Last Day To Vote Absentee

Tuesday is the final day for absentee voting for the May 1 primary. Hansford County Clerk Marie Gould reported 30 absentee votes had been cast Friday morning. Some confusion has arisen this year as to the method of voting, since votes for president are cast for delegates to the Republican and Democratic conventions rather than for the candidates themselves. Also, persons who choose to vote absentee need to be certain before going to the clerk's office whether they wish to vote in the Republican or the Democratic primary. Most candidates on the local level are in the Democratic primary, so that if a person wishes to vote for delegates supporting Ronald Reagan or President Ford on the Republican ticket he will not be able to vote for many local candidates. Voters must cast a ballot in one primary or the other, and can not vote in both. The only contested race on the Republican ballot, besides that of president, is that of the Republican candidate for Senator. Three Republicans are vying for the seat currently being held by Lloyd Bentsen, a candidate on the Democratic ballot for president. On the local level, the state representative from this district, G. R. (Bob) Close is listed on the ballot. On the Democratic Primary ballot, three candidates for president are put before the voters. They are Lloyd Bentsen, Jimmy Carter and George Wallace. On the local level, the May 1 primaries hold contested races for Sheriff, County Commissioner, Precinct 3, County Commissioner Precinct 1 and for District Attorney. In the race for Sheriff, incumbent R. L. McFarlin is being opposed by Lee Phillips. Candidates in the Commissioner Precinct 1 race are Ray Phelps, Roscoe L. Nelson, J. E. Kenney and Garland Head. Candidates in the Commissioner Precinct 3 are B. J. Kenner, Robert C. Ferguson, L. M. Womble and Dan Destimone. Incumbent for District Attorney, 84th District, Stephen F. Cross is being opposed by Bruce Robenson, and Cecil M. Pruett.

Judge Countiss Completes Course

RENO, NV. April 19, 1976 Judge Richard N. Countiss of the Spearman District Court, has completed one week judicial training and education session conducted by the National College of the State Judiciary. Dealing with the subject of evidence, the course reviewed evidentiary principles and trends. Topics included the judges' evidentiary role; judicial notice; questions of fact; expert and opinion testimony; hearsay; privilege against self-incrimination; and, improperly obtained evidence. Thirty-two judges completed the academic session, whose faculty included Judge M. Ross Bigelow of the Los Angeles Superior Court; Judge Loren L. Sawyer of the Medford, Oregon, Circuit Court; and, Professor Kenneth W. Graham, Jr., of the University of California at Los Angeles Law School. Judge Ernst John Watts, Dean of the National College, also lectured. The National College of the State Judiciary is an American Bar Association. It is a formal training and educational institution of judges, by judges, and for judges. Sessions conducted at the

National College are designed to remove the judge from his daily environment into an academic atmosphere, the Judicial College Building at the University of Nevada, Reno campus. With the assistance of his fellow judges, sessions provide him with a deeper understanding of his role as a judge and of the entire judicial process. Sessions explore the latest techniques available to the judge in order for him to increase efficiency by reducing court delays, reducing court costs, and reducing the amount of new trials required. In its history of conducting academic sessions, over 5,000 certificates of completion have been issued. These certificates have been presented to state judges of all levels of jurisdiction, administrative law judges, military judges, court administrators and foreign judges who have completed basic, regular, specialty and graduate sessions of one to four weeks duration. The National College also conducts extension academic programs in the fifty states in association with state supreme courts, judicial organizations and law schools, and assists in establishing state judicial colleges.

Baked goods must be in by 8:30 a.m. the morning of June 5th (Saturday). The pies entered in the contest will be sold and the proceeds will go to the HD Council of Hansford County. Remember, this includes only 4 categories; pies, cakes, breads; and cookies. And men, let's show the ladies up, by entering some of our favorite baking goods.

Monday night the Spearman High School and Junior High Choir will present this year's spring concert. Beginning at 7:30 the choir will feature music that everyone will enjoy. Songs from sacred to popular, folk to classical, patriotic--- everything! The High School Girls choir will begin their spring tour with this concert. Singing Wednesday in Pampa, the choir will also be at two schools in Irving, Nimitz High School, and MacArthur High School before performing Saturday at Del Mar College for the Buccanier festival at Corpus Christi. The concert is free in hopes that those who have not heard these fine choirs will come and spend a relaxing evening enjoying the music. The next choral event scheduled by the choir will be the performance of the hit Broadway musical "You a Good Man Charlie Brown" the evening of May 13. City Officials To Appear At Hearing

Spearman city officials as well as representatives from the cities of Spearman, Canadian, Booker, Higgins and all unincorporated communities being served by High Plains Gas Co. will be in Austin Thursday morning for a hearing before the Railroad Commission. High Plains Gas Company is asking for a rate increase that would amount to approximately 32¢ mcf for these cities, or 95¢ mcf for the cost of gas to the city. The City of Spearman is currently paying 63¢ mcf after a ruling just four months ago by the commission giving the gas company an increase. Mayor Ralph Blodgett, city attorney J. E. Blackburn, acting city manager Mark Neff, Bill McMorris, consultant, Wayne Brown, CPA, and attorney Bob Wilson of Austin will be representing Spearman at the hearing.

Registered Voters Up In County

According to Helen Dry, County Tax Assessor-Collector the registered voters in Hansford County total 3824. This is up from last year when there were 3255. Mrs. Dry stated that there had also been 273 cancellations, either by people moving or by death. Registered voters divided into voting precincts are: Precinct 1, 973; Precinct 2, 126; Precinct 3, 171; Precinct 4, 829; Precinct 5, 723; Precinct 6, 875; Precinct 7, 101; and Precinct 9, 126.

"LEWIS AND CLARK"


The expedition of Merriwether Lewis and William Clark set out from St. Louis on May 14, 1804 to explore the Northwestern areas of land the United States had acquired from France in the Louisiana Purchase. They sailed up the Missouri River, crossed the Rocky Mountains on horseback and then sailed down the Columbia River to reach the Pacific Ocean on November 7, 1805. The expedition began its return trip in the spring of 1806. Reaching the mountains, they divided into two parties, each taking a different course so that they could explore more territory. February Bond Sales Listed

In releasing Treasury figures, County Savings Bonds Chairman C. A. 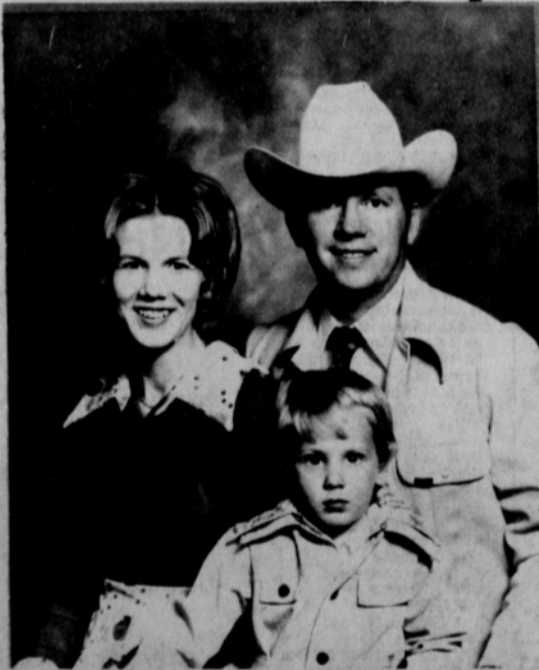

Fire Sweeps Creek Area

Fanned by gusts of wind up to 40 and 50 miles an hour, a prairie fire swept through the Palo Duro Creek area south of Gruver Wednesday afternoon with the alarm being turned in at 1:05 P.M. to call the Gruver Volunteers to action. Units from Spearman and Morse also quickly responded to the call for help to quell the flames which originated from a welder's torch being used at the Palo Duro Feed Lot.

The Ed Rafferty ranch home, now occupied by the Jim Tiner family, was threatened by the sweep of the flames with the resultant damage of smoke and a corner of the roof which was ignited by a row of evergreens growing near the house. Approximately \$1,500 damage was done to the home before the fire swept with inferno rage east and north along the creek bed finally being extinguished near the Winder place after blackening 2,000 to 3,000 acres. Many area residents turned out to help with the emergency and two men were slightly injured during the afternoon's fight. Danny McCammond of Morse suffered burns on one arm, his face and his nostrils during the battle of the blaze with a second man also suffering burns. Both men were transferred to the Hansford Hospital for emergency treatment after being given First Aid at the scene, treated and released.

Firemen battled the fire for four to five hours before finally bringing it under control about 5:30 P.M. but not before the flames had destroyed a wild life refuge on the creek, a rookery in which eleven sand pipers were destroyed along with the complete annihilation of their nesting area. Later in the evening, two owls whose homes had been in the trees along the creek, were rescued and placed in a safe roosting spot.

Highlighting the fire fighting was the entry of three spray planes. Buster Hendrickson and his son, Randy, of Spearman's Buster's Dusters and Clark Bridges who pilots a spray plane for Sparks Brothers were at the Gruver Airport having had to curtail their spraying activities due to the high winds when they heard the plea for more water coming from the scene of the fire. They decided to try their hand as volunteer flying firemen and forthwith filled their planes from a tank truck of the Dusters containing about 10,000 gallons of water--the two smaller planes capable of carrying about 120 gallons of water and the larger plane about 300 gallons. Highly successful was their entry into the fire fighting business for they were able to pinpoint the water on the blazing areas allowing ground fire fighting equipment to move in and extinguish the blazes.

These flying firemen feel that if they are informed immediately of a fire emergency--particularly on flat ground--that they could overcome a fire of this magnitude with three or four trips.





Pet Coyote

In their back yard, the Martins kept a pet coyote on a chain. Although they considered him harmless, they warned youngsters in the neighborhood to keep their distance. But one day a boy ventured too close and got bitten.

Sued afterward for damages, the Martins insisted in court that the coyote had never bitten anyone before. Nevertheless, the court held them liable. The court said the law is less interested in the characteristics of the individual animal than in the characteristics of the species.

Most courts agree that the keeper of a wild animal, even if it is seemingly tame, carries a heavy responsibility in case of an injury. (Of course, there may also be a local ordinance forbidding such pets altogether.)

Where is the dividing line between "wild" and "tame"? Generally considered wild are such

animals as lions, tigers, bears, and wolves. Generally considered tame are such animals as cattle, sheep, horses, dogs, and cats.

Then there are assorted animals near the borderline, like deer, mules, and monkeys. To some degree, the law's classification depends on the customs of the community. The elephant, held tame in Burma, was held wild in Ohio. The camel, held tame in Australia, was held wild in California.

Even if the animal is classified as wild, the keeper will usually not be blamed for an injury to someone who was guilty of deliberate provocation or recklessness. In one case a youth disregarded both a barrier and warning signs to approach a leopard in a cage.

Slashed by the leopard, he later demanded damages from the animal's owner. But the court threw out his claim. The court said, in effect, that the victim had gotten what he had asked for.
