The backers say that all they are after is to stop the waste, and they have a good point.

The School Tax Assessment Practices Board, created by the State Legislature in 1977, has released the results of the study of taxable property values for every school district in Texas. These values will be used to distribute state aid to schools over the state. Although it is not possible to determine exactly how these new values will effect the Spearman School District at this time, as a general rule, the higher the local value the less state aid the local district will receive.

According to the STAP figures released this month, Spearman District total value is up \$124 million from the 1975 values, to a total of \$322 million.

The new total includes \$50 million in intangible values which have not been included in past totals, and for the most part have never been taxed. The total value actually used by the local district for 1977 was \$171 million.

The STAP board was also required to arrive at a productivity value for farm and ranch land for each district. The Spearman District productivity value reported is \$52 million, as compared to the reported market value of \$102 million.

The inclusion of intangibles (stocks, bonds, money, etc.) has altered the overall state totals drastically. Since a majority of this type property is concentrated in the large cities, the effect will be to reduce the amount of state aid they will receive, if the legislature allows this property to be used in computing state aid. For example, while Spearman District total went up 63% from 1975 values, Houston School District values increased by 253%.

Much of the effect of this study will depend on the passage of the constitutional amendment to be voted on in the November General Election, and the enacting legislation next spring. The constitutional amendment will allow the legislature to pass laws that would remove all intangibles and personal household goods from

taxation, provide for productivity values on farm and ranch land, provide homestead exemptions on residences for school tax purposes, and prohibit statewide tax appraisals. Most of these provisions are permissive in the constitutional amendment, so the legislature will have to pass enacting legislation before they become effective.

The Tax Relief Amendment - H. J. R. 1 Injured Lynx lose 9-0

"The Tax Relief Amendment"

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

It was just plain heartbreaking to the scrappy Lynx team who thoroughly out-played Elk City the first half, and then came back to lead the entire 2nd half, and the ball game, 9-0.

Elk City managed a field goal in the last half to take a 3-0 lead in the game.

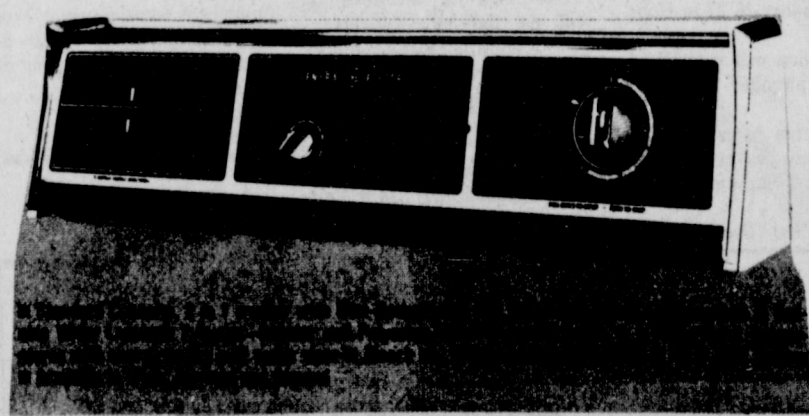

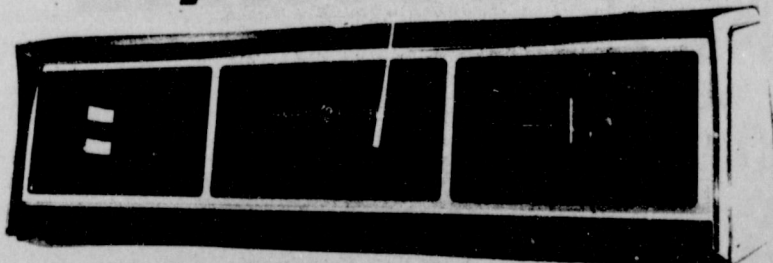

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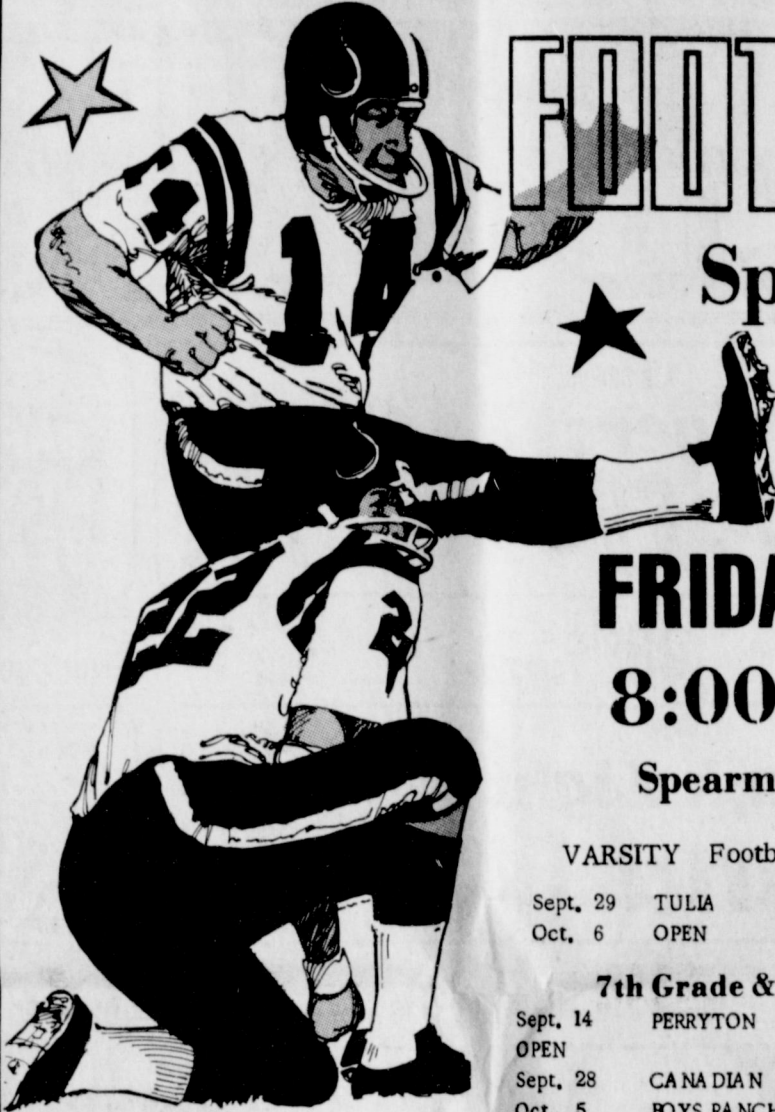
