Veterans Day 1977

An impressive Veteran's Day Program was held at the Varsity gym, at 10 a.m., Friday November 11th, 1977. The flag ceremony was in charge of the Boy Scout Troop No. 551, one of the finest groups in the state. This included the Pledge of Allegiance, and pledge to the Texas Flag, "Honor to the Texas Flag, I pledge allegiance to thee Texas, one and indivisible."

The National Anthem was played by Vick Kyler's fine Spearman High School band, and it was excellent. The color guard was at attention during the ceremony, and dismissed after the playing of the National Anthem.

Welcome was given by Gwen Younger, president of the Home Demonstration Council. "The Unknown Soldier" was given by Dena Baker, Jr. High student. "You're a Grand Old Flag" and "Colonel John" was played by the very excellent Jr. High band.

"Democracy's Mural" was given by Kelly Davis, high school student.

Highlighting the program was a "Patriotic Medley" by Mary Brock and Debra Brock. Introduction of Veterans was by James Cunningham. The benediction was given by Rev. Russell Pogue, of the First Baptist Church. The closing ceremony was "Taps!"

ing into the streets in the big cities and little hamlets—laughing, crying, shouting, talking and flag waving for World War I was at an end! The armistice went into effect at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918 to still the boom of the cannon and to bring our "boys" home from Europe.

Time marches on and fifty nine years later, a dismal silence and little activity awaits many who once commemorated this day as a tribute to our honored war dead—Armistice Day is now Veteran's Day by dint of a bill passed by Congress in 1954 changing this day, which was first observed in 1918 to Veteran's Day honoring all servicemen and service women who have served America. Yet another change has taken place in the fifty nine years for the date of Armistice Day has, as is the wont of many these days, been changed to a Monday in October with many observing that date and others clinging tenaciously to the November 11th date. (Next year, we understand, all will be almost back to normal with a universal observance of the 11th November date.)

However, regardless of the date, the time, or the name, the meaning cannot be changed and the significance of the day indicates that our nation does remember our war heroes and reminds us that the world has really not found a lasting peace as yet—admitting to each of us that one of the greatest tasks of ours is to instill good-will and peace not only in our own nation but throughout the world.

Our obligations to these honored dead are vividly brought to mind in the words of the well-known poem written by a young Canadian soldier, John McCrea who gave his life in World War I.

In Flander's Field
In Flanders Field the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row
That mark our place; and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flander's Field.
Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from falling hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep though poppies grow
In Flander's Field.

America's Answer
Rest ye in peace, ye Flanders dead
The fight that ye so bravely led
We've taken up. And we will keep
True faith with you who lie asleep
With each a cross to mark his bed,
And poppies blowing overhead
Where once his own lifeblood ran red,
So, let your rest be sweet and deep
In Flander's Field.
Fear not that ye have died for naught,
The torch ye threw to us we caught;
Ten million hands will hold it high
And Freedom's light will never die.
We learned the lesson that ye taught
Ye Flander's Dead!
November 11, 1977—Veterans' Day—the name and date are not important—the pledge of our faith to the future is!



Simpson, Price Lead

Former U.S. Rep. Bob Price of Pampa with 218 of the 730 total votes cast won in the Hansford County voting in the special election Tuesday, Nov. 8, to pick a new state senator for the 31st District, according to the official canvass of votes conducted Friday, Nov. 11, by the Board of County Commissioners.

In second place in the balloting was Jim Brandon with 154 votes while Burk Whittenburg garnered 149 votes to come in third. Mel Phillips, Jr., with 108 votes was in fourth position and Bob Simpson was fifth with 101 votes.

Price won in four of the nine precincts and tied with Brandon in Precinct 3. In Precinct 1, Price had 53 votes to 50 votes for Whittenburg, in Precinct 3, Price and Brandon each got 22 votes with Simpson tallying 15. Price received 58 votes in Precinct 4 with Brandon his nearest competitor with 49 votes. With 46 votes in Precinct 6, Price led Whittenburg who received 33

The mighty Purple Machine ended their regular season play with a perfect record, defeating the Canadian Wildcats 51-20 here Friday night.

The Lynx received the opening kick-off and started fast and furious. They went sixty yards in five plays capping off a successful drive on a 2 yard touchdown run by Billy Sellers with less than two minutes gone from the game clock.

Canadian took the kick-off and managed only one first down before having to punt the ball back to Spearman. On defense the "Purple Gang" was it's usually tough self.

The Lynx showed that awesome offensive power again driving the ball downfield in nine plays. Newton scored the TD on a six yard run with six minutes and ten seconds left in the first stanza. The PAT kick was no good leaving the score in Spearman's favor 13-0.

The Lynx were again superb with their defense forcing Canadian to punt the ball back.

The Lynx weren't finished. In just four plays they took the ball downfield capping it off with a 22 yard scoring run by Tommy

Barber. Three and a half minutes remained in the first quarter. The Lynx set up to run the ball for the two point conversion. Sellers took it in with an outstanding second effort after being hit two yards out. That made Lynx 21-Wildcats 0.

The Lynx fumbled on their next series, but our defense held Canadian yet another time. The Canadian punter backed up to send the ball downfield having trouble handling the center snap. It gave Twane Friemel just enough time to tackle the punter where the Lynx took the ball on Canadian's 44 yard line. In 7 plays the Lynx took the ball downfield again for the score. It was Newton this time running 10 yards into the end zone. The Lynx scored on the two point conversion with the half-back pass to Scott Martin making the score 29-0 in the Lynx' favor.

Canadian could not move the ball once again and punted to Spearman. Sellers took the punt returning it to the end zone, only to have it called back on a penalty. Two plays later Reid tossed a 37 yard pass to Newton coming out of the back field who

made a tremendous effort to keep the ball, setting up another TD. The scoring run was by Sam Boone going three yards into the end zone. Jed Miesner's kick was good for the extra point.

The Lynx scored again on a 64 yard pass play from Franklin to Whitaker. Jed Miesner added the extra point.

The Wildcats finally managed to get into the end zone late in the 3rd quarter. The PAT attempt failed again.

Canadian scored again on a 49 yard run. The PAT attempt failed again.

Billy Snider scored another Spearman TD on a 23 yard run. Chris Bodey tackled on two extra points on the run.

Canadian scored the last touchdown of the game on a 28 yard run. The PAT pass was good winding it up with a Lynx victory 51-20. The Lynx will meet Childress for the third year in a row for the bi-district contest.

Both Little Lynx Teams Win

Thursday night's game with Canadian Kittens marked the last game that the 7th graders would play as 7th graders and the last junior high game that the 8th graders would play. Both teams turned in commendable efforts.

The 7th graders opened the action. The 7th grade Lynx took the ball and marched the length of the field. Goodheart capped off the drive with a 3 yard TD run. Rocky Randall ran across for the two extra points giving Spearman an early lead.

In the middle of the second quarter Quimby started gyrating bringing loose for a 42 yard gain that set up his own 3 yard TD run. Quimby added the two points on the run making it Spearman 16, Canadian 0.

Neither team could do much in the third quarter, but early in the last stanza Quimby scored again on a 6 yard gallop. An Underwood to Goodheart pass combination was good and accounted for two more extra points. Good heart recovered a fumble later in the same quarter setting up another Spearman scoring drive. With 1:11 left on the game clock Ricky Torres scored a touchdown with a 25 yard run from scrimmage. The run for the extra point failed.

The final score showed the 7th grade Lynx 30, Canadian's 7th grade 0. The victory made Jim Bob Brown's first coaching season a winning year.

Such a 7th grade performance would be hard to beat but William's 8th graders hit the field ready for the 8th Grade Kittens for the second time this season.

Alex Olivarez recovered a

Canadian tumble early in the first quarter. Seconds later Chuck Rigdon looked like he would duplicate last week's performance with a 15 yard TD gallop. The extra point attempt failed.

Later in the first quarter it looked like an instant replay only that time it was Jeff Lackey who fell on a Canadian fumble. Spearman's next score was also added by Chuck Rigdon who broke loose and took off on a 75 yard run that ended in the end zone. The PAT attempt failed.

Later in the middle of the second period Spearman's eighth graders added another TD with a George to Rigdon pass combination which was good for 30 yards and the six points. That PAT attempt also failed. The half-time score was 18-0 in Spearman's favor.

Rigdon duplicated last Thursday's performance with another touchdown run, which was good for 50 yards and the TD.

Canadian put six points on the board seconds later returning the kick-off on a razzle-dazzle handoff play that was good for 65 yards.

Spearman wasn't finished, though. Monte George came back with a 48 yard pass to Stan Sherwood which Stan took into the end zone. Brack added the two points.

Canadian scored late in the final quarter on a 31 yard pass play. Their extra point try failed giving the Spearman 8th graders a 32-12 victory and giving Windy Williams an undefeated season.

Effort Needed To Attract Physicians

A concerted community effort to attract physicians to Spearman and Hansford County was the conclusion reached during discussion of such recruitment during the regular monthly meeting Thursday, Nov. 10, of the board of directors of Hansford County Hospital held in the hospital library.

Hospital administrator Jerry Taylor reported he had made some contacts, in following the recommendation of the board at the last regular meeting during which action was authorized, and had received some suggestions regarding attracting physicians to this region. The ideas and suggestions were contained in information distributed to board members during the meeting this past week.

In reporting on purchases recently authorized by the board, it was reported that an anesthesia machine and an infusion pump were on order and expected to arrive at any time.

In new business, the board authorized the purchase of a bilirubinometer to be used in blood testing procedures for infants within a few days of birth to determine the amount of bilirubin.

In other activity, the board approved as read the minutes of the last meeting and payment of bills as reflected in the financial report for the month.

Old business included discussion of interior work at the hospital with Taylor authorized to accept bids for such work, the status of painting work at the hospital and work on the isolated circuit transformer.

Dear Director:

We join with wheat growers of the High Plains in urging the removal by you of the regulation that would prohibit wheat producers from using set-aside acres for livestock grazing.

The climate and topography of the High Plains are such that cultivated acres that are made idle--diverted from crops--need to be planted in a cover crop. Wheat is the logical cover; but wheat growers cannot afford to plant acres unless they can utilize them for winter-spring grazing.

This is the way of farming on the High Plains, a region that takes in large parts of Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado and Kansas. Winter wheat controls wind erosion of cultivated acres, and is vital.

This special regulation will drive Plains wheat growers out of the set-aside program, and cripple a key part of the Farm Bill. Surely, this is not the intent of Congress.

We urgently ask that this provision, as outlined in the Federal Register on Oct. 14, be removed, and that livestock grazing be allowed on diverted wheat acres. Your consideration and cooperation are appreciated.

8-inch Rain!

Would you like to have an 8-inch rain? I saw one this week as I attended the Texas Plant Food Institute Convention in McAllen, Texas.

The valley was beautiful. The citrus was almost ready for harvest, sugar cane was still in the field and palm trees lined the city. The farming techniques were also very interesting. For example, beans are planted in March and again in August. The celery crop requires 200 pounds of nitrogen and is fertilized better than our corn crops.

TPI put together a very educational lecture panel. Sarah Weddington, chief council to the administration, discussed the new farm program. State Rep. Joe Hubanak, chairman of the committee on Agriculture and Livestock, spoke on various stages of agriculture and the bureaucracy effect. Other speakers spoke on soil sampling, facts on Follan Fertilization, and TVA's presentation on the latest development in farming and fertilization.

Dr. Larry Miller, a former college professor and presently a life insurance researcher, spoke on proposed tax law changes. According to Dr. Miller these changes will double tax much of our income. Also these laws will make it more difficult to keep family farmers due to inheritance tax.

Fondue Pot Perils

One of the most dangerous cooking fads to come to the entertaining scene today is fondue pot cooking. Basically it is dipping meat into an open pot of hot oil or molten cheese. It's elements of hot oil and open flame are burn accidents waiting to happen. Although fondue cooking adds a touch of ceremony, it also adds a touch of danger. Here are a few recommendations from the National Safety Council for the safe use of a fondue pot. Place an electric fondue pot close to an outlet so no one will trip over the cord and upset the pot. Never completely fill an alcohol burner. Alcohol, expanding with heat, can overflow and set fire to table covering. Reduce spattering when cooking meat by adding a teaspoon of salt to the meat dry before adding to the pot. Ignore recipes telling you that oil is ready when it bubbles. It could smoke and blaze before that. Test with a piece of meat.
