BON'T SAVE GRAIN
SORGHUM FOR SEED
Why can't 1 save grain year? I paid plenty for the seed this year, the harvest should be good enough to plant again. This comment is often voiced by Texas farmers who'd like to cut costs by sorghum crop for next year's seed.
quick look at a plot of grain sorghum at Texas A \&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center at McGregor will soon convince that saving grain sorghum for seed is folly.
The plot at the Research Center was planted with seed held out from harvest the previous year. Some heads in the field were four or five feet high, while others were a ground. This means more foliage has to be run through the combine to harvest tie grain. In addition, there were numerous white heads in the field. This is caused by the genetic makeup of seed saved
from the product of first-cross from the product of first-cross
grain sorghum harvest, Mixed grain always means a dock at the elevator, and many times it is difficult to find a buyer at any price.
Many of the heads were mature and ready to be harvested, but there were also heads
that were immature and could not be harvested, ot at best, would raise the moisture test. Again, this means a dock at the elevator.

## Conservationists Study Salt Water Problems

Ground water contains varying a mounts of dissolved minerals which determine its suitability for municipal, inIn the Northern High Plains the ground water in the Ogallala formation, the Cretaceous rocks, and part of the water in the Jurassic and Triassic rocks is suitable for most uses whereas water from the under lying Permian rocks is more most uses. The Permian are commonly known as the Red Bed.
In recent months water quality checks on a few irrigation wells in Hansford and Ochiltree cuunties have indicated are generally deeper than other wells in the area.
A sincere effort is being made by the Water District to determine where the salt is coming from, It is a known fact that a salt formation unour principal water bearing forour principal water bearing for
mation, at a relatively shallow depth. However limited information on this salt formation makes it impossible to isolate it area by area at this time.

There are some things which a land owner can do which could help discover salt water before too much money is spent
on the well.
(1) It is always important to
obtaina good test hole drillerobtaina good test hole drillersamples. This is of utmost importance. You are paying for this service and should insist that samples be caught and logged on paper. This is es-
pecially true when drilling pecially.
(2) Immediately after the test hole is completed an electric log should be run. An electric log is just as important as any other phase of well
