

Bank donates \$700.00 to YMCA !

40 bed addition to Manor proposed On 12 September 1985,

County Commissioners and the Board of Directors of Hansford County heard a presentation by Mr. Bob Cox, Croslin, & Assoc., an architectural firm from Austin, Texas, on the various plans for the expansion of Hansford Manor. Cost for the project is being projected at \$75.00 to \$80.00 per square foot for construction only. Mr. Cox noted this figure is higher than is actually expected to be.

Mr. Cox presented 4 plans with square footage and cost as follows, remembering this is construction cost only and does not include furniture, architect fees and financing fees: 15 bed, 3,925 square feet running in cost from \$295,000.00 to \$314,000.00; 25 bed, 16,725 square

feet at \$1,254,000.00 to \$1,338,000.00; 40 bed, 17,550 square feet at \$1,316,000.00 to \$1,404,000.00; and a plan called Development Plan containing 40 beds and all the additions needed with 22,910 square feet at \$1,718,000.00 to \$1,832,000.00 with construction time placed at 6 months on 15 beds, 9 months on 25 beds, and 12 months on both the 40 bed and the Development Plan. The commissioners were requested to comment on this project. After great consideration by all, a motion was made to accept the Development plan. Several Commissioners were noted to say there is a real need to expand our present facility. On a personal note, I, as the

administrator of both facilities, feel quite proud of the support the community gives to their hospital and manor. We have a fine facility, well equipped and can and do provide quality care. This expansion project will allow us the opportunity to share with more citizens of Hansford County. I would like to encourage the citizens of Spearman and Gruver to visit our facilities at their convenience. Respectfully,





The next meeting will be held September 26th in the home of Holly Simpson.



Texas Water Act Affects engineer. "A year ago, towns and cities with two million Texans had **Farmers**, Homeowner's

COLLEGE STATION---Farmers and ranchers as well as homeowners have a direct stake in the 1985 Texas Water Act and the upcoming constitutional amendments.

The two amendments on water resources will be placed before Texas voters at the Nov. 5 general election.

"The 1985 Texas Water Act focuses on water conservation in cities and in agriculture, water supply development, protection of bays and estuaries, flood control and the creatio of ground water districts," points out Dr. John Sweeten with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Sweeten, an agricultural engineer in waste management and chairman of the Extension Service's major program committee on water utilization and conservation. notes that Article 1 of the Act calls for cities that apply for state water development funds to establish water conservation programs that can include education, drought contingency plans, lawn watering restrictions and plumbing codes. Municipal education and technical assistance programs would be provided by the Texas Water Development Board as well as other local and state agencies.

Article 2 outlines financial asstistance programs and expands the existing water loan assistance program to allow expenditures for water conservation, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, chloride control and desalinization in addition to water development and to allow direct appropriations as well as revenue bonds. State loans administered by the Texas Water Development Board could be used to guarantee local water bonds or pay the local share of federal cost-sharing projects.

According to Sweeten, Article 3 of the Act creates a \$10 million Agricultural Soil and Water Conservation Trust Fund. Half of the interest on the principal is to be appropriated among various state agencies for agricultural water conservation programs, including technical assistance, education, demonstration, equipment, grants to underground water conservation districts, research, desalinization and weather modification. A pilot farm loan program (\$5 million for two years) will be used for improved irrigation systems that conserve water.

If voters approve Proposition 1 on Nov. 5, the state of Texas could issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds. Approval of Proposition 2 would mean that the state could issue \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds for low interest loans to farmers subject to legislative review of the \$5 million pilot loans program and approved by two-thirds vote of both houses of the legislature.

Technology for improving irrigation water use efficiency from about 60 percent on the average up to 80 to 95 percent is available to farmers, but capital costs generally present an economic obstacle to its adoption, says the agricultural engineer.

"The passage of the 1985 Texas Water Act would provide for a statewide commitment to water conservation and development programs that would have far-reaching effects on farmers and ranchers as well as homeowners," Sweeten points out. "It would open the door for more concentrated educational and research projects aimed at more effective municipal and agricultural use of the state's present limited water resources as well as the development of additional resources. Aslo, the current statutory limitations on interbasin transfer of water are maintained.

"Water problems have plagued many areas of the state in recent years due to drought conditions, population growth and increased

The bloodiest single day of the Civil War occurred in September, 1862. General Robert E. Lee, named to command Confederate forces only in June, invaded Maryland. The hope was that Marylanders would rally to Southern forces as Confederate legions marched north.

General George McClellan. commanding Union forces, was offered a rare opportunity of defeating Lee on September 16. Lee had sent General "Stonewall" Jackson off to capture Harper's Ferry, dividing his forces. Jackson took 25,000 of Lee's 55,000-man army. McClellan captured a copy of Lee's order, and realized he had a chance to crush Lee before the Confederates reunited.

Camped at Frederick, Md., McClellan moved on Lee with 60,000 men; Lee had audaciously moved on northward, and was at Hagerstown. McClellan, a good general with an army ready to fight, and which fought well, was somewhat like General Bernard Montogmery in World War II-cautious and slow. Nevertheless, he attacked Lee on the 16th near

Apple Cider

The 1985 apple crop is now being harvested and a word about apple cider is therefore appropriate. To begin with, what is cider?

Cider is unpastcurized apple juice, and, of course, it will ferment unless refrigerated and drunk within about two weeks. And while fermented apple juice (hard cider) is an old and popular drink, especially in English pubs, that is not the subject of this editorial. There are federal and state laws pertaining to the fermentation of apple juice.

Unfermented, fresh apple juice is, however, a fine drink and a healthy one. It must be made from good, clean apples and most experts blend sweet and tart apples to get the desired flavor. Obtaining the juice from apples is a two-part process. The apples are first ground into pumice and this is then crushed to extract the juice, which can run as high as ninety percent.

Cider--without preservatives and unpasteurized--can be frozen, but one should allow a pint to each gallon for expansion. Also, cider can be made right on up into the winter from stored apples. In fact, some believe that about February is the best time for making cider, with apples that have been properly stored and are then just reaching maturity.

Hard apple cider? The best advice is to ask apple farmers or those who have fermented it over the years. The volume of one's production is limited by law, as is the case in wine fermentation.



But Texas Department of Health (TDH) officials say injuries are also a mystery because nobody is certain exactly how many Texans recover from or are disabled by injury.

"In essence, we know the most about the people who don't survive injury because they are so badly hurt," said Linda Lloyd, an epidemiologist with TDH. "But very little is understood about people who are injured and live. We don't know how many recover and return to a normal life and how many are disabled.'

Ms. Lloyd is working with Brackenridge Hospital, the major trauma center in Central Texas, to learn more about the pattern of non-fatal injuries. The trauma registry that she is helping to develop is one of only a few in the country.

She said such epidemiological research is important in preventing deaths due to injury and reducing the severity of them.

Trauma, defined as a potentially life-threatening condition caused by injury, has a variety of causes including motor vehicle accidents. falls, drownings, electrocutions and other mishaps.

Ms. Lloyd said the trauma registry she is developing with data from Brackenridge includes information about the admitting diagnosis, the severity of a person's injuries, circumstances surrounding the incident and required medical treatment

"We hope the data will provide us with information about the type of injuries most common among different age groups and when injuries happen," said Ms. Lloyd.

That information can be valuable to physicians, she said, because medical treatment must be tailored for each patient.

"Take falls for example. That type of injury can happen when a construction worker falls from a scaffolding or when an elderly woman losses her balance and falls down the steps at home," she said.

Even though both patients are injured in falls, the medical treatment might be quite different," said Dr. Charles E. Alexander, Chief of the Bureau of Epidemiology. "If the man fell a great distance, he could suffer crushing injuries that would destroy his internal organs. On the other hand, the elderly woman might be more likely to break a hip.'

Prevention of such injuries might also require differing strategies, depending on who was involved. "The steps taken to prevent falls at a construction site and in an elderly woman's home would be different,' Lloyd said. "How many falls occurred in each place and the factors associated with the injury would help us determine how to best spend money or start programs aimed at prevention."



Bolter Votes on AMTRAK


WASHINGTON- During an eleotronic failure which caused members of the House of Representatives to vote "roll call" style, Texas Congressman Beau Boulter (R, 13) cast a loud "nay" vote on a bill to continue funding of AMTRAK, a federally owned railroad.

"It is ridiculous", Boulter said, "for Congress to be spending \$803 million of taxpayer money to support an inefficient, money-losing boondoggle like AMTRAK. And when you consider that we have \$176 billion national deficit as well - the whole thing becomes absurd.'


The final vote was 290 to 128. allowing for the continued funding of the AMTRAK system. Operating largely on the eastern coast, the AMTRAK rail system was started in 1971, and, as Boulter noted, "has never turned a profit." As a federally owned railroad, AM-TRAK receives annual appropriations from the Congress to cover its operating deficit and capital costs. In 1984, appropriations totaled \$716.4 million. The funding approved by today's vote represents a 15% out from last year's funding level, but, Boulter said, "doesn't

go far enough." "Our deficit dictates that we terminate some of the luxurious programs that the special interests want intact, but that the average taxpayer cannot, and should not, be asked to support. The 13th Distric' sure doesn't want these programs continued."

Earlier this year Boulter mailed a questionnarie to the voters of the 13th Congressional District, listing fifteen federal programs and asking which should be kept and which terminated. "The overwhelming majority of those who responded to the questionnaire asked me, as their Congressman, to terminate between 12 and 15 of the programs. Almost 45% told me to terminate them all. I think that those numbers are more indicative of the general mood of the American public, and I plan to continue working to terminate and phase out unnecessary federal programs."



Know Weather

What are the ominous directions for winds to blow from? Can useful weather information be obtained from the use of a wind vane only?

The worst weather in the United States often follow winds out of the east or north. Yes, it is possible to detect valuable clues about the weather using only a wind vane. If one will combine the vane with a barom-

eter, the accuracy of predictions will be raised many times. However, with only a

wind vane, be suspicious of a wind change from the east to the north. If the sky looks threatening (or a barometer reading shows pressure failing) you might well be in for a bad storm.

Likewise, a wind changing from south to east is often a bad omen. Remember that bad weather systems in this country (low pressure areas) move counter clockwise, and drift eastward.

Wind changes often reveal what section of this circular movement you are then in.


