# Mules get revenge on Friona with 23-13 win

Just as Muleshoe's name is no longer vandalized on a highway sign just outside the Friona city, limits, Friday's football game ended with a new look: Muleshoe avenged last year's loss with a 23-13 win.

With Friona now competing in Class 2A rather than 3A, Friday night's game will not go in Muleshoe's district standings. However, it is safe to say the Mules will still take pride in the victory over their old rivals.

Lincoln Riley threw for two touchdowns and ran for another to break the game open in the second half as Muleshoe avenged its 21-14 defeat at the hands of the Chieftains last season.

With the win, the Mules move to 3-0 heading into their home date this Friday against Tulia. Friona now holds a 3-1 record and will

face Floydada this week before starting district play against Hale Center.

"It's a big non-district win," Mule head coach David Wood said. "When we start over, we'll all be 0-0 again, but it's still a big win."

The game got off to a slow start and looked much like a repeat of the previous few seasons between the two squads.

Muleshoe did have excellent field position from the start as Stephan

Shelburne returned the opening kickoff to the Friona 47.

After a 12-yard reception by Danny Ramírez, the Mules were in business at the Chieftain 29, but Friona held Muleshoe on four downs and took over.

Muleshoe started its next possession on its own 35, but changed its fortunes quickly with a 23-yard run by Ramírez.

# Muleshoe students part of art exhibit on Internet site

Several students of Muleshoe art teacher Rheata White are among young artists across the country whose work has been selected for display in an Internet art show.

The students — 22 from Muleshoe, three from Sudan and one from Hereford — were among 8,437 who entered the juried contest.

Competition is open to any artist age 17 or younger. There is an annual grand prize of \$5,000 and a grand prize for each individual contest of \$1,000.

In addition, each contest includes 40 first prizes with a retail value of \$50 each and 73 second prizes with a retail value of \$25 each. There are no entry fees or required purchases.

The students' work can be accessed individually by typing in the identity of the website followed by the artist's identity number. If the identity number does not work, the computer will ask for the student's name.

About two dozen firefighters — 16 from Muleshoe and eight to 10 from Sudan — were able to contain a range fire Tuesday evening south of Muleshoe.

Fred Locker of Muleshoe also dropped water from an airplane onto the fire.

Jack Dunham, acting Muleshoe fire chief, said the fire was about 10 miles from town, south of Farm-to-Market 746 East, and burned somewhere between 400 and 600 acres.

"We were lucky we kept it south of 746," Dunham said. "If it had jumped the highway, I don't know what would have happened."

## Muleshoe man has been taping 'letters' for 20 years

Bobby Reynolds of Muleshoe and his brother, R.M. Reynolds of Aledo, Texas, are members of a large, close-knit family and like to keep in touch.

They and their family members spend as much time together as possible, but that never seemed to be enough.

They tried telephone calls and letters — Bobby Reynolds once bought a 70-page tablet and wrote on every page — but that didn't seem to be enough, either.

Then, 20 years ago, his brother suggested that they record cassettes to send to each other.

The brothers say they now exchange 50 to 100 tapes a year, with each tape containing about 30 minutes of talk on each side. They estimate that their total by now is 1,000 tapes exchanged.

The main topics of their "conversations" are everyday things such as "what broke down at work," tidbits of weather information and family news.

Over the years of exchanging cassettes, the two have come up with a new kind of talking that they call "tall-tale bragging."

A particularly "tall-tall" tale from this end was about one summer when he was working at a dairy near Summerfield, Texas, and heard someone whistling but couldn't see anyone.

As the story goes, he finally realized he was hearing his own whistling from the previous winter, when the weather was so cold the sound froze and only thawed after temperatures warmed up.

He has now worked at Prairie View Dairy for 16 years; his brother is retired but does some plumbing and yard work and enjoys watching the wild turkeys, humming-birds and deer that emerge from the woods around his home. Everything goes onto the cassettes.

Since they first began taping in

1980, the brothers have never considered quitting this means of communication.

Twenty years worth of "talking letters" have done wonders in strengthening ties.

Another 12-yard reception by Ramírez kept the drive going and Muleshoe had a first down at the 28 of Friona. Again, the Chieftains held their ground and stopped Muleshoe on another fourth down.

With just under 10 minutes to go in the second quarter, the Mules blocked José Piña's third punt and took over from the Friona 40.

This time, they were not stopped short. After A.J. Buhrman put up a 19-yard run, Ramírez caught a pass in the end zone for his fifth touchdown in two games and a 6-0 lead. The kick by D.J. Domínguez made it 7-0.

Friona had its best chance to tie the game two possessions later. After a high snap on a Mule punt, the Chieftains took over from the Muleshoe 18.

On third down for the Chieftains, Cason White threw a pass intended for Matthew Mata. Instead, the pass up the middle was picked off easily by Riley with 55 seconds remaining in the first half.

If Riley ended the first half on a high note for Muleshoe, then it could be argued that Domínguez started the second half the same way. Domínguez's kickoff went out of bounds at the Friona seven. After a sack by Cade Hooten

But I'm reading a really good book now, all the more special because it was written by a longtime family friend whose father spoke at the graveside of my own father, and this book has been delightful. It's by Tom Williams, and it's called The Crown of Eden. (You can order it at Amazon.com.)

The book centers on the unfold-

ing of a wonderful prophecy involving the marriage of the prince and princess of two kingdoms. At first the prince doesn't know he is a prince, and both he and the princess are presented with other potential and desirable suitors. Lots of twists and subplots sweeten the plot as the royal pair, unbeknownst even to themselves, search for each other.

I just read a passage that caught my attention. Hollywood and our society says, regarding the love of a man and woman, meet at a bar, head home, crawl beneath the sheets, and there'll be no devil to pay, ignoring the fact of a better than one in three chance of catching a really repugnant disease and a one hundred per cent chance of having to deal with unpleasant consequences.

Tom writes of Bogarth the blacksmith, that he'd taught his son, Aradon, "to look at women not as fortresses to be stormed and sacked, or as fruit to be plucked and

devoured, the core discarded, but as marvelous creatures of immense value, to be honored, wooed, and won courteously and gently. One must build trust, confidence, love, and commitment before tasting the ultimate intimacy. Aradon was a very normal


young man in every way, but he had resolved, not because he disdained love but because he wanted the real thing both for himself and the one to whom he would pledge his love, that "his body would not enter where his mind and heart had not opened the way," To follow mere lust "to pleasure would be a lonely, isolating, selfish thing rather than intimate sharing. He would be using her body merely to satisfy himself. . . . Moreover, she would know that she was nothing more to him than an instrument of pleasure" which "was why so many illicit lovers loathed each other after their lust was spent. They loathed themselves for their own slavery to appetite, and the partner was a mirror in which they saw this truth unmasked.

Bogarth went on to tell his son that "The writer of the Eden story was not just bein' careless with words when he said that 'Adam knew his wife, and she bore a son.' He didn't just use his wife; he knew her as he knew himself. Their souls and spirits were one, and it was neither an intrusion nor an act of selfishness for him to 'go in unto her.' Their bodies participated in the knowledge their hearts

already shared. And there is more truth and more genuine warmth and deep love in that than in a thousand steamy Hollywood lust scenes.

It's love. And it makes all counterfeit substitutes look shabby

## Weevil eradication virtual reality in one area

With the eradication of the boll weevil reportedly eminent in one part of Texas where infestation is traditional, cotton farmers in the Southern Rolling Plains region of the Texas **Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation** are beginning to breathe easier.

Despite a season-long drought, farmers report that the foundation's eradication efforts have been beneficial to cotton production.

Richard Pelzel and Rodney Ripple, both growers within the region, recently attended informational meetings in Plainview and Muncy. They came to assure growers in the Northern High Plains area that eradication is not only possible but happening.

Pelzel and Ripple spoke to a crowd of more than 500 producers, discussing the benefits of not having to fight the weevil anymore.

Besides increased production, they cited environmental benefits and decreased work load as major achievements.

"First thing is the environmental concerns," Ripple said. "Ridding our area of the boll weevil has resulted in less chemical use.... The boll weevil planes aren't flying, and that doesn't kick your beneficials out of balance."

"It has tremendously decreased my work load, not having to spray," Pelzel said. "If you're in a dryland situation like I'm in, and you are running like crazy trying to keep everything sprayed, and you don't know if all your work is going to do any good because you can't control if it will rain or not. With this program, it's not a guessing game."

Of primary concern to farmers in any area undertaking an eradication effort is the cost involved.

Pelzel told the group that forward thinking is required to understand the long-term benefits of eradication. rather than just seeing the numbers.

"Looking at this program longterm, every year you are able to set aside the exact amount of your assessment, knowing that in a few years you are going to be home free," he

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL HOUSTON - An often undetected condition that leads to heart failure can be corrected with a specialized surgery to remove clots from the lungs.

"Before this surgery, people with this condition died," said Dr. Rafael Espada, professor of surgery at Baylor College of Medicine. "This offers a lifesaving cure."

In the procedure, called a pulmonary thromboendarterectomy, special instruments are used to clean out the interior of the pulmonary arteries.

Espada said that for most people, clots in the lungs do not present a problem because the body dissolves them. But some people are missing the properties in blood that eliminate the clots.

"Normally, you can have a clot form and go to your lungs and you will never know it happened because your body destroys it," he said.

For the other group of people, however, the clots become rubbery masses that obstruct blood flow. Patients usually arrive at the hospital with enlarged, failing heart and difficulty breathing.

"Many times they come in with one diagnosis and we find, by doing an arteriogram, that there is an obstruction caused by these clots," said Espada, a surgeon at The Methodist Hospital.

He said the condition often goes undetected because it is difficult to diagnose without the specialized test.

A history of miscarriages, inflammation of veins in the leg and shortness of breath are possible indicators of the condition.

During the surgery, the patient is placed on a heart-lung machine and the body temperature is dropped to stop circulation. The pulmonary artery is opened and cleaned out with special instruments that peel out the clots.




