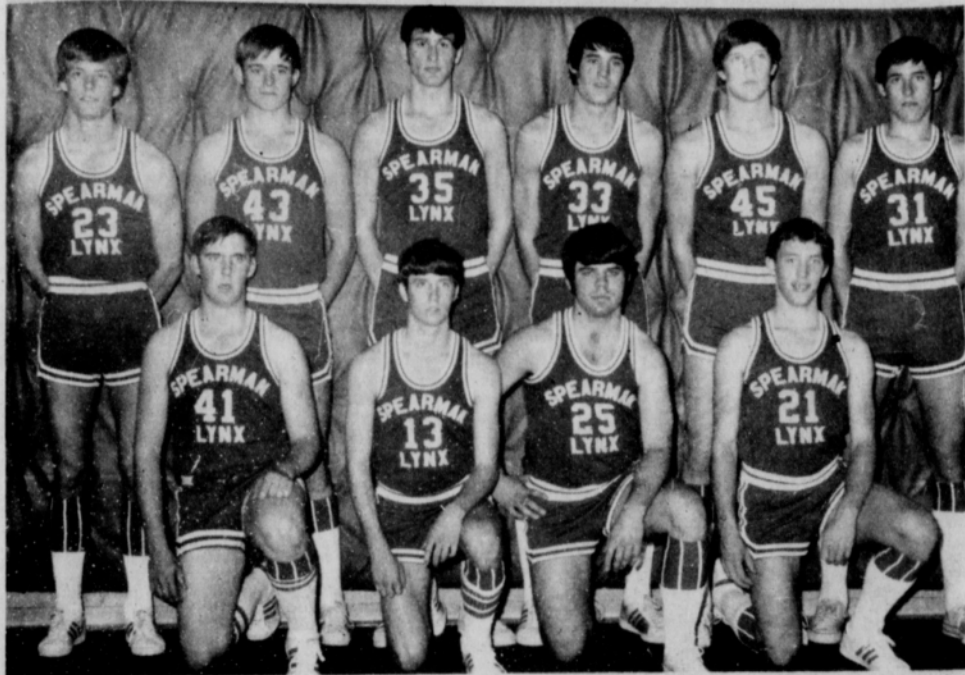


Lynx to play Bobcats Tuesday night

Lynx Win Over Skyrockets

The Spearman Lynx traveled to Miami Thursday night and came away with a 80-77 win over the Wellington Skyrockets in a game that was marred by a total of 48 personal fouls and turnovers by both teams by the dozen. The game with Wellington was a practice game for both District champs as Spearman travels to Canyon Tuesday night to play once again in the Childress Bobcats in the bi-district contest. Wellington will have to wait and see who wins as they play the winner of Sanford-Fritch and Stratford for the bi-district championship in District 1-A.

With the referees calling everything that happened, the game turned into who could score before the referee called a mistake on them. This win by the Lynx raised their season record to 16-9 and drops the Skyrockets to 22-4.

In the first quarter the Lynx jumped to a 21-16 lead as Roger Jones with 8 points and Randy Reid with 7 points led the Lynx. Also scoring for the Lynx was Jim Jones and Leon Hagerman each with 2 points. Also scoring was Jeff Beedy with 2

points on two free throws. Leading the scoring for the Rockets was Cliff Penmon, a 6'0" guard with 5 points followed by Ed Thomas with 4 points, Shane Tarver with 4 points. Also scoring for the Rockets was Jessie Davis with 2 points and Sammy Gonzales with one point.

In the second quarter the Wellington Skyrockets outscored the Lynx, 27-19 to take a 43-40 lead at the end of the second quarter. Leading the scoring for the Rockets was a 6'2" center Shane Tarver as he scored 9 points followed by Cliff Penmon with 6 points and Jessie Davis with 5 points. Also scoring for the Rockets were Sammy Gonzales with 3 points all on free throws and George Brewer with 2 points. Tony Martinez also scored for the Rockets with 2 points.

For the Spearman Lynx this quarter was nothing but trouble as Roger Jones was called for his fourth foul with 4:50 left in the quarter and the 6'3" All-Stater went to the bench with only 2 points in the quarter. With the leading scorer on the bench Zane Newton lead the Lynx in scoring with 5 points, followed

by David Steele with 4 points. Also scoring for the Lynx in the quarter was Randy Reid with 2 points in the quarter, Jim Jones with 3 points, Leon Hagerman with 2 points and Jeff Beedy with one point.

In the third quarter with the Lynx trailing by 3 points, the Lynx outscored the Rockets 22-13 to take a 62-56 lead at the end of the third quarter. Leading the Lynx in scoring was Roger Jones, as he came off the bench to score 10 points followed by Jim Jones and Randy Reid with 4 points apiece. Also scoring for the Lynx was David Steele and Jeff Beedy with 2 points apiece.

Leading the scoring for the Rockets was Shane Tarver with 7 points followed by Sammy Gonzales, Cliff Penmon and Jessie Davis each with 2 points apiece.

Leading by 6 points entering the fourth and final quarter, the Lynx were outscored by the Rockets 21-18 but the Lynx had enough lead and enough firepower to keep the Rockets from getting any closer and won the game 80-77. Leading the scoring for the Lynx was Zane Newton with 6 points with 2 of those points coming on a one-and-one with less than a minute remaining in the game. Also scoring for the Lynx was Randy Reid with 4 points, Leon Hagerman with 4 points and Roger Jones with 4 points. Jones did not get his first field goal until 2:13 were left in the game.

Leading the scoring for the Rockets was Ed Thomas with 11 points. Thomas who was the Rockets leading scorer was shut down to only 4 points entering the final quarter by the Spearman defense. Also scoring for the Rockets was Shane Tarver with 4 points, Jessie Davis with 3 points and Sherrill Winford with 3 points.

Free throws played a vital part in the win for the Lynx as they made 20-32 for 62.5% while the Rockets made 19 out of 33 for 57%. The game was close in statistic wise as the Lynx made one more field goal than the Rockets did, 30-29, shot one less free throw and made one more than the Rockets. The Lynx had 25 personal fouls while the Rockets had 23 personal.

There are 74 members in the local chapter. Advisors are Herman S. Boone and Burt Williams.

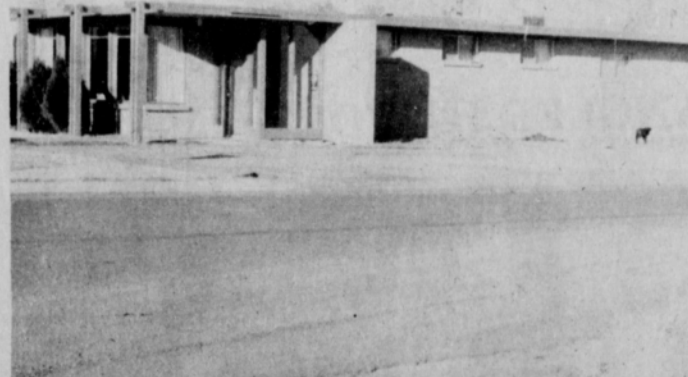

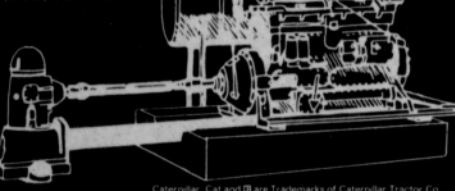

OBITUARY

Maude Valera Rosson was a member of the family of seven, the children of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Kirk, pioneers to this area from Comanche, Texas. The Kirks came by covered wagon in 1913. Mrs. Kirk drove a wagon and Maude, then eight years of age, took care of her brother C. W. (Jake); then two years of age, and her sister Olive (Babe) then three months. An older brother, Dyrel (Pete) assisted his father in the duties that went along with this mode of travel. Maude attended college at Goodwell, Oklahoma from 1922-1926 and taught the first grades at the Holt School the 1926-1927 term. Ceril Batton was a teacher at

the Holt School with Maude the same year. The Holt school was the largest school in Hutchinson County until 1926. Holt was never an accredited school. In 1935 the district dissolved and was consolidated with two districts, the Spearman Independent and the Pringle Independent District. Maude married Charles David Rosson August 14, 1926 at the country home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Kirk of the Holt Community. They settled on a farm near her parents where they resided their entire married life, and Maude continued to reside there to her death. Maude Valera Rosson was born Feb. 9, 1905 at Comanche, Texas and departed this life Feb. 2, 1976 at the Hi-Plains Baptist Hospital, Amarillo, Texas after a short illness. She was preceded in death by a brother and three sisters, her two children, Glenda Sue, age 12 in

Sept. 1952 and Lavonna Ann, age 1 year in May 1945, and her husband Charles David Rosson passed away Nov. 6, 1966. A sister, Mrs. O. K. Pendergraft and a brother C. W. Kirk still live in the Holt Community. Maude was a member of the First Baptist Church of Spearman. She taught Sunday School for years at the Holt School House. She sponsored a little girl, Dee Dotson, at the World Changers of Tulsa, Oklahoma to her death and left provisions to assist her through college. After the loss of her family and the death of her mother who passed away in 1962, who had required daily care for some time prior to her death, Maude was left with time on her hands and was grieving. Her Aunt, Mrs. Bertha Jenkins, managed to get her to join her on a tour through the East in 1964. That seemed to fill a void in her life and from that

time on she planned and took a tour each year finding she saw new scenery and met many new people. Maude loved people and people loved her. To know Maude was to love her. Every man, woman and child she met loved her and enjoyed her cheery disposition. Maude experienced many hardships but took it with a smile. Scot Martin In Calf Scramble

Scot Martin, 14 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Martin of Spearman, Texas will take part in the calf scramble at the 7:45 p.m., March 6 performance of the World's Championship Rodeo at the 1976 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

The calf scramble, a feature of the show since 1942, was started to allow 4-H and FFA boys an opportunity to get started in the beef or dairy cattle business. Winners at each of the rodeo performances receive certificates to buy registered females which they bring back for judging at the next year's livestock show.

Since its inception, more than \$1 million has been paid by the livestock show to youngsters to buy their animals.

Through the 1976 show, this will include expenditures for beef heifers amounting to \$606,125. This money went for 4,006 animals.

Of the 388 boys who compete this year, only half will be winners. The calf scramble is the fourth event at every rodeo performance. Twenty-four boys will take part in the beef scrambles, competing for 12 heifers and 28 boys will scramble for 14 dairy calves. Winners will receive \$275 certificates from sponsors in the Houston area.

The livestock show, which starts February 25, will be staged in the show's \$18 million, air-conditioned facility and rodeo performances will be held in the Astrodome, February 27 through March 7. Top professional cowboys from throughout the United States and Canada will be competing for the world's largest rodeo purse, over \$100,000. Rodeo audiences will also be treated to performances by these eight great stars in the field of musical entertainment: Freddy Fender and Tanya Tucker, February 27; Olivia Newton-John, February 28-29; Charley Pride, March 1-2; Rufus, featuring Chaka Khan, March 3; Glen Campbell, March 4-5; Charlie Rich, March 6 and Mac Davis, March 7.

Rho Chi members make the final selections from a list of all candidates who qualify.

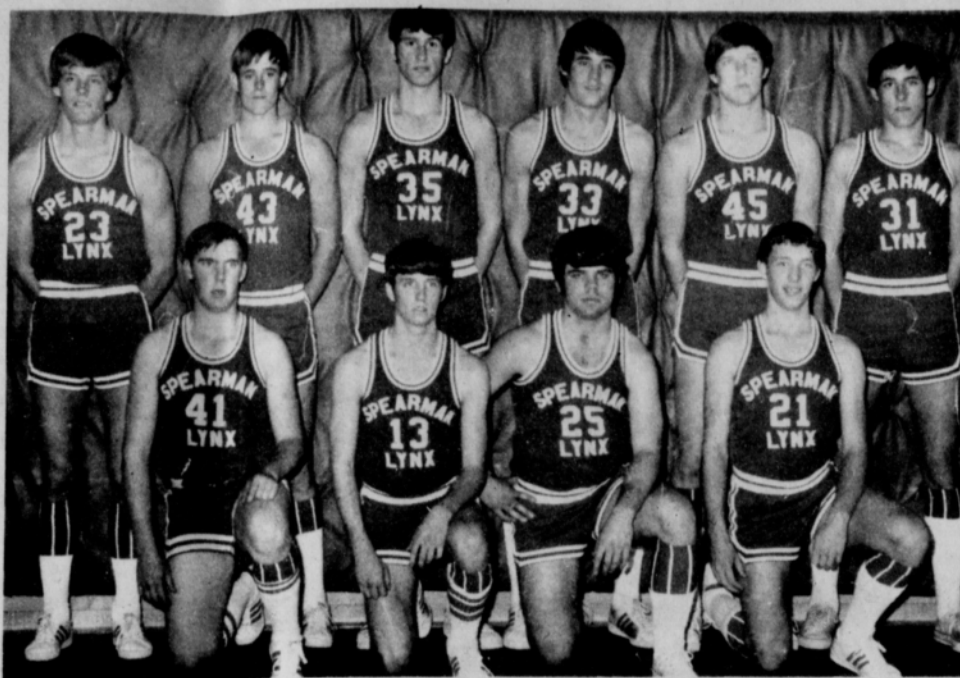

Postal Consumer Protection Week Designated

"The week of February 23-28 has been designated by Postmaster General Benjamin F. Ballar as Postal Consumer Protection Week to emphasize the importance of consumer protection and inform the public of its availability to users of the mail," Postmaster Ray Robertson said today.
"The Postal Service provides safeguards in the transportation of mail, against mail fraud and false representation, and provides assistance with mail-order and service problems," the Postmaster continued. "Our consumer protection program works through the Inspection Service, Consumer Protection Office of the Law Department, the Judicial Office and The Consumer Advocate."
Working together these four departments resolve complaints of alleged mail-order swindles when postal customers fail to receive merchandise ordered, refunds promised or find that the service or product purchased is not as advertised.

When a complaint is made, the Postal Service decides whether to investigate for possible commercial deception or to handle it informally as in cases where poor business practices are found to be the problem. Whatever the action, the customer is notified.

In cases where it is believed that false representation by mail exists, the Consumer Protection Office working with information obtained from postal inspectors initiates administrative proceedings to stop the mail in response to the alleged false representation.
If it is found following administrative proceedings that the mails are being used to promote schemes to obtain money by misrepresentation, the Judicial Officer issues a mail-stop
