Rainfall Tops 20 Inches


More rain fell on Hansford County Friday night to cool a hot Friday which had dried out



Monday Will Be Partial Holiday

Monday will be only a partial holiday in Spearman in observance of July 4, which is Sunday.

The Post Office, all county and city offices and businesses not related to harvest are planning to close.

The grocery stores, farm related businesses and service stations will be open. The bank will also be open for business; since it is normally closed on Saturday, it does not close on Monday for Sun-

day holidays. With the Post Office closed, there will be no city or rural mail deliveries.

Research Seeks To Increase Yields

Farmers the world over are looking for ways to make higher yields in crops, and at the same time, cut the cost. The High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway, Texas, has been working on a system to help solve this problem. In 1958, the Foundation began research in what was

gan research in what was called "skip-row interplanting" now known as High Plains Foundation Farming System. This method of planting two rows of cotton, skip one row and plant two rows of another crop, not only boosts yields and quality of crops but also cuts water needs by 50 percent.


One 160-acre field of skiprow interplanted cotton and grain sorghum, required only 7 (seven) days to irrigate. Formerly, this same field planted in the conventional method took 21 (twenty-one) days to irrigate. Reason? In the High Plains Foundation Farming System (skip-row interplanted) pioneered by the Foundation, only the rows planted are irrigated. In this method, irrigation water is allowed to run between the planted rows.

Water conservation is not the only advantage of this system of farming. Yields are boosted in both of the crops grown as is the quality. The yield increase of the crops by far offset having one blank row every third row.

Foundation personnel have found through research that these are some of the advantages of skip-row interplanting: (1) raise production significantly, and therefore, farm income; (2) conserve irrigation water and speed irrigation; (3) lower production costs; (4) make the best possible use of available crop land; (5) improve cotton qualify; (6) maintain organic matter level of the soil; and (7) reduce wind and sand damage to seedling cotton.

duce wind and sand damage to seedling cotton. The grain sorghum and other crops interplanted with cotton help to cut down on the wind action blowing around the cotton. This, along with the blank row, helps to keep the soil temperature up for better cotton fiber development.

Tax Lowered on Grain Sorghum

Effective July 1, 1965, the tax placed on U.S. Grain Sorghum imported into Italy was dropped by \$8.50 per ton establishing a threshold price for grain sorghum at \$60.80

per ton as compared to \$69.30 last year and to corn at \$64,80 per ton. The announcement was made official this week by the Italian Minister of Agri-

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



u. S. producers of grain sorghum markets. U. S. producers of grain sorghum produce and sell grain sorghum at about 10% less price than corn. The previous bigh dury in the previous high duty in Italy had made the price of grain sorghum there \$4.50 per ton higher than corn and the new price maintains only a 6.19% price spread between the two grains removing some of the price advantage for sorghum which still will not give it full access to the fast expanding Italian feed grain market.

Nelson pointed out that while this encouraging an-nouncement was made during his visit to Italy, that it would not have been possible without continuing efforts over the past by GSPA's re-presentative through the U.S. Feed Grains Council in Rome Dr. Romano Graziani and the office of the U.
