Football Practice Starts Monday

Even though it is still summer, it is football time again. The first game will not be played until Sept. 6, but workouts start Monday and this is enough to put the football fan in the grid mood.

Spearman players will take their physical examinations Saturday, draw equipment Sunday and begin workouts Monday morning in shorts. Evening workouts will be in pads.

Gruver Coach Leon Chapman is still in school in Canyon and the Plainsman was unable to learn his starting schedule. In past years Chapman has held night workouts only.

This week Lynx boss Don Seymour and assistants, Fred and Larry Dawson, Jerry Taylor and grade school coaches James Pendergraft, Perry Coursey and Kenneth Thomas have been having their own coaching clinics, and preparing information and equipment for the

players.

Tuesday Coach Seymour told the Lions Club that Spearman faces a tough 10 game schedule. In the district race he said Dalhart is far ahead of the rest of the district, but the rest will be bunched close.

At the state coaching school the coaches of the district picked White Deer and Stinnett to a battle for second, Shamrock would follow and Spearman in last place.

Seymour said he, his staff and team were going to try and change that finish.

Of the 29 boys Seymour expects on the varsity this fall, four will be seniors. The remainder will be juniors and sophomores.

Twenty eight freshmen will draw equipment Sunday and work out the same as the varsity. However, they will not scrimmage with the varsity, and they will play a freshman schedule.

Seymour said this is being done so the young boys can compete with boys of their own size and ability. In the past, he added, too many freshmen were lost to football because they had all their interest beat out by larger and older boys.

Seymour said the squad will be smaller this year, because some of the larger boys from last year have indicated they do not intend to participate this year.

In the grade school program that will start with the opening of school, there will be 24 boys in the sixth grade, 26 in the seventh and 26 in the eighth grade.

The fifth grade program has been changed to touch or flag football, because the fifth and sixth grades combined made such a large group that one coach could not give them proper supervision.

School Board Meets Monday To Inspect New Building

With the teaching faculty complete and the new high school building nearing completion, the Spearman school board meeting Tuesday was concerned mostly with routine matters.

The board will inspect the new high school building Monday night and either accept or reject the building.

Seats in the auditorium will be installed by Friday and the language laboratory will also be installed. Work on the building is now in the final touch-up stages in most areas and if it is accepted, moving will begin next week.

Board members agreed to pay the registration fees and \$2 per night lodging fees for the Spearman teachers attending the reading conference at West Texas State.

The board also approved a list of meetings the school administrators may attend this year. The superintendent will be going to the State Superintendents meeting in Austin, the American Assoc. of School Administrators meeting in Atlantic City, and the National Edu-

cation Association meeting in 1964.

Skate Rink Opens Friday

A new recreation facility for the athletic minded will open in the Community Building Friday night.

A skating rink will begin operations in the building and admission will be 50 cents per person, with or without skates.

The rink will be operated by "Shorty" Myers, a veteran skating rink operator. He said the rink will be operated in a safe manner at all times and the safety rules will be strictly enforced, so that everyone may enjoy skating.

The rink will be open Saturday and Sunday afternoons from 2 until 5 p. m. and every Friday night. It will also be open every first and third Saturday night.

The annual budget hearing for the Spearman Independent School District will be held Tuesday, Aug. 20, at 7:30 p. m. in the old high school building.

Supt. James Bramlett said the meeting was first scheduled for the new building, but has been changed to the old one.

If there is any doubt in which direction the liberals are taking this country, it should have been removed this week. Apparently the group is beginning to believe that it has enough of an economic control over the country that it does not have to try and cover its aims.

Vice President Lyndon Johnson and Supreme Court Justice Arthur L. Goldberg in speeches before two different groups pulled no punches in telling the groups that Washington will be supreme.

Johnson, speaking before a national organization of city government officials told the group that cities would enforce the civil rights rules as laid down by Washington or be faced with the possibility of losing self-government.

Justice Goldberg, the former union lawyer, told the American Bar Association that the lawyers and judges should support the Supreme Court and put aside discredited theories of constitutional law.

The Judge scorned the doctrine of interposition, the theory that states can interpose themselves between the federal government and the citizens of the states.

Now the idea of interposition has been a much discussed question of law for many years and there are big camps on both sides of the discussion. We cannot argue this point. Our point on contention is this new idea that Washington is infallible.

It seems we suddenly have a group of rulers, not necessarily elected, many appointed, who have had all the answers revealed to them and them alone. There are lots of elephants as well as donkeys in the group. This group of men and women are so intelligent they need no hindsight or assistance. They have all the answers and the many years of knowledge which have been built on the subjects are fallacies.

It would be nice if we had such a group, but we are afraid these super-brains will prove to be like so many super-brains of the years before. They will prove to be not as smart as they think they are.

Someone once said "Those who are not interested in the past cannot be trusted with the

Four Years Pays \$150,000

Wanted: Young men and women 18-30 years old interested in earning \$150,000 for three to five years of pleasant work. High School education only requirement.

That classified advertisement, if run in newspapers all over the country would bring an avalanche of applications.

You will not see the ad in this or any other paper but the opportunity is available. The pleasant job is securing a college education and the salary is the average amount of money that a college graduate will make above the nongraduate during a lifetime if they are both putting in the same amount of effort in an equal work day.

The nice thing about this difference in pay is that it is increasing all the time. Back in the 40's the difference was estimated at \$72,000. In 1952 a Time magazine survey upped the amount to \$100,000 and in the not too distant future the difference is being set at \$250,000.

According to WNS news story recently, there is a serious question in industry now as to whether or not in years to come there will be places where the common laborer can earn an adequate income.

Naturally, with the value of education going up, the requirements for entering college are stiffer, so a high school student cannot loaf through high school, then suddenly decide he wants to go to college.

Five years ago very few colleges required entrance exams. Today the open door policy is almost dead. Rice University, possibly the best school in Texas, rejected 2,200 applicants last year.

Trinity University, one of the state's smaller schools rejected 200 of the 900 applicants received. From all of the schools comes information that more and more students are being rejected.

Even though a student may pass the entrance requirements, he will still find the going much harder than the road traveled by his parents or even his older brothers and sisters.

College officials point out that requirements are greater now than even in the mid and late fifties. The percentage of aca-

demie failures is increasing as the colleges increase their standards.

The stakes are high and the competition is becoming keener all the time, so the high school or college student who decides to quit school now to keep making that "big" money will find in later years that it was very small money compared to what he turned his back on. The student, who does not already have his future secured through family connections cannot afford to leave school.
