LYNX BOW TO GREYHOUNDS

A pack of Gruver Greyhounds chewed up the Spearman Lynx 38-16 Friday night on Greyhound field.


Frank Silva raced 58 yards for a no-count touchdown the first time Gruver touched the ball from scrimmage and from that point the Hounds were off and

running. A clipping penalty at the Spearman 13 tubbed out that first Gruver counter, but it took Gruver only four plays to push across a valid counter from the Lynx 28. They got a little help from a 2.5 yard offside penalty against Spearman at the Lynx five.

Silva was the big gun in the Gruver attack. The sophomore carried the ball 20 times for 186 yards for a 9.3 yard aver-age and also threw two passes for 39 yards.

Lynx Rennie Berry took three touchdowns away from the Hounds with sure tackles. In the second half Gruver ran two Spearman kick-offs back deep into Lynx territory for what looked like scores. Berry was the safety man and both times he took the runner down with hard, low tackles.

The third touchdown he dis rupted was on a 21 yard pass from Sam Tipton to Mack Hoel on the goal line. Berry cut Hoel's feet out from under him just as the ball touched his hands



and it went incomplete on fourth down.

In the opening quarter Spear-man mounted two drives that looked like they might gener-ate points, only to have them sputter and die.

sputter and die. Spearman put opening kick-off in play on the Lynx 17 and immediately found a holt at the Gruver right tackle spot. Clay-ton Cochran and Ken Shu-feldt hit it repeatedly to move the ball out to the Lynx 49. At the 49 the drive bogged down and Larry Butts got off a short kick with the slick ball

a short kick with the slick ball and Gruver put it in play on the Hound 42.

and Gruver put it in play on the Hound 42. Silva, scored, but had it cal-led back to the Lynx 28 for the clipping infraction at the 13. Hoel went 16 yards on the next play, Silva then hit for eight. Spearman dropped Silva for a loss, but the play was rubbed out and Spearman was penalized 2.5 yards for being offsides. Sam Arnold dived in for the touchdown on the next play. Hoel tried to run points, but was erased by Shufeidt. The next kick-off Spearman went to work at their 30 and Cochran, Shufeldt and Dave Clement moved it to the Gru-ver 27. A fumble was the big gainer in the drive, Cochran fumbled at the Spearman 46 and end James Schnell recovered it for Spearman on the Gruver 45. This drive died when the start of the gruver of the

it for Spearman on the Gruver 45. This drive died when a fourth down pass got away from Berry .

Two plays later Silva raced 69 yards for a second Hound touchdown Don Mathews scored the extra points to make the score 14-0.

Gruver quickly got good field position again when Butts got off his second side of the foot punt and Gruver took over on the Hound 45. The punt was

only 15 yards. Fourteen plays and two pen-alties later Gruver had another score. Arnold and Mathews moved the ball into scoring territory on short punches into the line.

At the Lynx seven a backfield in motion penalty put the ball out to the 12. Then Randy Moore caught Silva for a two-yard loss. A clipping penalty put the ball back to the Spearman 27. Silva went to the air and hit Ronnie Laxson for a 21 yard gain. On the next play Mathews was in trouble behind the line, but went through three tacklers before being stopped on the Lynx two. At the Lynx seven a backfield

Gruver recovered a Clement fumble on the nine and Silva scored on the first play. He carried Butts with him across the goal.

goal. Tipton tried to pass for the points, only to have Shufeldt bat the pass away. Spearman and Gruver ex-changed fumbles at the Lynx 40 on successive plays, then Spearman mounted its first scoring drive. Clement put the ball into the fog and Butts and Shufeldt pulled it down to move to the Gruver 4. Butts caught two for 24, Shufeldt had one for 26. Berry kept the drive alive by going six yards on a fake kick behind some good offensive. blocking for a first down at 50. At the four, Ronnie Gilbert

At the four, Ronnie Gilbert and Buzzard opened the door and Cochran blasted in for the touchdown. Cochran went the same route for the extra points to make the score 32-8.

This time Hoel took the kick-off back to the Lynz 30 before getting unpended by Berry tackle. The Gruver scoring drive was slowed at the 26 where Rob-imon and Cechran racked Silva hard, then on the next play Schnell knocked down a pass, but on fourth and sight Silva hit Laxson for 18 yards and a first down at the Lynx seven. Mathews scored on the next play. Again Gruver tried to pass

first down at the Lynx seven. Mathews scored on the next play. Again Gruver tried to pass and again Schufeldt broke it up. The score was 38-8. The teams exchanged punts until midway of the fourth quar-ter when Spearman mounted their last scoring drive. Shufeldt got it moving with a pass to Schnell, then Clement hit Berry with a short one inside the 20 and a six yard penalty for piling on againt Gruver put the ball on the Gruver Six. One Clement pass went astray, then Jerry Holton hit a hole opened by Moore and Phillip Renner and scored, Cochran came in and ran the points over. Spearmantried an omside kick, but Gruver got the ball at the Gruver 47. They were stopped at the 34 when Shufeldt broke up a fourth down pass. Ever plays later Gruver started

Gruver Got a first at the Lynx eight. Mike Babbs and Gray stopped Allen Etter on two plays for four yards. Then Babbs, Moore, Rob-limon and Schnell chased Silva to ground for a 16 yard loss. On fourth down Tipton found Hoet at the goal, but as the ball got there, so did Berry and the ball went through Hoel's hands. Spearman came out passing after Spearman was penalized back to the 10 for holding. Cle-ments hit Shufeldt for 19, then Berry caught one for 20 and Butts got one for 12. With time running out, the second unit went into the game and fumbled on the first play. Gruver ran two plays as the game ended.

Grissiam Defense Files Motions; Trial Scheduled To Begin Monday duty and the prosecution and defense will begin trying to

Several preliminary motions by the defense lawyers for John Lincoln Grissiam were presented Thursday in 84th District Court . The nature of these motions are not known by this paper be-cause both publishers have been summoned as prospective jurors and were barred from the court-room during the hearing room during the hearing. However, the trial is still sch-

eduled to begin at 10 a.m. Monday when a Special Venire of 150 members will report for

select a jury. Grissiam, a farm worker is charged with murder with malice in the Feb. 26 death of Mickey Westerfield of Gruver .

Westerfield died of a smallcalibre gunshot wound in his store about 9 p.m. Feb. 26. westerfield managed to get to a telephone and call an operator to tell her he had been shot. He died before he could tell the operator where he was or who shot him.

Grissiam was arrested the next day and was charged with the murder. He has been held in the Hansford County jail without bond since that time.

bond since that time. His court-appointed attorneys are Charles Ballman of Borger and Don Reavis of Perryton. District Attorney Bob Galloway and County Attorney James P. Linn are handling the state's prosecution.





Only 75 **Loans Made** By F.H.A.

Farmers in Hansford, Hut-chinson, Lipscomb and Ochil-tree received only 75 loans from the Farmers Home Administration in fiscal 1965, according to Robert Holloway,

local supervisor. These loans totaled \$649,270. Of this total, \$171,410 was loaned for land purchase and development in Ochiltree County. Loans for rural housing totaled \$59,100 were also made. The remain-ing money was loaned for farm operations.

Over Texas 39,766 loans were made by the FHA for a total of \$88,289,230. This is an all-time high according to L.J. Cappleman, State FHA Director.

Repayments of principal and interest by borrowers tot-aled the largest volume col-lected in the agency's 30 year history, Cappleman said.




