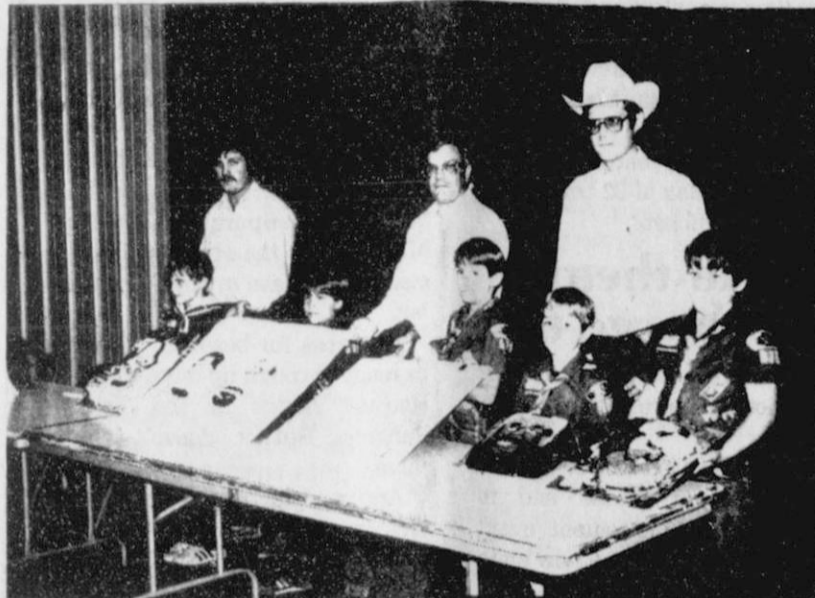

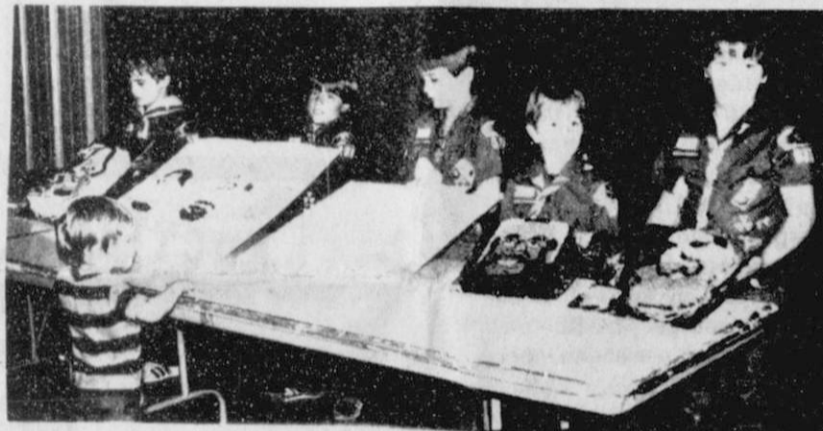

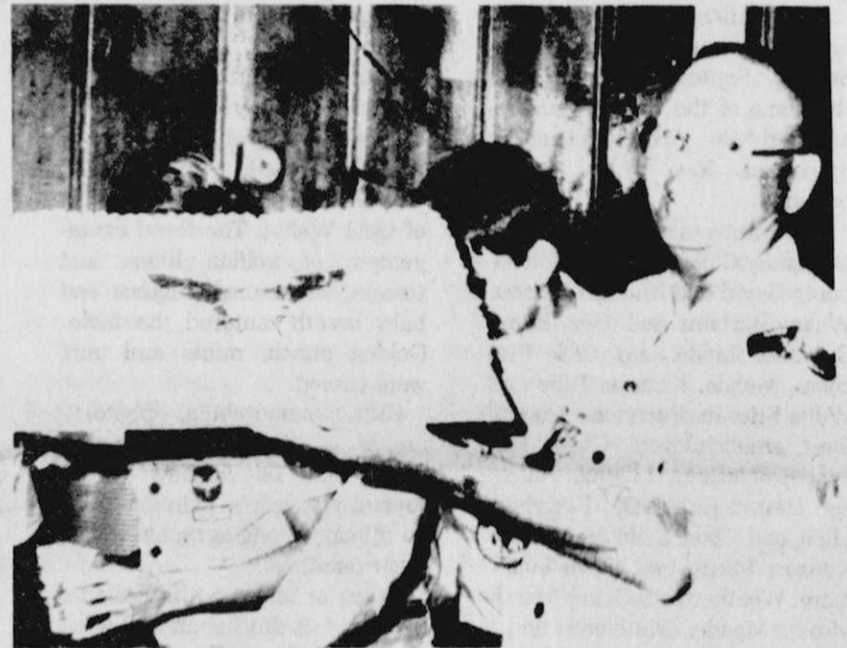

Phill Gramm appoints Roy Bulls county campaign chairman

U.S. Rept. Phil Gramm, the co-author of President Reagan's economic recovery program in Congress and now a candidate for U.S. Senate, has appointed Roy Bulls, of Spearman, to be his Hansford County Campaign Chairman.

"I am honored to have the active support of key leaders in the economic and civic life of 225 counties across Texas," Congressman Gramm said in making the announcement.

"These men and women of courage are the strong right arm in our fight to insure that traditional Texas values win out over the out-of-state special interests represented by the Mondal-Doggett ticket," he noted.

"Strong grassroots organization, I believe, is the key to overcoming the anti-Texas proposals of my opponent and his supporters in the Northeast," said the congressman.

Congressman Gramm, of College Station, earned a Ph.D. in economics, the subject he taught at Texas A&M University for a decade prior to winning election to Congress in 1978.

Gramm said he would have active coordinators and steering

committees operating in all of Texas' 254 counties by election day.

"As Texans become increasingly aware of the clear choice which faces our state in this election -- Reagan and Gramm vs. Mondal and Doggett -- our campaign is gathering momentum in every region of the state," he said.

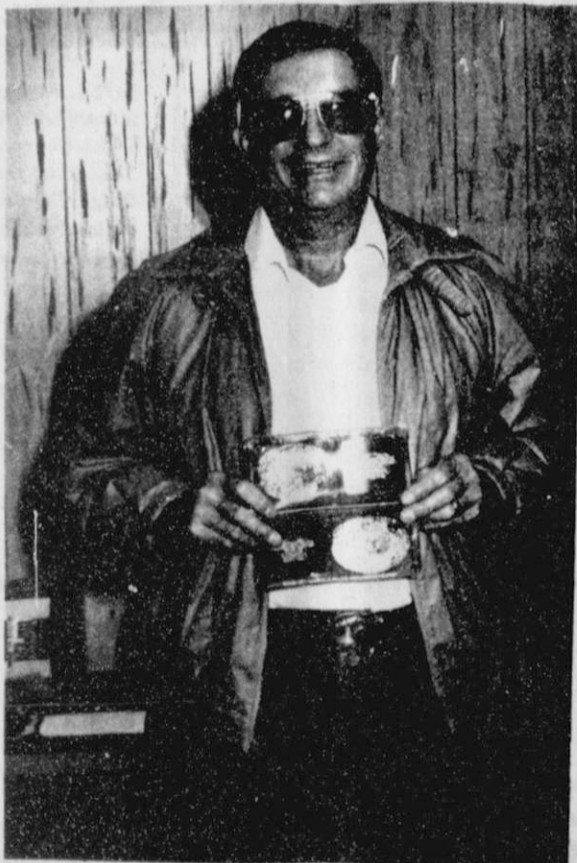

Recreational events to be taxed

The Dallas Cowboys have a new number in their line-up this year. The new number is 4 and 1/8th—that's 4 and 1/8th percent sales tax on the price of Cowboy tickets.

Sports tickets—along with tickets to most other entertainment and recreational events—come under the Texas sales tax for the first time ever starting October 2.

The so-called amusements sales tax is part of new tax laws signed by Governor Mark White.

If you are going to take in a game or two this year, be ready to pay this new tax of 92 cents on a \$15 Cowboy ticket.

If you are a season ticket holder, however, you are all right. The new tax law exempts individuals who, in effect, already had contracted for a season's worth of touchdowns and helmet-bashing.

The new tax is actually a part of a tax on entertainment, and all other professional sports events in Texas will fall under the tax. College games are not subject to the tax, and neither are high school athletic or entertainment events.

So, if you happen to be a basketball fan and want to see the San Antonio Spurs, the Dallas Mavericks or the Houston Rockets, you will have to pay the same tax.

That goes for baseball, too, so be ready to cough up more for the Houston Astros or the Texas Rangers. But it doesn't stop there.

Are you planning to take the kids or grandkids to the Ice Capades or the circus? The new tax will be charged on those events, too.

Movie theatres to charge tax

The coming attraction at your local movie theatre may be higher prices.

Beginning October 2, admission to movie houses and to almost any entertainment event will be taxed under the new state sales tax of 4 1/8 percent.

The Legislature passed the bill containing the new tax, and Governor Mark White signed it into law in July.

The minimum tax starting October 2 on a \$5 movie admission will be 20 cents. But theatre owners in some cities with a local sales tax and special taxes for mass transit will have to collect 30 cents per \$5 movie.

The same tax applies to concerts, cover charges at nightclubs, dragstrips, health club memberships, horse shows, opera performances, rodeos, water slides, golf tournaments, wrestling matches, and professional sporting events.

The tax may or may not be spelled out to the ticket purchaser, but a businessman in the entertainment industry will be liable for collecting the tax. He has to get it from somewhere.

And that usually is the consumer's pocket, which almost always foots tax bills.

One more thing: The state sales tax applies to popcorn and all the other goodies sold at the movies. The end.

Starting October 2, subscribers will pay state and local sales taxes on cable television services.

State school funding changed

State school funding in past years, was based on personnel units (p.u.). The dollars earned for these p.u. was based on the degree and experience of the teacher in those positions.

The state funding procedure has changed in it's entirety. The funding procedure is now based entirely on the average daily attendance (A.D.A.) of the students enrolled. To further complicate matters the A.D.A. (for funding purposes) is based on two four week periods during the school year. The first four week periods during the school year. The first four week period is Oct. 1st. thru Oct. 26th.

It is extremely important that

every effort be made to have the highest possible attendance by every child in our district during October.

For each 1% we are below 100% attendance, the net loss in state funds will be \$11,000.00 for the year. The 1% figure represents only eight students by being absent each day for the year. The bottom line is that if each student in our school system is absent only one day during the school year the net loss in state funds will be about \$55,000.00

House Bill 72: SECTION 2, Subchapter A, Chapter 16, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 16.006 to read as follows:

Sec. 16.006. AVERAGE DAILY

ATTENDANCE. In this chapter, average daily attendance is determined by the best four week of eight weeks of attendance. The State Board of Education by rule shall prescribe the eight weeks for which attendance records must be maintained by all districts for this purpose, except that the records must be kept for four weeks of each regular semester.

Average daily attendance is determined by the best of 4 of 8 weeks of attendance. The SBOE shall designate the 8 weeks which will be used, 4 of which will be during each semester. The weeks of 10/1/84-10/5/84, 10/8/84-10/12/84, 10/15/84-10/19/84, and 10/22/84-10/26/84 are designated as the 4 weeks used during the first semester. The 4 weeks for the second semester will be designated later in the fall.

District shall use the Daily Register of Pupil Attendance for recording attendance as in the past and shall keep attendance records during the entire 1984-85 school year.

Vocational Education and Special Education contact hour registers must be maintained during the same 8 weeks attendance is counted.

Either full day - full year, 1/2 day full year, or full year 1/2 year attendance is allowed for kindergarten students. As a minimum, districts must offer at least a full year 1/2 day program or a full day one semester program.

The scriptures have no authority apart from Christ. The Bible derives its authority from authority of Christ. If Christ is authoritative, then the Bible is authoritative; if Christ is just like any other man, then the Bible is just a book like other books. But if Christ is unique, then the Bible is unique.

The authority of scripture consists solely in the fact that the Bible is authoritative historical witness to Christ. It is the testimony of those who actually saw and witnessed to the saving acts of God in history (Exod. 10:2, Deut. 4:34-35, I John 1:1-3). This is the importance of the Old Testament and the New Testament. Both Testaments witness to Christ: in the Old Testament it contains the

testimony of the prophets to the Christ who will come; and the New Testament contains the witness of the apostles to Jesus of Nazareth. Outside the Bible there is no historical testimony of witnesses to Christ.

That is why the canon of the New Testament classes about the end of the first century because there is no more historical witnesses; for the historical witnesses had passed on. The importance of these historical witnesses is that they had experienced the unique and the saving act of God in history; as the Christ event!



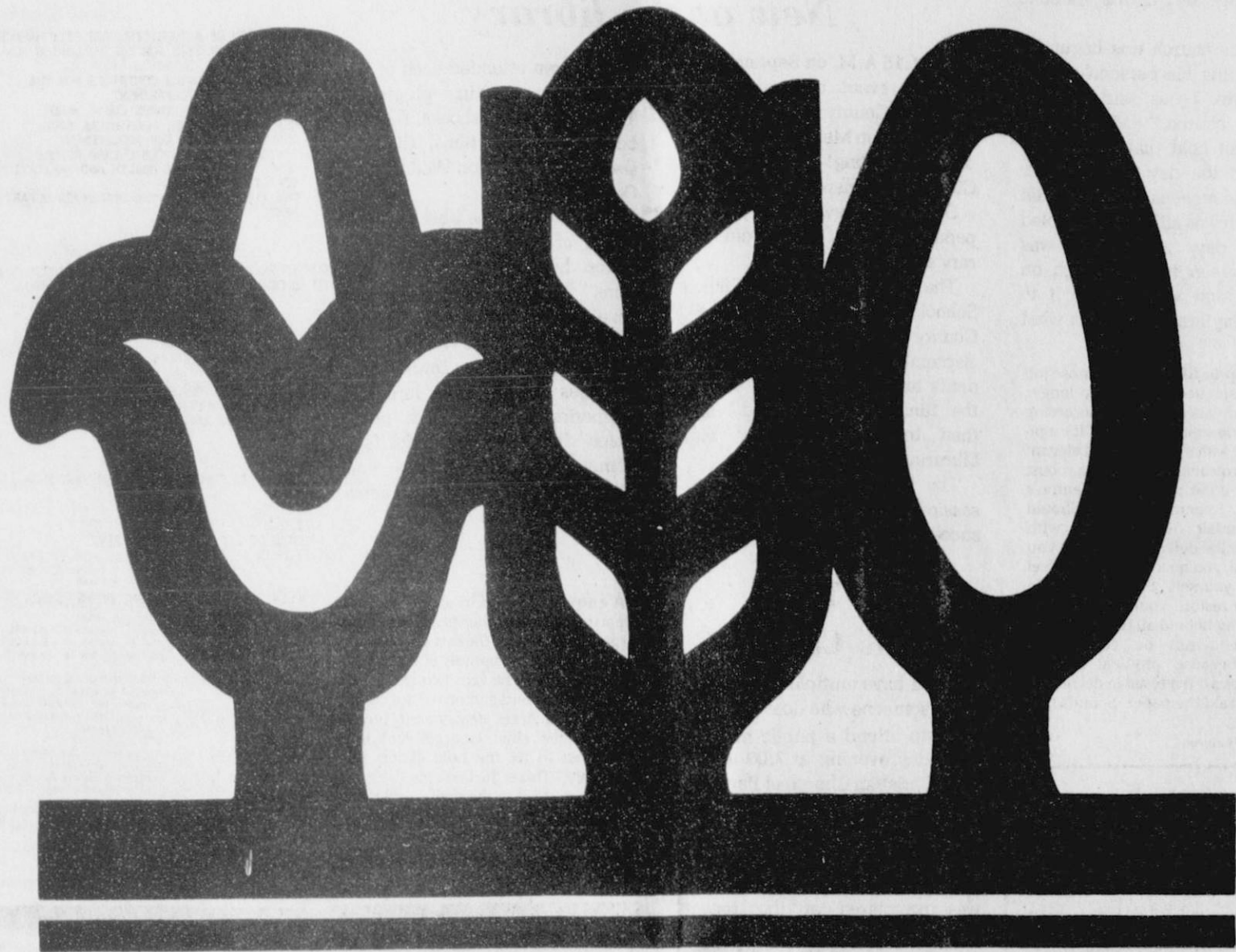
