



TAX NEWS

An advantage of the over-65 school exemption is that, along with it, elderly homeowners obtain "ceiling" on their school taxes. Although the appriased value of these homesteads may fluctuate with the market, taxes due the school district will not increase. The ceiling would be raised, however, if the homeowner adds an improvement other than repairs and general maintenance. In that case, the value of the new improvement is taxed at the current market value and tax rate, and the taxes due are added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

Mrs. Peddy stressed, though, that the elderly homeowner has to apply for the over-65 school tax exemption in order to get the ceiling. The homeowner must be 65 years old or over on January 1, 1986, to qualify for the special exemption and tax

Counties must offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption to all taxpayers, given only on the portion of the county tax levied for farm-tomarket roads or flood control.

Any taxing unit's governing body may vote to offer an exemption for a minimum of \$3,000 on the homesteads of disabled and /or elderly residents. Only in school districts, however, is the ceiling extablished for taxes on over-65 homesteads.

In addition, taxing units may decide to offer a local-option homestead exemption based on a percentage of a home's appraised value. This year, any taxing unit may exempt up to 30 percent of the value of all homesteads in the unit. No matter what the percentage, the dollar amount exempted on any homestead must be at least \$5,000. The taxing unit's governing body has to take official action to offer this exemption.

Percentage homestead exemptions are granted by City of Spearman at 20 percent; Spearman ISD, 30 percent; Gruver ISD, 30 percent; and Hansford County 30 percent, Hospital District, 30 percent; Palo Duro River Authority 30 percent; and North Plains Water District, 5 percent.

For more information about any of the homestead exemptions, homeowners may contact the Hansford County Appraisal District at 709 West 7th 659-5575 Spearman. Gruver 733-

Taxpayers can reduce the burden of property taxes for 1986 in Hansford County Appriasal District if they take advantage of various partial exemptions available on Texas homes.

According to Mrs. Alice Peddy. chief appriaser for the district, Texas property tax laws allow a homeowner to apply only once, instead of annually, for residence homestead exemptions.


Taxpayers who have never received residence homestead exemptions on the homes they were living in on January 1, and those who became 65 years old or disabled during 1985, must apply this year in order to receive exemptions for 1986. Homeowners should apply at the appraisal district office by April 30.

A residence homestead is usually the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The homestead can include up to 20 acres of land and any improvements like a swimming pool or greenhouse, as long as the owner uses them for residential purposes.

Mrs. Peddy said that, to qualify as a homestead, a property must meet four tests. It must be owned by the person or persons claiming the exemption; it must be designed or adapted for human residence; it must actually be used as a residence; and it must be occupied as the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption.

A mobile home, if it meets these tests, can be claimed as a homestead, even if it is on leased land, Mrs. Peddy noted. She added, "A taxpayer can still qualify for the homestead exemptions if part of his residence is used for other purposes, such as a business in the home. And the home will not lose an exemption if the owner moves away temporarily, provided he intends to return and doesn't claim a homestead anywhere else."

Among the various types of homestead exemptions provided by Texas tax law are two which a school district must give to taxpayers who apply and qualify. School District's offer a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all homelowners and an additional \$10,000 exemption to those who are 65years of age or older or who are

Don't Let Eggs "Spoil" Your Easter

It's that time of year again when some giant rabbit romps through neighborhood backyards just before the crack of dawn leaving a trail of magically colored hard-boiled eggs partially hidden in clumps of dewfresh grass. Children from toddlers to teens know it's time for the annual arrival of the "Easter Bunny."

Wise parents know it's the time to take special precautions against possible food poisoning from contaminated or spoiled eggs.

'Hard-boiled eggs that are cooled in water and not refrigerated can be a source of food poisoning," says Dr. C. David Morehead, Director of Infectious Disease in the Department of Pediatrics at Scott and White in

"Although unbroken and uncooked eggs are remarkably resistant to bacterial invasion," Dr. Morehead explains, "the heating process breaks down the egg's natural defense mechanisms and creates an ideal growth medium for bacteria."

Dr. Morehead emphasizes that

reports of contamination of whole shell eggs are rare, but cases of staphylococcal food poisoning commonly occur with improper handling and refrigeration of a variety of egg products, such as salads, custards, and deviled eggs.

"Even an uncracked egg can absorb bacteria, and cooking greatly reduces the egg's defense against contamination," he adds.

"The bacteria can be transmitted to the cooling water or the egg by a cook with unwashed hands or by storing eggs at room temperature for more than 24 hours," notes Dr. Morehead.

Symptoms of staphylococcal food poisoning may include vomiting, abdominal pain and diarrhea within 12 hours after eating the eggs.

Scott and White recommends the following tips to help make this a safe, happy Easter free from food poisoning caused by contaminated or spoiled

1. Wash hands carefully before handling eggs

2. Refrigerate boiled eggs promptly after cooking

3. Keep eggs chilled until ready to eat 4. Throw out any cracked eggs 5. Make sure colorings are "food
