William S. "Sid" Evans, 58, died Wednesday at Hansford Hospital following a lengthy illness. Services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday in First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Albert Lindley, pastor, and the Rev. Leland Grimmer, of the Apostolic Faith Church, officiating. Graveside services were at 10 a.m. Friday in Fairview Cemetery in Bronte by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Directors. Mr. Evans was born in Sonora. He married Felma Brunson in 1953 at Bronte. He moved to Spearman 24 years ago from Bronte. He was retired from Exxon Inc., having worked for the company for 31 years.

He was a World War II veteran and a member of First United Methodist Church, Masonic Lodge in Bronte, and Elks Lodge in Perryton. Survivors include his wife; a son, Kerry Evans of Amarillo; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Evans of Bronte; a sister, Mrs. Jo Winton of Fort Worth; and a brother, James R. Evans of Tyler. 420 calls for assistance

The activities for the month of August for the Spearman Police Department are as follows: For the month of August there were 420 calls for assistance. The Police Department had 46 offense reports. PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.
Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 67 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.
The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$100,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.
The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

Strake Talk

TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH

Texas has a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long—or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."

My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need

to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our highways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms—eight years. That is enough time for anyone. Too great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

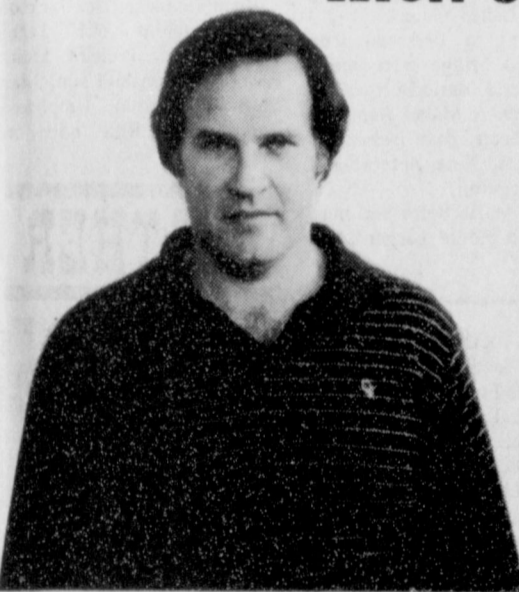

ACT assessment program available

As the new school year begins, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to participate in the ACT Assessment Program.

The ACT Assessment, which consist of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

School guidance counselors recommend that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during the junior year or early in the senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the Assessment from their high school guidance offices. The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$9.50. For 1982-83, ACT has established this test date schedule:

February 12, 1983	January 14
April 16, 1983	March 18
June 11, 1983	May 13

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. A sample copy of a full-length test is available in every high school. Students who would like to have copies of additional tests may obtain them at cost from ACT.

The ACT Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. The questionnaire focuses on the student's interests, academic and non-academic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment Program for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and replacement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and only those institutions and agencies specifically designated by the student.

The ACT Assessment Program is a major service of The American College Testing Program, which has national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa.

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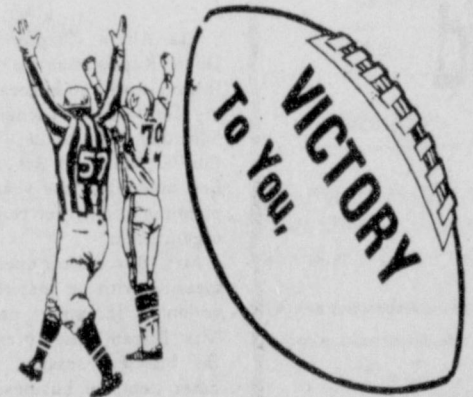

Sarpalius to introduce crop insurance bill

Legislation which would enable the State of Texas to further reduce insured grower's premium cost for All-Risk crop insurance will be introduced in January, according to Senator Bill Sarpalius of Hereford. Sarpalius, Chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Agriculture, announced today that his committee has begun drafting such a bill. "In 1980, Congress authorized for the first time, the Federal government to pay up to 30% of the premium cost to farmers and ranchers insured under the USDA All-Risk Program," the Senator said. "The bill also authorized any state to further reduce the cost to its agricultural producers by paying an additional portion of the true risk premium cost," he added. Ted Crouch, Field Operations Director for USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation in College Station, said, "FCIC is very pleased to hear of this innovative effort. I am especially pleased that it is beginning in Texas. We all know, too well, how severely the agricultural sector of our state's economy has suffered recently. During this period, FCIC's capacity to relieve these adverse conditions has been limited in many areas of the state because of low participation. The action being initiated by the Senate Subcommittee on Agriculture will almost certainly stimulate greater producer acceptance."

For the 1982 crop year an estimated 1.9 million acres of Texas crops are covered by All-Risk crop insurance. Maximum liability on these acres exceeds \$200,000,000. Senator Sarpalius feels the additional assistance would make Crop Insurance programs more attractive to more farmers. "Increased participation helps spread insurance risk and strengthens the Crop Insurance programs for all farmers involved," he stated. All-Risk Crop Insurance is administered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and marketed through private insurance firms. It guarantees a specific yield per farm for each insured crop. That yield is established prior to planting based upon either area average yields or the farmer's own production yield history. Crops are guaranteed against most unavoidable causes of loss. If the insured's production is less than the guarantee, a payment will be made for the production lost at a price selected before the growing season. No disaster designation nor any other special conditions are required for claims to be paid under the All-Risk program.



Renewal Course To Begin

An ECA or EMT Renewal Course will begin here Sept. 7 at 7 p.m. at the fire station. This will be a 40 hour course taught thru Frank Phillips College, with college credits available on successful completion of the course.

Michele Davis and Ed Williamson, paramedics, will teach the course. There will be a \$25.00 registration fee and the approximate cost of textbooks will be \$10.50. The class will meet two nights a week for approximately 7 weeks. This course is open to the

public, teaching basic life support, CPR and there are no requirements for you to work with the local ambulance. On successful completion of the course, participants will be certified by the Texas Department of Health. For further information you may contact Michele Davis at 3411 or Ed Williamson at 3843.
