Evans said the meeting showed that the crop is not a big money crop, but is another crop that can be grown at a profit in this area.

Co. were at the meeting. Custom cutters Dick and Don Bowthwell of Plainview, along with growers Junior Dunahoo, B.J. Turner, Dean Lainer and David and G.A. Burger were at the meeting. Sanders said the beans will

duce a cash return much like maize,

He said the crop requires about the same amount of water, or maybe a little bit more. The crop does not require a great amount of water at one time, but light watering more

Baker representative said the producers are given the selling price of the beans when he enters the program. This price has been averaging from \$4.90 to \$5.25 during the past five years.

This is the world market price and it is a relatively stable market.

Berry Grain of Waka, operated by Emmitt Drake and Clarence Wallace, are the agents for this area. They will handle the seed and also be the marketing point.

Farmers in the Waka area who grew the beans last year did not realize a big return on their investment, but they planted late and were just learning to grow the crop. learning to grow the crop.

again next year.







tell you how to reduce.

2. Reduce fat consumption.
