An average of five visits to the shelter seems necessary for women to become convinced that some action is necessary. This is true not only for us here, but across the nation. It is hard for them not to believe the batterer when he seems so contrite and promises never again - again! Especially when you want so much to believe him. Part of this gullibility is due to the fact that the woman feels herself to be inadequate for earning her own living - and heaven knows that everything in her experience tells her she is incapable and worthless. She must overcome this feeling to be able to take charge of

Note the letter above quoted. So, gentlemen of the law, please continue to render aid to these women. They will catch on, especially if you continue to recommend the Panhandle Crisis Center to them. And they will be forever grateful to you for your support. You should hear them sing the praises of those law officers whose patience did not run out!






