3 Sign up for City Race

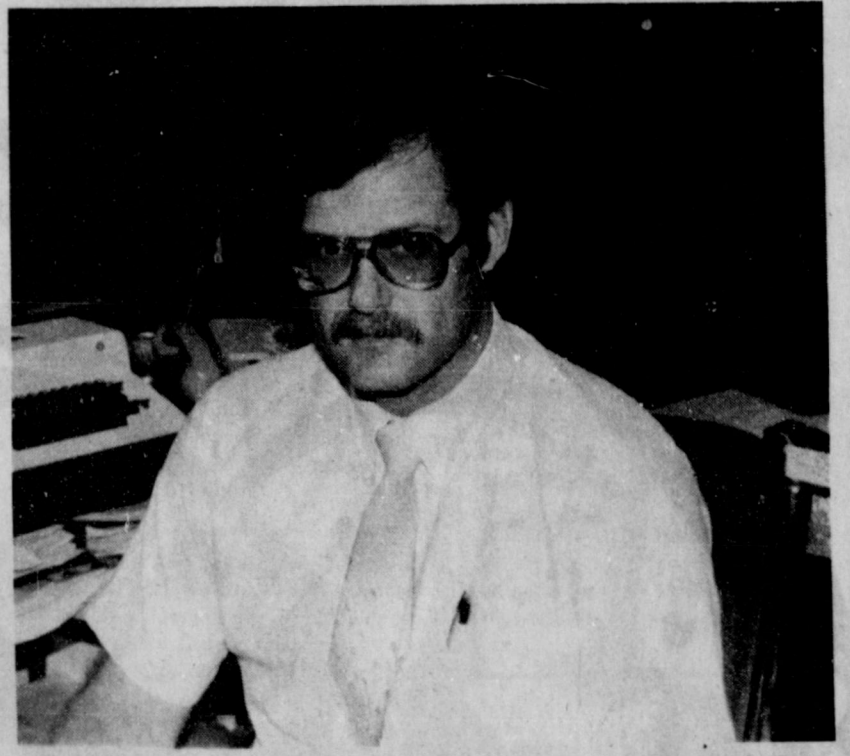

ees and employees with service anniversaries at the banquet. Howard Riggins, utility man-equipment operator in the Perryton Construction Center, retired after 18 years of service.

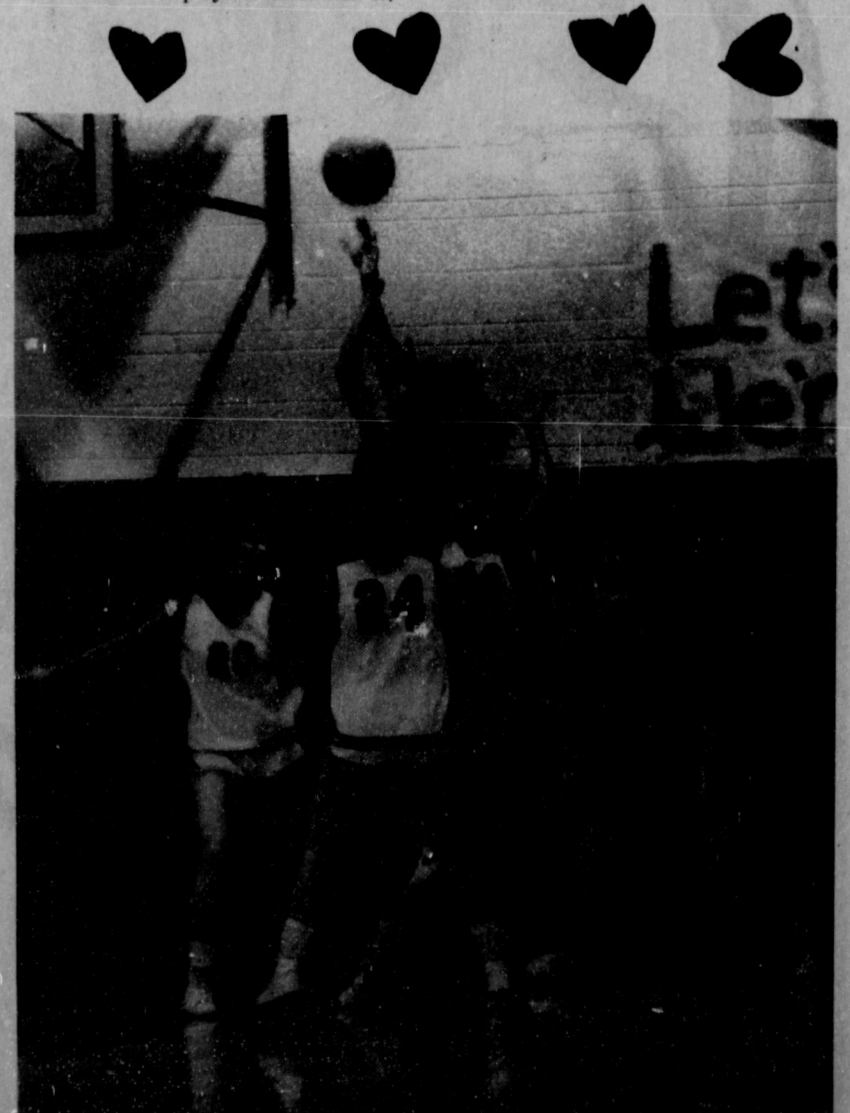

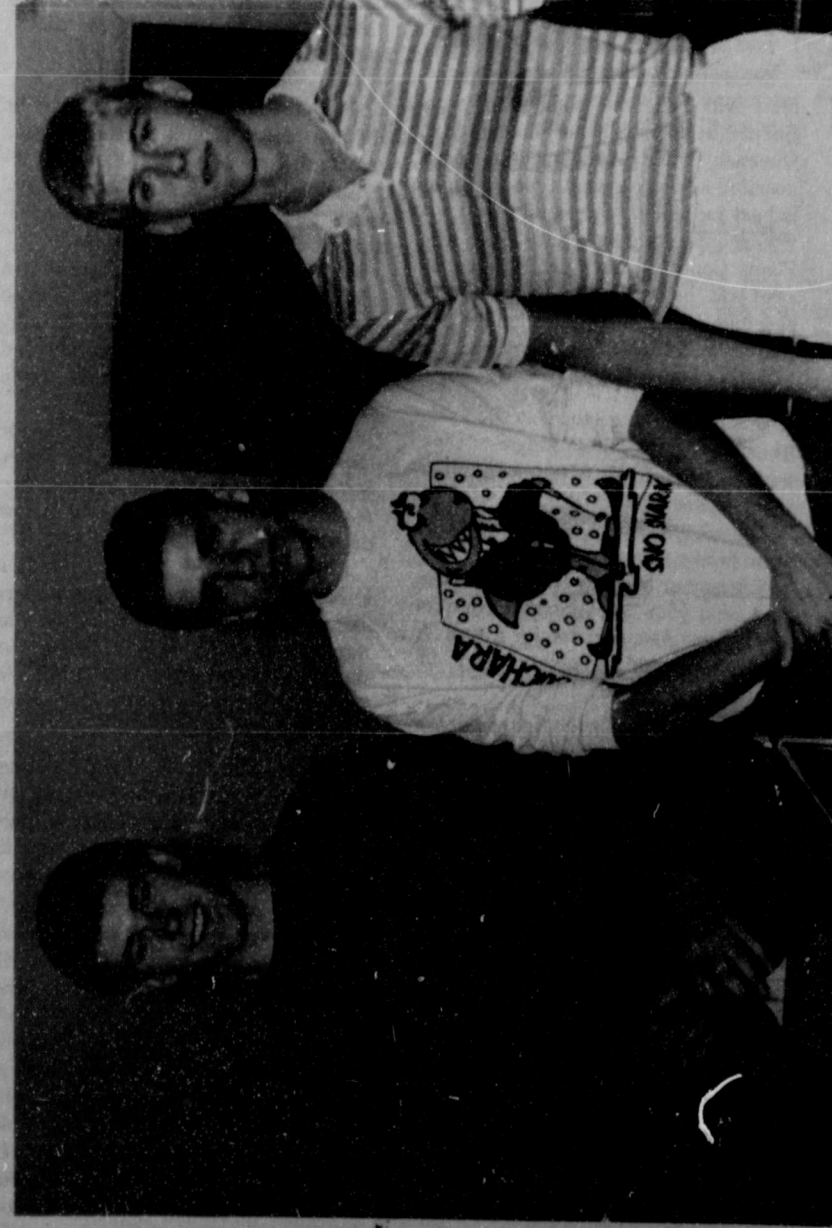

National Child Passenger Safety Week, Feb. 8-14, marks the first year all 50 states are enforcing automobile occupant protection laws. Wyoming passed its law in 1986 and was last of the states to do so.

David Zane, coordinator of TDH's Safe Riders program, said the laws save lives and prevent serious injuries almost daily. "Our files are full of survival stories," he said.

And said recent studies have revealed, however, that many child safety seats are not used properly.

The Texas Transportation Institute observed 15, 131 children in 12 Texas cities in 1986 to find only 51 percent correctly restrained in safety seats or seat belts. Another nine percent were restrained, but not correctly or safely. The rest were riding unrestrained, in violation of the law.

Another study, by the U.S. Department of Transportation, showed that nationally as many as two-thirds of children observed were riding in safety seats that were installed or used incorrectly.

Common misuses of safety seats include failure to snugly harness the child, incorrectly routing the seat belt through the safety seat frame, failure to use the harness or shield, and positioning infants to face forward instead of toward the rear of the car to prevent whiplash.

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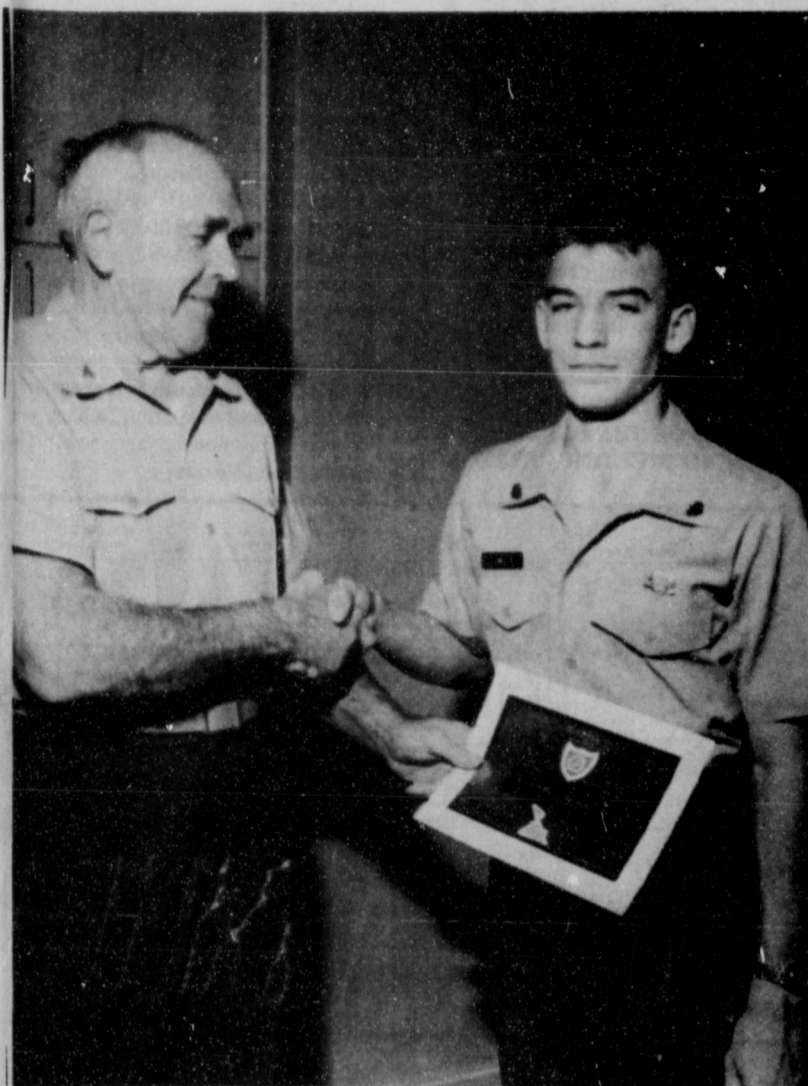

Palo Duro River Progress Report

A. Current Status

1. **Geotechnical.** McClelland Engineers, the District's geotechnical consultant completed the field exploration portion of the geotechnical investigation. Laboratory testing and engineering analysis have been started. Although all expenses have not been received, McClelland has estimated that the field exploration portion was completed about 10 percent under budget.

2. **Surveys.** Freese and Nichols did some surveying at the site and plans to complete all surveys during February.

3. **Conflicts.** No Freese and Nichols activity this month. Oil wells need to be abandoned and plugged, and several pipelines need to be relocated. Also, the County needs to be contacted about closing the existing County Road and re-routing over the dam.

4. **Permits.** An archeological permit will be required from the Texas Antiquity Committee. Progress in obtaining this permit is detailed in the following paragraph on Archeological Coordination.

5. **Freese and Nichols Projects.**
a. **Design of Dam.** Preliminary design associated with starting the geotechnical investigation was the only activity this month. No major activities will be under-taken until preliminary results of the geotechnical investigation are obtained.

b. **Archeological Coordination.** Proposals were received from two archeologists for the Phase I survey. Archeological Research, Inc. (ARI) proposed a lump sum contract of \$32,451.38 with field surveys performed in March 1987 and draft report submitted in August 1987. The Arch-

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c. **Environmental Study.** No activity this month.

d. **Water Conservation Plan.** A water conservation plan was completed and approved by the member cities. It was adopted by the Palo Duro River Authority Board of Directors and has been forwarded to the Texas Water Development Board for review.

e. **Project Funding.** A meeting was held with the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and the Texas Water Commission (TWC) on January 16, 1987. It was determined that the TWC must give its approval prior to any bond sales. An application to the TWC for issuance of bonds is being prepared.

B. **Significant Events for the Month**
McClelland Engineers, Inc. completed the field exploration portion of the geotechnical study. Proposals were received from two archeologists, and Archeological Research, Inc. was selected to do the Phase I Survey. A subcontract is being prepared.

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
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
