

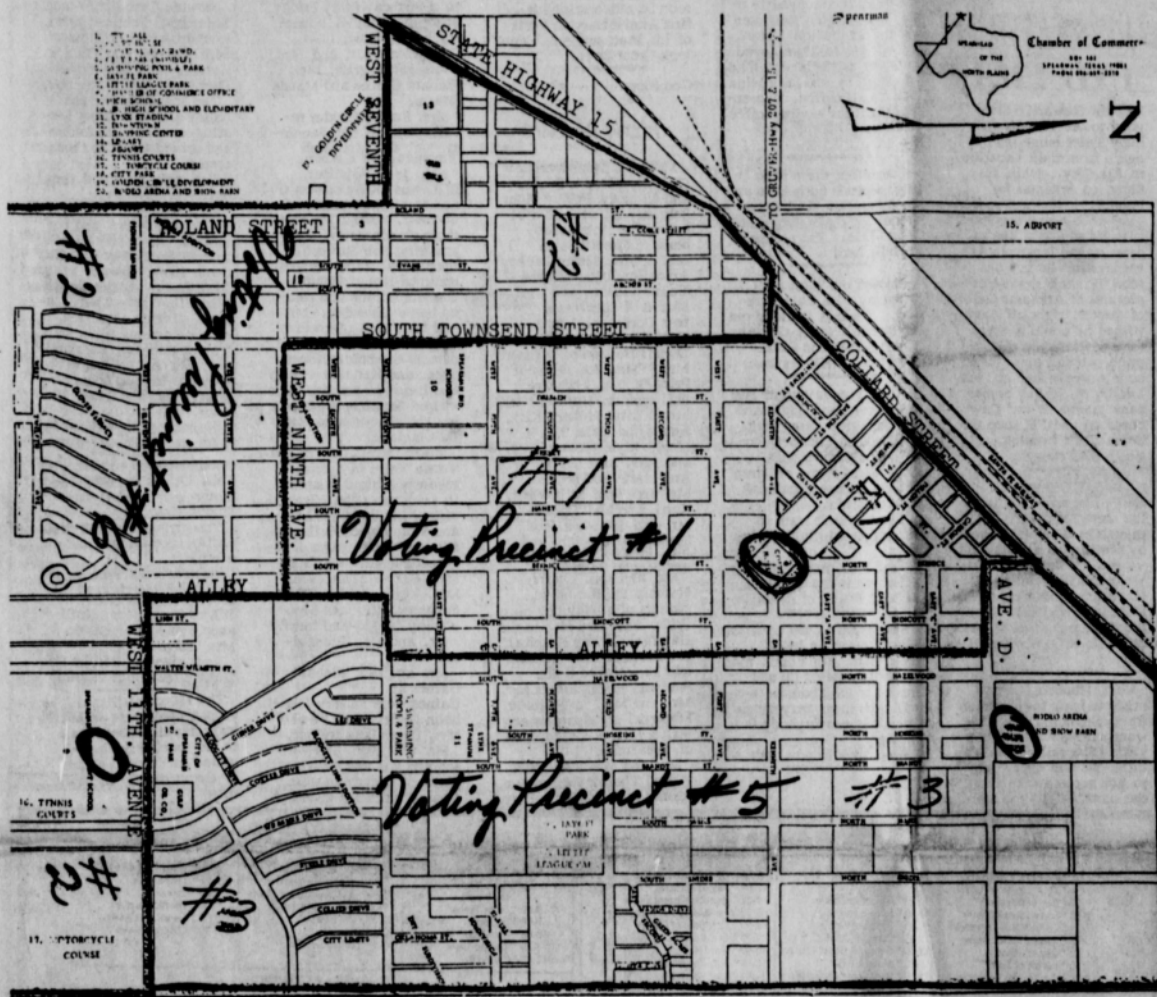

## Meeting Held On Proposed Child Care Center

A meeting was held Thursday evening, Feb. 20 at the Lutheran Church to make plans for the proposed child development center. The Chamber of Commerce sent out a letter earlier in the week to Spearman businesses asking them to have representatives at the meeting.

Members of the Board of Directors attending were Bob Pearson, attorney, Judge Johnny Lee, Rev. Victor Anderson, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Thompson, Pat Dear, Rev. Don Wirsdorfer, Shirley Bell, Denise Huxton. Others attending were Beverly Jenkins, who is the proposed director of the center, three guests, Clois Jean McLain of Perryton, Carol Linderman and Jana Collard, both of Amarillo. The guests are from the Texas Department of Welfare Commission.

Proposed plans for the day care center opening in Sept. Present plans are to use the Community Building. The city is presently applying for a grant from the HUD for remodeling of this building to include facilities for the proposed day care center, an activity room for senior citizens, and a teenage center.

As campaign chairperson, Mrs. Mathews will organize Bellinger workers to go house-to-house during May, Mental Health Month.

All proceeds from the

campaign will benefit the Texas Association for Mental Health, a voluntary citizens' organization.

The Mental Health Association is a nationwide association dedicated to informing the public about mental health and mental illness, while working to improve services for the emotionally or mentally disturbed.

"Mental illness affects one out of ten people," said Tom J. Caldwell, President of TAMH.

In Texas, then over 1.1 million people will need services for mental or emotional problems sometime in their lives.

One of the primary goals of the Mental Health Association is to see that people are served in their own communities, when they need help.

In the past, the Mental Health Association was instrumental in getting legislation passed to provide for community mental health centers throughout the state.

The Mental Health Association receives no government funds. In fact, it is the citizens' "watchdog" group. As such, the association must rely on public support to continue its work on behalf of the mentally ill.

## Gruver Man Texas Winner In Grain Sorghum Program

Keith Lamb of Gruver, Texas, has won the state championship in the irrigated division of the 1974 Project: 25 national grain sorghum growing program.

His yield of grain per acre was the highest received in that division from Texas growers. He used Funk's G-522 to gain the State championship yield.

National winner of Project: 25 was the partnership of Buckner and Kidd of Wilcox, Arizona. They entered a yield of 9,239, 5 pounds of grain per acre with G-522. National winner of the dryland division was Elo Stolle of Wharton, Texas, with a yield of 6,766.2 pounds per acre from G-522.

Project: 25 was first established as a regional grain sorghum growing program in the southwest. It proved so informative and popular that the Producers of Funk's G-Hybrids opened the program to growers in all sorghum growing states. Interest has

continued to grow. Project: 25 rules specify that a minimum of 25 acres of any specific Funk's G-Hybrid must be harvested from one acreage to qualify for entry. Yields are corrected to 14 percent moisture.

To prepare his land for planting, Lamb field cultivated and disked the sorghum land three times. As a preplant fertilizer, he applied 12 tons per acre of feedlot manure. This gave

him actual totals of 61 lbs. of nitrogen, 66 lbs. of phosphate and 91 lbs. of potash per acre.

Lamb used a herbicide and two insecticides. He irrigated the crop four times during the season.

The Funk's G-522 was planted on May 7 with a seeding rate of eight bushels per acre. Lamb planted double rows on a 40-inch bed.

At harvest on Oct. 19, the moisture level of his grain was 15.2 percent.

Lamb will receive a specially engraved plaque from The Producers of Funk's G-Hybrids in recognition of his state championship yield.

## Election Date Set

Election day, April 5, 1975, will find voters selecting Spearman school board members, Hansford County School board members, and Spearman city councilmen.

In the County School Board elections, those who have already filed and whose names will be on the

ballot along with others who file before the March 5 deadline are Miles Sneeje, incumbent for the post from Precinct 3, and Ellis Pittman, incumbent for Precinct 4, Dr. D. E. Hackley, who has been serving Precinct 1, is not eligible to represent this area due to the recent redistricting.

Charles Bellharr, representing Precinct 5, was elected last year and his term has not expired as well as the term of Freeman Barkley, Hansford County member at large who was also elected last year.

Terms for City Councilmen J. K. Hicks, Alton Ellsworth and Dan Deamons expire this year. As of Thursday, Feb. 20, J. K. Hicks is the only person who has filed for office at this time.

Terms for George Jackson and Bill Partridge on the Spearman School Board will expire. At this writing no one has filed for the school board.

The elections will be held at the high school this year instead of the R. High as they have been in the past.

Deadlines for filing in all these elections will be Wednesday, March 5, at 5 p.m. Filing for city offices may be done at the city hall, and then filing for the school board should do so at the high school business office.

### TEXAS TALK

**SCORECARD** — Is the system designed for judging cattle. Either beef cattle or breeding stock may be judged by the use of a scorecard. Most of the acknowledged breeds have designed their own card to reflect breed characteristics in judging. Basically, the scorecard is an exact description of an ideal animal. A certain number of points are allowed for each desirable characteristic. Those utilizing the card may then "score" an animal on each of the categories.

Typically, a scorecard for market cattle will have five divisions. Those are usually: general appearance, head and neck, forequarters, hindquarters and body. The general appearance division often accounts for as much as 40 percent of the overall scorecard rating when it includes the sub-categories of weight-to-age, form, condition and quality.

### Texas Beef Conference Set

AMARILLO, Tex. — Representatives of the Texas Beef Conference announced today (Feb. 21) that this year's conference will be held in Amarillo's Hilton Inn on Thursday, April 17. Speakers scheduled for the meeting include Gene Moos, past president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, Bill Helmig of the Livestock Business Advisory Service, Bob Parrett of Central Soya, Dr. Frank Baker of the Oklahoma State University school of agriculture and other leading spokesmen for various aspects of the cattle feeding industry.

The conference is co-sponsored by eight agribusiness and educational groups from across Texas. The meeting will be capped by a T-bone steak feed and a speech by a national news-maker.

Plans for registration and credentials are being finalized by conference officials now.

### Highway Dept. Investigates 2 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of January, 1975, according to Sergeant C. E. Henderson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first month of 1975 shows a total of two accidents resulting in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for Jan. 1975, shows a total of 451 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 241 persons injured as compared to Jan. 1974, with 553 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 302 persons injured. This was 102 less accidents and 31 less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 16 traffic deaths for the month of January, 1975 occurred in the following counties: two each in Archer, Castro, Lubbock, Oldham, Randall; and one each in Briscoe, Cottle, Deaf Smith, Hale, Hartley, and Wise.

### New Manager For Federal Crop Insurance

Mrs. Charlene "Pat" Glass of Claude is now representative in charge of the Amarillo office of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC). Mrs. Glass replaces Mrs. Wanita Brown who transferred to the Interstate Commerce Commission after seven years with FCIC.

As representative in charge, Mrs. Glass will manage the crop insurance program in 13 area counties. Those included are Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Gray, Hansford, Hartley and Hutchinson. Also, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Randall and Sherman.

Mrs. Glass is well qualified for the position having 13 years of experience with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Armstrong and Donley counties.

She is available in her office, Room 1105, Herling Plaza, from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM Monday through Friday.

FCIC is a non-profit agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is a voluntary program designed to offer protection to growers on their annual crop investments. In the Amarillo District insurance is offered on cotton, grain sorghum, corn and wheat against such disasters as drought, hail, excessive moisture, wind, freeze, insects and plant disease.

## IRS NEWS

Amarillo, Texas----- Time is running out for taxpayers who would like to receive a speedy refund on their income taxes this year, according to Ronald Archer, Director's Representative of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for the Amarillo area.

Archer said today the IRS can usually get a refund off within four or five weeks if a taxpayer files a correct return by about the middle of Feb. After that time, he said, the waiting period starts getting longer, peaking out at ten to twelve weeks for returns sent to the IRS in the closing weeks of the filing season.

Even an early filer may have his or her refund delayed if the return contains mistakes. For this reason, Archer urged all taxpayers to double-check their returns before mailing them to the IRS.

"Every day we get returns which the taxpayer has forgotten to sign or which have other mistakes such as incorrect social security numbers or illegible addresses. When this happens," Archer said, "it means the taxpayer is going to be waiting longer than would have otherwise been necessary."

Taxpayers who need some free tax information before filing their returns can reach the IRS in Dallas by dialing (214) 742-2440. Outside Dallas the toll-free number is (800) 497-4870.

Reduced grain and soybean production has resulted in rising feed prices and cutbacks in livestock feeding. Hog prices are expected to decrease this fall but should increase next year. Fed cattle prices should increase during the first half of 1975 along with feeder cattle prices.

## Challenge to ERA

Editor's Note: The following article is from the Committee To Restore Women's Rights, Mrs. Bill Paxton, Area Chairman, P. O. Box 7753, Amarillo, Texas 79109.

Our public challenge to the proponents of the Equal Rights Amendment for a full, open debate on issues has gone unanswered. This, despite the fact that they received registered letters containing the challenge. The organizations challenged are Amarillo League of Women Voters, American Association of University Women and High Plains Women's Political Caucus.

It is now obvious to us that these supporters of ERA are reluctant to expose their views to the public for scrutiny and intelligent consideration. They seem to prefer private interviews in which they deal principally with attempts to discredit opponents by declaring we are ignorant of the issues. If this is true, would not a debate on the ISSUES enlighten the opponents of ERA?

Recent events in Texas make it imperative that the citizens of this State be given facts concerning the amendment which could become a part of the United States Constitution. Representative Bill Hilliard of Fort Worth has introduced a resolution to rescind the Texas Legislature's ratification of ERA. Therefore, NOW is the time to inform our legislators of our opinions. Respected and recognized constitutional authorities have raised issues of concern for us and continuing generations of Americans. It is incumbent upon the citizens to thoroughly understand this amendment.

In addition, Representative George Preston of Bay City has introduced a bill for a POSSIBLE referendum on ERA, which may give the voters a chance for evaluation of this vital question. However, the vote on the referendum WOULD NOT change the condition which now exists, but would give the legislators a current

"voice of the people". We do not know when, if at all, this referendum will be placed on the ballot. Though it sounds good, the vote could actually be delayed until three-fourths of the states had ratified, then re- cision AND the majority view would become moot

questions.

Other states are rejecting the amendment, which would indicate sentiment in the other states is against ratification. Oklahoma has rejected. Georgia has rejected. Arizona has rejected. Utah has rejected.

According to three national polls, the majority of

American women opposed the Equal Rights Amendment. The organized minority which favors ERA has made so much noise they have convinced the legislators they represent the majority THEY DO NOT. We encourage the press and news media to give full and complete coverage of this issue. The COMMITTEE TO RESTORE WOMEN'S RIGHTS is prepared to sup-

port our stand. We will supply objective and adequate facts.

#### Child Rearing

In a recent pamphlet from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission it was noted that the Archdeacon of Chesterfield, England, gave his Church

of England parishioners a handy guide on "How to Turn Your Child into a Crook". He listed twelve "rules" in his parish magazine.

"Begin from infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe that the world owes him a living.

When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. It will encourage him to pick up "cuter" phrases that will blow the top of your head off later.

Never give any spiritual training. Wait until he is twenty-one, and then let him decide for himself.

Avoid the use of the word "wrong". It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later when he is arrested for stealing a car that society is against him and he is being persecuted.

Pick up everything he leaves lying around--books, shoes, and clothes. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing the responsibility on others.

Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful the silverware and drinking glasses are sterilized but let his mind feed on garbage.

Quarrel frequently in the presence of the children. Then they won't be too shocked when the home is broken up.

Give the child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?

Satisfy his every craving for food, drink, and comfort. See that every desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.

Take his part against the neighbors, teachers, and

policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.

When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him".

Prepare for a life of grief--you will have it."

### FERTILIZER CONSERVATION FOR GARDENERS

--With continued high fertilizer costs due to low supplies, home gardeners are urged to use fertilizer wisely during the coming months. A vegetable specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service advises having soil tested, using only light applications on fertilizer, using organic fertilizer and compost, using mulch to keep plant nutrients in the soil, and applying fertilizer as a sidedress when plants grow slowly or lack good color.

# Insurance Rates Increase For North Plains Drivers

Insurance rates for auto owners in Hansford County went up last month, and those who have not noticed it yet are sure to do so the next time they get their bill in the mail.

While the new rates set by the state insurance board for this section of the state range from an increase of 25 per cent in some areas to a drop of 26 per cent in others, the overall insurance bill for most motorists will increase from five percent to 17 percent.

The new rate schedules, which all North Plains insurance agents already have, were approved last Dec. and went into effect in the North Plains on Jan. 16. While the standard rates are set by the state board, companies can file a deviation with the board if they want to charge less than the set amount.

Breaks coming to motorists under the new rates include lowered cost for personal injury insurance and collisions involving uninsured motorists. However, these price reductions are a small part of the overall bill.

Insurance for accidents with uninsured motorists dropped 26.1 per cent for all drivers, a reduction of from \$5 to \$4 in most cases. Personal injury insurance dropped 13 per cent, or from \$22 to \$19 in most cases.

Big increases for area motorists come in the field of liability insurance. Collision insurance with \$50 deductible is up 12.2 per cent while \$100 deductible has increased 15.4 per cent. This means an increase from \$66 to \$78 for most new car drivers. Liability for property damage is also up, 11 per cent over last year.

On the average motorists will pay \$28 for liability this year where their bill last year was only \$25.

The owner of a 1975 medium-sized sedan, a brand new car with no driver under 25 years of age, will pay \$84 for comprehensive insurance on policies written after the Jan. 16 date. In 1974 new car owners paid only \$68 for the same coverage.

All in all, the bill this year for car owners will be that about \$235 for a

brand new medium size car. Last year motorists paid \$208 for the same type car, a difference of \$27 or 12.98 per cent less.

The big increases are in comprehensive insurance which rises from \$32 to \$40 and for collision, up from \$40 to \$56 for \$100 deductible.

Total bill for car owners with medical and uninsured driver coverage will come to about \$169 compared to a cost of \$146 in 1974.

Another change is an increase in the damage limits on a chargeable accident before a surcharge can be applied to a policy. In the past an accident where the policy holder was at fault netted him a surcharge of 20 per cent on his policy if the damage exceeded \$50.

Under the new rules a company cannot apply the 20 per cent surcharge unless damage in the accident exceeds \$200.

These figures in this article are for the average driver with a good driving record and no under 25 year old drivers. Insurance rates will vary in cases to case, but the

percentage increases and decreases in the same categories from last year will remain the same for all drivers. Rates are determined by the size of the car, type of driver and the use the car is put to.

### MANURE CONSERVES ENERGY?

Using manure on cropland helps save energy needed in the manufacture and distribution of commercial fertilizer. About 4.4 million BTU's of energy can be saved per acre by using 10 tons of manure instead of a comparable amount of fertilizer (180-60-0), says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Refeeding one ton of manure would equal the amount of energy needed to produce one ton of alfalfa in the Texas High Plains. Manure, air and water can also be converted into hydrogen and nitrogen.

### Food Stamp Regulations

Regulations in the food stamp program provide recipients a ten percent earned income exception, not to exceed \$30.00 per month.

This means that an individual receiving a \$100.00 per month pension and \$280.00 per month wages will receive an earned income deduction of \$28.00. The \$28.00 is then deducted from his income in arriving at the food stamp purchase price.

To ensure that full services are rendered the food stamp recipient, all persons between the ages of 18 and 65, who are not mentally or physically incapacitated or needed in the home to care for children or disabled adults, must register for employment with the Texas Employment Commission.

The work registration requirements are designed to ensure each community with a ready work force and to provide full service to deprived families striving toward self-sufficiency.

A recipient is required to accept and retain employment if it meets the following:

1. The applicable Federal minimum wage;
2. The applicable State minimum wage;
3. The applicable wage established by valid regulation of the Federal government authorized by existing law to establish such regulation;
4. \$1.30 per hour;
5. Employment on a piece rate basis which allows the employee to average earnings the applicable average hourly wage;
6. Does not require joining, refraining from joining or resigning from a legitimate labor organization;
7. The work is not subject to a legal strike or lock-out.

Families choosing not to participate in work registration are not eligible to receive benefits from the food stamp program.

Employers may wish to consider the possibility of consulting with the local T.E.C. office to save time in searching for prospective employees.

There are 8,000 FFA chapters in 49 states as well as Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

**CATTLE SLAUGHTER TO BE UP**--Even more drastic increases in commercial cattle slaughter are expected in 1975 by a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Beef supplies will come primarily from bulls, cows, calves, and non-fed steers and heifers. Slaughter of non-fed animals is expected to be up 56 per cent over 1974, while calf slaughter should increase 33 per cent and cow slaughter, 32 per cent.

Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention Operation Drug Alert

Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention/Operation Drug Alert has gone regional.

A new toll-free number offers anyone in the Panhandle of Texas the confidential 24-hour-a-day services of the Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention Center telephone contact.

Claire Rigler, Director of the Center, announced that while persons in Amarillo and Canyon will continue to use the original telephone number, 376-4251, persons outside Amarillo can use the new toll-free number.

This step makes our work truly regional and extends without charge to the entire Panhandle the services of our trained telephone-answering who began helping people some 12,000 calls ago in 1968. "Mrs. Rigler said.

She added that the toll-free number available to persons throughout the Panhandle will insure preservation of the caller's anonymity.

"This confidentiality would be much more difficult to guarantee for a caller in a small town seeking help within that small town," she said.

Calls from throughout the Panhandle, like the calls from Amarillo and Canyon on the local lines, will be handled by Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention volunteers--some of whom have more than five years of experience in answering the SPCI number.

Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention/Operation Drug Alert provides a source of aid, assistance and counsel to persons seeking solution to problems presented by their mental, emotional or physical condition--particularly in times of personal crisis or emergency.

"Suicide prevention ranks as our most important and most rewarding work because no other kind of death leaves behind more pain, remorse or shame for the survivors," Mrs. Rigler said, and added "Until he dies, a suicidal person is begging to be saved. Our goal is to shorten the distance one has to travel to the nearest heart."

Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention/Operation Drug Alert acts as a first aid stop to the person in a crisis situation--to help him hang on with courage for today and hope for tomorrow.

A though help for acute or emergency situations is emphasized, Mrs. Rigler encourages troubled people to call before their problems reach desperate proportions.

In addition to handling suicide-prevention calls, the volunteers have helped to avert tragedy by providing needed information--especially information about drug abuse and mental health.

Behind whoever answers a Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention/Operation Drug Alert call, there stand literally hundreds of helpers. A call to SPCI/ODA means a step toward help. Sometimes all the help needed may be simply the understanding "listening ear" of one of the trained anonymous volunteers. Other times, help has meant fast action--sending an ambulance, for example--to save a life.

Other help can mean referring the caller to a community agency. The volunteers are trained to pinpoint problems and match the problems to solutions. Each volunteer has at hand a 200-page looseleaf notebook that is a catalog of all the "helping" services available in the Panhandle.

Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention/Operation Drug Alert has handled problems solved by referrals to specialists who deal with financial, legal, medical, emotional or drug related problems. Other callers have needed food, shelter or clothing. Some callers have been helped by learning about organizations with special understanding of a possible or unwanted pregnancy, venereal disease, alcoholism, blindness, heart disease, cancer or muscular dystrophy.

Mrs. Rigler pointed out that Suicide Prevention-Crisis Intervention/Operation Drug Alert goes an extra step in following up the referrals to be certain that the caller is no longer in a crisis situation.

"Our 42 volunteers are ready now to offer to the entire Panhandle the same help we know has averted tragedies in Amarillo," Mrs. Rigler said. "It's a labor worth all the effort because we believe life is precious."

The toll free number, available 24 hours a day 7 days a week, is 1-800-692-4458.

### Rural Lawyer

LaRoue, director, rural residents may, by calling 1-800-292-3690, a toll-free number, be referred to an area lawyer who has specified that that lawyer's practice includes the type of legal problem involved.

Up to one half hour consultation may be secured for a fee of \$10.00. If further legal work is needed in addition to the 30 minute conference, the client and the lawyer will decide how to handle the future employment and fee arrangements.

## Texas Legislative Report

It has been another busy week here in Austin. The various standing committees have started meeting on a regular basis. The Speaker of the House advises that at this point in time there has already been considerably more legislation passed by this Legislature as compared to the previous one. There has also been an increase in the number of bills introduced in the House of Representatives. It is predicted that 3,000 bills will be filed this session. It is a monumental task to keep up with all of the bills introduced. A large portion of the bills introduced are never reported from committee. So, there is a better opportunity to read and analyze the bills which have been reported out of committee favorably before the bills are actually acted on by the House of Representatives.

Another problem is simultaneous meetings of committees. For example, last evening both the Natural Resources Committee and the Constitutional Revision Committee met at 7:30 p.m. Under these circumstances, I met with the Natural Resources Committee and had my Administrative Assistant attend the Constitutional Revision Committee meeting to take notes on its activities. The problem is further complicated by the fact that the author of the bill must present it when it is set for hearing before a committee and sometimes Representatives find they need to be in several places at one time. Since the House rules have been changed to limit the number of committee assignments, it should be easier to schedule committee meetings to avoid conflicts in the future.

One of the more controversial matters to come up during the last week was House Bill 139 by Newton. This bill would extend the temporary speed limit of 55 mph until April 1, 1975. The purpose of the bill is to qualify the State of Texas for Federal Highway assistance in excess of \$300 million.

Rep. Laney of Plainview offered a substitute amendment which would provide for a maximum fine of \$5.00 upon conviction for speeding in excess of 55 mph but less than 70 mph. Mr. Laney's substitute amendment would also provide that no such conviction within these

speed limits would be charged against the driver's record nor could an insurance company use such conviction for purposes of increasing insurance premiums. Several points of order were raised and the last vote on the issue resulted in House Bill 139 being recommitted to committee for further study.

The proponents of H. B. 139 feel that the measure is consistent within the conservation of energy and required to qualify the state for matching Federal funds. They also feel the substitute amendment is an attempt to evade the law and distort its purpose. They point to the number of lives saved by the lower speed limits. The opponents of the measure feel that the bill can be and should be amended as mentioned without disqualifying the state from receiving Federal funds. They claim one other state has done this and still qualified for the Federal funds. They express resentment at the Federal Government continually telling the state what to do.

This matter will be re-studied and will be presented to the House for a vote at a later date. I have already heard from three constituents. One urges adoption of H. B. 139. A couple urge adoption of the Laney substitute amendment.

Some of the highlights of this past week included a conference with Senator John Tower and an address to the House by Miss Shirley Cothran, the reigning Miss America. W. Iter Parker, the Representative from Denton was quite proud that the city of Denton had produced two Miss America's within the last five years. This must be some kind of record.

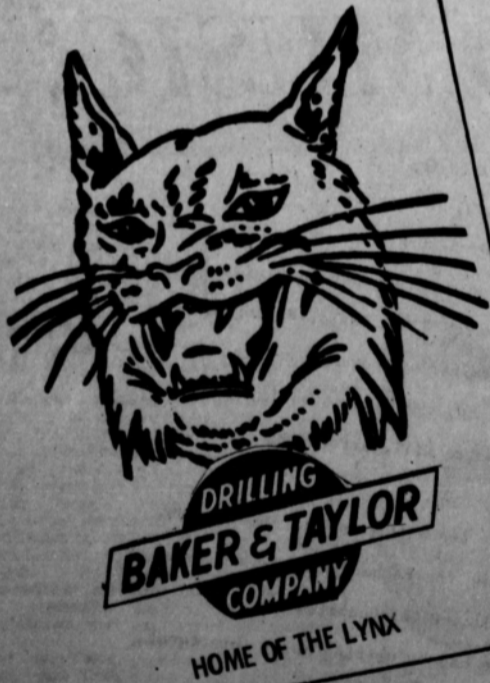

### PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties and other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."
