### Much Like Maize

# Castor Beans Not Miracle Money Crop

More than 70 local farmers learned that Castor Beans are not a miracle or a get rich crop at a Chamber of Commerce agriculture meeting Friday afternoon.

Representatives of the Baker Castor Bean Co., of Plainview and growers from over the area discussed the crop and how it is grown.

Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Committee Chairman Kenneth Evans said there were 75 farmers in the meeting.

Evans said the meeting showed that the crop is not a big money crop, but is another crop that can be grown at a profit in this area.

John C. Anderson and Don Sanders of Baker Castor Bean Co. were at the meeting. Custom cutters Dick and Don Bowthwell of Plainview, along with growers Junior Dunahoo, B.J. Turner, Dean Lainer and

David and G.A. Burger were at the meeting.

Sanders said the beans will produce a cash return much like maize.

He said the crop requires about the same amount of water, or maybe a little bit more. The crop does not require a great amount of water at one time, but light watering more often.

The Baker representative said the producers are given the selling price of the beans when he enters the program. This price has been averaging from \$4.90 to \$5.25 during the past five years.

This is the world market price and it is a relatively stable market.

Berry Grain of Waka, operated by Emmitt Drake and Clarence Wallace, are the agents for this area. They will handle the seed and also be the marketing point.

Farmers in the Waka area who grew the beans last year did not realize a big return on their investment, but they planted late and were just learning to grow the crop. Most of those attending are planning to plant the crop again next year.

## Lutherans To Build New Church Plant

Spearman will have another new house of worship by late summer, it was announced this week by the Rev. Robert

Cordes, pastor of the Faith Lutheran Church.

The recently organized Faith Lutheran Church of Spearman is completing details for the purchase of a building site at the corner of Eleventh and Bernice Streets in the south part of Spearman.

The proposed building will be of modern construction with approximately 4,000 square feet of floor space in the sanctuary and education department.

The Rev. Cordes is pastor of the Oslo Lutheran Church in the northwest part of the county. That church established a mission church in Spearman about two years ago.

The Faith Lutheran Church was organized here several months ago with the Rev. Cordes serving as pastor of both churches.

The church meets in the meeting room of the Farm Bureau building. It is outgrowing its present facilities. Church services are conducted at 9 a.m. and Sunday School is conducted at 10 a.m. each Sunday.

## County Collects

### 97% of Taxes

Hansford County taxpayers paid 97.9 percent of their 1964 county tax bill before the deadline, according to Tax Assessor J. B. Cooke.

The tax office collected \$532,359.93 from the time payment started Oct. 1, until the deadline Jan. 31. The total tax roll for 1964 was \$545,359.88.

Cooke said unpaid taxes began collecting one and one-half percent interest per month on Feb. first.

### Four Year Scholarship

## John Crawford Signs To Play For Raiders

Johnny Crawford, Spearman's outstanding quarterback, signed a letter of intent to play football for Texas Tech for the next four years.

Crawford was signed Wednesday by R. L. Fuller, to a four year scholarship at the Southwest Conference school.

Crawford is the second Lynx player to sign with Tech in recent years. Sam Cornelius completed his football career at Tech this fall. He graduated from Spearman High in 1961.

Crawford lettered three years in high school and this year was given honorable mention as quarterback on the Fort Worth Star Telegram All-State team.

The big, strong 185-pounder played quarterback for the past two seasons where he was a good passer and strong power runner. At times he moved to

halfback to better utilize his running power.

He is currently recovering from surgery on a knee injured in practice during the final two weeks of the season. He played two games after the knee was hurt.

Tech officials expect the knee to recover fully and not hamper his playing ability.

## Buzzard To Seek Office

One member of the Spearman School Board has filed for re-election to another three year term.

Lloyd Buzzard has filed for a second term as one of the seven men on the board. In his three years on the board Buzzard has favored providing the best facilities, faculty and course of study the district can afford.

Buzzard is one of three men who are completing their terms of office on the board. The other two are Board President Dr. D.E. Hackley and Jack Lovett.

## Lynx Slip In Last Quarter After Battling Hawks Hard

A 53 point second half by the Phillips Blackhawks was too much for the Spearman Lynx as they fell 95-67 in their final game in Phillips Friday night.

The Lynx stayed within striking distance of the Hawks until late in the third quarter when they tore the game open.

At the half, Spearman was trailing by only six points and managed to stay this close until about five minutes deep in the third quarter.

Phillips' Larry Lewis carried the Hawk scoring attack in the first half, then in the final surge, the entire Hawk squad hit with consistency.

Both teams played it rough with Spearman collecting 24 fouls and losing Bob Phillips, Ken Shufeldt and Carl Close on fouls. Phillips had 27 fouls and five boys finished the

game with four fouls but none fouled out.

Spearman hit 29 of 42 free throws and Phillips made 29 of 40 attempts from the line.

Larry Butts, Jim Kirkland, Bob Phillips and Leroy Callaway carried the Lynx scoring in the first half. It was spread out in the third quarter and reserve Bari Blevins hit seven points in the fourth quarter.

The quarter scores had Phillips in the lead all the way, 26-14, 42-35 and 68-55.

## Second Sugar Meeting Set

A second meeting on the proposed sugar beet refining plant will be held here Thursday, Feb. 18 at 2 p.m. in the County Courtroom.

County Agent Robert Adamson said a representative of the North Plains Sugar Beet Association will be here to explain the financing the program further.

The representative will also present the latest information on the drive to raise \$6.25 million dollars for building a sugar refinery at Etter and the securing of a sugar beet allotment for this area.

Financing for \$15 million of the cost of the plant has been secured and now the association is trying to raise \$6.25 million from the farmers wanting to grow the beets.

To get any of the allotted acres, a farmer must invest in the co-operative plant.

"Contemporary Nursing Practice," a special refresher course for inactive registered nurses, will begin at 9 a.m. Monday, March 1 at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Sponsored by the Nursing Service Department, the course will be held from 9 a.m. through 3 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week through April 22. Advanced enrollment is required by Wednesday, February 24.

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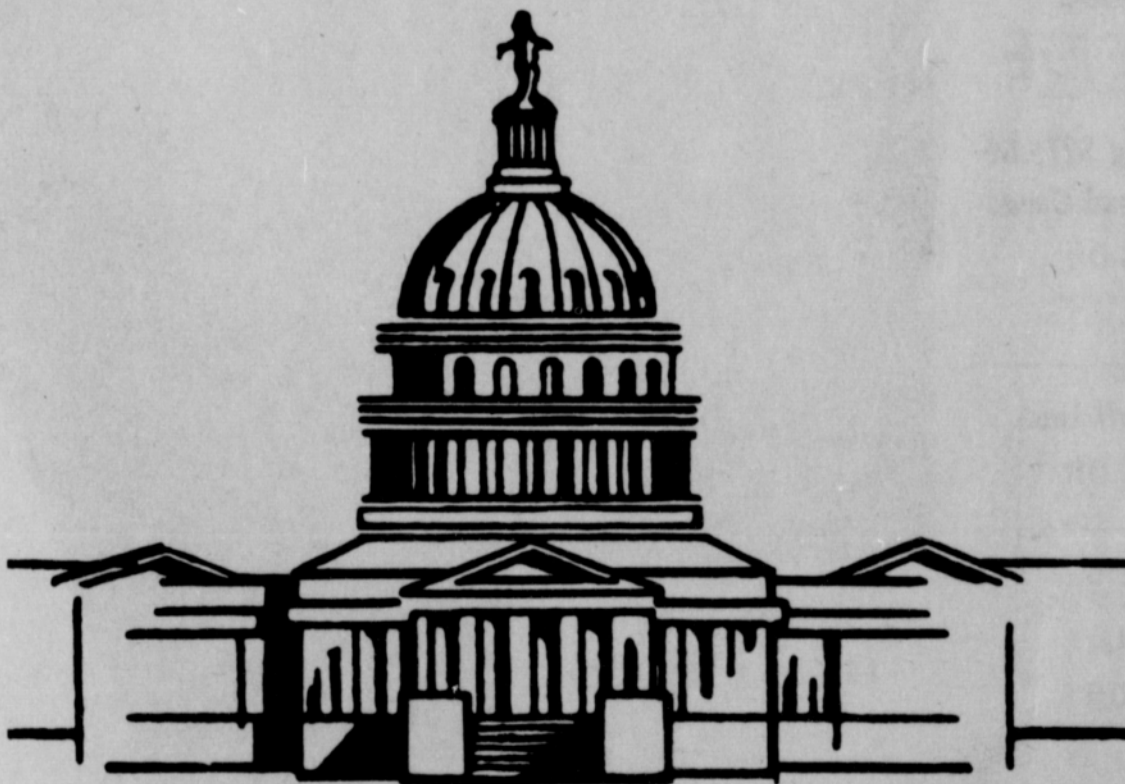

# Reasonable Precautions Suggested To Guard Against Heart Attack

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of the series of articles on heart disease written by Dr. R.L. Kleeberger, President of the Hansford County Heart Association.

It is important to remember that no hard-and-fast guarantees can be offered. But in most instances the individual can vastly improve his chances of avoiding or at least delaying heart attack by observing these reasonable precautions:

1. Reduce if overweight. Excess weight is accompanied by a higher risk to your heart and health. Remember that only a doctor is qualified to tell you how to reduce.
2. Reduce fat consumption. Reduction of caloric intake by decreasing the amount of ordi-

nary fat in the diet will not only help prevent obesity but will usually lower blood cholesterol as well. Another method of lowering blood cholesterol is controlling the amount and type of fat in the diet, without changing caloric intake. In the usual diet eaten by Americans, a large part of the fats has been of the saturated (animal origin) type. Too much of this type of fat tends to increase the cholesterol in the blood. If saturated fat intake is substantially reduced and polyunsaturated (chiefly vegetable oils) are substituted for some of the saturated fats, blood cholesterol usually goes down.

3. Control high blood pressure. If your doctor finds you

have this disorder he will be able in most instances to bring it under control. The measures used in most cases includes drugs and diet changes.

4. Stop smoking cigarettes. In studies of various population groups, it was found that death rates from heart attacks in men range from 50 to 200 per cent higher among cigarette smokers than among non-smokers, depending on the amount smoked.

5. Exercise regularly. Regular, moderate exercise is desirable. If in doubt about the amount and kind of exercise, get medical advice.

6. Shun needless tensions. You cannot avoid all stresses, but never intentionally go out of your way to acquire needless tensions. This will not

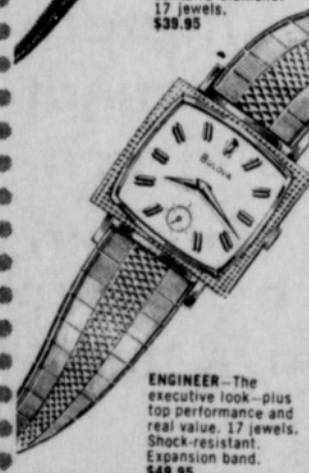
