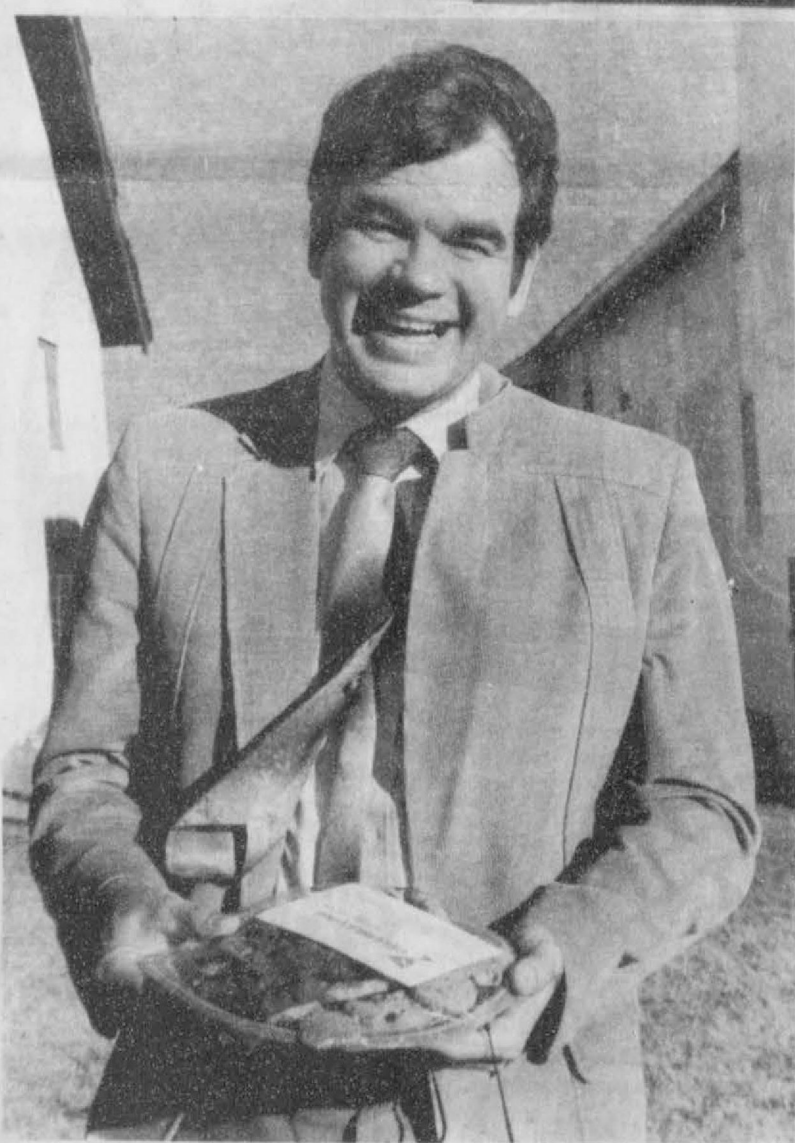

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE FIRST CHRISTIAN CHURCH OF SPEARMAN

The First Christian Church was begun in November, 1926 with Evangelistic Services led by Jasper Bogue, District Evangelist. During that time 39 persons were lined up as Charter Members.

They met as a Church for an indefinite period of time in the loof Hall.

In January, 1928 they purchased an old Bank Building and later moved it to the corner lots they had bought.

Brother Bogue continued to preach and they had occasional Revivals and added quite a few members to their roll.

In 1946 they built a small stucco building which had 4 Sunday School rooms. They used these buildings until 1949 when they were sold and moved away. The present Church building was built on the same site.

Today we have about 300 members. We have both Morning and Evening Worship every Sunday and Sunday School. On Sunday evenings before Evening Worship we have two very active youth groups. One for the Junior High and one for the High School age. Rev. Martin Foster is the present minister.

President Reagan has proclaimed November 11 as Veterans Day and has called upon all Americans to recognize "the valor and sacrifice of our veterans."

This year's Veterans Day theme is "A Grateful Nation Remembers," and the President has urged Americans to reflect on the great achievements of those whose sacrifices preserved the country's freedom and its way of life.

"Veterans Day gives all Americans a special opportunity to pay tribute to all those men and women who, throughout our history, have left their homes and loved ones to serve their country," the President said in his proclamation.

"With a spirit of pride and gratitude, let us recall their heroic accomplishments and thank them for their unselfish devotion to duty. They are indeed worthy of the solemn tribute of a grateful nation," he said.

The President has called on Federal, State, and local government officials to display the U.S. Flag and to encourage and participate in patriotic activities nationwide and to support the observance of Veterans Day with suitable commemorative expressions and programs.

In the 33rd annual observance at Arlington National Cemetery, the tradition of honoring the unknown soldier on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month will begin with the Presidential Wreath Laying Ceremony.

It was at that hour on November 11, 1918, that the world celebrated the end of World War I hostilities, a day that later became known as "Armistice Day."

Various Veterans Day observances will be held throughout the nation at many of the Veterans Administration's 109 national cemeteries.

JV Wins

Can the Varsity and the Junior Varsity play together as a team? That seemed to be the question on everyone's mind going into the final game of the season here Thursday night. The Lynx answered that question by gaining over four hundred yards in total offense, 22 first downs, and 4 interceptions against the Highland Park Hornets. The defense in return held the Hornets to 73 yards on the ground and 102 yards passing.

The Lynx opened the game by forcing the Hornets to punt on their first possession after the kick-off. Being lead by Jeff Gustin, Alan Beeson, Brett Davis, and Mark Garcia, the Lynx marched 57 yards on their first set of downs for the TD. The score came on a 21 yard pass from #10 Brett Davis to #81 Kevin Nelson. Point after failed.

Following the kick-off #28 Alan Beeson intercepted a Hornet pass on his second and third passes of the game. The second to #88 Tim Woolley for 7 yards, and the third to #80 Keith Benson for 10 yards and the second touchdown of the game. #40 Jeff Gustin added the extra points going around the left side. Highlights for the remainder of the second quarter was a pass interception by Alan Beeson and a 18 yard pass reception by #80 Keith Benson. The Hornets scored on an intercepted pass and kicked the extra point at the close of the half.

The Lynx offensive line played a big part in Thursday's game. On one side #64 Norman Seroggs and #74 Matt Tucker opened the holes for the running backs. On the other side this job was handled by #80 Keith Benson and #78 Scott Swan. This excellent job of blocking allowed Mark Garcia and Jeff Gustin to power their way 65 yards and the third Lynx touchdown. The score coming on a 14 yard run by Garcia. Davis kicked the extra point and the Lynx lead by 14.

During the Hornets short possession Tucker and Swan dumped the quarterback for a 9 yard loss, and then Brett Davis intercepted a Hornet pass and returned it to the 29 yard line. The Lynx's downs expired deep in Hornet territory. The defense forced a punt and the Lynx again took over in good field position. Davis connected with Tim Woolley for a 25 yard pass and to Kevin Nelson on a 20 yard completion. Garcia picked up 11 yards and Brett Davis went across the goal line from the one. The kicked extra point was good, giving the Lynx a commanding 21 point lead.

In the 4th quarter #12 Shawn Cook dumped the Hornets for an 8 yard loss before forcing them to punt. From the 31 yard line #40 Delwin Whitmire rushed for 25 yards along with a 15 yard penalty that put the ball on the Hornet 31 yard line. #31 Scott Wilkerson and Delwin Whitmire gained 2 yards each before the Lynx were dropped for a big loss. Then #33 Pete Saenz went through the left side of the line for a 36 yard touchdown. Extra point failed. With 8:40 left in the game the Hornets star player took the kick-off and returned it 72 yards for the touchdown, extra point was good on a kick, and Spearman's lead had been cut to 13 points. With 4:42 left in the game the Hornets on a fourth down conversion faked the punt. The Hornets found a brick wall consisting of #22 J. Garrett and #77 Tony Pacheco that stopped the try for the first down. Pete Saenz gained 7 yards and Delwin Whitmire busted loss for 21 more, that was called back due to a penalty. Saenz picked up the first down on a 17 yard run. #88 Jerald Blain added another 12 to the 6 yard line. #40 Delwin Whitmire scored across the left side for a 6 yard TD. Extra point failed. The Hornets scored the final score of the game on a 13 yard pass with the extra point conversion failing. The Lynx totally devastated the Hornets in a 40 to 21 victory to end the gridiron season.

City of Spearman Minutes of the Regular City Council Meeting

The City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas met in regular session in Council Chamber of City Hall, 30 S. W. Court, on October 28, 1986. Mayor Pro-Tem Ed Garner and Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett both presiding. Aldermen present: Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Burl Buchanan, Mike Cudd. Staff present: Jim Murray - City Manager, Cheryl Gibson - City Secretary, Joe Raper - Police Chief. Visitors present: Bob Myers of General Telephone, Don Smith, and Diane Carter of KRDF. Pledge and Invocation.

Mayor Blodgett was not present so at 7:37 p.m. Mayor protem Garner declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was led by McClellan and followed by the Invocation given by Buchanan. Consideration of the Minutes of Regular City Council Meeting held on October 14, 1986.

Motion was made by Nicholson to approve the Minutes of Regular City Council Meeting held on October 14, 1986, as written. Second by McClellan.

An update report on the installation of the New Electronic Switching Station

in Spearman by the operations manager of General Telephone.

Bob Myers, operations manager of GTE, Perryton, was present and gave a report on the New Electronic Switching Station. Mr. Myers informed the council as to when and how the switching to electronics would occur, what kind of service to expect and what new services would be offered. Mr. Myers also talked about the rural services and better overall quality of telephone service this area would have as of November 1, 1986.

At this time Mayor Blodgett arrived and presided over the remainder of the meeting. Consideration of awarding a contract to provide for painting Spearman's elevated water storage and ground storage tanks.

At 2:00 p.m. on October 24, 1986, sealed bids for the painting of Spearman's elevated water storage and ground storage tanks were publicly opened and read. The bids were as follows:
Bidder - ICR Painting Company of Borger, Texas - Total Bid - 75,799.00 - number of days to complete will be 182 days. 2nd Bidder Industrial Painting of Amarillo, Texas - Total Bid - \$60,300.00 and total number of day to complete was undecided.

Motion was made by Cudd to award a contract for the painting of Spearman's elevated water storage and ground storage tanks to the low bidder which is Industrial Painting of Amarillo, for \$60,300.00. Second by Garner. Motion unanimously carried. Consideration of a letter of agreement with Don Smith for the storage of a submarine in an unused T-Hanger.

After discussion was held by both parties, Mr. Smith withdrew his request for the City to store his submarine in an unused T-Hanger, free of charge. The council wished Mr. Smith well in finding storage for his submarine. No action was taken. Consideration of Authorizing the Mayor to enter into an Interlocal Agreement with TML Worker's Compensation Joint Insurance Fund for providing worker's compensation insurance.

Motion was made by Garner to authorize the Mayor to enter into an Interlocal Agreement with TML Worker's Compensation Insurance. Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried. Consideration of Authorizing Stephens Management Consultants, Inc., to develop bid specifications and evaluations for all the City's Insurance needs.

After discussion was held, motion was made by Nicholson to authorize Stephens Management Consultants, Inc., to develop Bid specifications and evaluations for the City's Insurance

needs. Second by McClellan. Motion unanimously carried. At this time Mayor Blodgett stated that the City Council would consider the emergency items on the Agenda that was duly posted. Consideration of amending our offer to North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. For 2 acres of land adjacent to the Municipal Landfill.

Motion was made by Cudd that the City would withdraw their original offer from North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. For two acres of land adjacent to the Municipal Landfill. The City is amending an offer to North Plains Electric Cooperative to purchase the land at \$850.00 an acre without the stipulation of the city being able to obtain a permit from the Solid Waste Division of the Texas Health Department. This amount is the same price as the City is paying the McClellan family for land adjacent to the Municipal Landfill. Second by Garner. Motion unanimously carried. Consideration of an Easement to North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. for an Electric Distribution line to cross a portion of the Municipal Landfill.

Motion was made by Garner to authorize the Mayor to execute a twenty foot Easement with North Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. for an Electric Distribution line to cross a portion of the Municipal Landfill as specified in the written Easement.

Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried.

Consideration of the Revenue and Expense report and Current Cash Position.

Motion was made by Garner to approve the Revenue and Expense report and Current Cash Position. Second by Buchanan. Motion Unanimously carried.

Europe and shattered the dream. Sixteen and one-half million Americans took part. Four hundred and six thousand died. The families and friends of these dead longed for a way to honor their memory.

An answer to the dilemma of how to pay tribute to those who had served in this latest, great war came in a proposal made by Representative Edwin K. Roes of Kansas: Change Armistice Day to Veterans Day, and make this a occasion to honor those who have served America in all wars.

President Eisenhower, in 1954, signed the bill proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day, and he called for Americans everywhere to rededicate themselves to the cause of peace.

On May 30, 1958, two more unidentified American war dead were brought to Arlington Cemetery from overseas and interred in the plaza beside their Comrade of old War I. One was killed in World War II, the other in Korea. A law passed in 1973 provided for the interment of an unknown American who lost his life in Southeast Asia during the Vietnam era.

To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army honor guard, the 3rd United States Infantry (The Old Guard), keeps day and night vigil.

A law passed in 1968 changed the national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. It soon became apparent, however, that November 11 was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens.

After the devastating game played by the seventh graders, it didn't look possible for the following games to get any better. In fact the eighth grade game seemed to be headed in the other direction. On their opening possession of the third quarter the Lynx again scored. The score capped off a 68 yard drive. Nava's second TD of the game came as a result of a 6 yard run. Final Planting November 15

November 15 is the Final Planting Date for Insured Barley and Wheat in Hansford County, Texas, according to Jackie Harris, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Insured Barley and Wheat planted by November 15 must be reported by November 30 in order to receive full Crop Insurance Coverage. The Acreage Report reflects the actual Acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

"During the Growing Season, if damage occurs, notice should be given promptly," Harris said.

Crop Insurance based on actual production history (aph), is available this year to producers of Wheat, Barley, Oats and Rye in addition to Corn, Grain Sorghum, Soybeans, Peanuts, Cotton, Rice and other Crops.

"Increasingly, our Insured Producers and discovering that with a yield guarantee which reflects production capability, Crop Insurance establishes a Farm Income Floor. Thus, Cash Flow and the ability to repay a loan may be more accurately projected," explained Harris.



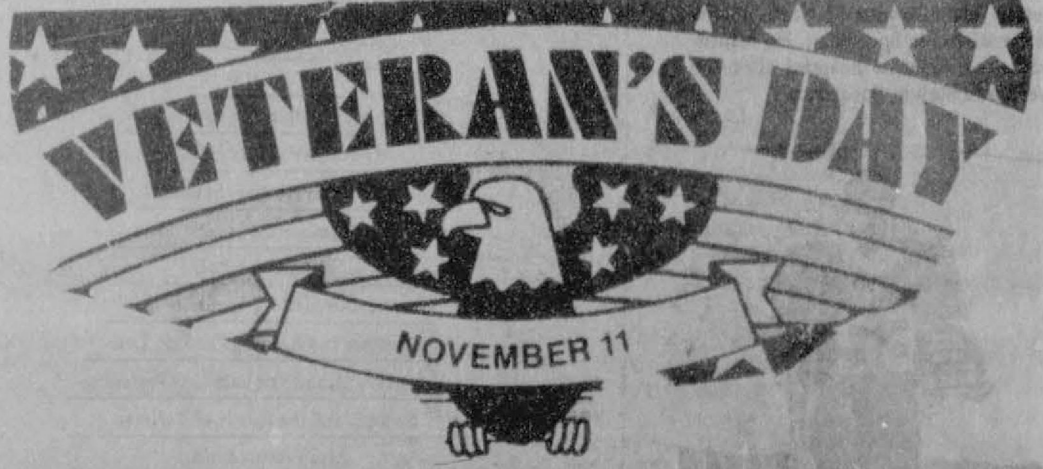
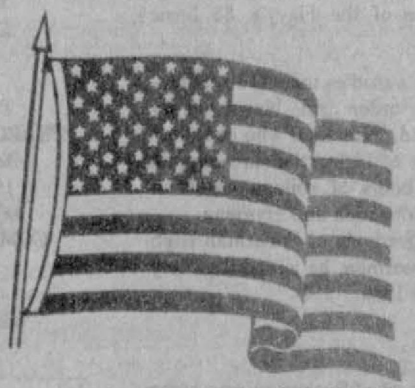

The choice of enamels as a medium

is based upon their transparent luminosity and durability. This ancient craft dates back to ornamentation designed for Egyptian Pharaohs, an outstanding example being King Tut's mask.

The enameled belts are composed of vitreous enamels fired at 1450 degrees F. on copper. Each original piece requires numerous firings. When fired, the enamel fuses to the metal and lends its jewel-like transparency in layers of glass, to the warmth and lustre of the copper.

Everyone is invited to participate. Students who wish to donate blood must be 17 years of age or older and weigh at least 110 pounds. They must have a signed permit from their parents. We encourage all interested adults of the community to donate and to help Spearman High School in this project.

Prior to donating, you should have a good night's rest—at least 6 hours of sleep within the past 24 hours. Eat a good breakfast, even if you usually omit it. You must not have a cold, sore throat or flu. You are eligible to donate blood once every 8 to 10 weeks.

We hope that you will consider sharing your good health by volunteering to donate blood on November 18, 1986 when the Blood Center comes to our school.

Here are some of the facts about AIDS that are furnished by the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services that concern the donating and receiving of blood donations.

IS THERE A DANGER OF CONTRACTING AIDS FROM DONATING BLOOD?

No. Blood banks and other blood collection centers use sterile equipment and disposable needles. The need for blood is great, and people who are not at increased risk for getting AIDS are urged to continue to donate blood as they have in the past. **IS THERE A LABORATORY TEST FOR AIDS?**

As with many other diseases, there is no single test for diagnosing AIDS. There is now a test for detecting antibodies (substances produced in the blood to fight disease organisms) to the virus that causes AIDS. Presence of HTLV-III antibodies means that a person has been infected with that virus; it does not tell whether the person is still infected. The antibody test is used to screen donated blood and plasma and assist in preventing cases of AIDS resulting from blood transfusions or use of blood products, such as Factor VIII, needed by patients with hemophilia. The test is also available through private physicians, most State or local health departments and at other sites.

CAN AIDS BE PREVENTED?
Yes. Cases of AIDS related to medical use of blood or blood products are being prevented by use of HTLV-III antibody screening tests at blood donor sites and by members of high risk groups voluntarily not donating blood. Heat treatment of Factor VIII and other blood products helps prevent AIDS in patients with hemophilia and other clotting disorders. There is no vaccine for AIDS itself. However, there is good reason to believe that individuals can reduce their risk of contracting AIDS by following existing recommendations. Communities can help prevent AIDS by vigorous efforts to educate and inform their populations about the illness, with special emphasis on educational activities for members of high risk groups. Meanwhile, the effort to produce vaccines and drugs against AIDS continues.

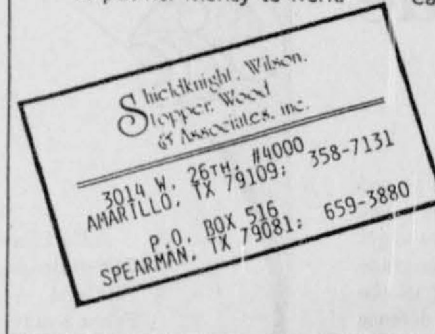
