Judge Lee To Become PDRM Manager

Longtime Hansford County Judge Johnnie C. Lee, approved Thursday, Jan. 5 by the board of directors of the Palo Duro River Authority as the new manager for the authority, said Friday that he has accepted the management pending leaving his present position as county judge.

He indicated he would resign sometime in the next six months from the elective job he has held continuously for almost 30 years.

Judge Lee said Friday that his main concern as manager of the PDRM is to find money to build the proposed multi-million dollar Palo Duro Creek Project.

He noted that the new job is comparable in salary and other benefits to his present occupation. But, he added, he felt it was a good time to get on with the proposed project.

He plans to discuss his resignation with Hansford County Commissioners who may appoint a new judge to fill out the unexpired term.

The judge added that until his official resignation from the county office, he will be on salary with the county only while transitioning to his new job.

Lee, appointed Hansford County Judge Oct. 11, 1948, has remained in office since that time through election victories and, at one time, at the age of 23 when he was appointed to the office as the youngest county judge in Texas.

Robert Novak, president of the Palo Duro River Authority board, said the directors feel "they have hired the very best man for the job. Lee has a good rapport with all the directors and the people in the area."

The multi-million dollar Palo Duro Creek project will involve water conservation through a number of dams to be constructed by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers along the watershed from Hansford County into Moore county.

Feasibility studies still are being conducted by the engineers, but it is expected that a reservoir will be located in Hansford County near Spearman.

The engineers say completion of the project may be years in the future.

Originally, a number of Hansford County ranchers and farmers were opposed to the project. But by July 22, 1976, when a public hearing was held in Spearman, the attitude apparently had changed to one of complete approval.

At the meeting, Judge Lee

said he hoped someday to be able to fish at the reservoir.

Lee, 52, was a veteran of World War II and was serving as veterans service officer when he was appointed county judge. He was born near Stratford but grew up at Gruver.

He is married to the former Jo Ann Hoskins of Spearman. They have a son, two daughters and a granddaughter.

Bond Sales

Hansford County Bond Chairman C.A. Gilmer of Spearman has reported that October sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Hansford County were \$2,403.

Sales for the 10-month period totaled \$67,915 for 75 percent of the 1977 sales goal of \$90,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$30,173,210, while sales for the first 10 months of 1977 totaled \$240,081,441 with 87 percent of the yearly sales goal of \$276.9 million achieved. It was reported by Leonard Cowden, Jr., Area 1 manager for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division of the Department of the Treasury.

\$1,746,931 Issued in 1977 City Building Permits

The building barometer, with permits for a new furniture store, a new shop facility, a new grain elevator, a new church, a new duplex, a Moose Lodge plus at least 14 permits for new residences, reached \$1,746,931 in Spearman in 1977 on the basis of the estimated valuation listed per each permit. March was the big month with permits carrying a valuation of \$516,200.

A total of 60 permits, for building and electrical work, was issued during the 365 days of 1977 and the largest single permit for a business was for \$200,000 issued on Nov. 2 to Spartex Grain for a new elevator on State Highway East 15 adjacent to the railroad.

Second largest business building permit went to Beedy Furniture Co. in the amount of \$140,000 for the new store location in the Golden Circle addition adjacent to Plains Shopping Center.

In the residential construction category, a permit for \$100,000 was issued in July for a new residence at 805 Wilmeth.

Last March a permit for \$200,000 was issued for some apartments on East Kenneth but construction has not started as of this time. It was mentioned on the new Seventh Day

Adventist Church on South Roland, started in March, 1977, when the permit for \$90,000 was issued and groundbreaking ceremonies held, is moving ahead at this time but a completion date has not been announced.

One new hangar, the permit issued to Junior Luby during last March in the amount of \$57,700, was added to Spearman Airport facilities during the past year.

The permit, with an estimated valuation of \$50,000, was issued during last May for the Hansford County Veterinary Hospital and dedication ceremonies for the facility were held a few months ago.

Last July Callaway's House of Flowers on State Highway 207 South received a permit for \$60,000, for an addition to the existing building noting an expansion for the business opened last year.

The new Moose Lodge in Spearman received a permit in October in the amount of \$32,000 and construction is in progress on East D Avenue.

A new shop facility at Baker and Taylor Drilling Co. in Spearman began to take shape with a permit for such work issued in the amount of \$125,000 during last November.

During that same month, permits for two residences, with a total of \$120,000 valuation, were issued with one structure at 708 Wilmeth having a valuation of \$85,000 and the other, at 1012 Linn Dr., carrying a \$35,000 valuation.

In December, a permit for \$900 for the block foundation for a small structure at 1016 S. Bernice, a permit for \$2,000 for a garage work at 424 S. Bernice where the garage was being converted to a room and a permit for a \$58,000 residence at 701 Wilmeth, were issued.

Last January four permits were issued, two for electric work, with the construction permits valued at a total of \$37,400.

In February the four construction permits issued had a total valuation of \$316,500.

March permits totaled nine, one being for electrical work, with the construction value estimated to total \$516,200.

In April, where three of the five permits were for electrical work, the remaining permits carried a valuation of \$24,400.

There were eight permits issued in May, one being for electrical work, with the other seven carrying a total valuation of \$170,050.

Permits for construction in June, there were eight with four for electrical work, carried a total value of \$90,500.

Permits for construction in July, there were seven with two for electrical work, carried a total of \$116,500.

There were only two permits issued in August for a total valuation of \$4,400.

Only one permit was issued in September in the amount of \$60,000 for a duplex on South Roland.

The three permits issued for construction in October carried a valuation of \$42,600.

During November a dozen permits, one being for electrical work only, were issued with the 11 others carrying a valuation totaling \$487,800.

The final three permits of the year during December carried a valuation of \$60,900.

Neither the delighted child nor the father knew it at the time, but Raggedy Ann, one of the most popular characters in juvenile fiction and far and away the most

popular single toy in American history, had just been "born."

Food Stamp Rules To Help With Utilities

The food stamp office at Perryton that serves Hansford County wants food stamp households to know that if their heating or utility bills go up this winter, the amount they pay for their food stamps may go down. Under new food stamp rules effective Jan. 1, 1978, households may be able to get prompt adjustments in their food stamp purchase price if heating or utility bills increase.

Food stamp purchase prices are based on net incomes, after itemized deductions. When deductions for heating and utility costs increase, purchase prices may go down if there is less income available to the household for food.

The food stamp office says Hansford County food stamp households will now be able to use their most recent utility bills to claim a larger deduction, if they have paid the bill or intends to pay during the month and will have enough money to do so.

If heating and/or utility bills

go up by more than \$25, households may have their cases reviewed right away. If the higher bills entitle the household to a lower purchase price, they will be able to buy their food stamps at that lower price within 10 days. If they have already bought their food stamps for the month, they would have their purchase price adjusted for the next month.

Households whose utility bills have increased less than \$25 will have the change processed according to normal procedures.

Allowable utility bills include heating and cooking fuel, electricity, water and sewer, garbage and trash collection and basic telephone service.

Food stamp households will receive a notice explaining the new procedures by Jan. 15. To find out if they qualify for a lower food stamp purchase price, households with increased utility costs should contact their local food stamp office and ask to have their case reviewed.

We of W.I.F.E. have had the support of businesses and individual people in our town and surrounding area and hope this does not cause any hard feelings upon our organization.
