When America's Bicentennial celebration is over ... when all the fireworks have been fired, all the flags have finished waving, and all the parades have faded away over the hortzon... the nation's public health workers will continue to carry on the traditions of service to the community that are as old as the Republic itself. Chances are, not many people will be thinking about public health matters during the Fourth of July festivities, and that's olday. In fact, it 's a kind of testament to the effectiveness of our public health programs that people today take for granted clean water, sanitary food service, and freedom from disease. That hasn't always been true.

It certainly wasn't true during the early years of American independence. Throughout the Revolutionary War, epidemic diseases were rampant in most of the colonfes—and, in fact, played an important role in the outcome of the War for Independence British soldiers, after the long voyage across the Atlantic, frequently ar-

British soldiers, after the long voyage across the Atlantic, frequently arrived in the colonies weak ened by disease and fatigue. They were easy prey for yellow fever, smallpox, typhoid fever, and dysentery—all of which

pox, typnoid tever, and dysentery—all of which were common, especially in the Southern colonies. Not that the American patriots were free of health problems. Time after time, General Washington pleaded with Congress for medical supplies, better food, and engineering help to protect his rag-tag army from defeat before they even had a chance to engage the Redcoats. Proper sanitation in the field and protection of food supplies were constant concerns, During the War, health problems were equally severe among the civilian population. Sessions of Congress were interrupted time and again because of epidemic outbreaks of disease in Boston, New York, and Philadelphia. Major issues were unresolved for weeks because key dele-

ease in Boston, New York, and Philadelphia, Major issues wenr unresolved for weeks because key-delegates to the Continental Congress were quarantined at home, or were unable to reach the Congressional session because of their own illness and illness of their families, One reason Thomas Jefferson took little part in the drafting of the Constitution was the death of his wife during one of the periodic outbreaks of disease in Virginia. It's no wonder, then, that public health was one of the first priorities of the newly-established state and federal governments. Laws were passed quickly to authorize local doctors to establish quarantines whenever an epidemic threatened. Other laws were passed to promote public health through regulations dealing with sanitation. These efforts were limited only by the limited

medical knowledge of the itme--a fact which the American states hoped to correct by establishing medical schools and providing for the proper training of medical practitioners. Public health activity crossed the Continent with the pioneers. In Texas, the first state public health agency was formed under the Texas Quarantine Act, in 1879 -- not quite a hundred years ago. The agency's only function was to proclaim and enforce quarantines whenever an epidemic occurred. That function, however, was enlarged in 1903 when the agency was re-named as the Dengament of public

function, however, was enlarged in 1903 when the agency was re-named as the Department of Public Health and Vital Statistics and again in 1909 with the establishment of the Texas State Department of Health. Over the years, new roles and responsibilities have continually been added to the duties of the state's public health agency. Most recently, in 1975, the agency was re-named yet again, as the Texas Department of Health Resources, and given a major new responsibility: the overall planning of all health facilities and services in the state, to ensure that adequate medical care is available to every citizen. And yet, even as we review the progress and development of public health in America over the past two hundred years, health officials across the nation are preparing to deal with that ancient enemy, the epidemic. The disease is a new one; a mutant strain of influenza virus.

Those who are not gainfully employed will help maintain the facility, Once they, too are employ once they, too are employ Once they, too are employ able, they will pay their fair share.

They may stay for as long as NINETY DAYS, paying their share for food and lodging. (With Board Approval, this period may be extended.) At such time as the Board or Committee thinks they are ready to resume their rightful place in their community and family life, they leave of their own volition.

The Center then becomes their home-away-from-

home. Always open, ready to serve, it is a place to meet their "Fellow" mem-bers. Their advice and experience to the newcomer is most welcome as a part of their therapy. They will discuss ideas and continue to learn, listen and observe, so they can practice, with the newcomer, what they preach.

The aim is to make the Center a stepping off place to a sober and sane life for men and whomen who

for men and whomen who have lost their way.

Until such time as the "Center" becomes self-supporting, its financial needs are \$4,000.00 for estimated monthly expenses, anticipated income from residents is \$1,500.00 and anticipated income from other sources is \$1,500.00, leaving a monthly contrib-



ution of \$1,000.00 necessary. The center also has an in-itial remodeling and refur-bishing expense of \$15,000.

The draft, largely the work of Thomas Jefferson conceived in anger and phrased with bold determination, was signed by fifty members of Congress on August 2, 1776 with six more members affixing their signatures at later dates.

PEGGY'S POINTERS

Microwave ovens are a popular aid for helping homemakers save time-but don't use them for home food preservation. Microwave ovens do not allow even heat penetration into the closed jars, and the metal leds interfere with heat distribution. This is not an acceptable method of canning, blanching or drying vegetables at home, because harmful bacteria may not be destroyed.

ful bacteria may not be destroyed.
Blanching vegetables prior to freezing kills enzymes that other wise would continue to work and cause undestrable changes in the food. The recommended method of blanching is in water. Or steam blanching may be used for

\$4,544,000 Spent On Food Locally

A detailed study of business activity in Hansford County and in other communities across the country shows that the local economy moved into higher gear in the past year.

According to the report, just released, the amount spent per family for goods and services was at a relatively high level, although inflation was responsible to some degree for the increase.

to some degree for the increase.

The details are contained in the annual market study made by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It indicates j ist how much was spent locally by the average family for food, cas. furniture, clorhing.

drugs and other items.

Comparable data is given for families in every other section of the country. In Hansford Country, it is shown, the largest part of the consumer dollar went for food.

The amount spent in local grocery stores, supermarkets, delicatessens, butcher shops, bakeries and other stores selling food for home consumption added up to \$4,544,000.

In addition to this outlay, a sizeable amount was spent in restaurants, lunch rooms and other places where food and drink are consumed on the premises. consumed on the premises In terms of the total amount spent in local re-

tail stores, about 34 cents out of every dollar went for take-home food, the figures show.

If the home food bill were divided equally among the local population it would average out to \$2,195 per household.

This compares with \$1,270.

This compares with \$1,870 per household elsewhere in the United States, and with \$1930 in the West South Central States.
