## Schools Open September 3

### School Drops Tax Rate 8¢

The Spearman School District tax rate has been lowered from \$2 per \$100 valuation to \$1.92.

This action was taken Monday night at a meeting of the board.

The new rate calls for \$1.50 local maintenance and 42 cents for bond service. Last year the rate was \$1.45 for local maintenance and 55 cents for bond service.

The reduction in the tax rate was possible through an increase in valuations of 20 per cent.

At the Monday meeting the board and the architect for the new school building were to inspect the building, but the architect said there were still too many small things to be completed, yet. The board expects to inspect the building next week.

Both the contractor and architect insist the building will be ready for school opening Sept. 3.

The last days of summer are upon us and in less than a month, students will be trooping back to the classrooms. Hansford County students will begin classes Sept. 3.

All schools in the county are waiting until after Labor Day to start classes.

In Spearman High School, students will register Aug. 28 and 29. Seniors will register the morning of Aug. 28, juniors that afternoon, sophomores Thursday morning and freshmen that afternoon.

A general faculty meeting will be held at 9 a. m. Friday, Aug. 30, for the Spearman faculty.

Other than first grade, there will be no pre-enrollment for students below high school level. They will be issued books and begin classes Sept. 3.

In Gruver the high school students register on Aug. 28-29 and the faculty meets on Aug. 30. Classes also, start there on Sept. 3.

At Morse the High School will register on Friday Aug. 30 and classes will begin on Sept. 3.

The first outside activity will be football games for Gruver and Spearman on Sept. 6. Gruver goes to Clarendon for the first game and Spearman goes to Panhandle.

Band practice for grade school, junior high and high school begins here Aug. 12. (See details elsewhere in this issue.)

Football workouts for the county teams begin Aug. 19.

Spearman High School will start the year in a new building. The public open house is tentatively set for Sunday, Sept. 1.

Gruver will let the contract for a new school at a meeting of the board today and construction is scheduled to begin this fall.

### Pastors Form Local Alliance

The Rev. Luther Berry, pastor of the First Baptist Church, was elected President of the Spearman Ministerial Alliance in an organizational meeting Tuesday.

The Rev. Charles R. Gates, pastor of the First Methodist Church was named Vice-President and the Rev. Everett Cain, Jr., was named Secretary-Treasurer.

Other pastors who participated in the organizational meeting were the Rev. George Bollinger of the Union Church, and the Rev. W. Graham Pugh of the First Christian Church. Other pastors of local churches expressed interest in the Alliance, but were unable to attend the first meeting.

Tentative plans were made for a Union Thanksgiving Service Nov. 26 or 27 preceding Thanksgiving Day were made. The group also discussed and took under study suggestions as to how the Alliance may lead to fuller Christian Service in the community.

The group will meet on the first Monday of each month.

### SA Exceeds Fund Goal

Hansford County has opened its check book to another worthy charity and the Salvation Army Fund Campaign has exceeded its goal, according to George Collard of Spearman and Elmo McClellan, Jr., of Gruver.

Collard said Spearman donated \$1051 and McClellan said that Gruver donated \$679 for a total of \$1,730.

Both men were enthusiastic in their thanks to the many volunteer workers and contributors who helped in the drive.

### Band Called For Monday

Music, possibly a bit flat at first, will begin filling the air, Aug. 12, when Spearman Band Director Sam Watson opens the first sessions of summer band rehearsal.

Watson announced this week that the first session will be at 9:30-10:30 a. m. Monday for the grade school band. At 10:30 the Jr. High Band will begin and the high school band will meet from 8:30-9:30 p. m.

The practices will be held in the old band house.

Those interested in drum major and twirler try-outs will be informed about these try-outs at the first practice sessions.

Funeral services for a long-time Spearman resident, Mrs. Flora Cates, will be conducted at 10:30 a. m. today (Thursday) in the Mountain View Baptist Church in Mountain View, Okla., with D. Cullin of the Berger congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, officiating.

Mrs. Cates died at 8:45 p. m. Monday in the Coon Memorial Home in Dalhart. Mrs. Cates had been confined in the Hansford Hospital for many months.

She was born Feb. 17, 1885 in Red Bay, Ala. She and her husband had lived in Oklahoma and Quitaque before moving to Spearman in 1932. The family farmed and operated a grocery store here.

Again this year Phillip will be participating in the National Jaycee Junior Golf tournament to be played in Midland.

Although he plays with a brace on his leg, Phillip was runner-up in the Hawaiian state

tournament. The brace prevents him from bending his knee.

Phillip wrote his grandmother that he almost missed making the national tournament for the second year. He wrote that he was leading the tournament, but got too careless and finished second.

The Jaycees in Hawaii had only enough money to send the winner, but when Phillip finished second, despite his handicap, funds were quickly raised for him to make the trip.

Last year Phillip played in the national tournament held in Virginia and finished 60th

out of several hundred boys competing. During the tournament he was bothered by pains in one leg. Shortly after returning home it was discovered that he had a bone disease that would require surgery.

He will be playing in Midland later this month and his grandmother and aunt, Mrs. Tom Etter, plan to see him in action.

## EDITORIALS

### Engineer Gives Choice

Perryton's City Water Engineer, J.D. Maberry, last week, while predicting a bountiful supply of water for that city, gave the North Plains a choice. We can continue to have hit or miss dry land farming and plenty of city water, or we can have a more bountiful and stable irrigated agriculture economy with many more people and an uncertain future supply of city water.

Engineer Maberry did not put the choice quite that bluntly, but it adds up to the same thing. What he did say, according to a quote in the "Sunday Herald", "I think the only thing that would lower the water level would be irrigation." He was referring to the Perryton water supply.

We are going to have more irrigation. Just as a salaried worker wants a regular pay check, the farmer and land owner want regular pay checks and irrigation is how they will try to get that regular pay.

The North Panhandle has rich soil, probably better than the South Plains and we can produce as much or more with irrigation. Therefore, those of us depending on wells for city water supplies are going to find many, many irrigation wells mining that precious resource.

There is no need fooling ourselves, what has happened in

older towns depending on wells can happen here. True, maybe they did not have as much water to start with, but they did not use it as fast either.

In the parable of the foolish virgins there were five who made no provisions for extra oil for their lamps and there were five who planned ahead and had oil when the need arose. The five wise virgins refused to share their needed oil. There are towns which will find themselves in the same shape in years ahead. The people who prepared before time will not be eager to share with those who were foolish.

### Step Foward

A step toward possibly more community cooperation and harmony was made again this week when some of the pastors of local churches got together and once more organized a Ministerial Alliance. This is something Spearman has been needing for a long time.

There are many times that joint community services would be appropriate. With the work and cooperation among the ministers and working members of the churches it might be possible to have some services on Christmas Eve or Morning, on Memorial Day, Thanksgiving Day, and all the other days when religious services would have special meaning and are not now observed by local churches.

Attempts have been made earlier to organize an Alliance, but apparently like so many other mortal organizations there was lack of interest. Let us hope that these and other pastors will receive the encouragement from their flocks to work together for good. That's one product that is not over produced.



### Figures Do Lie

And speaking of classifieds, Newspaper people have a tendency to look at polls, whether they are federal, private or Gallup, with a little disdain. Most have looked at the unemployment figures released by individual polling agencies as well as government figures with a somewhat doubtful eye. Many have had this same experience I have I feel sure. You may need an employee and the government tells you there are thousands un-

employed in almost every field-but find one that wants to work. Robert Keating, Editor of the Blairstown, N.J. paper, decided to help the unemployment situation by giving away free "Work Wanted" classified advertising to anyone who would come into his office and ask for it. This act was well publicized. What happened? One ad, a high school senior wanting odd jobs. And this is a town where unemployment offices reported 1,500 people needing jobs. Let's hear no more of this blather about unemployment. They are-and they want to stay just that way. After all, they're making a pretty good living standing in line drawing welfare checks.

**THE WAY I SEE IT**

Some say "Never!" Some say "Now!" Some say "Not so fast!" What is the answer to the Negro problem? I don't know. I do know both black & white people are at fault. The following is an excerpt from ONE magazine in which Martin Luther King speaks. Is there some truth in his words???

"For years now the Negro has heard the word "wait." This wait has almost always meant "never." We have come to see with the distinguished jurist of yesterday that "justice too long delayed is justice denied." We have waited more than 340 years for our constitutional and God-given rights. The nations of Asia and Africa are moving with jet-like speed toward the goal of political independence, and we still creep at horse-and-buggy pace toward gaining a cup of coffee at a lunch counter.

"I guess it is easy for those who have never felt the stinging darts of segregation to say "wait". But when you have seen vicious mobs lynch your mothers and fathers at will and drown your sisters and brothers

at whim;

"When you have seen hate-filled policemen curse, kick, brutalize and even kill your black brothers with impunity;

"When you see the vast majority of your 20 million Negro brothers smothering in an airtight cage of poverty in the midst of an affluent society;

"When you suddenly find your tongue twisted... as you seek to explain to your six-year old daughter why she can't go to the public amusement park that has just been advertised on television, and see tears welling up when she is told that Funtown is closed to colored children, and see the depressing clouds of inferiority begin to form in her little mental sky, and see her begin to distort her personality by unconsciously developing a bitterness toward white people;

"When you have to concoct an answer for a five-year-old son asking, "Daddy, why do

white people treat colored people so mean?"

"When you take a cross-country drive and find it necessary to sleep night after night in the uncomfortable corners of your automobile because no motel will accept you;

"When you are humiliated day in and day out by nagging signs reading "white men" and "colored";

"When your first name becomes "nigger" and your middle name becomes "boy" (however old you are) and when your wife and mother are never given the respectable title "Mrs.";

When you are married by day and haunted at night by the fact that you are a Negro, living constantly at tip-toe stance, never quite knowing what to expect next, and plagued with inner fears and outer resentments;

"When you are forever fighting a degenerating sense of

Man (instructing wife to drive): Stop on red. Go on green. And take it easy when I turn white.

"nobodiness"---THEN YOU WILL UNDERSTAND WHY WE FIND IT DIFFICULT TO WAIT.

"There comes a time when the cup of endurance runs over, and men are no longer willing to be plunged into an abyss of injustice where they experience the bleakness of corroding despair. I hope you can understand our legitimate and unavoidable impatience..."

Have we "whites" truly helped our brother even though he be black? Have we truly as a nation offered equal rights? I personally don't believe so. I know the Negro has much to change and mature. But truly, don't we too? We have a great problem on our hands. Brotherhood love is one answer.

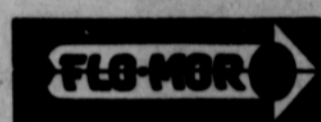

A request for permission to sell small street trash containers in Spearman by a Liberal firm was turned down. The council felt the containers were too small and would be a problem to empty. The council decided the benefits would not be worth the cost to individual merchants.
