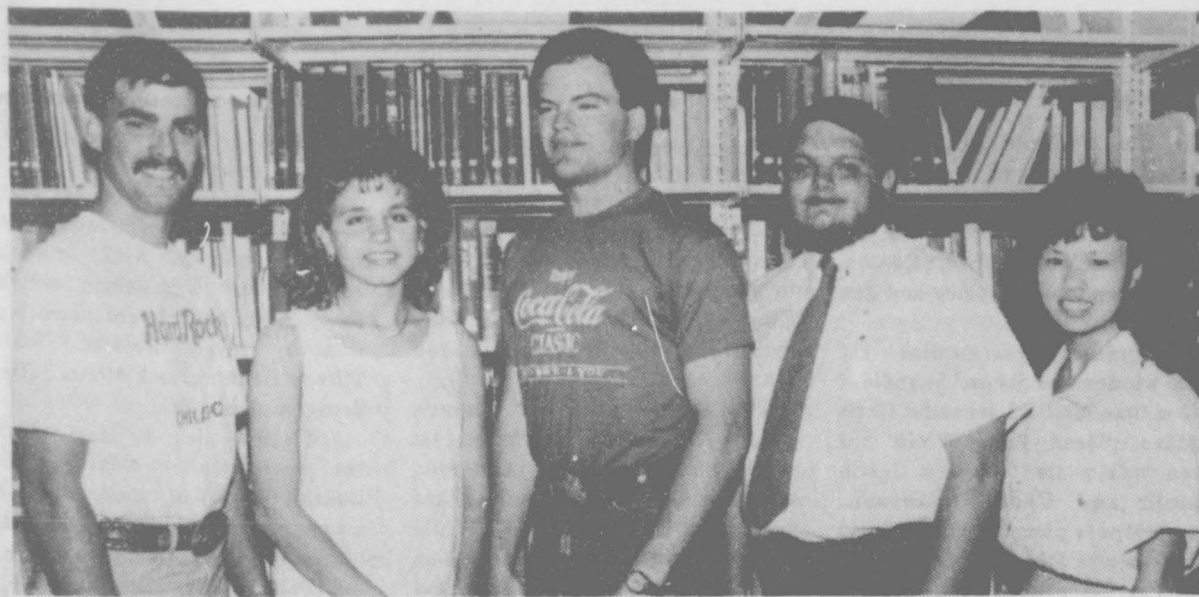

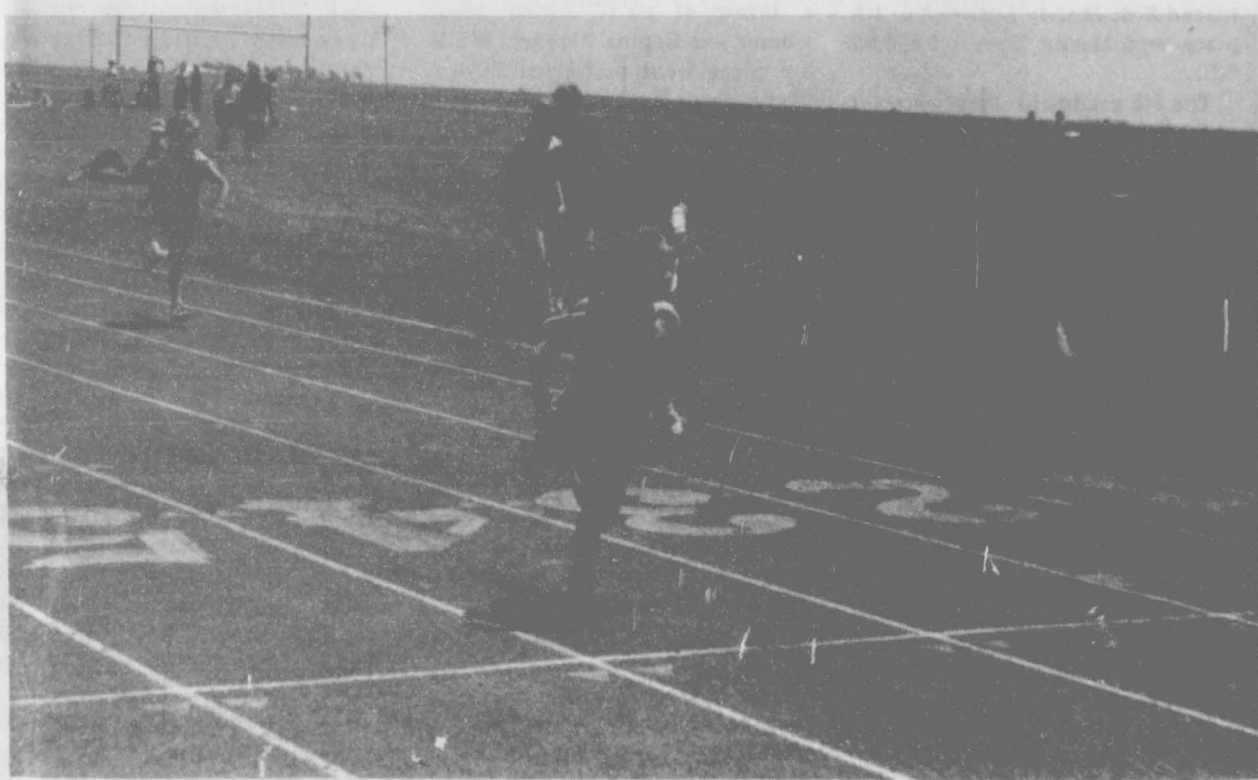

TDH warns of heart disease

During May, National High Blood Pressure Month, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) warns that heart attacks and diseases of the heart are still the leading cause of death in Texas. In fact, heart disease accounts for more than 1/3 of all deaths in the state each year.

Ironically, one of the most deadly of cardiovascular diseases, high blood pressure, is one of the most preventable and controllable.

Dr. Clift Price, associate commissioner for Personal Health Services, said, "A huge majority of the deaths our Vital Statistics Bureau records every year, particularly the heart disease deaths, are entirely preventable, if only the public will follow the simple, well-

publicized advice the medical community has recommended for years."

Dr. Price said that anyone who smokes, is overweight, gets little or no exercise, eats too much salt, suffers much stress daily, or uses birth control pills, is at risk of having abnormally high blood pressure, also called hypertension.

He said, "Most people who develop hypertension can find out if they have the condition easily and painlessly. And after they know they have high blood pressure, they usually can control it, either by modifying their lifestyles or by using specialized medications."

High blood pressure is difficult

to detect from how one feels physically. There are usually no warning signs, such as dizziness or nervousness. In fact, a person with high blood pressure may feel as if he or she is in excellent condition.

Dr. Price stressed that the only real means of determining whether someone has developed high blood pressure is regular health check-ups, during which blood pressure is routinely measured.

"I know all this sounds almost too simple," Dr. Price added. "But the truth is that a large proportion of the nearly 40,000 Texans who died from cardiovascular disease last year could still be alive if they had heeded the advice we have emphasized for years."

Clements proclaims tourism week for Texas

Governor Bill Clements has proclaimed May 15 through 21 as Texas Tourism Week, coinciding with National Tourism Week, to heighten awareness of the positive economic impact tourism has on the state.

"Tourism is one of the largest industries in Texas and contributes greatly to the economy of our state," Clements said in the proclamation. "During the state's year-long birthday celebration in 1986, expenditures totaled over \$17 billion. Nearly one in every 15 Texans is part of this industry."

"It is important that we move forward to increase this industry as a means of diversifying our state's economy and we continue to make potential visitors aware of the tremendous assets of Texas. We must continue to welcome our visitors with the friendliness and courtesy that typifies our world famous Texas hospitality."

According to a study by the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas, travel and tourism supported 294,000 jobs in Texas during 1986. Business and pleasure travel contributed \$17.29 billion to the state economy and accounted for \$605 million in state taxes and \$391 million in local taxes. An estimated 39.4 million people who live outside Texas visited the state.

Texas cities have been encour-

aged to conduct events to increase local awareness of tourism's benefits. Tourism industry personnel are requested to wear red during tourism week, and especially on May 16 which was declared National Tourism Awareness Day by President Ronald Reagan.

The themes for National Tourism Week are "Tourism Work\$ for America" and "America's Red, White and Blue Chip Industry."

According to 1987 estimates by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D.C., travel and tourism is the second largest employer in the United States, providing jobs for 5.5 million Americans. Nationally, tourism generated \$292 billion in expenditures and paid more than \$36 billion in federal, state and local taxes.

A bold, new advertising campaign to boost Texas tourism was announced in April by Governor Clements and Mrs. Rita Clements, who chairs the Tourism Advisory Committee for the Texas Department of Commerce.

At that news conference, the governor said, "By the end of August, we'll have spent an estimated \$5 million on our tourism advertising this fiscal year. Compare that to the less than \$1 million we spent last year and you'll have a clear picture of our commitment. But certainly, this is money well spent. Tourism means jobs for our people and money in our state."

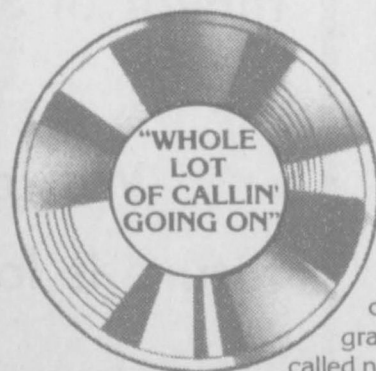

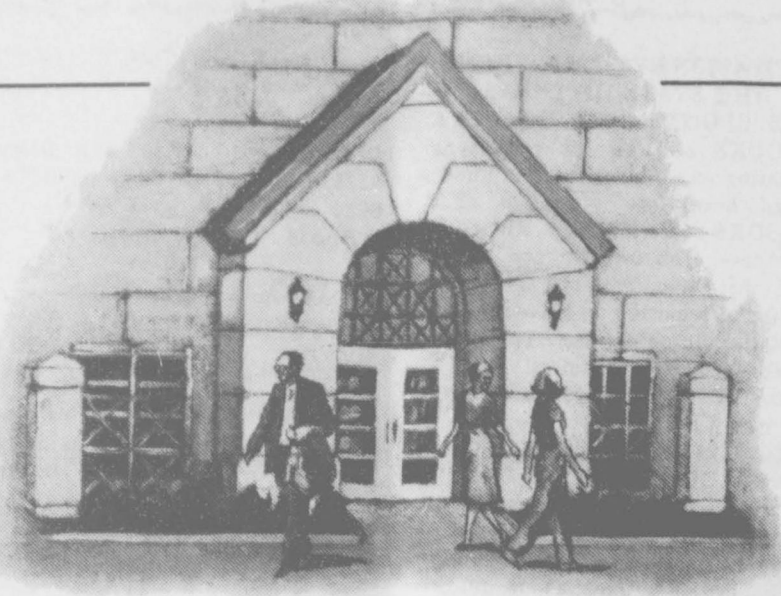
