| The West Texas Consolidated Comanches had the Midas touch Friday night, turning a quartet of Lynx miscues into a golden crown as they effectively elinched the district 1-AA gridiron championship by edging out Spearman, $\mathbf{2 0 - 1 3}$, before a capacity crowd in Lynx stadium. <br> The win propels the Comanches into post-season play with a $4-1$ conference mark and only one regular season game to play, that coming against Gruver next week. <br> Despite an overwhelming statistical edge, the Lynx find themselves at $2-2$ on the year and all but out of contention for a shot at posiseason play unless Stratford can beat White Deer in the regular season finale, forcing a 3 -way tie which would be decided by a coin flip. <br> This unusual combination came about this Friday when White Deer upset heavily favored Panhandle. 21-14, to shake up what had looked to be a straight line up for the 1-AA post-season picks after contests this week. <br> The win ups the Bucks conference mark to $3-1$ while Panhandle fell to 2-2. A. Verification is possible only
with the husband's permission in writing. This does not preclude a change in beneficiaries at a later date.
Q. My husband died of a service connected disability and I have
filed a claim for Dependency and Indemnity compensation (DIC). My husband was a military retiree and was contributing to a monthly annuity for me under the Survivors
Benefit Program (SBP) Benefit Program (SBP). May I
receive DIC from the VA and SBP from the military?
A. No. You may not receive both
benefits. For every dollar benefits. For every dollar of DIC
you receive, you must waive a you receive, you must waive a
dollar of your SBP benefit. Should
your monthly SBP benefit exceed your monthly SBP benefit exceed
the monthly DIC benefit, you will be entitled to receive the difference. The premiums paid into the
SBP fund during your husband's SBP fund during your husband's
lifetime which represent that porlifetime which represent that por-
tion of the SBP benefit which you must waive in order to receive the DIC benefit will be refunded to you in a lump sum. You are not
required to elect the DIC benefit. You may elect to receive the total SBP benefit; however, SBP benefits are fully taxable whereas DIC
