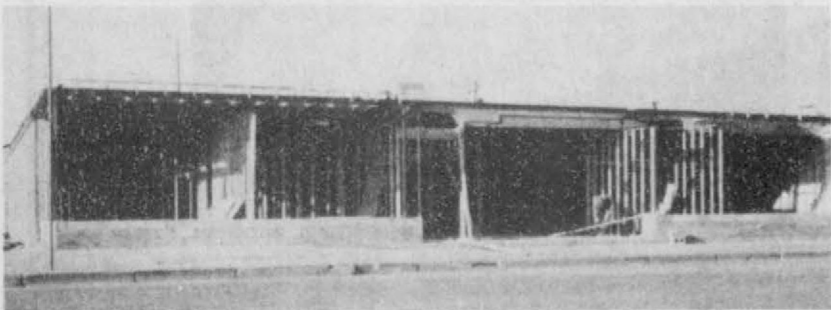

Remodeling underway on Brock building

The remodeling of the old building has included complete removal of the old interior, changing entrances, removal of the old roof, closing up of windows, and will be like a new building for downtown Spearman.

This will certainly enhance our downtown area and everyone is watching with interest the work being done to make this new office for Brock's.

USDA extends farm program deadline

Agriculture Secretary John Block Saturday, Feb. 18, extended by three weeks the deadline for farmers to join the 1984 USDA programs.

The announcement of details was released shortly before 5 p.m. Tuesday.

The USDA is lifting a controversial requirement that would require both wheat and skip-row farmers to plant cover crops on land idled as part of the 1984 farm programs. Mayfield said they would be allowed to use tillage operations as an alternative to cover crops.

The news was a victory for area farmers who had lobbied intensively during the last three weeks with USDA leaders for a change in the cover-crop rule, a rule they said could prove costly and detrimental to water conservation on farm land.

The combination of the new cover-crop rules and the extension until March 16 of a sign-up deadline apparently has stirred interest among local farmers, as county ASCS offices were busy with calls Tuesday.

About half of the farmers in Hansford County had made their intentions known to the local ASCS office, said Keith Martin, ASCS director. He did not have any statement as to whether or not they were signing up or declining to participate. He expected to be extremely busy the last few days before the deadline was extended.

Texas ASCS director Wayne Mayfield, said less than 30 percent of all wheat-state farmers had agreed by last Friday to join the 1984 wheat-crop rules as the two regulations that needed to be changed to stimulate increased participation.

A third major item opposed by wheat producers, to extend haying and grazing time on PIK acres, was turned down by Block. There also was no change in the \$50,000 limit on farm program payments.

1983 bond sales reported

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds in Texas during 1983 were \$263,956,322, an increase of 22.7% over the same period a year ago. T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, Texas, announced today. These sales represent 117.5% of the state's 1983 assigned dollar goal of \$224,700,000.

In Hansford County, sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$44,512.00 during 1983. C.A. Gibner, Volunteer County Chairman, said. This year's sales represent 59% of the County's 1983 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, 1983 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$3,897 million, an increase of almost 20% over 1982 sales, representing 111.3% of the nation's \$3.5 billion goal. December 1983 sales amounted to \$326 million, the highest sales for the month since 1979. Redemptions for the month were 10% below last year, and the lowest for any December since 1983. Savings Bonds held by the public amounted to \$71.48 billion as of Dec. 31, 1983. Increase in the amount outstanding in 1983 was \$3.1 billion.



Mail fraud verdict issued

Postal Inspectors in Charge D.C. Strader, Fort Worth, and John J. Slavinski, Houston, along with Edward C. Prado, U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Texas, have announced that on Friday, Feb. 17, 1984, A.L. Chavis and Lambert Daniel Slisz were convicted in Federal Court in San Antonio in connection with using the mails to operate numerous nationwide work-at-home schemes which grossed the promoters approximately 7.5 million dollars during the past five years.

Chavis was convicted on 19 counts of mail fraud and Slisz was convicted on 7 counts of mail fraud. The verdict concluded a trial which lasted six weeks.

Both men are currently in custody in lieu of bail. U.S. District Judge D.W. Suttle set bond at \$100,000 cash or corporate surety for Chavis and \$25,000 cash or corporate surety for Slisz.

The work-at-home promotions, which generated thousands of complaints to postal inspectors, Better Business Bureaus, and media consumer reporters nationwide, were operated by Chavis under several different business names.

Starting in 1979, Chavis and Slisz together operated Home-worker Job Opportunities and later the American Fidelity Company (AMFICO). Both of these promotions were operated out of New Braunfels, Tx. They also operated the Keystone Homemaker Program using a San Antonio address.

In addition to operating HJO, AMFICO, and Keystone with Slisz, Chavis also operated other work-at-home promotions under the following names:

American Association of Home Income Programs (AAHIP)
San Antonio, Tx
The American Home Income Association (AHIA)
San Antonio and Boerne, Tx.
Bond Industries/CCP (Bond)
Kendalia, Tx.
Financial Advisors Services
San Antonio, Tx.
Consolidated Industries
San Antonio, Tx.

Promotions operated by Chavis and Slisz have been the subject of civil actions taken by the U.S. Postal Service in the past. In 1980, False Representation Orders were issued against AAHIP, FAS, and Consolidated Reliance Agency, San Antonio, Tx. HJO was the subject of an FRO in February, 1981. Tri-Co, Boerne, Tx., which was operated by Chavis, was discontinued by an FRO in March, 1981. In March and October, 1982, FROs were issued against AHIA and Bond.

False representation orders are civil actions which forbid the postmasters at the offices of address from delivering mail to the addressees. They are issued after presentation of evidence to an administrative law judge which indicates false representations are being made to induce victims to send money through the mail to order products, programs or services.

The government's case during the lengthy trial was presented by Assistant U.S. Attorneys Mitch Weidenbach and R. Michael Duffey. Judge Suttle will sentence the two men on March 19. Slisz faces a maximum penalty of up to 35 years in prison and/or a fine of up to \$7,000. Chavis faces a maximum prison sentence of 95 years and/or a maximum fine of up to \$19,000.

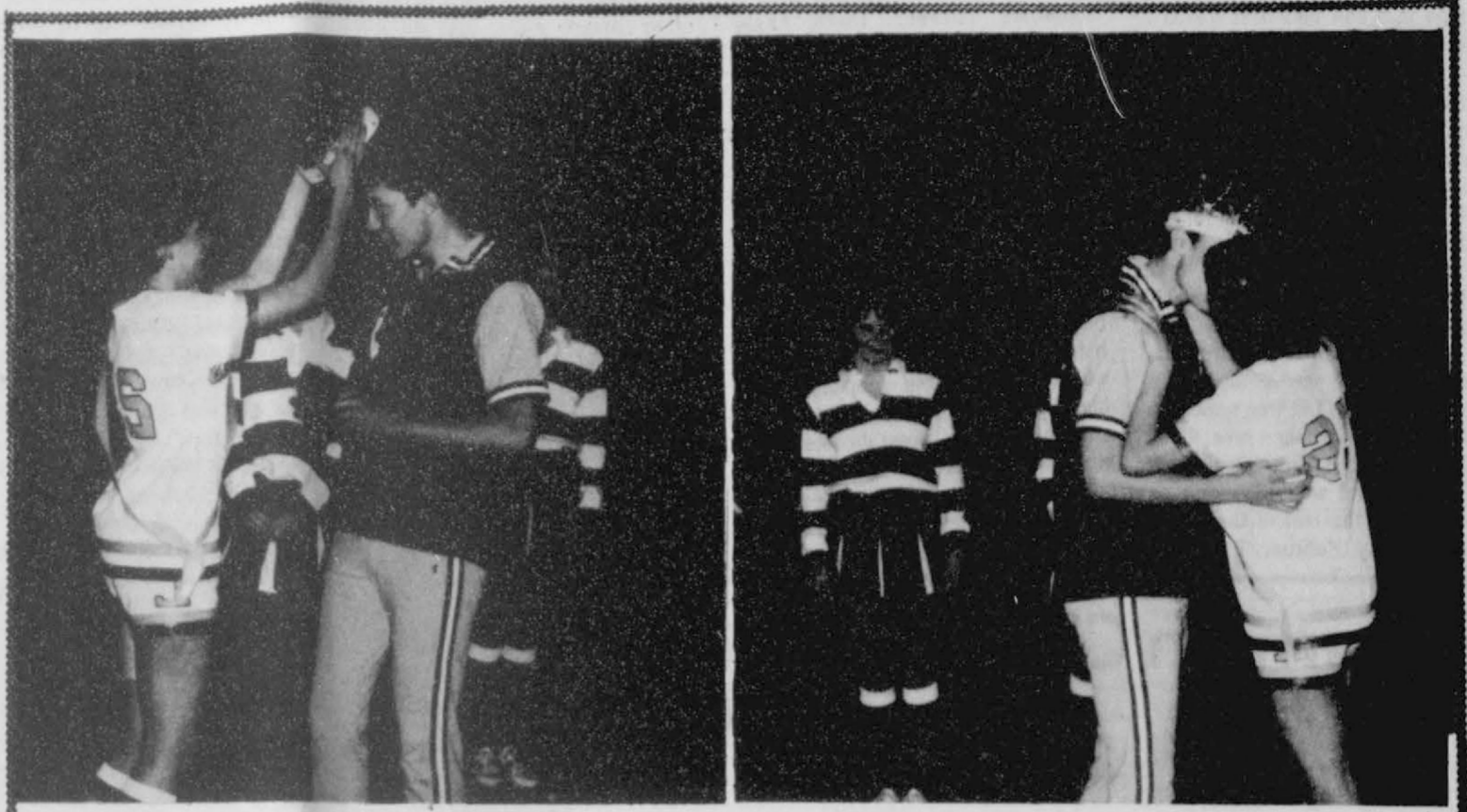

As far as we can tell

On Saturday, February 18, 1984, at approximately 7:24 PM, an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to a prowler report. 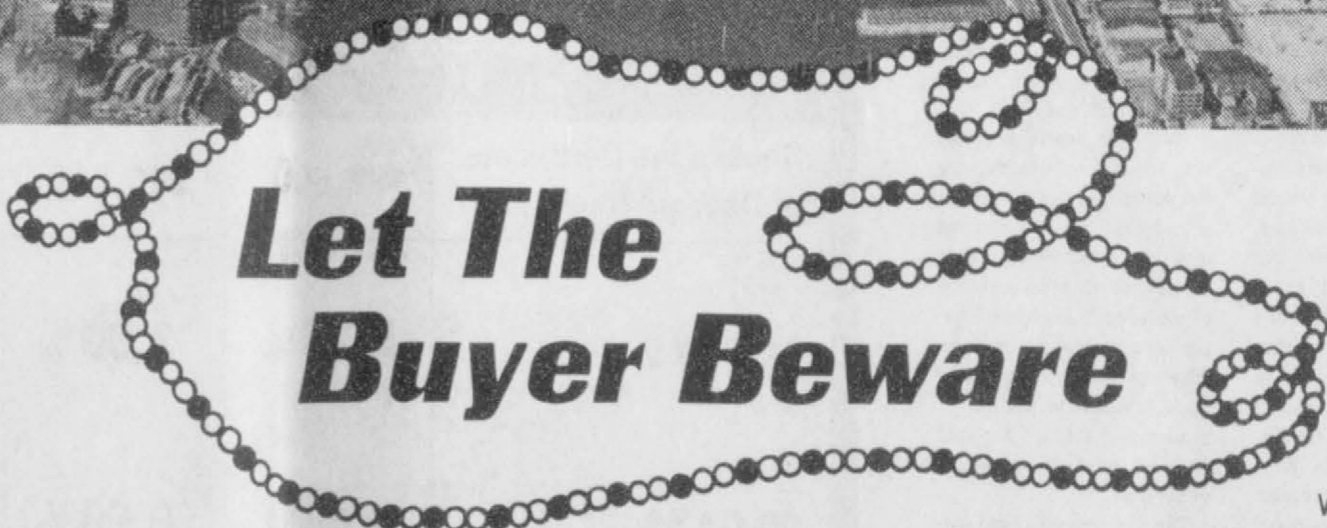

Cancer Society services available

The American Cancer Society in Hansford County announced today that it has a variety of services available to cancer patients without charge.

"Many people are unaware of all the services we can provide right here in this town," said Clementine Renner, service Rehabilitation Chairman. "And all that is required in most cases is written permission from the patient's physician."

Loan equipment such as hospital beds, wheel chairs, commode chairs and walkers are available as well as expendable items including dressings, hospital gowns, bed pads, pillows and other items.

"These are all in addition to our basic information and referral services," said Mrs. Renner. "And, depending on location, we also have several rehabilitation programs including Reach To Recovery for mastectomees, esophageal speech lessons for laryngectomees, ostomy rehabilitation and related patient and family support groups."

The concept for these rehabilitation programs is the volunteer-to-pa-

tient relationship," added Renner. "We have many volunteers who are themselves former patients and who are specifically trained by the Society to help other patients and even their families adjust to living with cancer."

Mrs. Renner cited that when most people think of the American Cancer Society, they relate to cancer research. "While it is true the ACS funds millions of dollars for cancer research, we are also a community-based organization providing many local services. These patient services as well as education materials of all types are just a few of the ways we can help."

"Since September, an estimated \$1,054.00 worth of services to patients has been utilized in this town already this year, but even more could be done if more patients were referred to us," added Mrs. Renner.
