

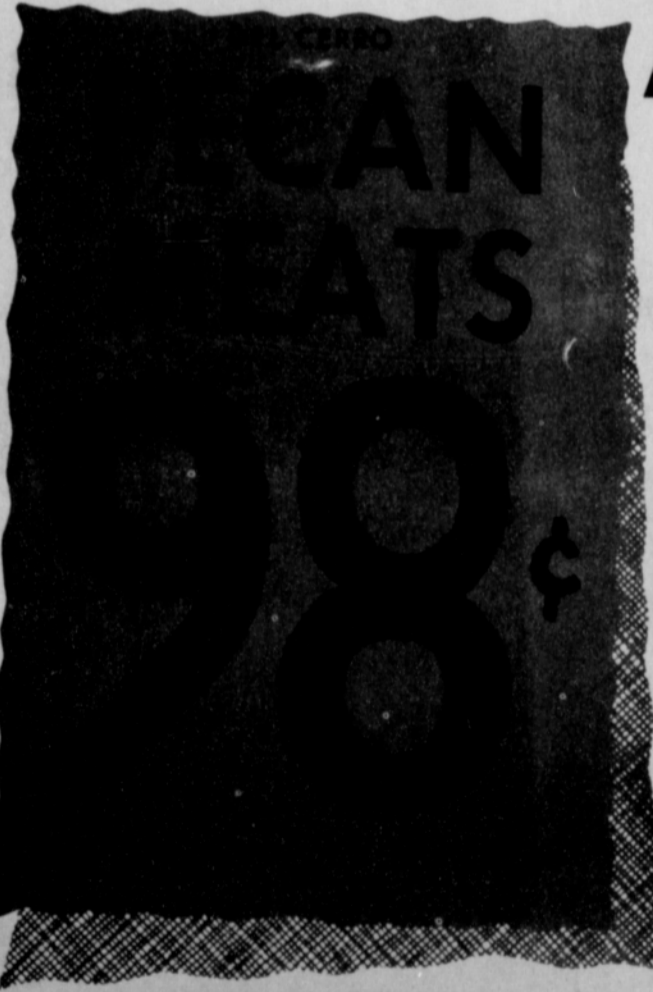

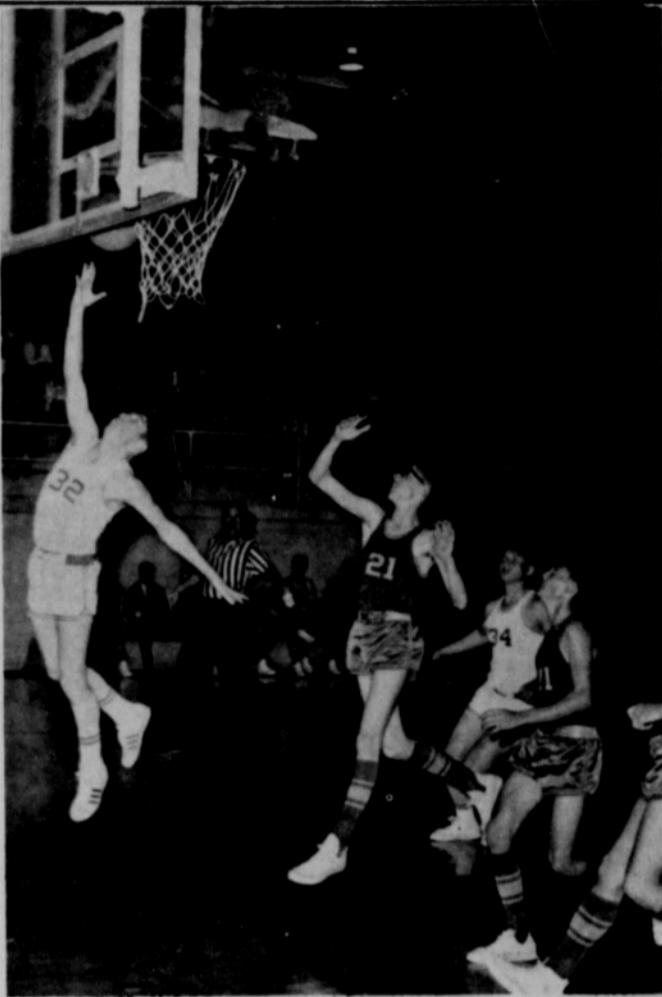

ZIP Code Will Speed Christmas Mail Delivery

The Spearman Post Office will be closed Thursday, Nov. 25th, in observance of Thanksgiving.

There will be no rural or city deliveries or collection service. All outgoing mail should be mailed at the main post office.

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history," Acting Postmaster Elmon Jacobs said today.

Nationally about 99 per cent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

Zip Code use and the co-

operation of the public in mailing early were the main reasons for our success. With the same or better cooperation this year, we expect to handle an even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush.

Mr. Jacobs had advice which would help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season.

Update last year's address list and include Zip Codes.

Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials; boxes, tape, strong wrapping paper, strong string or cord, etc.

Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved or that undeliverable cards will be returned if a return address is on the envelope. Affix a complete and legible return address with Zip Code so your recipient may update their addresses.

The Postmaster emphasized again this year that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He urged that cartons be packed by using stuffing material to fill up the empty space around the merchandise.

He also asked that all mailers make an effort to address their letters, cards, and packages as clearly as possible and that they make every attempt to mail often, not waiting until the last minute to deposit all their gifts and greetings.

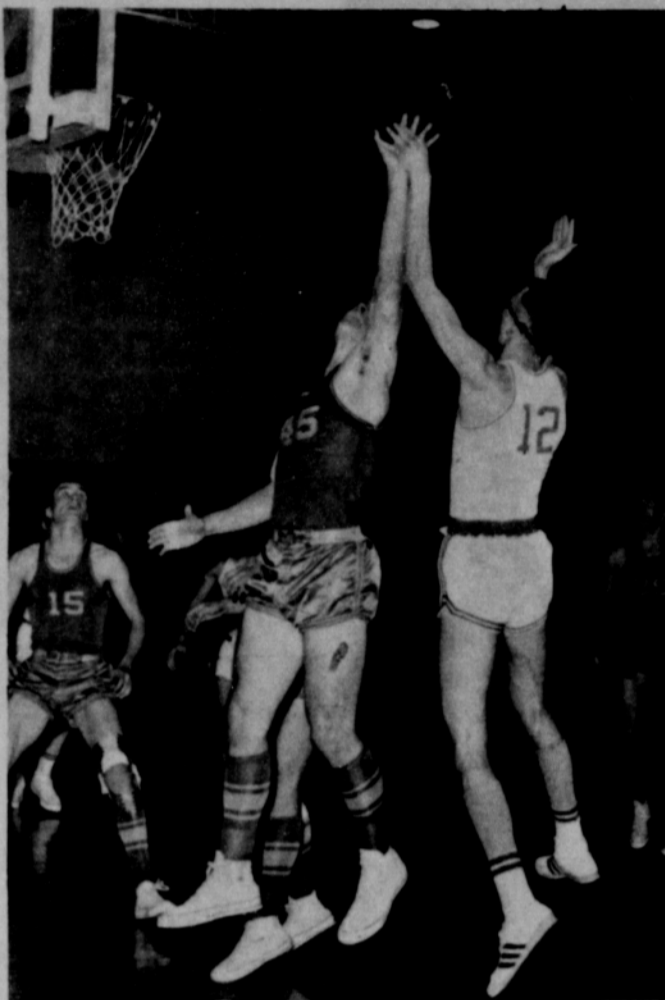
