Irrigation Farmers To Organize

Hansford County Irrigation Farmers should not take their natural gas for granted. It is not guaranteed, and its availability and price are suject solely to the whim & pressures applied to government bur-caucrats and gas company

Directors of the North Plains Energy Consumers Associa-tion met in Spearman Thurs-day at the Hansford County Library. The purpose of the meeting was to solidify the organization and to emphasize its objectives, which are to guarantee the Priority 2 status for natural gas irrigation far-mers in the northern ten counties of the Texas Panhan-

counties of the Texas Panhandle, and to make the gas available to farmers at a reasonable price.

During the meeting, President, Jim Dowty, and Association attorney, Mike Meredity, stressed that at the present time irrigation gas is specifically excluded from regulation by the Texas Railroad Commission. There are no regulations on natural gas for irrigation purposes, it is regulated only by the gas suppliers consciences.

The El Paso Decision, which many farmers have thought guarnateed irrigation gas on a guarnateed irrigation gas on a Priority 2 basis, is not a blanket guarantee. The Prior-ity 2 designation was given on the basis of Extraordinary Situation Status only to El Paso customers. It does not guarantee Hansford County

high as Hansford County far-mers are currently paying. Texas farmers are now subsid-izing users in other states. In the latest hearing before the Texas Railroad Commiss-ion, gas companies offered testimony that new gas is being purchased for \$1.92 per TCF. They estimate that with-in 8 months to a year they will need to charge \$2.00 per TCF. North Plains Energy Con-sumers Association favors in-trastate rgulation of irrigation gas and derugulation of inter-state gas. This association will

attempt to get irigation gas under the jurisdiction of one of the existing regulatory agencies during the next session of the Texas State Legislature. The deregulation of interstate gas would help stop the Texas gas consumers' subsidy of the interstate users.

Thus far, the Association has spent the majority of its efforts on hearings before the Texas Railroad Commissin and in aiding in battles such as the El Paso Decision. It is trying to organize the only representation the irrigation farmer will have on the local, state, and national levels.

We are living in a place and time where a Washington Bureaucrat recently asked. "Why does a farmer need to heat the water before he puts it on the field?" This is merely one incident emphasizing the urgency of representation on all levels of government. The farmer needs a voice to clarify the necessity of natural gas to the agricultural consumer and

the necessity of natural gas to the agricultural consumer and to inform and educate nonagricultural citizens and government employees of the farmer's plight.

There will be an effort to organize hansford County farmers in the near future. Hopefully, concerned Hansford County residents will support this effort and our local organization will develop into a strong and versatile voice for irrigation farmer.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976**

PUBLIC NOTICE

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to pro-vide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas vater development additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

ment purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions two-thirds of the legis-lature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitu-tion; and repealing Sec-tions 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

(H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amend."

"A constitutional amend-ment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Develop-ment Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."
