## **Engineer Gives Choice**

Perryton's City Water Engineer, J. D. Maberry, last week, while predicting a bountiful supply of water for that city, gave the North Plains a choice. We can continue to have hit or miss dry land farming and plenty of city water, or we can have a more bountiful and stable irrigated agriculture economy with many more people and an uncertain future supply of city water.

Engineer Maberry did not put the choice quite that bluntly, but it adds up to the same thing. What he did say, according to a quote in the "Sunday Herald", "I think the only thing that would lower the water level would be irrigation. "He was referring to the Perryton water supply.

We are going to have more irrigation. Just as a salaried worker wants a regular pay check, the farmer and land owner want regular pay checks and irrigation is how they will try to get that regular pay.

The North Panhandle has rich soil, probably better than the South Plains and we can produce as much or more with irrigation. Therefore, those of us depending on wells for city water supplies are going to find many, many irrigation wells mining that precious resource.

There is no need fooling ourselves, what has happened in

older towns depending on wells can happen here. True, maybe they did not have as much water to start with, but they did not use it as fast either.

In the parable of the foolish virgins there were five who made no provisions for extra oil for their lamps and there were five who planned ahead and had oil when the need arose. The five wise virgins refused to share their needed oil. There are towns which will find themselves in the same shape in years ahead. The people who prepared before time will not be eager to share with those who were foolish.

## Step Foward

A step toward possibly more community cooperation and harmony was made again this week when some of the pastors of local churches got together and once more organized a Ministerial Alliance. This is something Spearman has been needing for a long time.

There are many times that joint community services would be appropriate. With the work and cooperation among the ministers and working members of the churches it might be possible to have some services on Christmas Eve or Morning, on Memorial Day, Thanksgiving Day, and all the other days when religious services would have special meaning and are not now observed by local churches,

Attempts have been made earlier to organize an Alliance, but apparently like so many other mortal organizations there was lack of interest. Let us hope that these and other pastors will receive the encouragement from their flocks to work together for good. That's one product that is not over produced.

And speaking of classifieds. Newspaper people have a tendency to look at polls, whether they are federal, private or Gallup, with a little disdain. Most have looked at the unemployment figures released by individual polling agencies as well as government figures with a some what doubtful eye. Many have had this same experience I have I feel sure. You may need an employee and the government tells you there are thousands un-

employed in almost every field-but find one that wants to work. Robert Keating, Editor of the Blairstown, N.J. paper, decided to help the unemployment situation by giving away free "Work Wanted" classified advertising to anyone who would come into his office and ask for it. This act was well publicized. What happened? One ad, a high school senior wanting odd jobs. And this is a town where unemployment offices reported 1,500 people needing jobs. Let's hear no more of this blather about unemployment. They are and they want to stay just that way. After all, they're making a pretty good living standing in line drawing welfare checks.





## THE WAY I SEE IT

by Robert Cordes

Some say "Never!" Some say "Now!" Some say "Not so fast!" What is the answer to the Negro problem" I don't know. I do know both black & white people are at fault. The following is an excerpt from ONE magazine in which Martin Luther King speaks. Is there some truth in his words???

"For years now the Negro has heard the word "wait, " This wait has almost always meant "never, "We have come to see with the distinguished jurist of yesterday that "justice too long delayed is justice denied. " We have waited more than 340 years for our constitutional and God -given rights, The nations of Asia and Africa are moving with jet-like speed toward the goal of political independence, and we still creep at horse-and-buggy pace toward gaining of a cup of coffee at a lunch counter,

"I guess it is easy for those who have never felt the stinging darts of segregation to say "wait". But when you have seen vicious mobs lynch your mothers and fathers at will and drown your sisters and brothers

at whim;
"When you have seen hatefilled policemen curse, kick,
brutalize and even kill your

"When you see the vast majority of your 20 million Negro brothers smothering in an airtight cage of poverty in the midst of an affluent society;

"When you suddenly find your tongue twisted. . as you seek to explain to your six-year old daughter why she can't go to the public amusement park that has just been advertised on television, and see tears welling up when she is told that Funtown is closed to colored children, and see the depressing clouds of inferiority begin to form in her little mental sky, and see her begin to distort her personality by unconsciously developing a bitterness toward white people;

"When you have to concoct an answer for a five-year-old son asking, "Daddy, why do

white people treat colored people so mean?"

"When you take a cross-country drive and find it necessary to sleep night after night in the uncomfortable corners of your automobile because no motel will accept you:

"When you are humiliated day in and day out by nagging signs reading "white men" and "colored".

"When your first name becomes :nigger" and your middle name becomes "boy" (however old you are) and when your wife and mother are never given the respectable title "Mrs.";

when you are narried by day and haunted at night by the fact that you are a Negro, living constantly at tip-toe stance, never quite knowing what to expect next, and plagued with inner fears and outer resentments:

"When you are forever fighting a degenerating sense of

Man (instructing wife to drive): Stop on red. Go on green, And take it easy when I turn white.

"nobodiness" ---- THEN YOU WILL UNDERSTAND WHY WE FIND IT DIFFICULT TO WAIT.

"There comes a time when the cup of endurance runs over, and men are no longer willing to be plunged into an abyss of injustice where they experience the bleakness of corroding despair. I hope you can understand our legitimate and unavoidable impatience..."

Have we "whites" truly helped our brother even though he
be black? Have we truly as a
nation offered equal rights?
I personally don't believe so.
I know the Negro has much to
change and mature. But truly,
don't we too? We have a great
problem on our hands. Brotherly love is one answer.





PLAN WHEAT FERTILIZA-TION EARLY

It is now time to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall. Because Hansford County soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs in the soil test, My office can supply information on how to collect and mail the samples. By sampling early the report will be received in plenty of time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element likely to be in shortest supply. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, factors such as amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately, and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop. Research data of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station clearly indicates that where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen application is of little importance. When wheat is to be grazed it is important to apply all or part of the nitrogen replant. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can contain 20 percent protein or 3.percent nitrogen on a dry

Phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture so it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots for efficient use.

Several registered cattle herds in the county have been tested for Tuberculosis lately or will be tested soon. This testing has been done to reaccredit Hansford County as a T.B. free area. NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 62 of Art-icle XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by add-ing thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (71/4%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or pur-

chasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.
