Texas Public Schools Week, March 3-7

The annual TEXAS PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK will be held March 3-7, according to Superintendent James Cunningham. Cunningham stressed the need for widespread community participation in examining the complex and changing problems faced by our education system. All parents and concerned citizens are urged to visit schools during this week and talk to students, faculty and administrative personnel about our system of education. All grades-elementary through high school- will be open for public visitation and inspection during the week.

Tuesday, March 4 open house will be held at the schools from 7 to 9 p.m.

The elementary school, grades kindergarten through 4th grade, will have classroom visitation from 7 to 8, and a musical program in the junior high auditorium from 8 to 8:30. Mrs. Wilma Clark, music teacher, and 3rd and 4th grade students will be demonstrating some of the different activities, such as folk dancing, rhythmic work, etc., during the musical program.

Junior high physical education students will be demonstrating what they do in their PE classes in the gym during the open house. Parents may stop by and see these activities as they attend classrooms and view their child's work and visit with the teachers.

High school instructors will be in the classrooms also from 7 to 9 for visitation with parents and interested citizens.

Hansford County Shriners and Hansford Lodge #1040 will be serving refreshments in the Junior High cafeteria beginning at 8:30.

Parents are encouraged to attend the open house and also to attend classes during the day and to eat lunch with their children in the cafeteria if they so desire. Parents wishing to eat lunch at the cafeteria should notify their children's teacher the day before so that necessary arrangements can be made.

The observance of Texas Public Schools Week marks the 121st year of the public school system in Texas. School officials, board members, and faculties throughout the State believe that active and community participation in

education will help to maintain the highest standards of achievement on the parts of the students and the faculty.

"Our schools today face growing problems unique in our history", said Supt. Cunningham. "Energy shortages and inflation pose questions which must be answered and dealt with, and action must begin on the community level. I cannot overemphasize the importance of concern and participation on the part of every citizen, both parent and non-parent, in this matter. The continuing quality of life in Texas and the nation will depend on our maintaining and improving the level of education of our children."

Bumper Crop Possible Wheat Prospect Looks Good As Snow Blanket Thaws Out

With fair weather back in the area for the time being, farmers were out inspecting their fields and reports are that the overall picture looks good for a bumper wheat crop this year. Not to say the crop is sure thing at this early date, but with the right kind of weather, neither too hot nor too cold from now on, and more moisture, farmers expect to have a much better than average yield from their fields.

Kenneth Allen, General Manager of the Equity Elevators, noted that the price decline this week to \$3.50 per bushel on Wednesday was due in part to the expectation of a bumper crop for wheat across the midwest. "The price dropped from \$3.85 before the wet weather through the plains and seems to want to go lower in expectation of a really good crop," he said.

The first two snows that dropped about 11 inches of snow stayed on the fields and really did a lot of good for the dry soil. The last one, accompanied with high winds, mostly wound up in the fence rows and bar ditches and probably will not have a beneficial effect on the crops.

The snow has given the crop a good "start," but more moisture and moderate temperatures will make the difference from now on.

County Agent Joe VanZandt says farmers should get out in their fields as soon as possible to look for greenbug infestations. While no severe problems have been reported so far there have been some outbreaks in the area and the insects could have been working on the wheat under the snow cover. Farmers should also keep an eye

out as well for wheat streak mosaic. This will become more visible as the crops start to grow and become larger.

Looking forward to the harvest, area farmers also have their eyes on the price of wheat, and along with that the export market and wheat reserves they are holding.

Equity manager Allen said this week that the export market seems to be in good shape except for political problems that are interfering with trade agreements. "Like the recent agreement with the Soviet Union which fell through."

Besides the prospect of a bumper crop in the wheat fields this year, Allen said another item which is affecting the price is the world economic situation, which is largely in a recession at the present time. That means that not only is the supply of grain likely to be large but there may be less demand than last year, meaning still lower prices. In 1974 the price of wheat peaked at \$4.35 per bushel.

Looking forward to a good crop this year, most area grain elevators report they are making arrangements where they can get more railroad cars to ship the grain in. Also underway is the repair of some railroad cars to put them back into use this summer when they may be sorely needed.

Another factor which will enter into the price for the golden grain in the summer is the amount of grain still being held in reserve from last year. Although the harvest then was scanty in the area, farmers here and elsewhere in the wheat belt are still holding a "reasonable amount of wheat off the market," one crop expert said.

If this is all sold or mostly sold with the new crop then the price is almost sure to drop still lower for the farmer.

City Sales Tax Payments Earlier Than Usual

Comptroller Bob Bullock surprised 809 Texas towns and cities Thursday with \$64.1 million in quarterly city sales tax payments coming a full month earlier than usual.

"I said we would speed up the payments and we did," Bullock said.

The payments covered the October-December, 1974, quarter. Last year payments for that quarter were sent on March 25.

The city of Spearman sales tax check for this last quarter of 1974 will be in the amount of \$18,162.90. A check with city hall Friday revealed that they had not received the check yet. The city of Gruver will receive \$5,647.21 for the same period.

Bullock said the early payment will help all cities with cash flow problems but he also noted that the total payout was worth some \$400,000 in one month's interest alone if the cities simply invested the money.

In a letter accompanying the checks to the cities, Bullock said he will try to further improve the service and said his office is continuing to work on a plan to make payments more frequently than once a quarter.

Speedier handling of the city money was one of Bullock's primary issues in his election campaign.

The \$64.1 million for the October-December, 1974, quarter compared to \$58.7 million for the Christmas shopping quarter of 1973.

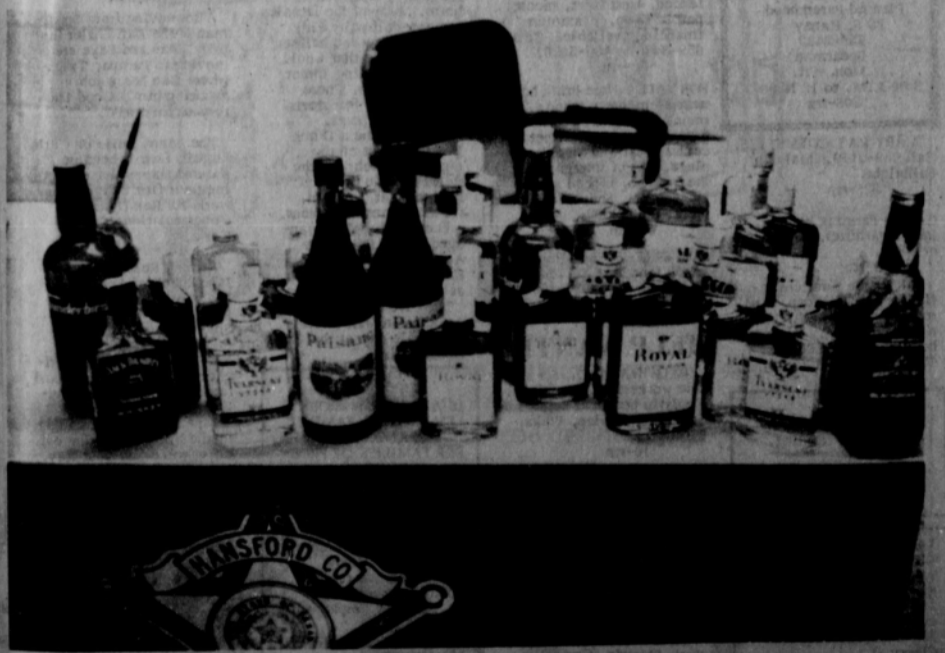
Terms are up this year for city aldermen Hick, Dan Desimone and Alton Ellsworth.

IRS NEWS

Amarillo, Texas--Taxpayers who retire on disability before reaching mandatory retirement age may now exclude up to \$100 a week in disability payments from their income as tax-free sick pay, according to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

Ronald Archer, administrative officer in charge of the Amarillo office of the IRS, said today that some retirees may also be able to obtain refunds on taxes paid in previous years when taxpayers included their disability payments as part of their taxable income.

He noted that retirees may claim the sick pay exclusion for their disability payments only until they reach the age at which retirement is required by their employer. For example, many employers set mandatory retirement at age 65.

Retirees who feel they are entitled to refunds would file amended returns (Form 1020X) or claims for refund (Form 843) to claim the sick pay exclusion. There are certain limitations, however, and Archer suggests that retirees with questions about the sick pay exclusion contact the IRS for details.

Taxpayers with questions on this or any other tax matter can get toll-free tax assistance from the IRS by dialing 800-492-4830.

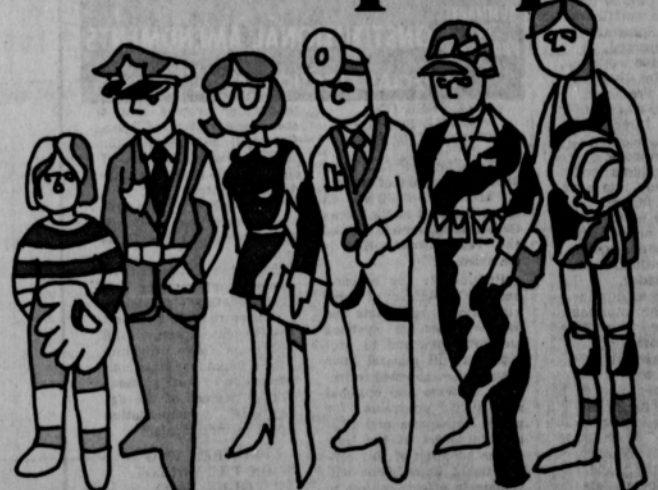

March of Dimes Rescheduled

The March of Dimes campaign which was scheduled for Sunday, Feb. 23 was canceled because of the snow and has been rescheduled for March 9. All volunteers are asked to meet at the First Christian Church at 2:30 p.m. to receive envelopes and material for the door to door campaign, according to County Chairman, Joe Dan Bryan.
President Gerald Ford has signed a proclamation naming the 1975 March of Dimes Birth Defects Month
The Proclamation reads thusly, "The nation's most precious resource is our children. Each year, however, about 150,000 babies born alive in this country have some kind of birth defect. In the first year of life, birth defects are a leading cause of death."
"Today, more than 1,500 genetic defects have been catalogued, and new defects are being described in increasing numbers. Some of these are pre-existing defects from parent to child, some are caused by factors in the environment such as radiation exposure, drugs, chemicals, and infections, while the cause of others is still unknown."
"Discovery that a baby has a birth defect is devastating to parents. In some families, however, the probability that a specific birth defect will occur can be predicted with some accuracy."
"Some defects can be diagnosed before, at, or shortly after birth. Almost as many are discovered during the first year of life. A few do not become evident until years later. Some defects can be corrected during the earliest months of life, but others unfortunately result in life-long handicaps and are irreversible. Some defects are severe and some are so mild that they can be overcome with specialized medical management."
"Birth defects occur in families in every social, economic, racial, and educational levels. The problems presented by these defects today are different than they were 10 years ago. Damage caused to an unborn infant by the German measles virus can virtually be eliminated with the use of German measles vaccine. Further reductions in other birth defects can be made using knowledge already available. Good prenatal care from the earliest weeks of pregnancy, or better yet, even before pregnancy, can help protect the pregnant mother and her unborn child from potential factors known to cause these tragic defects. In addition, new information about genetics and the effects of drugs taken by a pregnant woman upon the developing child is being used to prevent these disorders."

ACS Report Available



Judge Johnny Lee, president of the Hansford Unit of the American Cancer Society, announced this week that the 1974 Annual Report of the ACS, Texas, Division, is now available to the public. The summary of program accomplishments during the 1973-74 program, including a record Crusade high of \$4,006,970, document the volunteer efforts made toward conquering cancer.

Judge Lee said the Hansford Unit residents contributed over \$8,000 to help support the American Cancer Society program. A summary follows: "Professional Education" provides up-to-date information on cancer diagnosis and treatment to the medical and allied health professions. The past fiscal year, these programs reached 77,916 physicians, dentists, and nurses. Also, 17

clinics and 8 conferences were supported by the American Cancer Society in Texas.

"Public Education" helps save lives by increasing public awareness and knowledge about cancer prompting early diagnosis and treatment of the disease. This year over 38,687 programs were presented to an audience of 1,413,603 people. These programs, representing a 23% increase over the previous year, included ACS educational films, physicians and lay speakers, also thousands of exhibits and millions of educational pamphlets.

Mrs. Elmo McClellan, Jr., Gruver, is Hansford Unit Education Chairman assisted by Mrs. Newell Allen, Spearman, and either one may be contacted and will aid anyone interested in scheduling a cancer education program or project.

"The Service Rehabilitation Program" seeks to save lives, to ease the pains and lighten the many burdens the disease places on its victims and their families. This year, the total number receiving ACS Service in Texas was 26,124 Texans.

Mrs. Comfort Winders, Gruver, is the Service Chairman of the Hansford Unit of the ACS. Rehabilitative services like the "Reach to Recovery" program for mastectomy patients, esophageal speech program, and others, aided 2,826 people. Contact Judge Lee of Spearman, or Mrs. Winders in Gruver for anyone who has need of such ACS services.

"Research" is a crucial phase of the ACS activity which enhances the possibility of finding those answers that will aid in the control of cancer. During 1974, grants in Texas in-

cluded: 20 National fellowships, 31 research grants, and 13 Texas Division fellowships. The total of these grants exceeded \$1,619,075.

Judge Lee concluded, "I feel that fighting cancer is a local responsibility and a challenge that every concerned individual should meet. Every man, woman, and child in our community has a stake in the outcome and each has a responsibility to participate in it. The American Cancer Society provides just such an opportunity."

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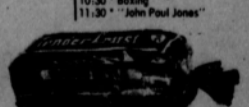

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a statewide system of other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month. Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

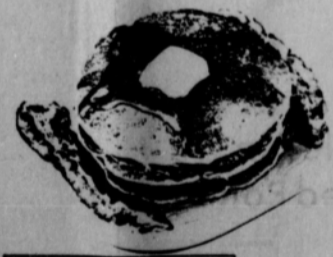

TEXAS TALK

By Vance Snider

Q: What do the terms "canner" and "cutter" mean?
A: Canner and cutter are two of the terms used to describe beef cattle carcass classification. Specifically, "canner" is the lowest of the eight common quality grades of mature beef. The designation canner would indicate virtually no marbling in the meat and mean the animal was at an advanced age when slaughtered. "Cutter" is essentially the same except generally there would be less maturity and at least a trace of marbling. Canner and cutter grades are used only for the older or mature animals and may include steers, heifers, cows, bulls and stags. The other six quality grades used in the beef class include: Prime, choice, good, standard, commercial and utility. Southwestern beef, usually finished in the feedlot, customarily falls into either the choice or prime categories.

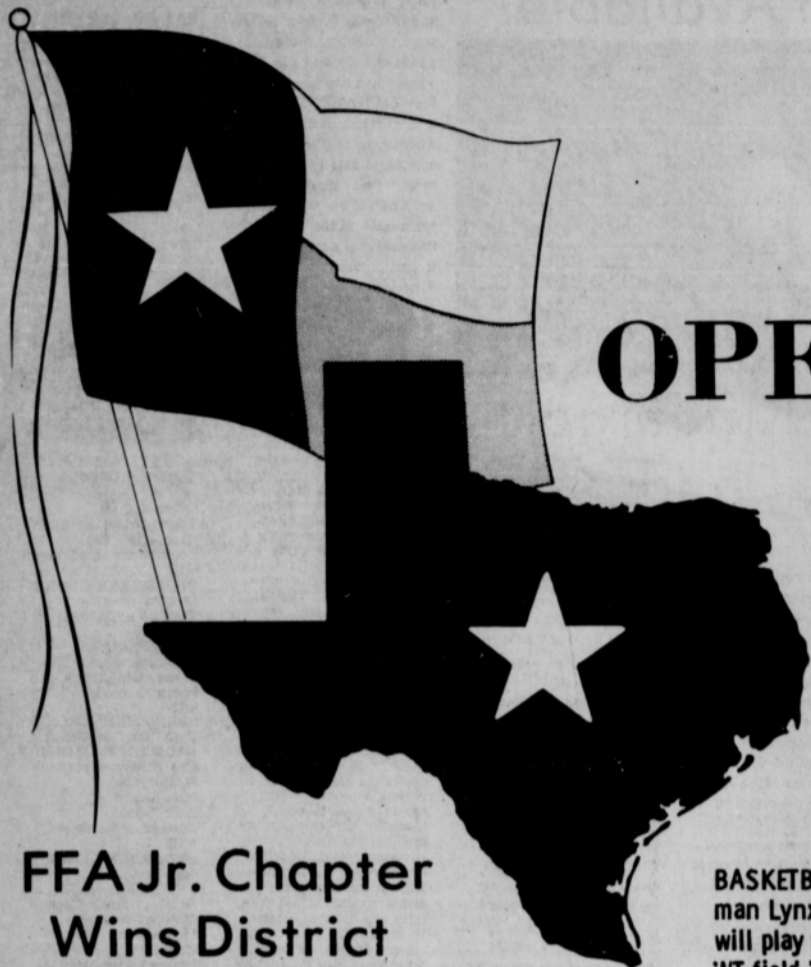

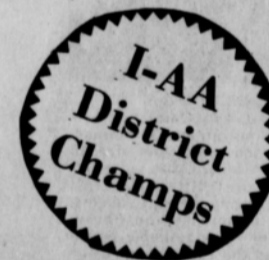
