Lynxettes in Third Regional Tourney

With their third consecutive bi-district championship trophy in the case to go with the six consecutive district titles, the Spearman Lynxettes go to Lubbock Saturday searching for the regional title and a ticket to the state tournament.

The Lynxettes meet Floydada at 11:10 a.m. Saturday in the first round of the regional tournament.

This is the third consecutive year for the Lynxettes to go to Lubbock and it will be the first time they have not met Friona. Floydada won that district this year and Tuesday night had an easy time beating Friendship for the bi-district title. Floydada won 56-43.

Floydada won the game with one starting guard sidelined with a knee injury.

Coach Dean Weese said he did not know if the guard would play Saturday. She was hurt in the Floydada-Springlake game Saturday. Springlake beat

Floydada by 25 points. Weese said Floydada had a forward who had returned to action late this season who was helping them. The girl had a foot injured in a car wreck last summer.

The Lynxette boss said Floydada was about the same size as Spearman. Their strongest point is their aggressiveness, Weese said.

Karen Gibson has been treating a sprained ankle, for a week. Weese said she was moving good in practice and would be ready Saturday.

Weese did not get to scout Floydada Tuesday night because bad weather forced his plane to return to Spearman. He had scouted them earlier.

The girls will go to Lubbock Friday.

Voter Registration Starts Here Today

Registration under the new Texas Voter Registration law begins today, Thursday, at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office.

Persons who have paid their poll tax this year do not register, they are already qualified to vote. The requirements for registering under the new law are the same as the poll tax requirements, Sheriff J.B. Cooke said this week.

Persons who wish to qualify to vote in all elections this year have until midnight March 17 to register. There will be no registration after the deadline.

Persons must have a poll tax or be registered to vote in any local, county, state or federal election, unless they are exempt under the old poll tax law.

There will be elections this year for school board, city offices, county, state and federal offices. There is a possibility of bond elections also.

Jones Files For Trustee

Another candidate for the Spearman School Board filed for a place on the ballot this week. The filing deadline was Wednesday afternoon. The election is April 2.

Hershel Jones, a partsman at Excel Chevrolet filed for one of the two places that are up for election this year. Jones is a graduate of Spearman High School and now has children in the Spearman schools.

The two incumbents for the board filed earlier for reelection. Members seeking a second term are Roy McClellan and Ira Harbour.

Transit Dies From Alcohol

A transit laborer died about 7:45 p.m. Saturday after police officers found him on the back steps of the McLain apartments a few minutes earlier and took him to Hansford Hospital.

The man, Raymond M. Coleman, 45, was found by city policeman Bill Martin. He and Deputy Sheriff Leland Wood took the man to the hospital.

A witness, Paul Hill, told officers the man had been on the steps since about 5 p.m. that day.

Coleman's body was taken to Amarillo for an autopsy. The autopsy report said Coleman died of pneumonia caused by a tear in the esophagus allowing liquid to be drawn into the lungs. The tear was from strain caused by the excessive use of alcohol. The blood test showed it contained 93 percent alcohol.

A second man was found in the building passed out from alcohol. He was taken to the hospital and was later placed in jail for being drunk.

Coleman's body was taken to Wetumka, Okla. for funeral services.

Lynxettes Win Third Straight Bi-District Crown Easily 46-29

Electra fans blew their horns and booed the officials, but they had little to cheer about as the Spearman Lynxettes whipped the Tigerettes 46-29 for the bi-district title.

The Lynxettes settled the game early, then just toyed with outclassed winners of district 2-AA title.

Spearman jumped into a 15-0 lead early in the first quarter as they continually took the ball away from the Electra six before they could score. Spearman was leading 20-3 at the end of the first quarter.

Coach Dean Weese pulled

starting forward Karen Gibson after the first quarter and used her sparingly the rest of the way. She is nursing a sprained ankle.

Electra made only five field goals against the tough Lynxette defense. They hit 19 of 26 free shots. With Susan Hutchison, Robbie Ownbey and Nancy McCullough on defense, Electra was able to do little offensively and at times the officials called jump ball because the Lynxettes forced one player to stand and hold the ball.

Barbara Wilde led the scoring for Spearman with 28

points. Marcia Shieldknight had nine, Gibson had five and her replacement, Linn Robinson had four. Spearman's forwards hit only six of 18 free shots.

With a 30-10 halftime lead and a 38-18 third quarter lead, Weese used his reserves freely during the second half.

He used so many different combinations that ex-forwards Hutchison and McCullough played some at forward.

After the game some Electra fans were heard discussing their team's inability to score with the coach. He told them it was hard to shoot when a guard kept a hand in the forwards' face all night.

100 Hear Sales Talk

Approximately 100 business owners and their employees attended the dinner and sales clinic Saturday night in the school cafeteria sponsored by the Hansford Plainsman.

The business people were all from firms taking part in the "Salute of Values" sales promotion being conducted in Spearman during March and April.

Bill Leigh of Wm. A Leigh Associates, Inc., a nationally known sales promotion firm, urged everyone to check themselves to become better salespeople.

In doing so, Leigh pointed out, they would better serve the people who sign their paychecks and they will also serve the entire community.

He gave his listeners this advice:

"The customer is important and should be shown respect.

"In approaching the customer, I must be in a proper mood and conduct myself in the proper manner. The impression I make will be a reflection on me, the store and the entire community. "I should have the customer's complete approval of each item sold or service rendered. I would be better off to sacrifice the profit I would make if I felt that the item did not have the customer's complete approval."

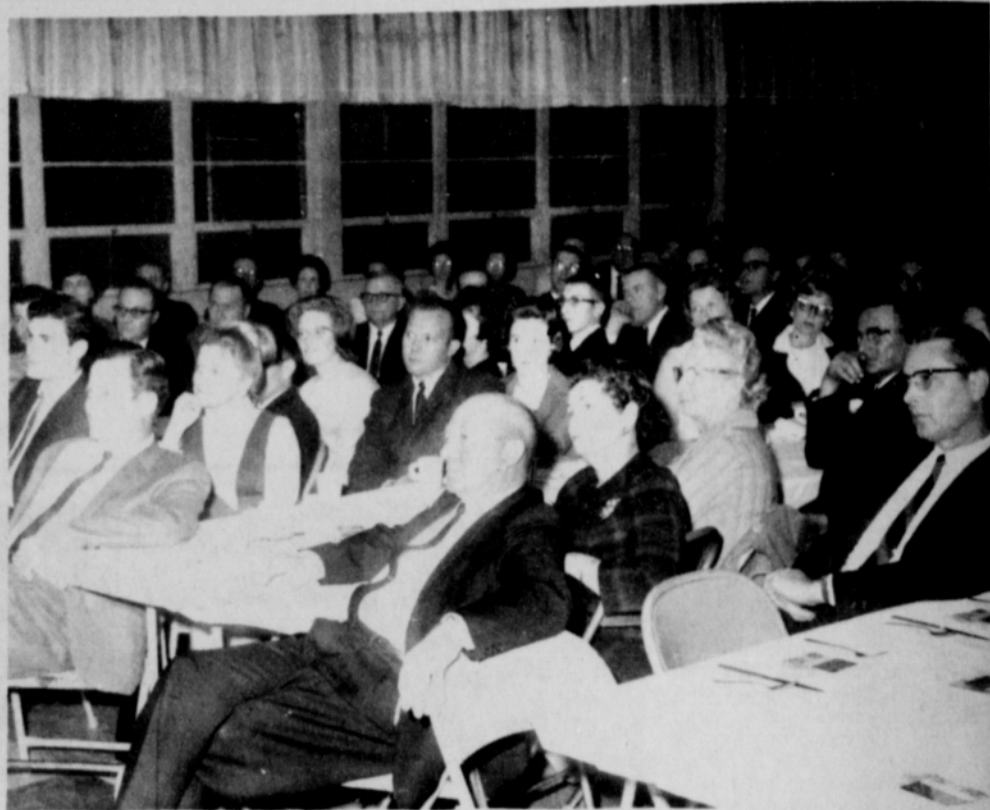

County Increases Gifts To March of Dimes Drive

Hansford County increased its donations to the March of Dimes by \$600 over last year's total that made Hansford County the largest contributor per capita in the state.

This year the county donated \$4,775.21 to six different fund raising activities, campaign chairman Ed Dear announced this week. The total last year was \$4,137.59.

Dear said on behalf of the county committee, he wished to thank everyone who contributed money and work to the

campaign. "Without everyone's wholehearted cooperation, the drive could not have been a success.

The five hour radio and TV auction was the biggest money raiser. It gathered \$2,371.75. The Spearman Mothers March raised \$827.87, Gruver Mothers March collected \$697.83, the Morse Mothers raised \$107.82 and the Spearman teen-agers radiothon raised \$230.26. Individual donations outside the organized drives totaled \$540.68.

Homemaking Notes

A one-step Miracle Angel Food Cake mix you just put into a bowl, add water, and beat for one minute to produce a tall, airy cake.

A new tomato sauce with cheese in 8-ounce size, contains herbs, spices, onion and garlic blended together with tomato sauce and cheese to provide a rich sauce for many uses.

A new Butter Brickle cake mix flavor, and a coordinated butterscotch creamy-type frosting with butter brickle bits.

Four new TV dinners, frozen: Loin of Pork; Ham, Filet of Haddock, and Fish 'N Fries, all with complete accompaniment of sauces and vegetables.

Canned roast beef, ready to serve from the can, contains natural beef juices retained during cooking.

Frozen pecan piecrust shells, with real pecan nutrients in the pastry. The ready-to-bake shells are especially suited to cream, chiffon and ice cream pies. They come two in a package.

Have you had trouble with aerosol spray cans that won't spray? I have, and I think I've found part of my trouble.

You must hold an aerosol can upright for efficient operation. This keeps the dip tube in the liquid.

If the container is partly emptied and you tip it on its side in use the dip tube may be out of the liquid. If this is the case, you will release only pressure when you press the button. If the can runs out of pressure before the contents are used, it will be impossible to empty the can.

A few safety precautions in using aerosol sprays of any kind:

1. Never spray directly in someone's face.
2. Never smoke while spraying.
3. Never spray near a fire or open flame.
4. Never store cans where temperatures may exceed 120 F. as high temperatures may cause pressurized cans to burst.
5. Never throw a pressurized can in the fire or keep one on the stove or on a radiator.

Aerosol sprays are quite convenient, but remember to handle them carefully.

Do your dresser drawers look like a rummage sale. Take time out for a clean up; empty drawers, and throw out everything you haven't used in a couple of months. Before you rearrange dresser and kitchen drawers, give them a thorough cleansing with a pine-cleaner solution. Then put back sorted-out contents into fresh, clean smelling drawers. No rummage sale look today.

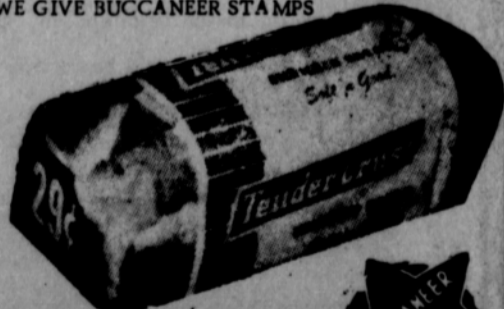
