There were some people who got their drivers license then who didn't know much about driving, and a lot of these same people have kept their drivers ficense valid ever since by nerely sending in their renewal fee every two years.
In the intervening years, their driving ability may have slipped to the point where they are dangerous. There are a lot of ers license in their billfold.
Then, too, we have a financial responsibility law, but we don't worry about it until after the wreck, and then it's too late.
