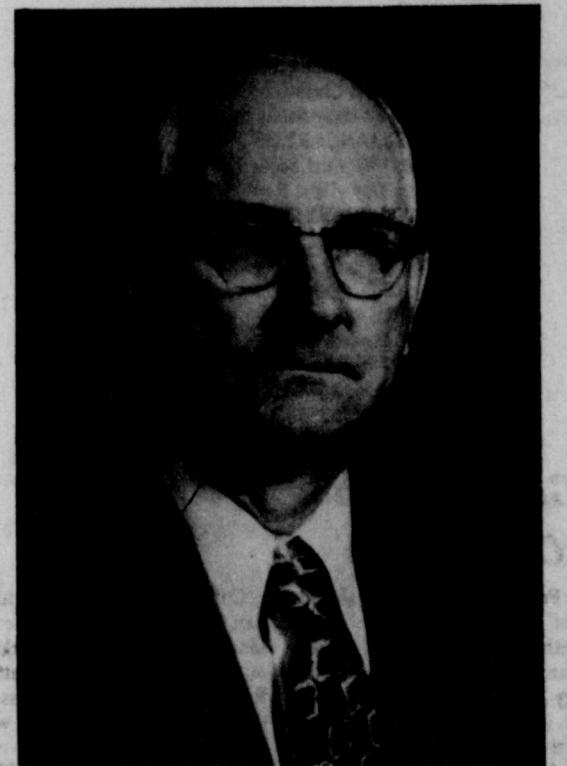

He was a member of the Collingsworth County Hospital Board, served as Baptist Sunday School superintendent and was a member of the Samnorwood School Board from 1933 to 1964. He also had served on the county school board and was a deacon of the First Baptist Church.

He married Cordie Glazner in 1921 in Wellington.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, James Allan Cunningham of Spearman and George Cunningham of Lorenzo; a daughter, Mrs. Jody McBrayer of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. Alice Edwards of Santo; seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

### J.W. "Buck" Buchanan Announces Candidacy



As a legislator, he was Chairman of the Natural Resources Committee and of the House Subcommittee on Appropriations, and a member of Committees on Highways and Roads, and Livestock.

He authored legislation increasing funds for water development, establishing the North Plains Research Farm at Etter, and exempting gas companies for being classed as public utilities for selling gas for irrigation.

### COMPREHENSIVE POLICY ENDORSEMENTS

The value of a Comprehensive General Liability Policy cannot be overemphasized. The broad coverage afforded provides maximum protection to the insured. All third party liability because of sickness, disease, or bodily injury, and injury or destruction of property is covered.

However, the policy may be written to cover only property damage and bodily injury caused by an accident. This is a limitation, because something might happen that may not be deemed an accident. It would be an occurrence -- something that just happened, but not at a definite time. For example, suppose a heater flue was

improperly installed and fumes escaped over a period of time causing gradual sickness. That would be classed as an occurrence, NOT an accident.

This problem would be avoided with a personal injury occurrence endorsement. This endorsement is also necessary in the case of professional liability. Referring to the above example, a heating contractor would be liable for the injury from the fumes.

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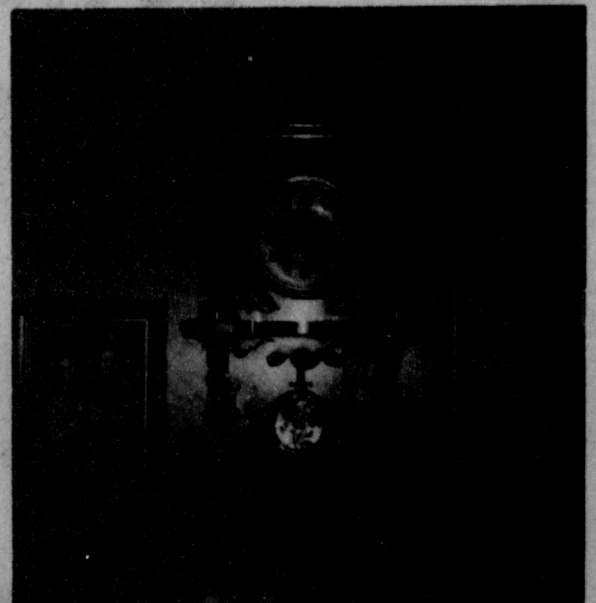

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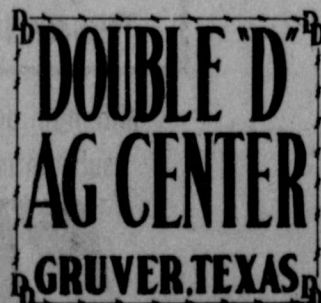
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
