

About one-fifth of the county's qualified voters went to the polls to cast their bal-lots in this important election. The county vote was 295 for enlarging the senate and 48 against. There are over 2,000 people in the county qualified to vote.

Those voting favored the proposition by overwhelming majorities, but not enough people turned out to vote. City Soon To Be Junction For Two State Highways

Spearman became the junc-tion of two state highways last week when the State Highways Commission approved the re-numbering of several high-ways into two state highways. Highway 15 which will eventually run from Tulsa, Okla. to Farmington, N.M., and State Highway 207 will run from the Oklahoma line through Spearman south to Post was approved by the commis-sion. sion.

sion. Highway 15 will turn west at Spearman and go to Gruver and Stratford, then on into New Mexico and across to Farmington. This is part of a three-state effort to get a sin-gle number on a highway from Tulsa to Farmington Tulsa to Farmington. Oklahoma and New Mexico

are working on building roads to close some of the gaps now existing and also re-numbering some highways so travelers can follow the same road

across the three states. The new highway 207 will start at the Oklahoma line where FM 289 will be changed, then from Spearman to Claude old Highway 15 will be renumbered and from Claude to Post several FM and State Highway numbers will be changed to make it all 207. The 207 highway will get the new number as soon as

some additional right-of-way can be secured along FM roads in Armstrong and Briscoe counties. The new numbers will be included in the next printing of the official state highway

maps. Members of the Highway 15 association in Spearman and members of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce attended a meeting in January with the State Highway Commis-sion to request the changes in the highways.





Rogers Hopes Congress Will Appropriate Funds

Congressman Walter Rogers said today it is his hope that the Congress can approve be-fore the end of the current session an appropriation to be-gin development of the Ali-bates Flint Quarries National

Now that the President has signed into law my bill creat-ing the Alibates Monument, ing the Alibates Monument, I am going to exert every ef-fort to see that development of the site can begin as soon as possible, "Congressman Rogers said. The

Alibates National The Alibates National Monument, including flint quarries used by American Indians for more than 12,000 years and the ruins of pueblos inhabited during the 12th and 13th centuries, is the first na-tional monument to be designated for Texas.

"We in the Panhandle can take special pride in the fact that the Alibates Monument is a first for our State, "Con-gressman Rogers said, "Desig-nation as a national monu-ment is the highest classifica-tion that can be placed on a historical size " historical site .

At the same time the President signed the Rogers Bill creating the new national monument, he signed another Rogers measure naming the Canadian River reservoir "Lake Meredith."

Senator John Tower Supports Cost-of-Living Benefit Increase

As you know, the Congress voted a few months ago to in-crease Social Security bene-fits by a seven percent cost-of-living factor. I fully sup-ported this cost-of-living ben-fit increase.

I am not pleased that con-tinued unwise federal fiscal policies have forced the price of goods and food into a con-tinuing upward spiral, but I did not feel that we could any longer expect Social Security recipients to bear the brunt of the recent inflation.

The seven percent increase was made effective as of January 1 of this year, so Social Security beneficiaries prob-ably will be received sometime this month a supplement-al check for their increased benefits due from January through September . Thereafter the seven percent increase will be reflected in each monthly check.
