Texas Sales

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said a sales tax analysis for Texas last year showed that gross sales in the state exceeded \$186 billion

Bullock said gross sales in Texas during the fourth quarter of 1978 reached \$54.2 billion, a \$9 billion increase in sales recorded during the year's thrid

"In spite of glimpses of economic uncertainty around the country, the Texas economy continues to be strong and is growing," Bullock said. Gross sales for the first two

quarters of 1978 were \$44.2 and \$42.4 billion Bullock also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties and a sales tax analysis broken down by the state's Standard Metropolitan Statisti-

cal Areas. In the fourth quarter of 1978, Harris County--the state's opulous--recorded sales totaling \$15.3 billion, up from \$12.4 billion in the third quarter. Second quarter sales were \$11.9 billion and first quarter sales

were \$10.8 billion. Reported gross sales in other major urban areas included: Dallas County, \$9.2 billion, up from \$7.6 billion in the third quarter and up from \$7.4 billion in the second quarter. First

quarter sales were reported at Bexar County, \$2.5 billion, up from \$2.2 billion in the previous quarter and \$2.1 billion and \$1.9 billion in the second and

first quarters, respectively. Tarrant County, \$3.8 billion, up from \$3.1 billion in the third quarter. First quarter sales in Tarrant County were reported at \$2.6 billion. Second quarter sales totaled \$3.2 billion.

Hansford County, with 199 reporting outlets reported gross sales for 1978 at \$9,462.205. Gross taxable sales were \$3,324.368 with deductions of \$1,016,248 and Use Tax Purchases of \$1,082. The amount

subject to tax was \$2,219,212. One cent of the 5 cent sales tax on goods is remitted to the City of Spearman and City of

Six months after Congress signaled the end of the 40year-old Sugar Act, sugar soared from 25¢ to 64¢ a pound, and then fluctuated wildly. A bill now before Congress would tend to keep by again levying import duties on foreign sugar that is dumped on U.S. markets.

Of the 75 million hours of service, more than ten million are spent on welfare of children. And among the many services to the elderly, cooking, delivering meals and sewing takes up almost 5.5 million RSVP hours

each year.

RSVP is a dual-purpose rogram, giving the elderly a chance to be active, as well as elping their neighbors

Financing of an RSVP project is based on a cost-sharing approach. During the first year, ACTION agency provides 90 percent of the funds, the remaining ten percent coming from local sources. The local contribution increases by ten percent on each of the next two years. Beginning with the third year, the projects are funded with 70 percent of the federal and 30 percent of local monies. All projects are planned, operated and controlled by the

Library Books from your Library

Bataan and Beyond: Memor of an American POW by John S. Coleman is a new book at the Hansford County Library. Mr. Coleman, a Wellington, Texas native, gives a first hand account of events that took place on the Bataan peninsula following the fall of Manila to Japan in 1941.

Mr. Coleman was an air force officer assigned to the Philippines to train air corps regiments for infantry combat. He was one of the fortunate men who fought on Bataan and lived Faye's Daze to tell his story.

This book tells of the ground combat on Bataan and the horrors of the "death march" which followed. He details the conditions under which he existed as a POW for the next 31/2

Bataan and Beyond was placed in the library as a memorial book for Samuel Leroy Sheets, a Spearman native who was on the "death march". Leroy was born on July 20, 1917. He graduated from Spearman High School in 1934 and enlisted in the service during the summer of 1941. He was sent to the Philippines and was involved in the events that took place at Bataan. Leroy was taken prisoner, participated in the "death prison camp in 1942. His family march", and died at a Japanese

Management Important To Screwworm Program Success

Rancher cooperation in Medina County did not record herd management practices still holds the key to success in the screwworm eradication program for Texas this spring, reminds Layton Barton, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Recent widespread rains over much of the state-and warmer spring temperatures-could provide an ideal environ-ment for the spread of screwworm cases

To date in 1979, six screwworm cases have been confirmed at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Screwworm Laboratory. While Hidalgo and Starr Counties -- in the Rio Grande Valley--each have one

confirmed case, individual cases also have been confirmed in Jim Wells and Kinney Counties, situated much to the west of the traditional problem areas. Medina County recorded its second case on April 23, with both cases originating in navels of new-born calves. Last year,

its first case until July, records

Barton said that the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service field staff, along with field testing units of the Texas Animal Health Commission, are conducting trapping activities to determine location and movement of native fertile wild flies and sterile female flies, in an effort to monitor potential problem areas. Results of the trapping programs will be made avialable to livestock producers and related industry representatives to aid them in planning herd

management practices. The new Aricruz strain of flies is progressing well, and results of the fly distributions also are being monitored. Tests with marked flies help to determine dispersion of the flies after boxed release in the field, Barton said. Screwworm eradication program officials also are using insecticide treated pellets this year in selected counties, along with the sterile

Livestock producers, Barton reminded, can still aid the screwworm eradication program by continuing the "basic three" practices of examining their herds on a regular basis, collecting samples of any larvae found in wounds and sending the samples to the Mission Lab for identification; and treating the wound to reduce host sites for the screwworm fly.
