The Butch Lasater ranch home, known as the old Deaner Place, was completely vandalized on June 25 according to Sheriff R.L. McFarlin.

The vandals kicked holes in the sheet rock, broke all of the windows in the house, tore off every door on the cabinets, pulled up the bathroom sink, and destroyed the commode in the bathroom.

At this time, Butch Lasater is offering a \$1,000 reward for

information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the destruction.

Sheriff McFarlin through intensive investigation, determined that 3 people were involved and one of the vandals apparently injured his left hand.

deserving of the recognition and thanks. This award will be sent to the state high school association so that they may present it at an appropriate event.

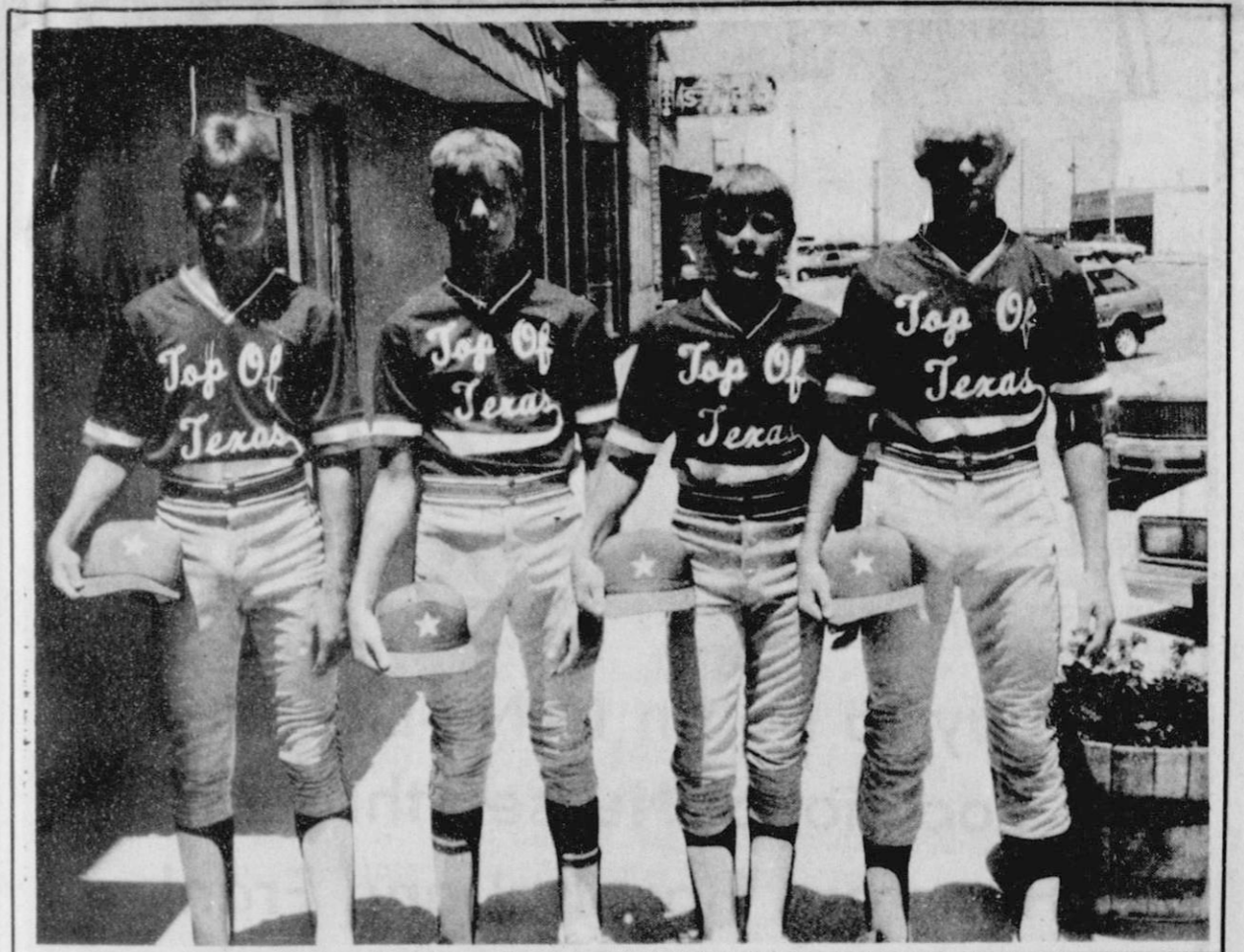
Congratulations on being selected to represent all of those deserving people in the states of Section VI who have contributed

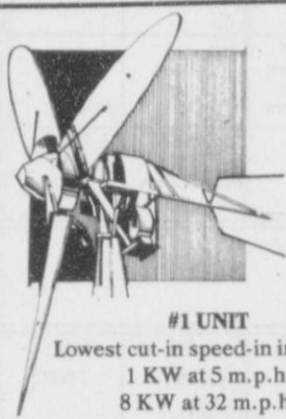

Following a week of activities for area gifted and talented children, plans are being finalized for a Saturday program during the fall semester at West Texas State University.

The June gifted and talented summer session at WTSU attracted 113 students from eight to 14 years old from 24 Panhandle communities.

The summer program featured sessions in science, with Kirby Hoffman, WTSU graduate student in biology from Canyon, and Rick Devoe, science teacher at Crockett Junior High School, Amarillo; English, Candace Benefiel, assistant reference librarian at WTSU Cornette Library, and Cynthia Valk, English instructor at Amarillo College; creative dramatics, Carol Hollingsworth, elementary school teacher in Amarillo; Frankie Coy, graduate student in music therapy from Canyon; art with Ruth Carleton,

elementary school art teacher in Amarillo; music, Regi Fowler, Canyon elementary school teacher; and physical education, Faith McDonald, WTSU instructor in physical education.

WTSU international students also directed kite construction, egg roll cooking, Chinese calligraphy and Chinese folk songs.

The fall program on Saturday will bring area children from grades one through 12 to campus Sept. 15 through Nov. 10.

Gifted and Talented Institute programs at WTSU were initiated in 1982 with a grant from the Rockwell Fund, Inc., of Houston.

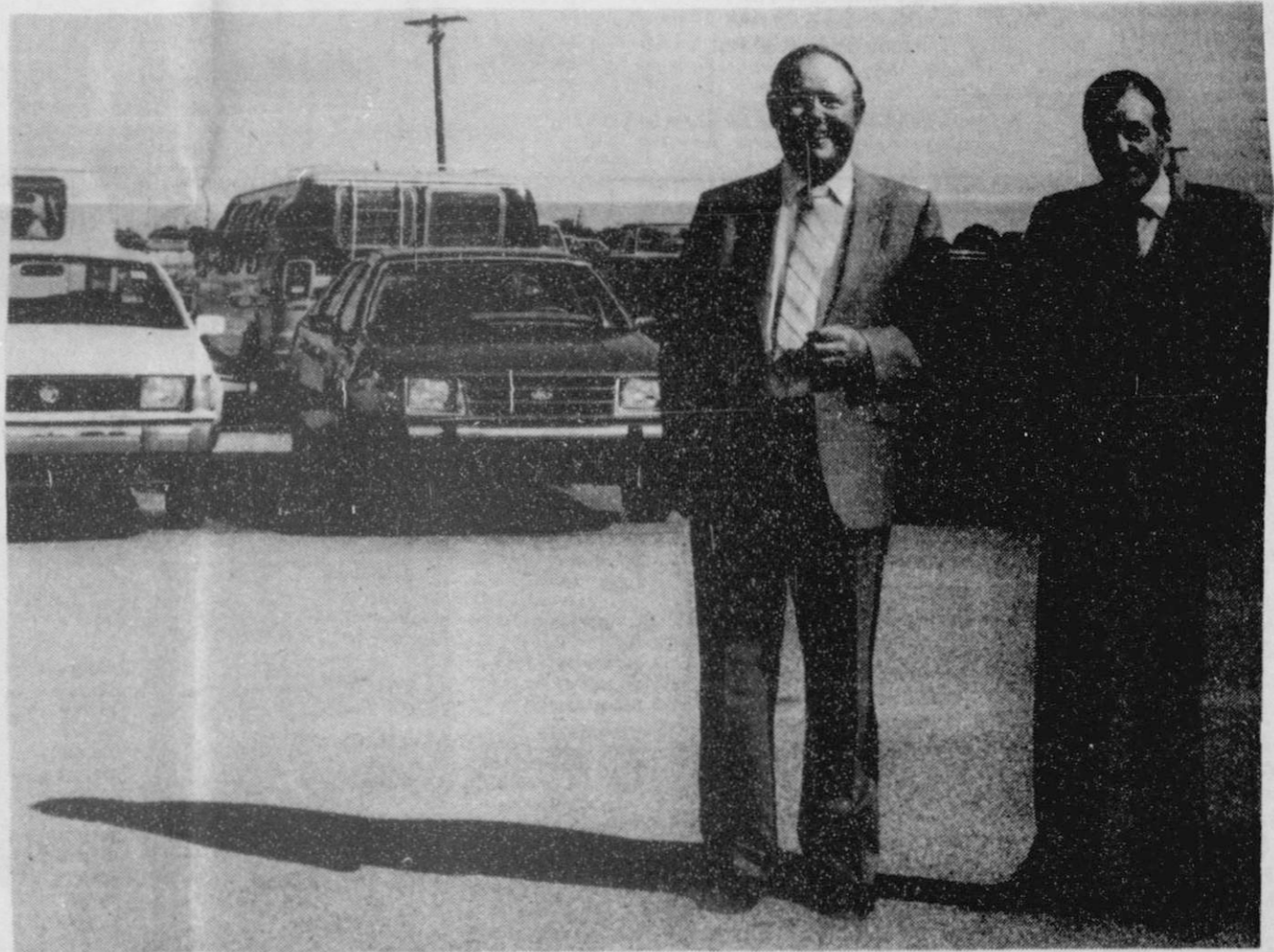

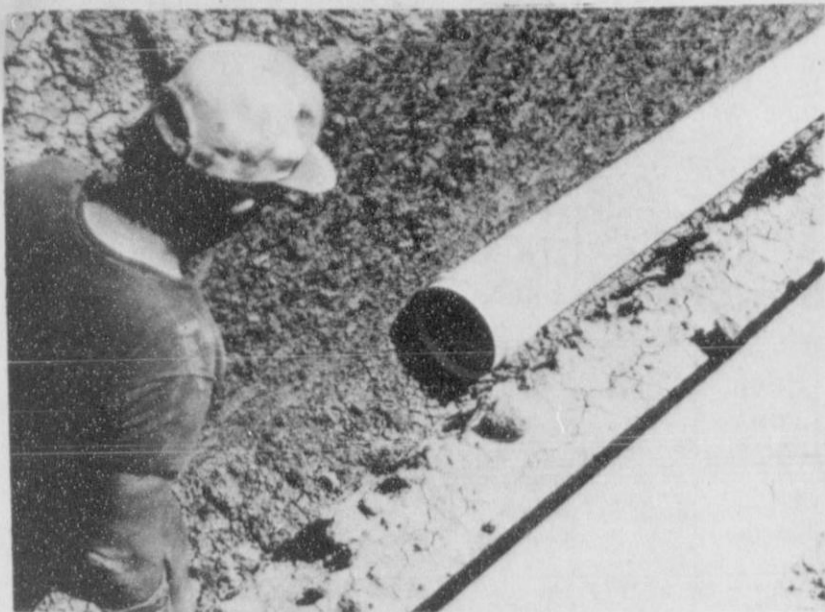

Pipelines also make tillage operations easier and reduce the weed problems associated with open ditches. 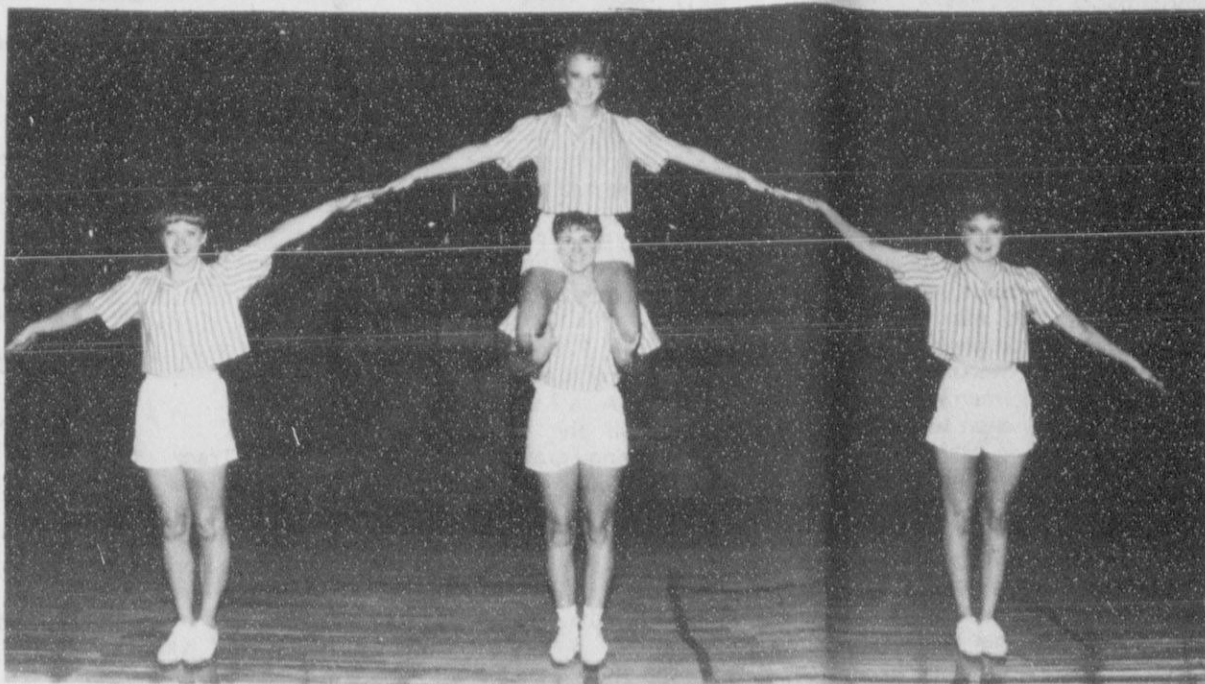

## Sodium Chlorate authorized for use

A crisis declaration by the Texas Department of Agriculture authorizes the use of sodium chlorate to kill weeds in wheat to facilitate harvest. Elvis Cozart, manager of the Pesticide Registration Section, emphasized that authorization applies only to the High Plains of Texas.

The use provisions are as follows:

1. Only sodium chlorate containing a fire retardant may be used.
2. The authorized application rate is 4 lbs. active ingredient per acre.

3. The spray volume should be between 5 and 10 gallons per acre.

4. A pre-harvest interval of 7 days must be observed.

5. Do not graze treated fields within 14 days following treatment.

This special authorization was requested by producers because of rapid weed growth following recent rains. According to Dr. Frank C. Petr, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, sodium chlorate is non-selective so caution is urged to prevent its application or drift to other crops in adjacent fields.

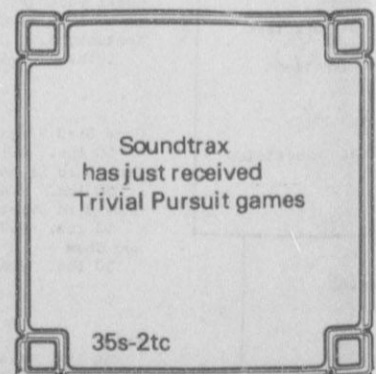

When Jonah booked passage for Tarshish, he was running from God, Trying to escape the command to preach at Nineveh. Undoubtedly he had heard how terribly cruel the Assyrians were. Shelton hesitated, knowing that some of the men who had killed his friends might be there. But he also knew that God had given him this opportunity and would help him love these men, so he consented. When he finished preaching, about 25 communist guerrillas indicated they had received Christ.

If God is leading you to witness to someone you find hard to love, don't refuse. Obey Christ's command. He will give you the love you need.

# Police Dept.

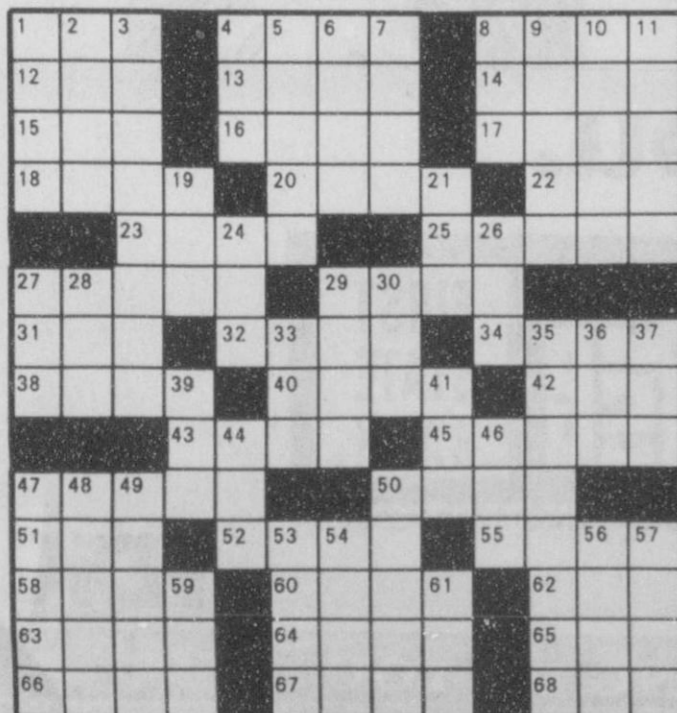
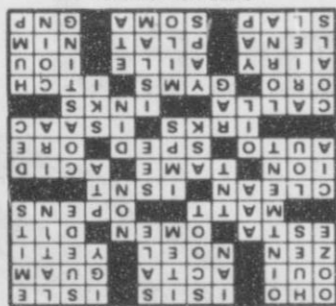

## Chemical weed control may be answer

Hansford County wheat growers looking to conserve moisture, minimize erosion and reduce costs should seriously consider launching a chemical weed control program.

A chemical weed control program is any system that replaces tillage with a herbicide application for weed control during the fallow season, says Bruce McRee of AGCO of Spearman, Inc. in Spearman. For most Hansford County growers the fallow season is generally the three-month period between continuous winter wheat crops, he adds.

"Moisture retention is clearly one of the most significant benefits of a chemical weed control program," McRee points out. "On most Hansford County farms, moisture is one of the most limiting production factors a farmer has to contend with," McRee notes. Research, in fact, has shown that a single disking or deep tillage across a field can extract an inch of moisture, translating into a yield reduction of 3 bushels an acre.

In studies conducted at the Central Great Plains Experiment Station, Akron, Colo., moisture loss to evaporation was reduced by more than 50 percent when farmers reduced tillage by using a chemical weed control program and left a residue cover on the surface. Extra moisture at planting will often produce a good stand, allowing farmers to graze cattle earlier and longer over the winter months, while also increasing yields at harvest, the dealer suggests.

Soil erosion control is another benefit of a chemical weed control program. During the winter, it's

possible for 25 to 30 mph winds to simply blow away soils left unprotected, he points out. Wind erosion can be eliminated, however, with proper management of a residue cover. One USDA study, he notes, showed that soil erosion could be decreased by as much as 90 percent when residue is left on the surface.

Economics and time savings also favor a chemical weed control program, he contends. A grower can save between two and three tillage operations by spraying rather than tilling his fields for weed control during fallow periods. "At the rate of about \$4.50 to \$5 per acre for each tillage trip, the cost savings are considerable. Growers will also save time spraying versus multiple tillages," he adds.

A typical herbicide program on fallow ground might revolve around an application of Roundup herbicide at the low rate of 12 ounces or 1 pint per acre either after harvest, during fallow or prior to planting, the dealer notes. Such an application will control a broad spectrum of annual and perennial weeds such as volunteer wheat, pigweed, cheatgrass, kochia and Russian thistle.

Treatment should be made while weeds are actively growing, and between 4 to 6 inches tall, he adds. For improved broadleaf control, growers may apply Roundup at the 12 ounce or 1 pint rate in a tank with a half pint per acre of Banvel or a pint of 2,4-D.

Roundup can be sprayed with ground equipment or by air. At the 12 ounce rate, growers should use only 3 to 10 gallons of water for ground application, and 3 to 5

gallons for aerial spraying. Flat fan nozzles are recommended over large flood jets and nozzles should be spaced on 20-inch intervals on the boom.

"With a properly-timed herbicide application, wheat growers can control weeds during the fallow season without having to till the ground. This allows them to conserve moisture and minimize erosion, resulting in higher wheat yields in their continuous cropping rotation. The future profitability of our local farmers will be dependent on our ability to manager our soils for future

generations. And, chemicals will play a large part in helping reduce tillage and minimize erosion," he concludes.
