Adjustment

Divorce particularly has brought many changes in the American family. Research in the last few years suggests most children are able to cope with the divorce of their parents, and within a couple of years, to resume normal development.

"The adjustment to a re-marriage is much easier for a child than the adjustment to a divorce," he said. "For one thing, remarriage brings in a male income, and that by itself is a great boon to the family fortunes."

In his most recent study of grandparents and their grandchildren after divorce often can be much stronger and deeper than is the typical relationship.

"During normal times, grandparents are content to sit back and enjoy their grandchildren as pals and loving companions. But when a family crisis such as divorce, serious illness, or long-term unemployment arises, grandparents

do step in quite quickly play a very important role.

"What divorce does is kind of recreate the more fragile circumstances family which exchanges support and works together," said the researcher.

Another drastic change in the family is that after a remarriage the family is no longer confined to one household. In the case of step-families, the family can extend over two or three households, pointed out the Johns Hopkins University professor.

Crime, drug abuse, sexual licen.. contempt for society — on all counts the 'tuation is worse, not better. Why do we no longer hear much about juvenile and parental delinquency?

First, the more common evil becomes, the less it is called *delinquency*. Lower standards enough and there are no delinquents!

Second, it wasn't juvenile or parental delinquency that caused our plight. It was *spiritual delinquency*. Millions in our society set their spiritual standards at a level where such delinquency became custom.

The thing to do with an opinion like this is to REVERSE it. That can be done by a Higher Court — such as an *aroused* citizenry, seeking every spiritual opportunity and fulfilling every religious responsibility that its churches provide and teach.

What a wonderful, wonderful program Janie Kunselman and her committee; Rubyjo Wilbanks, Carol Pack, Barbara Cluck, Mary Rae Lamb, Joyce Johnson, Virginia Head, Jan Stedje, Ruth Shaver, James and Lometa Sparks, Donetta Greene, Albert Graves, Mary Brock, Laura Mackie, and Karen Babitzke put together. Joe T. Venneman, master of ceremonies, stood at the podium with the state seal of Texas hanging on the front of it. Joyce Johnson painted this seal. Martin Foster of the First Christian Church in Spearman gave the invocation. Then Joe T. asked everyone to "please stand." 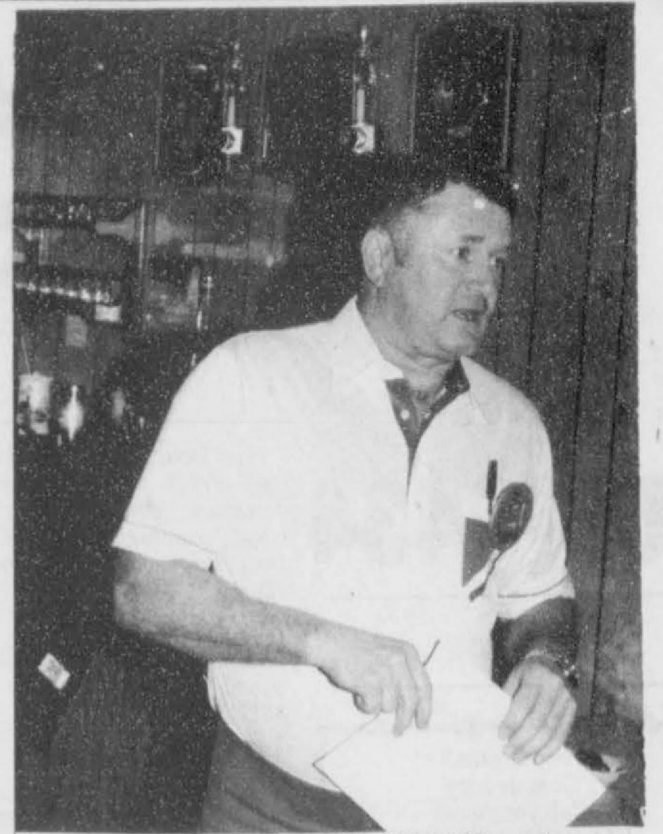

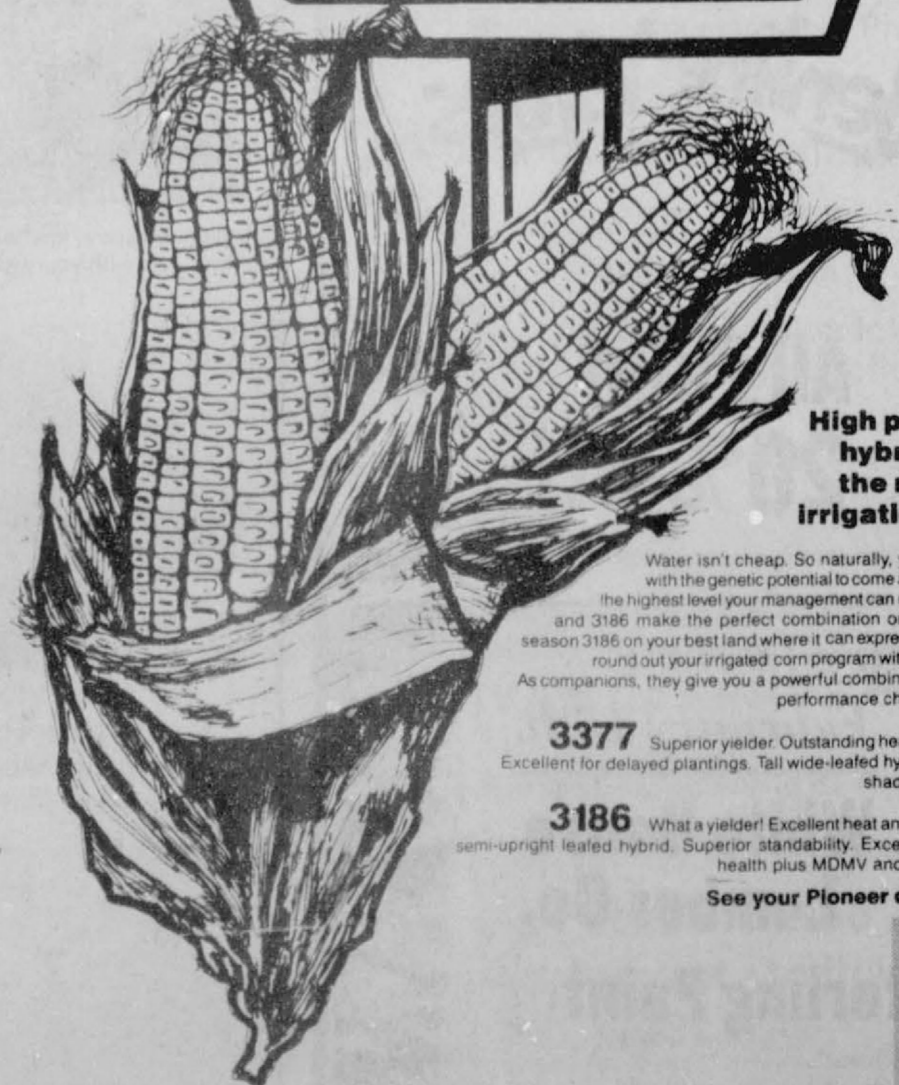
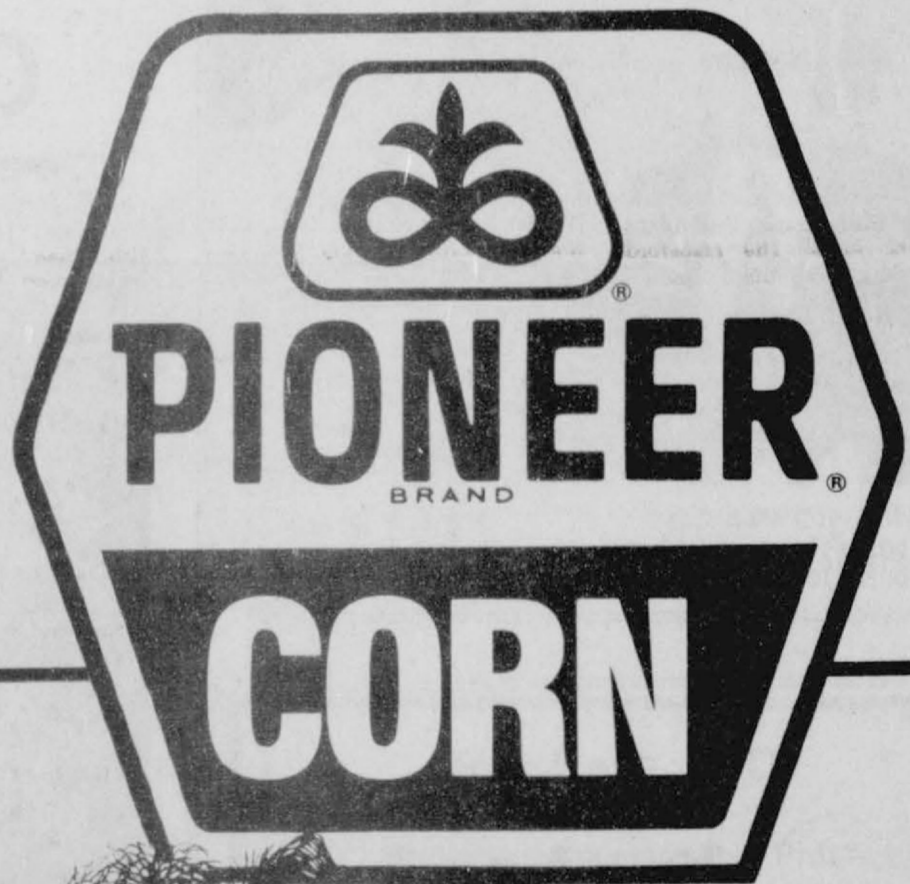

District's ban may fuel legal skirmish

Move aims to prevent storage of toxic waste

DUMAS - The North Plains Water District on Tuesday banned toxic waste storage in its seven-county district, a move state officials say could topple current toxic waste laws and widen local authority in matters of waste disposal.

The unprecedented and legally untested ban was drafted to block a Detroit company's plan to store tons of polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) in a 2.5-acre dump site in northwest Hansford County, said water district chairman Gaston Wells.

The water district approved the ban, drafted by its board of directors in early January, after conferring with engineers and legal experts during its meeting here, Wells said.

The ban is the first legal effort to stall plans by ANR Pipeline Co. to build a 2.5-acre landfill near the Oslo community.

According to documents filed with the Environmental Protection Agency, the \$300,000 landfill will hold 20,000 tons of soil with PCBs in a clay-bottom depression lined with plastic.

EPA officials are studying ANR's construction request and plan to issue a preliminary ruling late this month, said Karen Brown, an EPA spokeswoman.

It's unknown how successful the district will be in blocking the proposed dump site, but state legal officials said Tuesday the ban certainly will trigger legal battles over who controls toxic waste storage.

"If nothing else, the ban is an effective legal maneuver to hold up any dumping," said Wade Russell, a legal expert with the Texas Water Commission.

The district's action challenges years of federal laws governing disposal of toxic wastes.

Wells acknowledged legal history stands in opposition to the district's toxic waste ban.

"We know we are plying new ground here," he said.

According to Wells, the proposed dump site threatens the Ogallala aquifer, the primary source of water for the Panhandle and several surrounding states.

The PCB storage facility will rest about 260 feet above the aquifer, he said, according to ANR documents.

"We fear that sooner or later PCBs will percolate down to the aquifer and contaminate our water supply," Wells said. "We have a legal obligation to prevent that."

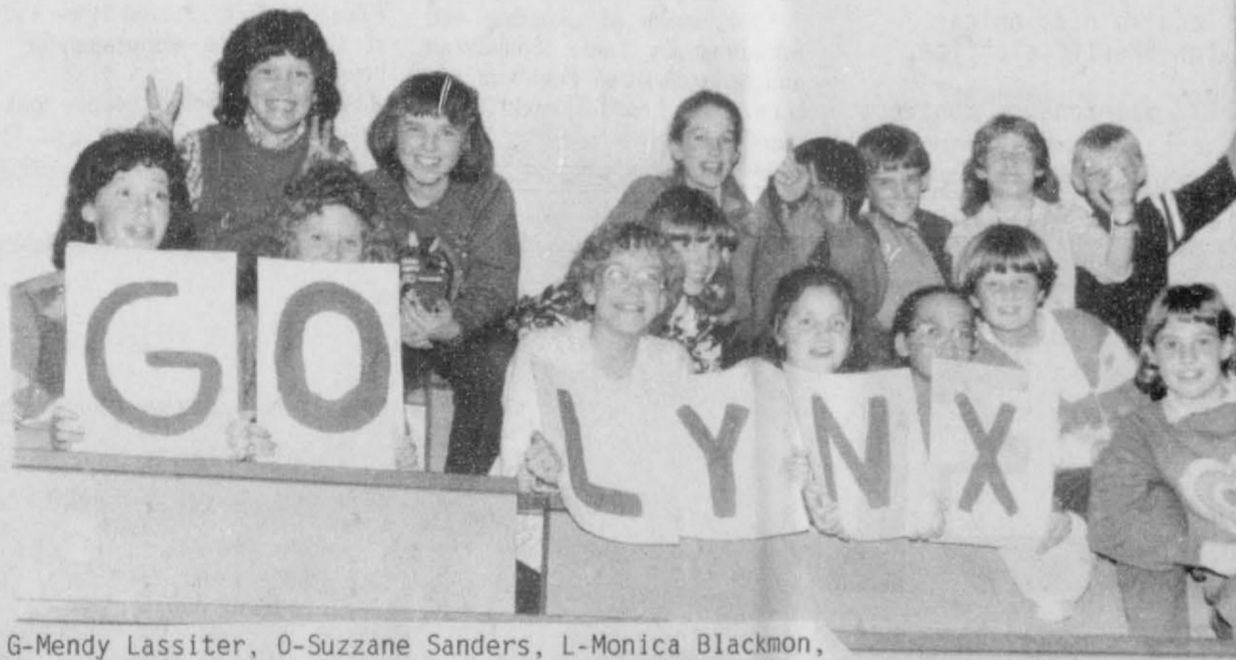
Because the water district enjoys broad regulatory power and governs a wider area than a city or county, the toxic waste ban may stand up to judicial scrutiny, Russell said.

"The state Legislature has given water districts broad authority over protection of ground water," Russell said. "And this ban seems to be a move in step with their authority."

Legal officials with the EPA, the water commission and the water district agree the ban will, if nothing else, assure a protracted legal debate over toxic waste disposal in the Northern Panhandle.

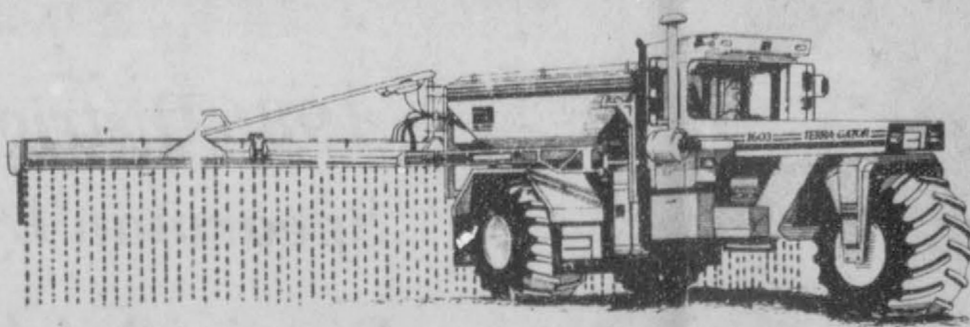

part in that even the Grand Ole Opry couldn't equal and was surprising to all who listened and watched.

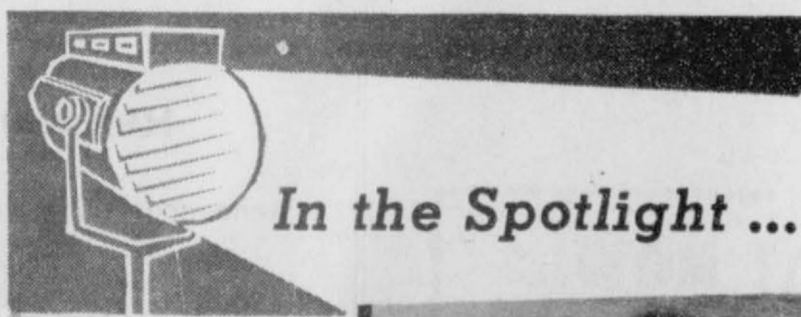

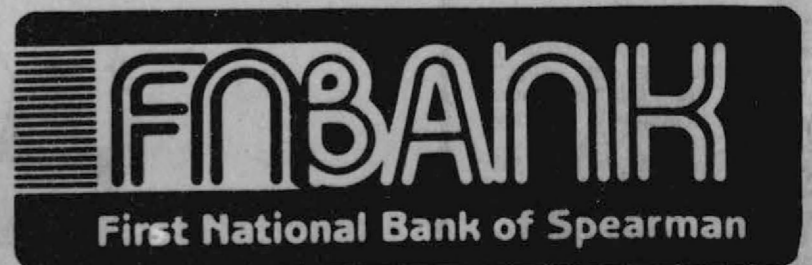
