County Voters Deny New Document Try

The proposed new constitution, divided up into eight segments, didn't suit the tastes Tuesday of Hansford County voters who overwhelmingly rejected the document.

County voters displayed similar inclinations as those all over Texas as the proposed constitution failed by about a three to one margin.

Overall, returns in Hansford County looked like this, with the larger number on each proposition being those who voted "against" and the smaller number being those who voted "for."

The Palo Duro River Authority Board of Directors held a meeting Wednesday night, Nov. 4 at the Farm Bureau building.

The directors decided not to call a bond election for the purpose of raising local monies to support the application to the Texas Water Development Board for the funding of approximately 10% of the cost of the PDRA project.

Reasons who no action was taken to call the bond election in the immediate future were several.

In the general manager's report to the board, the board was informed that Bill Holmberg of the U. S.

Corps of Engineer's Office, Tulsa, Okla. had called the PDRA office on Oct. 23 to inform the general manager that Holmberg had been appointed by Col Smith as the project engineer for the PDRA project and that Holmberg would be here to begin the flood control study as soon as the money for the study is released by the U. S. Congress.

The bill has been signed by the president. Presently, the flood control study money is in an appropriation bill that has been passed by both houses of Congress but is part of a larger appropriation bill that is in the joint House-Senate committee of the Congress. The money is expected to be released in late November or early December.

This news was so encouraging to PDRA directors that all of them felt it would be wise to wait until the U. S. Corps of Engineers had made their study of the project because by waiting we might save considerable local tax monies.

Also in postponing the bond election the PDRA board decided that until the state determines precisely what it intends to do relative to evaluation for tax purposes of rural lands that they could not determine a tax rate for the bond issue that would be verifiable as to the amount of money it would raise and the amount of assessment needed.

On the basis of the above, it seemed reasonable to wait for a period of time until we all have a better idea of just what amount of local money will be needed.

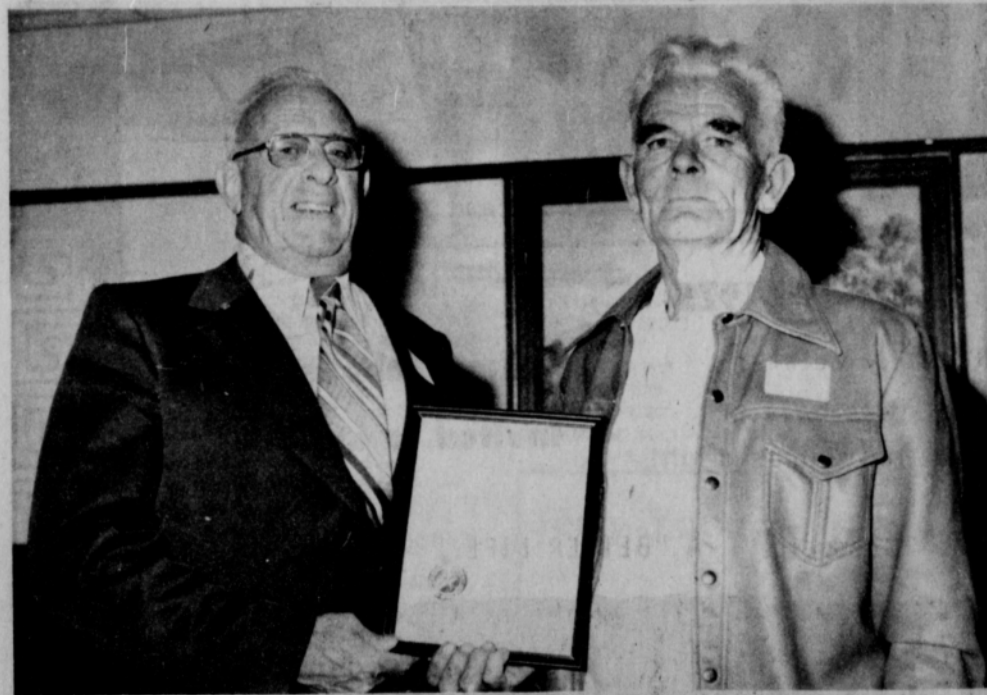

for the season. Billy Sellars scored first for the Lynx on a 30 yard sweep, on one of his usual brilliant runs, behind massive blocking from the Lynx offensive unit. The PAT failed. New State Conservationist Named



Temple, Texas--- George C. Maris will succeed Edward E. Thomas as state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service effective November 2.

Maris, a native of Heidenheimer, Texas, is currently state conservationist for Arizona. He began his career with SCS at Rusk in 1950 as a soil scientist and later worked as a soil conservationist and district conservationist at Sulphur Springs, Winnsboro, Jefferson, New Boston, and Corsicana.

From 1964 to 1968, Maris was area conservationist at Temple. He then moved to Arkansas as an assistant state conservationist. In 1972, he was appointed state conservationist for Arizona. He received awards for outstanding work in 1967 and 1975.

A 1944 graduate of Temple High School, Maris has a bachelor's degree from Texas A&M University, 1950. He

served in the U. S. Air Force from February 1945 to August 1946. Thomas, state conservationist for Texas since 1972, is being promoted to the position of assistant administrator for SCS in Washington, D. C. He entered SCS in 1954 as a soil conservationist at Lubbock and later served as district conservationist and area conservationist at various locations in Texas. In 1968, he was promoted to assistant state conservationist at Temple and to deputy state conservationist at Nashville, Tennessee in 1971. He was assigned to his present position one year later.

Thomas is a 1954 graduate of Texas A&M University where he was a member of the track team. He served as an army officer in Korea from 1954 to 1956.

Day Care Center Closes

It is felt the Center rendered a very worthwhile service to many in the community, but with lack of adequate financial support, there was no alternative to the action which was taken by the Board. The Board does wish to express its gratitude for the gifts that were given during the operation of the Center. Under the very fine direction of the Executive Director, Mrs. Beverly Jenkins; and the staff, the Center was run in a very effective manner. We regret that because of conditions beyond the control or concern of the staff, the Center has to be closed. We realize that many mothers may have difficulty finding others to take care of their children with such short notice and this we do regret. The staff is working with the mothers to try and help this situation at least on a temporary basis. One reason why the decision has been taken on such short notice is so that we may close without any large indebtedness on the Center. There is still hope that at some time in the future, a Day Care Center may be established. However if this is to be, there will have to be more adequate financial backing available on a permanent basis. Also a facility that is more suitable than the one we tried to use. Without the support of the community, a Day Care Center cannot be maintained. The Staff-members were:

There has been some interest indicated for organizing a home demonstration club to meet in the evening especially for working women. If you are interested, let us know and we'll work out something.

Sewing fashionable scarves at home takes little money or time to produce this season's top accessory.

Depending upon the size and shape desired, one-fourth to one yard of lightweight fabric is adequate. Enclose raw edges by making the scarf double. Single, overcast or hem the edges for a single thickness.

Newest looks for scarves are as belts, draped across one shoulder in a triangle or as a head wrap. Wear small scarves in multiples. Twist any size tightly into a rope for a novel effect.

Extending the scarf look, shawls abound in large triangles, rectangles and squares. Create a suit effect by making one to coordinate with a skirt, dress or pants. Add decorative braid, fringe or ruffles. Any shape can be made from 54- to 60-inch wide fabric.

Other accessory fashions needing only a little fabric are vests, brimmed hats, wrap belts or soft fabric bags. Synthetic suedes and leather, corduroy, denim and quilted fabrics are ideal choices.

It's time to begin planning holiday cooking and turkey is usually included.

Self-basting turkeys offer the busy holiday cook the advantages of convenience, texture and flavor.

Self-basting turkeys are usually U. S. Grade A birds injected with a limited amount (three per cent) of basting solution. As the bird roasts, the solution is released throughout the meat, improving the texture and flavor.

Basting solutions range from straight butter to mixture of oil and water. Oils used are the same ones normally found in margarine—such as cottonseed, soy, coconut or corn oil.

The USDA approves these solutions under regulations for federally-inspected turkeys. It also protects consumers from fraud by requiring the label to state a basting solution has been added to self-basting turkeys.

Unbasted turkeys are also available. These birds don't have any basting solution to add weight, so they will "weigh in" lighter than a basted turkey of comparable size.

Unbasted turkeys will be just as good as self-basting ones—but more care in cooking is required.

Turkeys are a wise market choice all year, but take time to examine the turkey—choosing one with firm flesh, free of blemishes. Also, read the label carefully and make the purchase a matter of choice not chance.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's shield is a sign the bird is wholesome, that the poultry came from a healthy animal and was inspected throughout the packing operation.

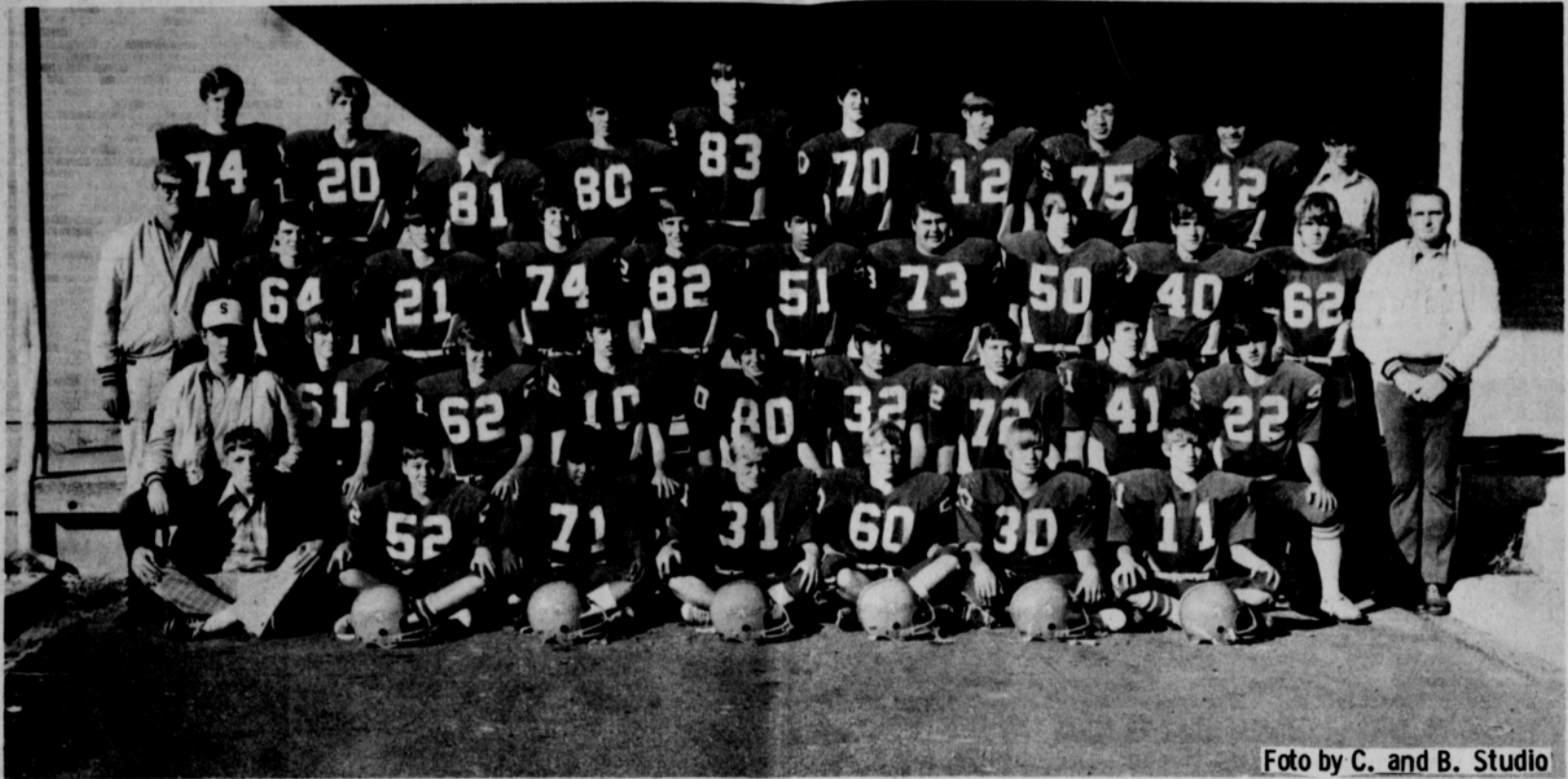
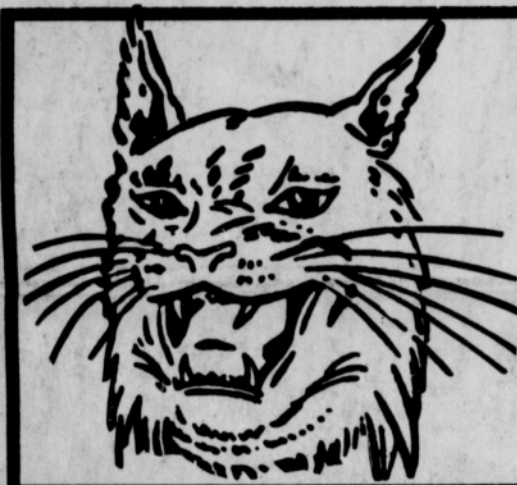

Thirty people new to the program enrolled plus others who rejoined or transferred.

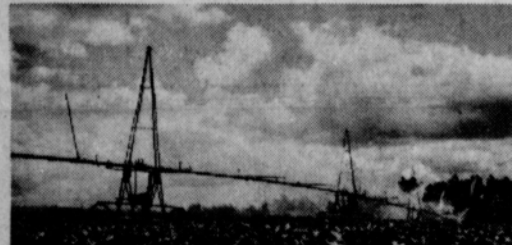
