Baggies and combines start on wheat

Harvest underway, wheat hits \$4.17

You may see a gleam in the eye these days of some of the farmers in the area who have had a rough time of it the past few years with low prices for their products and high operating costs. Prices have been climbing for the past few weeks and Thursday wheat hit \$4.08 a bushel. Also there is a good prospect that dryland wheat will turn out well this year, barring any weather disaster before farmers can get it harvested. This will be the first year since 1973 that a good dryland wheat crop will be harvested.

Other crops that are grown here have also been increasing in price. Thursday, corn was quoted at \$3.14 a bushel, Milo \$4.45 per hundred weight, Barley \$2.13 and soybeans \$7.35. A check with market prices of a year ago shows that wheat sold for \$2.78, Corn \$2.48, Milo \$3.85 and Soybeans, \$9.70. Soybeans was the only crop that had dropped since 1978.

A check with Equity Elevator here revealed that they had not received any wheat yet but expected farmers to begin cutting anytime. The Holt Elevator has been receiving wheat, as farmers in that area are getting a jump on the rest with their harvest. Harvest is late getting underway this year due to the cool wet spring weather.

According to Martin L. Chandler, Hansford County ASCS Executive Director there are approximately 80,123 acres of wheat planted for harvest this year. Farmers in the county filed intentions to hay and graze some 7,156 acres.

Intended corn acreage when farmers signed up was 7435 but Chandler stated that this may be changed now since the wet weather in the spring hampered corn planting. This figure is down from last year. Intended maize plantings were up from last year with some 39,982 acres being reported. Also farmers who had planned to plant corn may go to milo because of the wet weather.

Corn has reached its highest price level since 1975, and Carl King, president of the Texas

Corn Growers Association, says "The report from the USDA is that the Carter Administration is worried that corn prices will soar to the levels of the early 70's-which will tickle the heck out of us."

According to the KIPLINGER AGRICULTURAL LETTER grain and soybean markets are sitting on a powder keg. Potential is there for prices to soar, really take off, sometime in the next 12 months. If or when they blow depends on the weather. Here's why-present world grain glut may change to a shortage overnight. What seems like a burdensome surplus right now will fade away quickly if 1979 crops come in on the slim side...in light of the super-

demand. Already there are signs that the wheat crop will be shrinking...that the total output worldwide will fall short of previous expectations.

Latest estimate puts U.S. wintercrop 4 percent below earlier forecasts. The spring crop may be trimmed by the late, wet season...not just in U.S., but in Canada and Russia, the whole Northern hemisphere. Also...U.S. corn crop is suspect because of a late start, etc.

If average yields are off significantly, prices will zoom, according to KIPLINGER.

reluctant to predict.

Most of the wheat in Hansford County has escaped damage except for approximately 5000 acres in a 2 to 3 mile strip county wide in the northern edge of the county, which was totally destroyed 2 weeks ago in a devastating hail storm. One house was demolished in this storm, as well as a shop and barn being blown away.

One way to harvest wheat this year, is by cutting it with an ensilage cutter, and putting it in "baggies" for cow feed. That is exactly what Mike Garnett is doing with some of his wheat this year. Not only is he taking it off of the grain market, but he is insuring himself of an adequate

supply of feed for his livestock this winter. Kent Depe'e does the work on the project. He cuts the wheat in the dough, stalk and all, and then the wheat is packed into the 115 foot long baggies and sealed air tight. In 10 days the feed will be ready for the cattle to eat. Kent's

packer is quite a machine, and it "stuffs" the bags full and tight, and they don't fill them with a pitchfork, as pictured above!

The feed value of the baggies feed, is excellent, and with the price of cattle at an all-time high, cattle feeding from the baggies may be the coming thing for Hansford County.

Shortage Of Adequate Housing

Many Texas Communities are faced with a shortage of adequate housing, and this dilemma will continue to grow unless positive action is taken.
Dr. Fred Cross with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Stephenville suggests that community leaders and officials plan for realistic and orderly housing growth. And the Extension Service has prepared materials that can be used to systematically study, evaluate and act upon the community's current and projected housing situation.
"Housing needs will continue to grow as Texas' population increases," notes Cross, a community resource development specialist. He points to a recent study by the Texas Real Estate Center which reported that the state's population grew by 853,000 people from April 1, 1970 to July 1, 1974. This rate of growth-7.6 percent-is almost twice that of the national rate and virtually assures an increase in Texas' population of more than two million people during the 1970-80 period.
Where will all these people find quality housing at a reasonable cost?
"The materials we have prepared, including a housing manual, should help community leaders cope with this situation," says Cross.
"A fundamental assumption in preparation and use of the manual is that local collective action is necessary to insure a realistic assessment of what housing the community has, what it wants to have, and what it can have in the future," he points out.
"Without a concerted effort by a broadly representative body of local community leaders, any housing action plan or development goal is subject to disappointment or failure," Cross contends.
Further information on this new housing education program is available from any county Extension office.



Sunray Co-op to sell 50,000 gallons of gasohol

Gasohol will become available to Panhandle area residents tomorrow morning.

The Sunray Co-op in Moore County will begin selling 50,000 gallons of the gasoline-alcohol blend for 90 cents a gallon. The new fuel goes on sale at 7:30 a.m. tomorrow.

Don Graham, vice president and general manager of the cooperative, said the gasoline will arrive by transport truck and will be blended with alcohol at the cooperative.

The cooperative will sell the gasohol "as long as supply lasts," Graham said.

"If demand is such, we will have it on a continuing basis," he said. "This is where we hope to make it economically feasible (to produce gasohol) and to stretch our current stocks by 10 percent."

A car that gets 17 miles per gallon has a fuel cost of 4.9 cents per mile, Graham said. If the same car gets a two mile per gallon increase with gasohol, the fuel cost is reduced to 4.7 cents per mile.

The co-op's board of directors took action about a month ago to blend and sell the fuel. The only other time gasohol was available in Texas was when efforts were made to encourage legislation allowing the manufacture of the fuel. The fuel was

available to state legislators. The gasohol is only for cars that use unleaded gas.

Comments on wheat program are sought

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland asked the public to comment by August 6 on proposals for the 1980 wheat program.

He also asked for comment on whether barley and oats should be included in the 1980 feed grain program and if program decisions on barley and oats should be announced at the same time as wheat.

The secretary proposed to make the following determinations:

The amount of the national program acreages.

The reduction from the previous year's harvested acreage.

Required to guarantee target price protection on the total 1980 planted acreage.

Whether there should be a set-aside required and, if so, to what extent.

If a set-aside or land diversion is required, if a limitation should be placed on planted acreage.

Whether there should be a land diversion program and the extent of such diversion and the level of payment.

The loan and purchase levels for 1980 crop wheat, barley, oats and rye.

Whether the special wheat grazing and hay program should be implemented.

The target price for wheat, barley and oats. Other related provisions such as: CCC minimum resale price, commodity eligibility for loan, storage requirements, premiums and discounts and other provision as may be necessary to carry out the program.

Most of these determinations are required to be made by the secretary on or before August 15.

Before reaching his decision the secretary will consider any recommendations and views regarding these items. To be assured of con-

sideration, all written comments must be received on or before August 6. Comments should be sent to:

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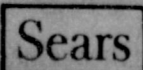

BIKE RIDERS ARE GUILTY

You hear of a motorist striking a child on a bike and what's your reaction? Usually a slight outrage against the motorist. The surprising truth is that in bike-car collisions, the driver is seldom at fault. Fully 80 percent of the bike riders killed by cars are clearly in the wrong. They are struck down because they violate a traffic rule.

Parents of bike-riding children should take note of this fact. Teach them traffic regulations and insist they obey them. In most communities, bicycles are in the same class as automobiles and subject to the same rules of the road. Bike riders must obey all traffic signals and signs. There should be no sneaking through red lights. At

busy intersections a child should get off his bike and walk it across. Cyclists must ride in single file on the far right of the road. Riding on the left, facing traffic, is definitely more dangerous according to all surveys.

hindered germination of the cottonseed, but weeds are thriving. Cultivation is vital to the crops and is ongoing.

This morning a fuel distributor in my home town, which is the middle of a major cotton-producing area, called to say he had been operating for 45 days with only a 50 percent diesel and 60 percent gasoline allocation. The 100 percent guarantee had not caught up with him, and I have had similar calls almost every day for the past month.

Wheat harvest in my district will not be completed until mid-July, and it will then grind its way through the midwest to the Canadian border. The harvest this year in the High Plains of Texas may be as much as 40 percent higher than a normal year, and last year it was only 40 percent of a normal year. The consequence is dramatically

higher consumption of fuel this year, and it must be available at the time it is needed. Every hour ripened wheat remains in the field increases the odds of its being devastated by an act of nature.

I respectfully suggest that the wrong answer to the immediate problem could create an even more severe problem in the long run. Trucks and trains must be allowed to roll, but tractors and combines must be allowed to operate in the fields to assure that the trucks and trains will continue to have something to haul. Repeal of Special Rule No. 9 prior to its original July 31 expiration date would be premature and counter-productive. Every possible administrative means must be initiated to meet the needs of truckers without damaging agricultural production.

Ranchers Sign Up For Grasshopper Treatment

There were 15 ranchers present at the meeting Monday evening to initiate the grasshopper treatment program. Thirteen ranchers signed up some 16,720 acres in the program.

According to Layton Barton, County Extension Agent, there is some doubt as to whether the Texas Dept. of Agriculture will have the manpower and funds available for the treatment.

The acreage in the program will be present to them Monday and it will be up to the Agriculture Dept. then to make

the decision. Ranchers pledge \$1.20 per acre for the spraying. This is twice the amount that was originally considered, due to the lack of funds available from the Agriculture Dept.

Time is limited, according to Barton, as it will be about 3 weeks before grasshoppers begin laying eggs, and they must be sprayed before then.

Mike Garnett is the chairman of the Grasshopper Control Committee, and Jim Shirley is secretary and treasurer.

F B Urges Truckers To Move Produce

The president of Texas' largest general farm organization urged striking independent truckers Friday not to ignore the Texas fruit and vegetable harvest.

Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka said, "We recognize that the trucking industry is suffering from the price of fuel and the shortage of fuel, just the same as agriculture, but this is the only income that many of these farmers will receive this year."

The harvest of fruits and vegetables in the Winter Garden area, near San Antonio, is reportedly suffering from a shortage of trucks, compounded by the Independent Truckers Association strike. Once the crops there are ready for har-

vest, farmers will have only a few days to market before the highly perishable commodities ruin in the fields.

"We need the full cooperation of the truckers to move these perishables immediately because very soon they will be in no condition to be moved at all," said Chaloupka.

Both the Winter Garden and the Rio Grande Valley are harvesting melons, vegetables, and other crops, and the demand for trucks is, as always, huge. Practically all of the crop is transported by truck.

Chaloupka was joined by other farm leaders, including Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown, in urging the truckers to continue to move the fruit and vegetable crop.

Hightower Protests Truck Diesel Allocation

THE ATTACHED STATEMENT IN THE FORM OF A TELEGRAM WAS SENT TO PRESIDENT CARTER ON THIS DATE REQUESTING AGRICULTURE PRIORITIES FOR DIESEL FUELS.

Mr. President, Farmers breathed a collective sigh of relief when you promised they would be guaranteed 100 percent of their fuel needs and Special Rule No. 9 was implemented to fulfill that promise. Press reports this morning indicated the Administration has determined that farmers no longer need priority allocation of diesel fuel because planting has been completed. I understand the rule is to be repealed and diesel fuel previously allocated to agricultural

production will be diverted to the independent truckers.

Feeding the American people has to be our top priority. I know there are areas of the nation where produce is rotting in the fields or storage sheds, and in my area beef packing plants have curtailed their purchase of live cattle for slaughter because their freezers are filled to overflowing. There are no trucks to haul it. On the other hand, although planting may be completed in most of the nation, wheat harvest is only now reaching its peak. Completion of planting by itself does not stop the tractors. In portions of my district cotton has been planted as many as three times because rains have washed away the seed. Low temperatures and wet ground have

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"School board says tax automobiles!"

Tax Relief as provided for by the constitutional amendment voted on and passed in November 1978 were implemented by the past session of the legislature. Here are the major provisions of the bill as passed.

Requires that all rural land devoted to the raising of livestock, crops, orchards, etc for at least five of the last seven preceding years be valued for tax purposes on its productivity value. This value is determined by capitalizing the net income to land for each category of land by Federal Land Bank interest rate plus 2%. The State Tax Practices Board shall prepare and distribute appraisal manuals setting forth the method of determining agricultural use value, and all tax jurisdictions shall follow the procedures outlined in that manual. These values shall be used for the 1979 tax roll unless the governing body determines that it is not possible to apply them, but will apply to all tax rolls for the 1980 year.

Exempts all intangible property except that which is taxed under special statutes.

Exempts household goods and personal effects not used

for the production of income. Personal effects are defined as property normally worn or carried by an individual.

Exempts all automobiles owned by a family or individual and not used for producing income. However, any jurisdiction may continue to tax all automobiles if its governing body by resolution, order, or ordinance provides for such taxation to occur.

Exempts \$5,000. of market value on all residential homesteads for school tax purposes only.

Exempts an additional \$10,000. of market value on all residential homesteads owned by persons 65 years of age or older, or those persons receiving disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance. To claim the exemption, a person must file an application with the school tax office each year.

This amendment also provides that on any homestead that qualifies for the \$10,000. exemption, the total school taxes that can be collected are frozen so long as it remains the property of that owner, unless improvements are made

to the property.

This amendment provides that a portion of the tax revenue lost to school districts by these exemptions will be reimbursed by the State. This applies to school districts only.

Locally the Spearman School Board of Trustees have acted on these proposals. Agricultural productivity values will be allowed for the 1979 tax roll, and all automobiles will be taxed. All residential homesteads that qualify will be granted the \$5,000. exemption off of market value. For those persons 65 years of age or older, an additional \$10,000. will be granted to those that have applied and are qualified. This translates to \$3,000. tax value on all residential homesteads and \$9,000. on those over 65. Based on the 1978 tax rate, this means a reduction of \$37.20 and \$111.60 respectfully in school taxes on these properties which are qualified for 1979.

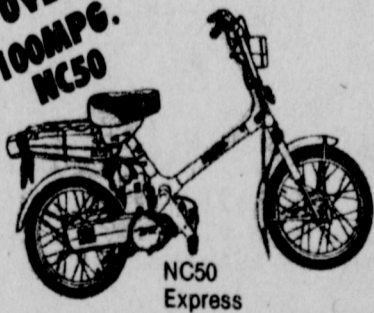


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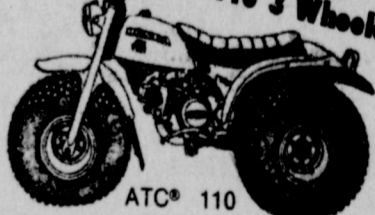
