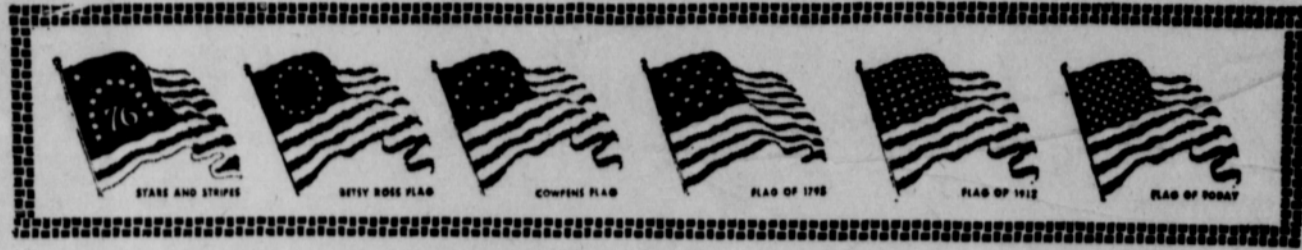

Baby Skunks Feared Rabied

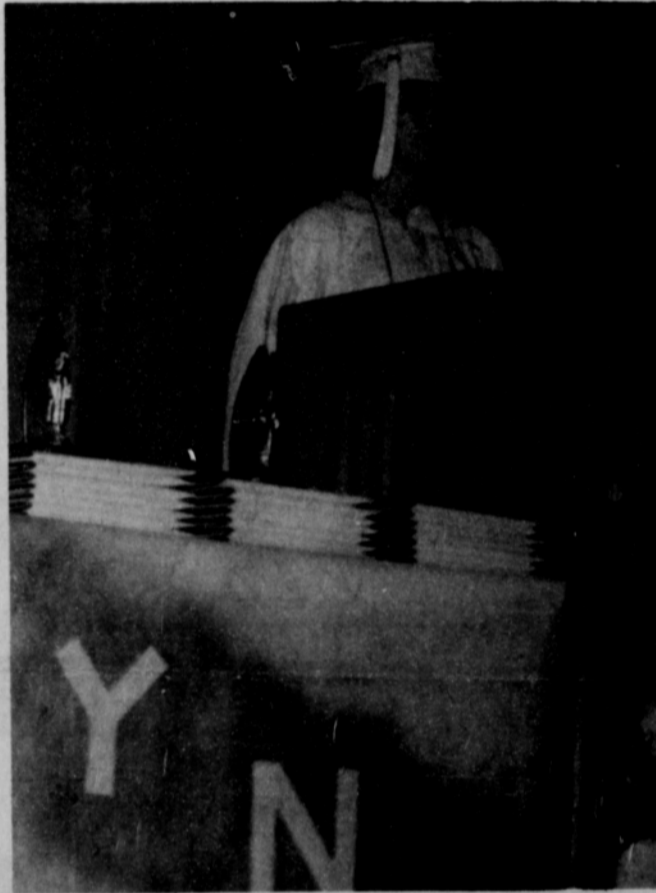
Numerous people may have to take rabies shots because of coming into contact with some baby skunks found here and taken to the zoo in Amarillo.

Sheriff J. B. Cooke said Saturday morning that the skunks were found southeast of Spearman after Sid Beck had shot and killed the mother skunk.

Ruby Schroeder found the skunks and brought them to Billy Pettitt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Pettitt, Cooke said.

Billy had one large pet skunk that has been inoculated against rabies. His parents let him keep two of the babies and the other three were taken to Amarillo where they were given to the Amarillo zoo.

One of the skunks died and was found to be rabied. The officials at the Amarillo Animal Shelter said that if one of the little skunks was rabied, then 99 chances out of 100, (Con't. on page 2.)

Mr. and Mrs. Simpson have two children.

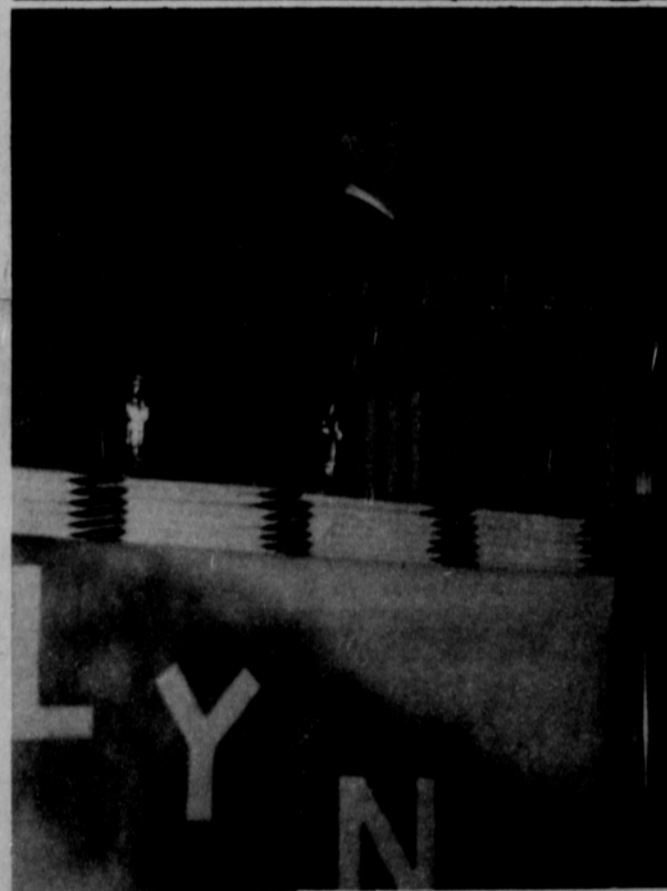
James (Jim) P. Allen has been hired as assistant football coach. He has been an assistant two years at Seagoville. He played for the University of Texas and has coached two years.

Salutatorian James Ownbey received a scholarship from any church related college in Texas.

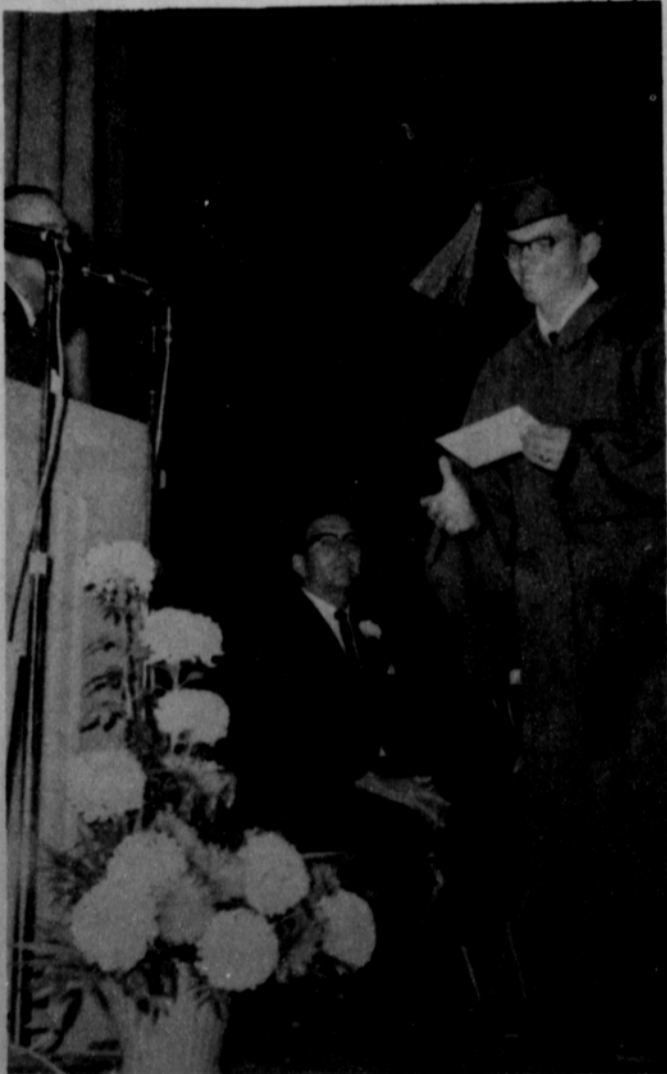
Kathi Pattison received a merit scholarship from Phillips University at Enid, Oklahoma. It is an \$800 scholarship.

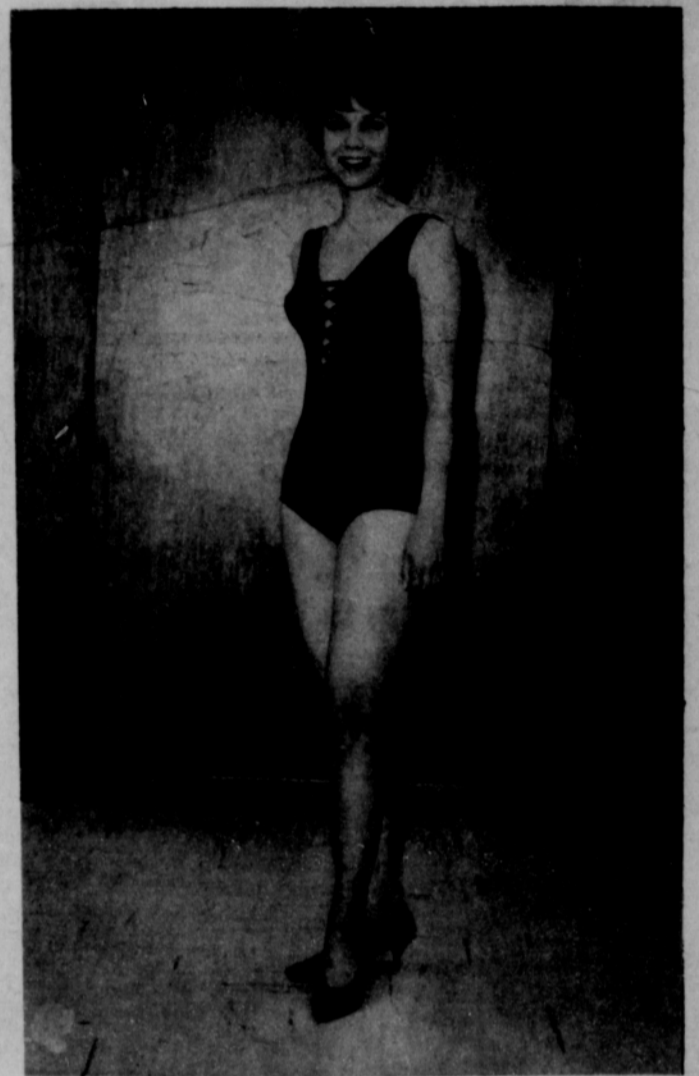

Judgement Counts In Water Code

AUSTIN — The fine print NOT in the new state water safety code may trick some water sports enthusiasts into hazardous areas, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The regulations spell out the more obvious equipment requirements, limitations on boat operation affecting skiers and swimmers, about sobriety, about boat licenses, transfer of ownership, lost or destroyed certificates and about reporting accidents.

There is generous detail about driver discipline and responsibility, about willful, wantonly reckless or negligent driving.

Also strong emphasis on such words as "reasonable" and "prudent" and about "hazardous wakes or wash."

And it's against regs to anchor a boat in the traveled portion of any river or channel. It's not legal to water ski later than one hour after sunset and earlier than one hour before sunrise.

But it's the unwritten law angles that may trip a lot of

water sports, as the Department see it. The statewide law does NOT forbid, for example, boat drivers sitting on the back of the seat, or on the side of the cockpit.

The state law does NOT forbid persons sitting on the forward end of the boat, or otherwise occupying areas such as cabin tops not designed for human occupancy.

The law does not stipulate distances between moving boats and permanent installations, such as docks and moving watercraft.

But the Department's files are beginning to bulge with the grim details of persons violating common sense precautions.

The files also reflect, from the last monthly arrest reports, that game wardens, now shar-

For Better Team

West Texas State University will field a better football team in the 1966 campaign than the one that compiled a 6-4 record last fall, according to a summary of the results of the spring training.

The Buffalos lost only seven starters and four of them will be trying for places on professional teams this fall.

Kerbel's fearsome defensive unit will return nine starters, but they will not have as much size as in past years. Also, Butch Walterscheid, the wild pass rusher, will be trying his hand at chasing professional passers this fall.

Kerbel has all three starting linebackers, Dave Gasser, and Burl and Earl Wood returning. There is depth behind them. He is three deep at the corner-back and safety positions.

Safety Steve Haterious will be attempting to stay in the top 10 nationally on punt returns. He was there most of the season until he was injured. He returned 21 punts for 260 yards and was just five yards shy of a school record.

Offensively the Buffalos should have more than three throws and a punt in their offensive play book this fall.

In the backfield there are four lettermen and three sophomores battling for two set-back positions. At the end of the spring training the sophomores Gene Morris and Albie Owens had put the lettermen on the bench.

In the offensive line there were five graduations, but Percy Green will be back to anchor the wall and Bobby Duncum has been moved from the defensive unit to guard with Green.

There are lettermen and strong junior college transfers to fill the other positions in the line.

Quarterback Hank Washington has within his reach school records for passes attempted, completed passes and yards gained rushing. He completed 119 passes last fall and ranked twelfth nationally passing.

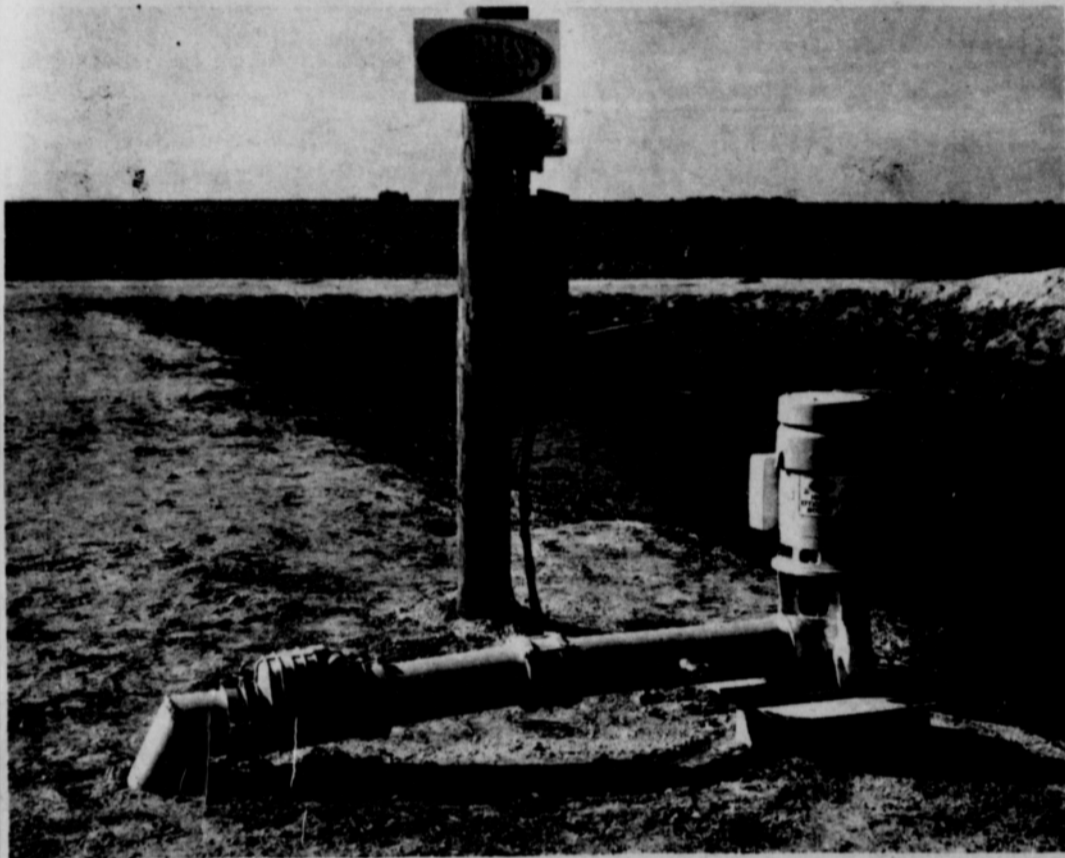
With stronger running backs and an improved line for protection he should have a great senior year.

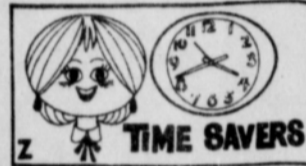

Closed Windows Mark Boom In Auto Air Conditioning

Four years ago, cooling units were being installed in one out of eight new cars. By next year, according to Changing Times, one car out of three will be air conditioned and eventually three out of four will be.

Improvements in air conditioners have been many and varied. The once cumbersome, heavy, inconvenient and trouble-laden cooler has been refined into a sleek, dependable package. The factory air unit is now barely noticeable, and "customized" hang-ons mount unobtrusively under the instrument panel.

Both factory air and hang-on have advantages and disadvantages, and they share some common traits. They burden the engine equally, slightly increasing fuel consumption. Both types still have their service weaknesses, main one being road and engine vibration, which can cause a leak in the pressurized system. But maintenance of the latest models generally won't amount to much more than a once-a-year check-up and refrigerant recharge.

The hang-on type is about \$100 cheaper, installed, than the cheapest factory integrated system. It can be switched from one car to another and usually can deliver cool air more quickly than an integrated system because it doesn't have several feet of ductwork to chill first. This also means that you can get more air blast and noise from a hang-on unit. Most factory integrated installations appear to do a better job of distributing cooled air throughout the passenger compartment.

Since the hang-ons have to be bolted to the underside of the instrument panel or to the floor, they take up front seat foot room. Factory air, designed into the car's body, is neater, less in the way, quieter, and if combined with the heating system, has filtering and dehumidifying advantages he year around. Technical improvements in both types have promoted better warranties, and when a warranty expires, a service contract can be obtained to cover parts and labor costs.

WHAT TO DO DURING A TORNADO!

■ THE ROAR is deafening. It sounds like hundreds of airplanes flying overhead at once. You look into the sky and what you see scares you as much as if there really were hundreds of planes—enemy planes—above you.

A dark funnel cloud is sweeping along between 25 and 40 miles an hour, bursting buildings, scooping up trees and hurling autos about like toys.

This is a tornado. But if you use your head, you have a good chance of escaping unharmed.

Each year about 200 tornadoes rip across sections of the United States killing more than 200 persons. In the last 50 years every state, including Alaska and Hawaii, has been struck by destructive funnel clouds.

Few twisters occur west of the Rocky Mountains, but Iowa, Kansas, Mississippi, Texas, and Oklahoma have more than a fair share.

Weathermen can't pinpoint where a tornado will occur, but they can and do issue warnings of possible tornadoes, sometimes hours in advance.

Even if you don't hear about a tornado warning, these twisters have certain "habits" that indicate when and where to watch for them. For one thing, most tornadoes occur between 3 and 6 p. m. For another, they usually accompany thunderstorms, especially

hailstorms. And invariably, they travel from the southwest to the northeast.

If you are inside your home when a tornado occurs, open all windows and doors and shut off water, gas and electricity, if you have time. Then seek shelter under a heavy table or other furniture in the basement against the southwest corner

walls. If you have no basement, lie on the first floor against an inner wall.

If you are in your car, you might be able to outrun a twister. Since winds on the left side of a tornado generally are not as strong as those on the right, drive toward the left of the tornado at right angles with the tornado.

If you can't outrun it, seek shelter in a nearby building or lie flat in a ditch if you have to. Don't remain in a car which can be picked up and crushed.

If you have a choice of shelters, select the bottom floor of a steel framed or reinforced concrete building. Large open structures such as churches and halls, won't provide much protection. Of course, a storm cellar, cave or some other underground excavation, offers the best protection.

The path of a tornado usually is relatively small, about 10 to 40 miles long and only 300 to 400 feet wide. So, if you act immediately and sensibly, you may be able to save yourself.

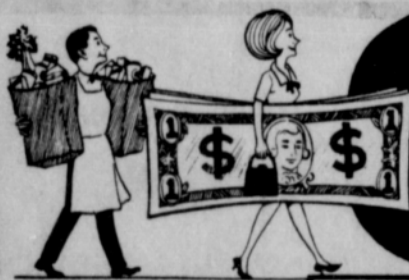

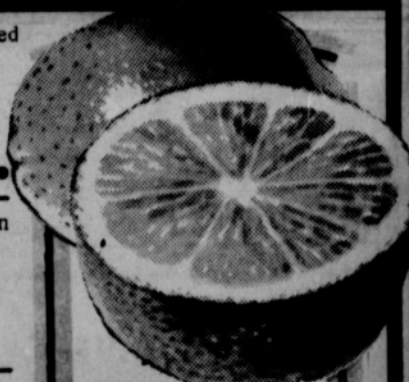
